## Residents would feel graduated income tax

Hinsdale will be among the communities impacted most profoundly by the proposed graduated state income tax structure, a Chicago Tribune study has found.

Nearly 30 percent of village residents, or 2,288 tax filers, in the 60521 ZIP code in 2016 earned more than \$250,000, the threshold for higher tax rates if a constitutional amendment to change Illinois' flat income tax to a graduated income tax is approved by voters in the November 2020 election. Currently the state taxes income at 4.95 percent for everyone.

In May, the Illinois Assembly passed legislation to put the amendment on the ballot and to institute the following tax rates for single/joint filers if approved:

- 4.75 percent for income \$0 to \$10,000
- 4.9 percent from \$10,001 to \$100,000
- 4.95 percent from \$100,001 to \$250,000
- 7.75 percent from \$250,001 to \$350,000/\$250,001 to \$500,000
- 7.85 percent for \$350,001 to \$750,000/\$500,000

to \$1 million

• 7.99 percent above \$750,000/\$1 million

According to the Tribune, roughly 85 percent of those facing higher tax rates under the graduated tax plan live in Cook County and the five collar counties. Hinsdale and Winnetka are tied with the second-largest concentration of high earners at 29 percent. Glencoe has the largest with 35 percent. In Western Springs, 21 percent of households would see an increased rate, along with 20 percent in Oak Brook and 16 percent in Clarendon Hills.

Proponents of the amendment say tax rates would be same or lower for roughly 97 percent of the state's population under the graduated system.

But Rep. Deanne Mazzochi (R-Elmhurst), who voted against the amendment, said the change would punish many of her constituents in 47th District, which includes Hinsdale, simply for being successful. And it could backfire by actually driving them away.

"We're actually very lucky that we have people that are top earners," Mazzochi said. "They're fiscally savvy, and many of them have the ability or opportunity to move to other states."

Mazzochi said pension system reform should take priority over changing the tax structure.

"I'm just not in favor of a constitutional amendment that's designed to give Springfield more power to tax and spend," she said. "We're not getting anything of value for it. There's no upside for our district to vote in favor of this amendment." State Sen. Suzy Glowiak (D-Western Springs) voted in favor of putting the graduated income tax structure on the ballot but opposed the bill establishing tax rates if the amendment passes, breaking with many of her Democratic colleagues.

"I want to give people the chance to weigh in on it," Glowiak said. "We need to see if there's going to be support for the change or not. Instituting tax rates simply puts the cart before the horse."

She said she was not surprised at the Tribune's findings, knowing that the district she represents is home to a large number of high-income earners. She believes her constituents already carry a disproportionate burden in property taxes.


"We should be finding ways not to increase our taxes but, if we can, to lower them," she said. "We're looking at ways to not penalize the 24th Senate District."



## Hinsdale woman loves every destination

*From lavish vacations to more rustic ones, traveler always finds something new to explore*

The decision to take her career in a different direction 30-plus years ago opened up a whole new world for Hinsdale resident Diane Sarther.

Along with her switch from hospital nurse to college instructor and research consultant came time and opportunity to travel the world.

"It kind of broadened my horizons," said Sarther, who makes full use of the vacation time allowed by her academic schedule.

The desire to explore other cultures, landscapes and lifestyles was planted long ago for Sarther, whose parents would pack up the family every summer for a two- to three-week trek.

"My parents always placed value in travel. It really started then," said Sarther, who carried on her family's summer tradition by traversing the country with her own three children. Traveling in a conversion van, the four would set out each summer to explore a new part of the U.S. or Canada. Once they arrived at their destination, Sarther's husband, Jim, would fly out to meet the family and

share in their summer adventure.

With her children now grown, Sarther continues to explore the world each summer — sometimes on foot, sometimes by bike and always in the spirit of discovering something new. This summer, she will bike a 235-mile stretch through Michigan. It will be the last trip on a summer agenda that included a hiking trip in Ireland and a visit to Alaska.

