## Vote Yes spends more than half a million

Political consultant gave committee credibility, helped focus efforts, president says

Supporters of a \$139 million referendum in Hinsdale High School District 86 spent about \$560,000 on a campaign encouraging voters to approve the ballot question April 2.

The referendum passed with 60 percent of the vote — a dramatically different outcome than November, when 54 percent of voters rejected a \$166 million measure.

D86 Vote Yes on Referendum to Save our Schools raised most of its money — almost \$448,000 — between Jan. 1 and March 31, according to campaign finance reports filed with the Illinois State Board of Elections.

That's more than the group expected to raise, said Kari Galassi, Vote Yes president.

"It definitely exceeded our original goal, so that was great," she said. "We had lofty goals when we first hired the political consultant (Glenn Hodas of Hodas and Associates in Springfield). I think his original goal for us was somewhere between \$200,000 and \$250,000, but then he really wanted to add cable TV, and

that's what jacked the budget up significantly higher.

"I was very, very delighted at how successful the fundraising was," she added.

An early fundraiser at Ruth Lake sold out in three days and raised about \$350,000, Galassi said, between donations and bids on silent auction items.

"That was what kind of set the stage for the rest of the campaign," Galassi said.

The top 10 donors during the first quarter contributed almost \$115,000, with donations ranging in size from \$5,000 to \$12,000.

But the group's biggest support came from IPACE, the Illinois Political Action Committee for Education. Hodas helped the group apply for the \$100,000 rebate, which went toward paying for his services.

His first quarter bill, which included digital and cable advertising, telemarketing, direct mail, polling and a video, was slightly more than \$264,000. Overall the group spent almost \$500,000 with Hodas, Galassi estimated. She said the investment was worth it.

"I think having the political con-

sultant really helped us fundraise," she said. "People felt more comfortable donating a larger amount knowing a political consultant was handling the budget."

Hodas also helped the group focus its efforts, she said. The committee worked to convert no votes to yes votes and to get more voters in the 18 to 35 age group to the polls.

While the number of no voters dropped significantly from November to April, the number of yes votes stayed relatively the same (see sidebar).

"I don't think it was the same people who came out and voted yes in April," Galassi said. "I think we were able to get a lot of people out in April. We really did move the needle on the 18-to-35 chunk."

She credited her army of committee members for mobilizing this age group as well as senior citizens.

"We had a huge team of people really pushing on both high school seniors and recent grads. We did have just over 600 18-year-olds that voted," Galassi said, noting that group had very low turnout in November.

Other volunteers canvassed



neighborhoods, knocking on every door in the Hinsdale Central attendance area and Darien. She thanked the community for its support of the campaign and the referendum. Many other residents hosted small group discussions in their homes.

"It was just great to have the level of support and commitment that we had," Galassi said.

District 86 Vote No on Tax Increase to do Better collected \$35,640 during the first quarter of the year and spent almost \$17,390 on events, signs, and newspaper and magazine advertising. The group also made use of a consulting firm, spending \$7,000 with Cor Strategies of Palatine.

Since that report was filed, the group recorded a \$9,000 contribution from Atlas Tool & Die Works, the company owned by former Acting Mayor Zach Mottl of Burr Ridge, an outspoken opponent of the referendum. The Hinsdalean was unable to reach Mottl before press time.





# North Hinsdale home is hilltop heaven

*19th-century beauty on Washington has stood the test of time — and teardown waves*

The stunning Victorian home at 526 N. Washington St. exudes none of the foreboding vibe that vintage homes can project.

But some Halloween candy-seekers are put off by the lengthy uphill trick to get their treats. Homeowner Barbara Erickson said she makes sure the reward is worth their effort.

"If they come all the way up, I give them double," Erickson chuckled.

The walk up the original gravel drive evokes visions of horse-drawn carriages clippety-clopping their ascent to an inviting porch that must have hosted some splendid gatherings when this edge of Hinsdale was still farmland in transition. Erickson pointed out the coach step at the porch's base where visitors would alight. The front door faces the drop-off on the home's south side, not Washington, which also throws off trick-or-treaters.

