Changes to D86 curriculum questioned

The new aligned social studies curriculum that will be rolled out over the next few years in Hinsdale High School District 86 is aimed at helping students “see themselves” in the content, educators submit.

But some district board members questioned the wisdom of doing away with popular courses like AP European History in pursuit of creating “global citizens.”

At the March 23 meeting, members of the District 86 Social Studies Alignment team laid out the plan to, as detailed in the presentation, “create a single program of studies, which is sustainable (and) meets our department mission and goals” at both Hinsdale Central and Hinsdale South.

Beginning with the 2024-25

school year, freshman on the AP track will take World Cultures Honors, replacing World History Honors (Central) and World Studies Honors (South). World Cultures Honors made the most sense, staff said, because the curriculum will reduce content overlap between freshman and sophomore honors courses currently offered, provide a solid social studies foundation that students will build upon in future courses, value depth over breadth and critical thinking skills over memorization and meet state standards for both the geography and inquiry standards. It will also focus on literacy, writing and thinking skills demanded in future AP courses and standardized tests, among other benefits, said Kathy Lencioni, Hinsdale South department chair.

Those students would then pro-

ceed to the new AP Modern World History as sophomores and AP US History as juniors. AP Modern World History is replacing AP European History in the track, but will still be offered as an elective for juniors and seniors.

Board member Debbie Levinthal, who has been critical of the changes, said AP European History has traditionally been one of the most popular courses at Central and produced scores well above national averages. She questioned if AP Modern World History could generate the same level of engagement and performance.

Noting that the course will incorporate what has been taught in the soon-to-be sunsetted East Asian Studies and Humanities classes, Lencioni said it will be a more inviting class to a broader range of students.

“We wanted to design a class where students can more easily see themselves in the curriculum” rather than more narrowly focused class that may not resonate beyond a certain student subgroup, she said. In that vein, content from the current African American History class will be folded into the U.S. History and new American Diversity courses.

“I know there’s a tendency to lament what is lost,” said Hinsdale Central social studies department chair Mark Meyer.

But he encouraged people to see the potential of these new learning opportunities.

Board member Cynthia Hanson praised the team for its work, echoing Meyer’s remarks that the evolution of the curriculum is an appropriate response to a changing culture and student body.



Return flight

NCL connects moms and teens with seniors

Each year the Hinsdale-Clarendon Hills Chapter of the National Charity League holds an all chapter meeting at which mothers and daughters team up on a project to benefit one or more of its philanthropic partners. This year's event took place at The Community House on Feb. 26 and benefited a pair of local organizations.

Mothers and daughters from the local NCL chapter gathered to create handmade cards and handwritten letters for residents of Birches Senior Living and Memory Care in Clarendon

Hills. The endeavor doubled as a project to benefit the Hinsdale Historical Society and its upcoming celebration of the village's 150th birthday, with each card and letter including encouragement for Birches residents to share their stories of Hinsdale.

"Part of the celebration is to collect stories and memories of those who have been part of the community for a long time," said Christina Salerno, vice president of philanthropy for the local NCL.

Birches is one of 16 area organizations that benefit from the work of NCL's 120 mother-daughter teams, Salerno said. Throughout the year,

members visit Birches to lead games of bingo, bake holiday cookies, read stories, serve meals and visit with residents.

The chapter's work with the Historical Society also extends beyond the cardmaking event. Members are helping to create a photo log documenting every home in Hinsdale as part of the 150th anniversary celebration.

"It's been an ongoing project that we've been working on for quite a while with them," Salerno said.

Along with information about the Hinsdale Historical Society project, the letters and cards created at The

Community House included everything from hand-drawn pictures to poems and photos, Salerno said. Some writers shared information about their own lives, while other letters offered simple greetings to let the reader know someone was thinking of them.

NCL chapters across the country bring mothers and their daughters, from seventh-graders to high school seniors, together to perform philanthropic acts to benefit local charities and organizations. Each year NCL members donate nearly 3 million hours to more than 6,000 charities in the United States.

Buy vehicle stickers, animal tags by May 1

Vehicle sticker and animal tag applications are on sale now for Hinsdale residents and must be purchased by May 1. A \$25 late fee will be imposed for any vehicle stickers bought after the deadline. All vehicles registered in Illinois with a Hinsdale address must also be registered with the village through the purchase of a vehicle license sticker.

Residents should have received a vehicle sticker application in the mail earlier this month and have the option of purchasing 2023-24 stickers online at www.villageofhinsdale.org. The sticker will arrive in the mail in about

five business days after the online renewal is completed.