Sarther and a group of women that included several fellow Hinsdaleans spent more than a week this summer walking and exploring the Wicklow Mountains of Ireland. Hiking 12 to 18 miles each day, the women stayed in bed and breakfasts and visiting small towns along the way.

Arriving back home in Hinsdale, Sarther had just enough time to repack before traveling to her next destination, more than 3,500 miles and 11 time zones away.

Accompanied by her niece, Hinsdale Central graduate Veronica Peterson, Sarther flew to Alaska — a place she has visited twice before. It's home to a cousin whose house is accessible only by boat or plane.

During their stay she and Peterson did a lot of hiking, bear spray in hand.

"Luckily, we didn't need to use it," said Sarther. She said she's grown more comfortable with the many creatures of Alaska since first traveling there. And she never grows tired of spotting a moose, a caribou or even a bear during her Alaskan travels. Out on the water, it's common to spot whales, seals and sea lions.

"This time, I saw more eagles than ever," Sarther said. But one thing she saw less of was Alaska's great glaciers. Even in the decade since her first visit, Sarther said there is a notable reduction in their size.

After a full day of exploration, Sarther and Peterson spent their nights sleeping on a blow-up mattress in the back of a rented Dodge Caravan.

For Sarther, travel doesn't have to be glamorous to be exciting. But that's not to suggest that she didn't enjoy the time spent at an upscale hotel on a beach in Oahu or her trip to watch the world's top tennis players at the U.S. Open. She likes it all.

Sarther's adventurous spirit and desire to learn new things has taken her to Brazil, where she studied back in 2003. She's been to Kenya on a faith-based mission trip, stayed

in a convent in Rome and backpacked through Vermont and New Hampshire. Every trip, Sarther said, comes with its own lessons and discoveries.

"I haven't stopped the sense of just wanting to go and do these things," said Sarther, who on this summer's trip to Alaska cleaned a fish for the first time.

More new experiences await Sarther and her husband, who are considering a trip to Prague for the opening game of the Chicago Blackhawks' 2019-20 season. This fall, they will explore Nova Scotia for the first time. One day, Sarther said, she hopes to visit Japan and spend time in Eastern Europe.

But first, she'll embark on a new adventure closer to home when she begins a new job at Loyola University this fall — a job that lets her share her love of nursing with the next generation of professionals while allowing plenty of time for her love of travel.

## Motorists cited during July Fourth campaign

The Hinsdale Police Department has reported the results of its Fourth of July "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" and "Click It or Ticket" safety enforcement campaigns.

Police issued 65 seat belt citations, 44 citations for illegal use of an electronic device while driving, 13 citations for speeding and six citations for other vehicle code violations during the holiday weekend. One arrest was also made for driving with a revoked license, according to a department press release.

Law enforcement agencies

throughout Illinois participated in this statewide effort to get drunk and drugged drivers off the roads and encourage seat belt use. Hinsdale police joined forces with more than 160 other state and local law enforcement agencies conducting the crackdown, which featured high-visibility enforcement combined with a variety of outreach activities, including a media campaign.

The effort was funded by federal traffic safety funds administered by the Illinois Department of Transportation.

## Hearing continued in Urban murder case

A pre-trial hearing in the case against the man accused of murdering Andrea Urban in her Hinsdale home last year has been continued to 9 a.m. Wednesday, July 31, according to the DuPage County Circuit Court Clerk's office. A hearing had been scheduled for yesterday, July 24.


Dominic Sanders, 30, 819 White Oak Lane, University Park, is charged with first degree murder for killing Urban, a 51-year-old mother

of two, at her home May 4, 2017. Sanders has been held without bail since his arrest May 25, 2017, after being stopped in Will County for a traffic violation.

He is also charged with home invasion and armed robbery in the case. Sanders has pleaded not guilty.

The case is scheduled to go to trial Tuesday, Sept. 24.

The hearing will take place in Courtroom 4004 at DuPage County Circuit Court in Wheaton.

# Portrait paints picture of family's past

*Research uncovers more about relatives than their relationship to Abraham Lincoln*

A long-forgotten painting provided Hinsdale resident Ginger White with far more than a picture to adorn her living room wall. It led to the discovery of her family's very storied history.