Erickson said the striking exterior aesthetics were a big part of what sold her on the home when she and her late husband Bob bought it in 1976.

"I walked up the driveway, walked in the front door, looked around the hall entryway, and I whispered to my husband, 'This will do,'" Erickson related, adding that they weren't seeking something historic in their move from Atlanta back to their Chicago stomping grounds. "We liked the location, and without even seeing the rest of the

house, I said, 'I'll move from Atlanta to here.'"

The home was built in 1892-94, according to Erickson, for Lester C. and Cherry Newell. Historical records indicate Lester relocated to the Midwest from Massachusetts "in search of a livelihood," which he found in the woolen business. He married Cherrie, a Chicago native, in 1886, and they are believed to have raised two children in the home.

The wraparound porch remains as they would have known it, although it needed some TLC when the Ericksons took ownership. Aluminum siding was never considered.

"We tried to keep it original," she said.

Walking through the front door, visitors find an entry area resplendent with Craftsman-style wainscoting and original hardwood floors.

"Thank goodness nobody painted over it over the years," Erickson remarked.

Previous owners had, however, painted many of the windows shut. And they stripped the hardware down to its intended finish. Stunning colored leaded glass windows set off the view from the living room across the porch and expansive front lawn. The space likely was once divided into a parlor and a study.

Across the foyer, opposite the entrance, is a fireplace that would help warm the home in the winter months.

An elegant dining room opens to the left, that is unless the massive, beautiful-ly preserved pocket door is deployed, as

Erickson demonstrates.

"Years ago there was not central heat, so they would close off the dining room," she said.

Another gorgeous window highlights the dining room, and it's refracting properties may have reportedly lit up something unexpected long ago.

"We were told when the sun was low one winter, it started a fire on the dining room table," Erickson said.

The grand main staircase allegedly played a starring role on a bride's big day once.

"There was supposedly a wedding here, where the bride through her bouquet off (the landing)," she said.

Four bedrooms on the second level are configured just as they always were. Erickson thinks even the wallpaper in one of them is original.

"My husband always wanted to redo it, but I said, 'I don't think we should,'" she said.

The couple integrated a hallway linen closet into their master bath, and added storage off another bedroom, closed off by a spare door discovered in the attic. But the preserved wood trim and transom windows hearken back to an earlier day.

On the wall opposite a back staircase leading to the third floor hangs a primitive intercom by which members of the Newell family, who owned the home until 1945, would summon their staff on the third floor. The two bedrooms there were converted into an office, a guest area and a bathroom.

"All there was was a sink in the bedroom, no toilet," Erickson remarked. "There was an old laundry chute that we used to (install) the plumbing and the electrical for the air conditioning."

The view from the bathroom window reveals just how high a perch it is. Erickson points out how far the Newell property originally stretched, complete with a tree orchard and vegetable garden. Lester Newell was apparently quite the golf enthusiast, playing with a neighbors on a makeshift course west of Burns Field before becoming a charter member of Hinsdale Golf Club.

Descending the narrow staircase eventually brings one into the kitchen through an inconspicuous door, preserved when the kitchen was remodeled.

Back outside, the north side of the home is flanked by a towering oak tree whose age must rival that of the home. Erickson admitted that maintaining an old house is hard to do. Fortunately that didn't deter her or Bob, the consummate DIYer.

"It takes a lot of work to find the right person to do it the right way. And that was my husband," she said. "Somebody could still come and tear the darn thing down, but for me, it works."

"It worked for us."

## Trial date set for fall in Urban murder case

The case against the suspect accused of murdering Andrea Urban in her Hinsdale home two years ago will go to trial beginning Tuesday, Sept. 24.

The jury trial, scheduled at a May 22 hearing, will be held in Courtroom 4004 at DuPage County Circuit Court in Wheaton beginning at 10 a.m. according to Paul Darrah, spokesman for DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin.

Sanders, 30, 819 White

Oak Lane, University Park, is charged with first degree murder for killing Urban, a 51-year-old mother of two, at her home May 4, 2017.