Residents still may purchase stickers in person at village hall, 19 E. Chicago Ave., from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays or to buy vehicle stickers via mail. Those who prefer to mail the application and payment should update the application form with any new or changed information and return it to the village's finance department along with the proper fees. Please be sure to return both the top and bottom forms when submitting the application through the mail.

DuPage County voters also may cast paper ballots at the DuPage County Fairgrounds (Building 5), 2015 Manchester Road in Wheaton, just off County Farm Road, east of the

county's government administration buildings.

Voting hours at the fairgrounds are 8:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. weekdays to April 3; and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekends through April 2.

News reporting has changed, part two

As part of the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the village, we've taken a look back at some early issues of The Doings, which started covering the village in 1895.

These news briefs show not only what was going on in the 1920s, 1930s and 1970s, but how reporting has changed over time.

Big vote for annexation

April 14, 1923 — The annexation of Fullersburg became a reality after the votes were counted at the special election Tuesday. Though only a small vote was polled, it was so overwhelmingly in favor of the proposition that there was no question left in one's mind as to the public sentiment toward a Greater and Better Hinsdale.

Two hundred and sixty-three votes were polled. Of these, 247 were in favor of annexation and 16 against. There was some electioneering against the annexation by a few residents of Fullersburg who feared an increase in taxation, but it had little influence.

The annexed territory, which becomes a new gateway to Hinsdale and is traversed by the State Road, will become a part of the village which in time will contain some of the prettiest spots in town. The wooded sec-

tion offers excellent home sites and the southern end of the Cousins subdivision is high class property. This subdivision will grow rapidly now that water, sewers and electric light are available.

The village board at an early date will consider plans to carry village improvements into the annexed territory. Street lights and sidewalks will be the first improvement, and later water, sewers and pavement will come as property owners petition for the same.

No News; So We Have to Make a Little of Our Own

March 16, 1933 — All was quiet in Hinsdale about ten o'clock on Friday morning. News was as scarce as "hen's teeth."

Then all of a sudden things began to happen.

The cold spell necessitated a little more heat than usual to warm up the shop at the Merrill Printing company. The furnace responded, but the flue pipe "couldn't take it" and as a result became overheated. The soot caught fire and the situation became rather serious.

A quick call to the Hinsdale Fire Department brought Chief Henry Domianus and his men over in a hurry, with a result that the chemicals soon had the blaze extinguished.

The Doings takes this opportunity to thank the local

firemen for their quick action and fine results.

Globetrotters trot to town

Oct. 12, 1972 — Hinsdale is getting the basketball works Tuesday night at Central high school. And that means Meadowlark Lemon, Curly Neal and the gang.

All that gang is the Harlem Globetrotters, the Clown Princes of the Court. Lemon remains the center of attraction, according to former Globetrotter Bobby Milton, but he also acts as a coach and no doubt will be on the bench when the Globetrotters play for real.

But you'll be able to tell when the fun's about to start because he'll be out there, along with Neal, who still dazzles with his dribbling.

Their foes will be the New Jersey Reds, featuring little Red Klotz, who has real ability but is taken advantage of by the Globbies. ... The night is sponsored by the Hinsdale-Clarendon Hills Jaycees.

Milton played for 18 years for the Trotters and coached the team upon the death of Abe Saperstein in 1966. Milton no longer plays, but guaranteed that the team at Hinsdale Tuesday will put on a "complete show — the same one that's given at the Pope's house." Also on the team are Nate Branch, ex-Nebraska star, and Jumpin' Jack Jackson out of Virginia Union.

The Globetrotters are starting their 47th season. The stop in Hinsdale is one of their first before "they're long gone," laughed Milton.

HC senior brings voice of fellow students to board

Hinsdale Central High School senior Meghna Mitra will serve as liaison to the Hinsdale District 86 school board for just a few more months, but it's a job that she said will follow her into college and beyond.

"I'm interested in studying public policy and politics on the pre-law track," she said.

One day, she hopes to use all that she's learned to affect health and environmental policy.

As the liaison between the Hinsdale Central Student Council and the school board, Mitra adds the voice of her classmates to issues being discussed and decided upon by the school board.

The committee of the whole meetings that Mitra attends are held just once a month, but the work that goes into the position takes place all month long as Mitra tries to keep herself apprised of the needs and concerns of her classmates by talking to people, conducting interviews and making herself available. She recently began distributing a survey that allows any student to share concerns and suggest topics in need of attention. She said it's

important to provide a means for every student's voice to be heard.