Years ago, and nearly a half century after one of White's relatives moved out of his Shorewood, Wis., home, White's mother was contacted by the home's owner, who had discovered possessions belonging to J.Y. Scammon, White's great-great-grandfather, in the home's attic. Among the items was a torn portrait of a woman and a stack of old letters — letters written to Scammon by his friend and law partner, Abraham Lincoln.

White said the family knew of Scammon's relationship with Lincoln, including his role as a pallbearer at the president's funeral, prior to the attic discovery.

But the items in that attic led White, her mother and other members of the family on a quest to learn more about their ancestors, beginning with the woman in the long-forgotten portrait.

A curator at the Milwaukee Art Museum identified the painting as the work of portrait artist George Healy, creator of two portraits of Lincoln that still adorn the walls of the White House. Further investigation revealed that the woman portrayed in the portrait was Maryann Dearborn



Scammon, wife of J.Y. Scammon and White's great-great-grandmother.

White's family discovered that along with being a good friend and law partner to the future president, Scammon was a prominent businessman. He started Chicago's first newspaper and donated the land on which the University of Chicago was built. He also is credited with starting the Chicago History Museum, once known as the Chicago Historical Society. That's where his portrait,

also by Healy, hangs today, in the office of president Gary Johnson.


"He was one of the city's wealthiest men," White said of Scammon. But that all changed in 1871, the year of the Great Chicago Fire. White said her great-great-grandfather lost nearly everything in the blaze. But the portrait of her great-great-grandmother survived.

After his wife's death, Scammon gave the portrait to his daughter. As the family will tell it, Lincoln's son, Tad,

rescued the painting from Scammon's daughter's home as the fire approached.

After the rescue, the painting would spend much of the next century in that attic in Wisconsin. But after being restored by the same craftsman who cares for the portraits in Washington, D.C., it finally has found a proper home, and the appreciation it deserves, on the wall of White's home.

Despite the painting's age and the notability of its creator, White said her treasured

portrait isn't exceptionally valuable. If she ever parts with the portrait, she plans to offer it to the Dearborn Observatory at Northwestern University. Named after Maryann Dearborn, it still uses a telescope purchased and donated by Scammon.

The letters penned between Lincoln and her great-great-grandfather are now stored in a vault at the Lincoln museum in Springfield — a far safer place than the attic of an old house in Wisconsin.

### Indiana native feels at home at Hinsdale Park and Rec

She's completed her classes and even donned her cap and gown, but Jillian Boger has one last thing to do before she officially graduates from Indiana University, and she's doing it in Hinsdale.

The Indiana native is fulfilling a 12-week internship this summer with the Hinsdale Parks and Recreation Department — a requirement for her degree in tourism, hospitality and event management.

"I have a background in parks and recreation," said Boger, who played tennis and volleyball while attending high school in LaPorte, Ind., and served as a tennis instructor for her local parks and rec department. When she learned of an opening for an intern in Hinsdale, she knew it would be a good fit.

Going into her summer internship, Boger said she set goals to work on her technical skills and marketing know-how. She said she's accomplished those goals while building confidence in the skills and abilities she already had.

"Although I still have a lot to learn in this field, this internship

Event management is Boger's favorite part of her multifaceted major. As Hinsdale's intern, she was charged with planning the department's "Unplug and Play" series — monthly events aimed at getting kids out from behind their screens and into their community.

The June 25 event took participants on a scavenger hunt at Katherine Legge Memorial Park. Plans included coming up with the clues and tasks of the hunt, as well as soliciting donations of prizes from local businesses.

"We had a really good turnout for the first one," said Boger, who is living in Berwyn while serving her summer-long stint.

She also planned the cardboard castle-building contest, held July 23 at Veeck Park.

The final Unplug event will be a popcorn and pop trivia night on Aug. 6, just before Boger's internship ends on Aug. 23.