Sanders has been held without bail since his arrest May 25, 2017, after being stopped in Will County for a traffic violation. He is also charged with home invasion and armed robbery in the case. Sanders has pleaded not guilty.

A pre-trial hearing is scheduled for July 24.

## Residents reminded to keep it down this summer

"Any unreasonable noise to the disturbance of the peace or quiet of any person residing in the vicinity" is unlawful, according to the ordinance, on public or pri-

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


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

### New volunteer, lifelong learner honored by forest district

For years Barbara Greenberg dreamed about the day she could volunteer at Fullersburg Woods Forest Preserve. In her mid 80s, she finally found the time.

Now 86, Greenberg is making up for lost time. After just a year and a half as a volunteer in the Fullersburg Woods Nature Education Center, Greenberg was honored with a president's award at the DuPage County Forest Preserve District's recent volunteer appreciation celebration.

"I was honored and surprised," Greenberg said.

Greenberg moved to Hinsdale, just across the road from Fullersburg, in 1985. Although her three children were grown and gone, Greenberg continued in her career as an educator and patent attorney throughout her 60s and 70s, all the while enjoying the nearby forest preserve.

"It's an absolutely incredible place. I'm enjoying every second that I'm there," Greenberg said.

Along with greeting guests, Greenberg has found a way to use her experience as a scientist and educator to benefit Fullersburg

and its guests.

She helps with special events and creates pop-up workshops that teach visitors about topics such as alternative energy, aerodynamics and the environment. In February, she offered a lesson titled "Love Birds." The topic of June's pop-up event is pollination.

"It's loads of fun. All the people seem to enjoy it," she said.

This summer, Greenberg will once again lead a Little Scientists camp for preschoolers. The popular camp was filled before Memorial Day.

Camp leader is just the latest in a long list of titles for Greenberg, who was a scientist working in research before spending a decade or so as a stay-at-home mom. When her youngest entered school, she became a teacher. She taught science at Willowbrook High School and the Illinois Math and Science Academy before embarking on a second career as a patent attorney while many of her peers were talking about retirement. She still helps people with trademarks and copyrights, and she remains part of the

adjunct faculty at National Louis University.

A lifelong fitness enthusiast, Greenberg said she gets some of her best ideas for pop-up workshops while running.

"Now, I just run very slowly, but I run. It's good for thinking," she said. She said she never gives much thought to the fact that at 86, she's still active and doing the many things she loves.

"I never think about it, because I don't feel like it," said Greenberg, who credits her varied interests with keeping her young.


"I love learning about everything around me," she said.

A mother of three and grandmother of 7, Greenberg is immensely proud of her family and their many accomplishments.

With so much going on in her life, Greenberg said it would have been easy to keep putting off her plan to become a volunteer. Instead, she made a conscious decision to make time for the things most important to her.

## Summer means more folks sharing the roads

Right after school starts each year, we offer words of caution to drivers.

“School’s open,” we remind them. “Drive safely!”

Similar counsel is appropriate at this time of year as well — for the opposite reason. School is almost out, which means more kids will be walking, biking and skateboarding around town morning, noon and night.

We hope parents are encouraging their kids to be vigilant anytime they enter the street — either on wheels or on foot — and instructing them to always make eye contact with drivers before crossing their path.

The directives we offer below, from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, might seem like common sense. But reminders never hurt — especially when lives are at stake.

### At all times

- Avoid distractions from driving such as using a cell phone, texting, eating or drinking, talking with passengers or using in-vehicle technologies or portable electronic devices.

- Before backing out of a driveway or parking spot, walk around the vehicle to check for children running and playing.

- Lock the vehicle’s doors when not in use so children do not play or get locked inside. If the outside temperature is in the low 80s, the temperature inside the vehicle can reach deadly levels in just a few minutes, even with a window rolled down. Plus a child’s body temperature rises three to five times faster than that of an adult.

### Before a summer road trip

- Check tire pressure and fluid levels, make sure lights and air conditioning are working and determine if wiper blades need to be replaced.

- Make sure floor mats are installed correctly and do not interfere with operation of the accelerator or brake pedal.