The results of her work are presented at the board meetings held the second Thursday of each month. Mitra speaks at the beginning of the meeting, followed by her counterpart from Hinsdale South High School.

One such report addressed the need for social-emotional learning as a part of students' overall wellness.

"Coming out of the pandemic, that was a really big focus of the administration," Mitra said. Her report included suggestions for where the administration's efforts would be best focused.

Through her monthly reports, Mitra said she also tries to bring attention to the many groups and activities that make her school unique, including niche clubs that not even she knew about before becoming the board liaison.

Her reports often are influenced by issues that come up at weekly meetings of the Student Council.

"I basically get representatives from each grade telling me what issues their grade is having," she said.

Mitra also meets regularly

with Principal Bill Walsh, who informs her of what's coming up on the board agenda and which issues might benefit from a student's opinion.

Mitra said her role as liaison has given her a perspective that few students are afforded and an appreciation for the work of a decision-making body such as the school board. Much more goes into making a decision

than the average student realizes, she said.

Mitra is the founder of her own nonprofit, Sustainable Health, which advocates for environmentally friendly practices in health care. She also is an active member of several organizations in the Hinsdale community. Advocating for change isn't new for Mitra, but through her experience as liaison, she

said she realizes more than ever the importance of equity and representation and the role that public policy has on the road to social change.

"I really value the ability to have conversations with representative groups about what changes we need to see," she said. "I'm really grateful for this experience."

Thousands — even millions — of reasons to vote

Why should you vote in the Tuesday, April 4, election? The 2,450 students who attend Hinsdale Central High School, where they are taught by 215 certified faculty members and have the chance to participate on 31 athletic teams and more than 85 clubs.

The 1,364 students at Hinsdale South High School, which has 134 certified faculty members, 31 athletic teams and more than 70 clubs.

An annual budget of some \$160 million.

The three individuals voters elect to serve on the Hinsdale High School District Board will be responsible for the above — and more — during their four-year terms. They will be in charge of hiring a new superintendent, creating a new strategic plan, evaluating curriculum decisions and overseeing the final construction projects that are part of the \$140 million future ready facilities plan.

We've done our best to introduce the candidates to readers, sharing some biographical information and running three full pages of charts summarizing their positions on the issues.

We've summarized board issues over the past two years and provided some information about the board members who are not up for reelection to help voters decide who will best complement that group. All our election coverage is available online at www.thehinsdalean.com.

We've also offered our own endorsements, recommending Asma Akhras, Kay Gallo and Catherine "Cat" Greenspon for the three open seats on the board (our reasoning is explained in full in a March 23 editorial posted online).

And now it's up to you.

Of course District 86 isn't the only local race on the ballot. Residents also will elect school board members for Community Consolidated Elementary District 181 and trustees for the Hinsdale Village Board and Hinsdale Public Library Board. Those three races are all uncontested.

DuPage voters also will be asked to weigh in on candidates for the College of DuPage District 502 Board and the Regional Board of School Trustees.



The good news is you don't have to wait until April 4 to cast your ballots. Early voting is available for DuPage County voters at Hinsdale Village Hall, 19 E. Chicago Ave., through Saturday, April 1.

Cook County voters can cast their ballots now through Monday, April 3, at the village halls in Brookfield and Lyons. Visit www.cookcountyclerk.gov/elections/ways-to-vote for more information.

In addition to the coveted "I voted" sticker, those who cast their ballots on Tuesday will be setting a great example for their kids. And they'll have the satisfaction of knowing they fulfilled their civic responsibility.

Good reminders for troubled times — or any time

I first discovered Charles Mackesy in November 2020 when CBS Sunday Morning was doing a piece on him and his book, "The Boy, The Mole, The Fox and The Horse." We were enjoying our annual Thanksgiving weekend getaway in Saugatuck, so I had time to sit down with my coffee and enjoy the show.

"In a quaint barn in the English countryside, there's a man, with a dog, documenting the human condition in its simplest form, through sketches about kindness and empathy, as we all navigate this new world," correspondent Seth Doane said as he opened the segment.

Then Mackesy spoke.

"I sort of got quite obsessed with making drawings that encourage people not to give up," he said. "It just sort of came out of nowhere."

An English illustrator with a dog living in the countryside trying to make us all feel better? I was hooked.

The book, which ended up under our Christmas tree as a gift

for Ainsley, is charming, just like Doane's report.