That leaves her just a few weeks to prepare for her next move — a

15-month stint in Germany, where she will work at a hotel that serves the needs of the U.S. military, their families and veterans. She's one of six IU grads who will be working there.

The trip will be Boger's first visit abroad, and she said she's excited for the adventure. She hopes to help with the hotel's recreation program, which includes a full menu of winter sports. And although she doesn't consider herself exceptionally skilled at things like skiing and snowboarding, she's willing and ready to learn.

Boger said the time she has spent in Hinsdale has led her to consider parks and recreation as a possible career choice.

"What impresses me the most about Hinsdale's Parks and Recreation department is that despite it being on the smaller size staff-wise, the staff truly works so hard to be able to put on different events and programs for the residents of Hinsdale and neighboring communities to enjoy," Boger said.

### Summer often means dry spell for nonprofits

Hunger never takes a vacation, the website of the Northern Illinois Food Bank reminds us as we head into the final days of July.

Many of us spend the summer months traveling to distant shores or enjoying the lazy, hazy days relaxing at home. We might not be as focused on the needs of area agencies as we are during the school year, when our schedules are more regimented.

But many experience no vacation from the needs they face year-round. For some — such as the children who are entitled to free lunch during the school year — the summer months make things worse. When there's no school, there's no mid-day meal.

To help, the Northern Illinois Food Bank serves 265,000 summer meals to children in need through its Summer Meals Program. Someone has to pay for all those extra meals. If you can help, visit [solvehungetoday.org](http://solvehungetoday.org) and make a donation.

Even those agencies that don't offer special

programming can suffer during June, July and August.

Blood shortages typically occur during the summer, and 2019 is no different. In addition to a drop in the number of scheduled blood drives, demand often increases due to a higher number of car crashes on the road and more violence on the streets.

The American Red Cross of Chicago and Northern Illinois reported a critical blood supply shortage earlier this month, indicating donations are down 17,000.

According to Red Cross data, only 10 percent of people who are eligible to donate blood actually do so.

And yet a single donation has the potential to save up to three lives.

There are ways to help closer to home as well. HCS Family Services received a boost after collecting food and cash during Hinsdale's

Fourth of July parade, but shelves at the agency's two food pantries won't be sustained by those donations forever. And the Willowbrook school pantry stays open all summer long to help families who depended on school breakfasts and lunches during the year.

The Hinsdale Historical Society, Robert Crown Center for Health Education, The Community House and Wellness House could benefit from any support residents might want to offer in these final weeks summer as well. See our Facebook page for a link to these organizations to make online donations.

Churches struggle at this time of year, too. Fewer people in the pews translates to fewer dollars in the collection plate.

Summer is always difficult on nonprofit organizations. We still have several weeks before schedules return to normal and things are in full swing again. Let's all do our part to help these agencies not just survive the summer months, but flourish.

"Who cares?!" I screamed at the magazine.

I tried to find the article to share it with you but was unsuccessful. I found this instead — an October 2017 article from Harper's Bazaar that is a perfect substitute.

*"The dolphins are leaping off the Malibu coast this morning, but no one's paying attention to them. Not now that Julia Roberts has emerged from her beach hut in an operatic red ballgown by Ralph & Russo, flanked fore and aft by wardrobe minions shading her with umbrellas and holding*

*her regal train free of the sand.*

*'Just a little something for the beach!' she quips, while some 20 people hover about her, on this gusty day, an attentive retinue to Lancôme's ambassadress. They swoop in to adjust her hair, dab her cheeks and arrange her outfit. She looks like she's wandered down from a Great Gatsby party in a nearby mansion ..."*

Good Lord. How long did it take the writer to come up with the phrase "an attentive retinue to Lancôme's ambassadress"? How many people even know what a "retinue" is without looking it up?

A July 8 Time article about Colson Whitehead (author of "The Underground Railroad," my book club's August book), sent to me by a fellow book club member, reads the same.