- Pack an emergency roadside kit.
- Check for any recalls online at [nhtsa.gov/recalls](http://nhtsa.gov/recalls).

- Schedule appointments for any regular maintenance that is necessary.

### When driving with kids

- Have all children younger than 13 ride in the back seat.

- Make sure car seats and booster seats are

property installed and appropriate for the child’s size.

### When riding a bike

- Always wear an approved safety helmet to protect the head and brain from injury in the event of an accident.

- Remember that while riding on roadways, cyclists must follow the same traffic laws, signs and signals that apply to motorists.

- Ride in the same direction as vehicle traffic.
- Use arm signs to help drivers anticipate left or right turns to stops.

- When approaching an unmarked intersection, yield to the pedestrians and vehicles on the right.

- Ride single file when riding in a group.
- Make sure the bike is equipped with a front and rear reflectors, side reflectors, reflector pedals, a horn or bell, a properly adjusted seat, reliable brakes and a front light visible for 500 feet (for night rides)

Road trips, family bike rides and playing outdoors are all joys of summer.

We hope everyone will be vigilant about safety to ensure those wonderful memories aren’t marred by tragedy.



In honor of Jack's wishes, family services will be held this summer in Kohler, Wis.



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# ASK AN EXPERT

KATHLEEN KUSPER, ACTOR

## What joy do you find in community theater?

Hinsdale's Kathleen Kusper had just had her third child, and attention to motherhood had sapped some of her self-assurance in conversational situations.

"I needed to get out of the house," Kusper related. "I just wanted to get some more confidence when I was going to meetings or for anything."

Kusper had done theater in her youth and was intrigued by a friend's suggestion to join the Theatre of Western Springs. She's now in the 33rd year of her run.

"The bug bit me, and I just loved acting," she said.

Her debut there, one line in a director's workshop piece, underscored that there are no small parts.

"I just went over and over that (line) backstage," Kusper recounted with a smile.

The roles have grown since then and have included Kate Keller in "The Miracle Worker" and Mrs. Kendall in "The Elephant Man" among the more than two dozen shows she's been cast in. Her latest

turn is as Mrs. Braddock in TWS' production of "The Graduate" June 6-16 (see Page 20 for details).

"She was the typical sheltered, dutiful housewife and mother of the 1960s," Kusper described. "My greatest challenge is to find that fine line between (her submissiveness) and her incredible integrity."

Some of the most valuable work comes before the actors feet ever tread the boards.

"For three days it was all table talk, just analyzing our characters and each other's characters," she said of preparation for "The Graduate."

Among her most memorable experiences was being in "Quilters," the first musical ever staged at TWS. She also had to do some serious soul-searching when she played M'Lynn Eatenton in "Steel Magnolias."

"She lost a daughter to Type-1 diabetes," said the mother of four and grandmother of three — and two on the way.

And she got to stretch her physical acting chops in "Picnic" portraying the "bawdy and tactless" Rosemary.

"All of us have a little bit of something like that. You just have to tap into it," she said, relishing the opportunity to play a drunk

Rosemary on stage. "It's broadened my horizons regarding empathy, walking in someone else's shoes and becoming a character who may be far removed from my life."

A former school teacher, Kusper said acting brings together people with varied backgrounds.

"I love the creative process," she said. "It's always a collaborative process. Everybody works together, and there are always new groups of people with each play."

Her now-married children and husband Joe were always her biggest fans behind the scene. She even got to share some scenes with her kids in "A Christmas Carol" when they were young.

Kusper has continued to polish her skills over the years through a series of acting classes at schools in the area and said she's always gaining new insight. "I learn something from every director and fellow actors," Kusper commented.

Whether in front of the audience or backstage helping support her peers, Kusper said she's nowhere near her final act.

"It's my second home, my second family," she said. "I hope to do it another 33 years."


Mitchell's cockatoo.



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

## Central again nets state trifecta

*Schmelka, Daw / Hernandez lead Red Devils boys tennis to championship*

Win singles title, doubles title and team championship all at once. Then repeat.