"I hope this book encourages you, perhaps, to live courageously with more kindness for yourself and for others," Mackesy writes in the introduction. "And to ask for help when you need it — which is always a brave thing to do."

Each page features a wonderful drawing, almost always accompanied by a little gem of wisdom — often presented in response to a question from the boy.

"What do you think is the biggest waste of time?" he asks.

"Comparing yourself to others," said the mole.

"What do you think success is?" he asks.

"To love," said the mole.

"What do we do when our hearts hurt?"

"We wrap them with friendship, shared tears and time, till they wake hopeful and happy again,"

said the horse.

The book has had more success than Mackesy ever imagined. Initially only 10,000 copies were printed, but it's sold more than 2 million and spent 51 weeks on the New York Times' best-seller list. Oprah read it aloud live for the Chicago Public Library, using voices for the different characters, and it

has been made into an audiobook, narrated by Mackesy himself.

Even Britain's health service has looked to Mackesy, using some of his lines to promote mental health, Doane reported.

"What is the bravest thing you've ever said?" said the boy.

"Help," said the horse.

Mackesy also has been posting inspirational sketches on Instagram and Facebook for a couple of years. One person on Instagram indicated Mackesy convinced him to ask for help rather than take his own life.

I think what I appreciated most about Mackesy was his humility. He said he really doesn't have the answers to life's complicated questions.

"I'm not on this side of the river saying, 'This is how you get across,' " he told Doane. "I'm on your side of the river going, 'Wow! That's a big river. How are we going to do this?'"

I also really appreciated the insight he offered on social media, where posts seem to depict perfect lives — and where people feel free to weigh in on all sorts of topics.

"You've got plenty of critics, so don't be your own critic," he said. "Encourage yourself. Be kind to yourself."

His book might look like it's for children, but his messages are ones we all need to hear. Especially now.


Former state senator applauds endorsement of Gallo

ASK AN EXPERT

DR. TOM CARABALLO, PHYSICIAN

Why did you launch a concierge practice?

While attending to injuries and acute illnesses, emergency department physician Tom Caraballo said he also sees the department waiting room filled with people with less-than-urgent needs. Emergency medicine has become primary care for many people, Caraballo said, due to difficulty in getting appointments, access to doctors and access to care in general. As the founder of Fashioned Health, the Hinsdale resident is offering a solution.

Fashioned Health is a concierge, private-pay medical practice that offers patients prompt, unlimited access to their physician. The Fashioned Health website describes the service as "a physician partnership that will bring back the doctor-patient relationship and focus on optimizing one's health to help prevent disease." The practice's goal, Caraballo said, is to empower each patient to take charge of their health through informed lifestyle decisions and changes.

"I like the idea of holistic medi-

cine," Caraballo said of the practice of treating the body as a whole rather than as a collection of unrelated parts. "The whole body is connected."

While they are not averse to conventional medications and interventions, Caraballo said he and other doctors in his practice consider how things like sleep, exercise and diet affect a patient's health and existing conditions. Whenever possible, the doctors try to use lifestyle changes to achieve the outcomes the patient desires.

Caraballo earned a degree in biomedical engineering at the University of Miami before attending Nova Southeastern Osteopathic Medicine School in Ft. Lauderdale. Caraballo and his family moved to Hinsdale about four years ago. He's now medical director of the emergency department at Ascension Mercy Medical Center in Aurora.

"Now, I'm doing the concierge practice, as well," he said.

Fashioned Health is a membership-based practice that doesn't involve insurance companies or co-pays. For a flat monthly fee, members have unlimited access to their doctor, in-home lab testing and more. The company's HIPAA-compliant app allows doctors and

patients to communicate safely and immediately, Caraballo said.

"It makes it easier for the doctor to provide care to the patient because the physician works for the patient," he said.

New members begin the relationship with a thorough health history and baseline labs that measure 40 to 50 blood markers.

"We go deep into everything," Caraballo said.

Once a patient's overall health is assessed, the doctor works with the patient to develop a game plan to reach health goals.

"The physician becomes a health coach and the patient's No. 1 cheerleader," Caraballo said. "We stick with you the whole way."

Fashioned Health launched in November 2022, but Caraballo already has success stories to share, including a patient in his 30s who was hesitant to take statins to control his high cholesterol.

"We were able to reverse the high cholesterol," Caraballo said.

Another patient struggled to find help with his mental health. Working as a team, the doctors of Fashioned Health matched the patient with the professional help he needed.