*"There's Colson Whitehead up ahead, minutes before our*

*arranged time, dawdling on the corner of 126th Street and Fifth Avenue, dressed in slim jeans and Chelsea boots, his dreadlocks cutting a clean line across his back. I'm content to nurse a half-block distance between us and observe. Whitehead's walk, by the way, is not what the youngsters would call swaggerific.*

*Swagger is imitative, and the way Whitehead moves evokes less a simulacrum of a strut than it does acceptance of his stature and physiology, most notably that he's long and lean and little knock-kneed. He stops on 127th Street, and since I'm a few paces behind him and don't want him to glance back and peep me trailing, I call his name. He snatches wired headphones out of his ears and reaches out for a handshake — our first. 'Nice to meet you,' I say. 'I think we're headed in the same direction.'*

I don't know where to start. I really don't care where writer Mitchell Jackson first spotted Whitehead or how many times the two have shaken hands or whether his headphones are wired or wireless. And "evokes less a simulacrum of a strut"? Really? It's just too much.

I'm not sure who these guys are trying to impress. We, the readers, know these writers work for prestigious magazines and are interviewing famous people. We know — or at least feel comfortable assuming — that they interviewed the personality in person. Otherwise, how would there be enough material for a four- or five-page article? So why all the fuss?

Maybe these writers have to do all this to fill the space the magazine has allotted for their article. Fortunately, I'm out of room for this one.



# ASK AN EXPERT

## DAVE HERZOG, PUPPETEER

### What's involved in styling a marionette show?

Puppeteers like Dave Herzog work in full view of their audience. But that doesn't mean he's always seen.

"I remember one boy saying to me after a show, 'How did you make yourself invisible during the show?'" Herzog related with a laugh.

The entertainer and his marionette magic will appear at the Hinsdale Public Library at 6:30 p.m. Monday, July 29 (see Page 23 for details).

Now in his fifth decade of dazzling young and old with his cast of hand-crafted characters, Herzog said he was one of those mesmerized kids watching a puppet show in second grade. The experience would go on to animate his livelihood.

"I wanted to learn how to do that, how to make puppets and perform with puppets," Herzog said. "I started working in my 20s for a company that did shows for amusement parks up and down the east coast."

The Chicago native returned to his home turf in the mid-1980s and

keeps a full schedule with bookings at schools, day care centers, country clubs and more.

The most critical aspect of the trade is having engaging partners with which to share the stage. He currently has more than 200 puppets in use, all of which he has made from scratch. Inspiration for a new figure, he said, can strike at any moment.

"You have to come up with the idea first," Herzog explained. "It might come from a piece of music I hear or something I see in a movie. It can be practically anything."

The puppet's use in the show must be considered in order to build in the necessary range of movement. Then he makes a mechanical drawing to guide his patterns for shaping the parts.

"There's a lot of sanding," he said of the wooden body sections. "The heads are hollow, and I sculpt them in clay to make plaster of paris molds. Most of the puppets have moving eyes and mouths."

Personality springs to life in the finishing touches.

"You have to design the puppets' wigs and clothes. I do all of that. I pattern and sew the clothes. You're kind of one man

band," Herzog commented.

The process takes about a month from start to completion.

"It's always a lot of fun when you have the finished puppet," he said. "I've always got something on the workbench that I'm creating."

Putting together the actual show is another time-consuming endeavor.

"I work for hours rehearsing and rehearsing with the puppets to get the movements to work with the music," Herzog said.

Hinsdale library attendees will be treated to "Puppetpalooza," a show featuring more than a dozen characters.

"It's meant to be sort of an around-the-world circus," said Herzog, offering a small foretaste of the act. "There's a little German fellow in lederhosen who's been strung to do various tricks with roller skating."

Herzog's longevity in the business means he's now performing before second- and third-generation audience members.

"This is old-school entertainment. And it's still effective today," he said. "People still laugh at the same things."

The award program emphasizes and encourages the development of active citizenship in young Americans and recognizes those youth deemed most dedicated to the high qualities of citizenship and true Americanism.