The Hinsdale Central boys tennis squad stuck to those instructions over the weekend, sweeping all three top trophies at the IHSA state final meet for the second straight season.

"It was our best tournament of the year," head coach John Naisbitt said of the 45-point performance, which gave Central its 26th team title overall and ninth in the last 13 seasons. New Trier was runner-up with 34 points, while Stevenson finished third with 29.


Singles champion sophomore Danny Schmelka and doubles champions senior Joe Daw and freshman Noah Hernandez were rarely threatened in their title runs. The other doubles team of freshman Mujtaba Ali-Khan and junior Rayan Nehme finished third. Sophomore Ansh Shah earned six points in making the consolation quarterfinals in singles.

A couple of disappointing losses for Schmelka during the regular season persuaded him that his strongest tennis was yet to come.

"I knew when I came to the state tournament, I had to play my best because there were a lot great players," said Schmelka, who gained valuable state meet experience last year as a freshman.

He cited his third-round match on Thursday against New Trier's Jake Zipoli as an inflection point.

"We were having a really good match. In the second set we had like a 30-shot point that I eventually won, and he started cramping. I knew the match was

coming to an end and just didn't want to let it slip away," said Schmelka, who emerged with a 7-5, 4-0 win after Zipoli retired.

His quarterfinal pitted him against Stevenson's Erik Perkowski, a familiar opponent from their USTA tournaments.

"I play him a lot, and we always have really close matches that always go three sets," he said.

This one was no exception as they split the first two sets before rain interrupted play.

"I think the rain delay actually helped me a lot because he had a lot of momentum after winning the second set," he remarked. "I was able to reset and refocus, and was able to dominate that third set."

Dominate as in 6-0.

He then dispatched LT's Dominick Cuchran, the top seed, and Hersey's Max Sheldon, both in straight sets, to claim top honors.

"I was just so relieved," he said of finally celebrating after Sheldon had fended off four championship

points. "It fell really good to be state champion. That was goal from the beginning of the season."

Naisbitt said Schmelka saved his best for last.

"We knew Danny was going to be right there, and he showed it in spades that he is the best player in Illinois," his coach said.

Meanwhile, Daw and Hernandez were living up to their billing as the favorite in the doubles draw by dropping a total of five games in the first three matches. Their Edwardsville foes in the quarters were able to take four games in the second set of their match. But that 6-0, 6-4 victory was as close as anyone got. They proceeded to defeat Stevenson and Naperville Central by identical scores of 6-1, 6-2 in their title wave.

Daw, who teamed with Shah last year to capture fourth place, said he wanted to cap his stellar Central career with a state championship.

"Going in to the season, that was pretty much my main goal, to finally win

the title in doubles," he said — just as his father, Joe, did with West Aurora in 1978. "Ever since I was a kid, winning a state doubles title was always something I wanted to do just so I could be like him. And now that it's happened, it's just a really great feeling."

Hernandez said he was excited to help his partner achieve his goal.

"I was really happy for him because he's been trying to win it for four years," he said.

Both Daw and Hernandez said their games perfectly complement each other, with Daw the power hitter and Hernandez the volley virtuoso.

Naisbitt said they know how to command a court.

"It's just domination, what they did out there," he said. "They play big-boy doubles, and they do it with so much grace and natural class. I'm proud of them on so many levels."

"Joe has represented us three years in doubles (at state). When Noah came along, it was just a match

made in heaven," Naisbitt added.

He also praised Shah for great play at his first state tournament and Ali-Khan and Nehme for earning third.

"The entire team contributed," Naisbitt said. "(Ali-Khan and Nehme) are not the archetype for doubles, not intimidating-looking, but boy can they play some tennis."

With two freshman and two sophomores comprising two-thirds of their state contingent, that suggests a lot to look forward to.

"I've got to believe we were the youngest team there," Naisbitt commented.

He said his counterpart coaches are always gracious in congratulating him, but one has to wonder if it gets old for them. Not for Naisbitt.

"I don't enjoy it any less than the first championship," he said. "For us it's 'Title or bust.' It's a case of talent and determination coming together and forming a dynasty."

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