### MAZZOCHI NAMED TO TASK FORCE

State Rep. Deanne Mazzochi (R-47, Elmhurst) has been appointed to serve on the newly-created Property Tax Relief Task Force, which is responsible for proposing solutions to achieve meaningful property tax relief for suburban homeowners. House Minority Leader Jim Durkin (R-82, Western Springs) appointed Mazzochi to the task force in recognition of her commitment to taxpayers.

"We all know Illinois' property tax system is broken," Mazzochi said. "High property taxes make it difficult for more families to achieve and maintain the dream of homeownership and make it nearly impossible for seniors on fixed incomes to afford to stay in their homes. The time for action is long overdue."

"This Property Tax Relief Task Force signals our commitment to finally come together on a bipartisan basis to reform the system," she added. "I intend to use my appointment to the task force to offer solutions that will deliver meaningful results for local families."

Specifically, the task force is charged with examining the root causes of high property taxes in communities across the state, assessing other states' legislative solutions to reduce property tax burdens in the short and long term and proposing policy changes that will bring real relief to

Illinois homeowners.

The task force is required to submit a report to the governor and the General Assembly with short- and long-term solutions that can take an administrative, electoral or legislative approach. The initial report will be produced within 90 days, and a final report will be due by Dec. 31.

County Line Home Design Center at 110 S. Washington St. in downtown Hinsdale celebrated its grand opening June 22.

Since forming County Line Properties in 1991, Penny and John Bohnen have had an idea to create a "Builders Boutique" that showcases talented craftsmanship. Last October that vision became a reality when John Bohnen reached out to resources he's known over the years.

The nondescript entrance one door south of Bohnen's County Line Properties leads to an oasis.

"The unique physical attributes of the structure lends itself to the talented artisans inside its walls," John Bohnen said.

The 1925 building features a charming gallery entrance leading to one-of-a-kind spaces for tenant businesses, complete with unusual sky lighting in the rear structure, which is separated by a quaint garden courtyard space. ## Entrepreneurs pour passion into brewing

*Microbreweries in Darien, Willowbrook and Woodridge join flourishing landscape*

The number of microbreweries in Illinois has more than quadrupled in seven years, from 54 in 2011 to 229 in operation last year.

Chicago is home to dozens of them, but Hinsdaleans don't have to drive that far to taste a quality

craft brew.

This article — the second in a three-part series — highlights three options, all within a 12- to 20-minute drive of Hinsdale.

### Black Horizon Brewing Co.

behind the bar at Black Horizon Brewing Co. with a beer in hand. He's meeting one of his responsibilities as co-founder: quality control.

"I make sure the St. Baldus tastes like St. Baldus," he says, enjoying a sip of the Belgian-style quad aged in a rye whiskey barrel.

St. Clair, one of three co-founders of the Willowbrook microbrewery, used to be a "vodka guy." Now he and partners Kevin Baldus and Alex Stankus share a love of beer with each other and their customers.

Stankus, the head brewer, draws on the years he spent in the gourmet food industry and his experience as a homebrewer.

"I slowly took over the kitchen at my house," he said. "My family was a little hesitant at first, because I was taking over all the space, but soon there was free beer, so they didn't complain too much about that."

Black Horizon's beer list offers a mix of popular styles, like the Horizon IPA, and traditional beers, like the Tales of Old Vienna ale.

"Our goal and philosophy was to push ourselves to constantly make different beer styles and improve upon ourselves," Stankus said.

A glance around the taproom offers a glimpse into the owners' personalities. The bar is fashioned from old Riverside-Brookfield High School bleachers, where Baldus teaches. The comic books that line a shelf above the bar are owned by St. Clair and Baldus, and the Nintendo 64 belonged to Stankus for years before it arrived in the taproom.

Baldus said he enjoys hearing directly from customers about products he and his partners are making on the premises.

"We do often get surprised on what beers take off and are really popular," he said, pointing to Stealing Sunshine (a sour) as a recent example. "We never find out until we release it in the taproom."

St. Clair said there's just one complaint when all your beers are good ones.

"A lot of people just come in and are like, 'The only bad thing about this place is I have a hard time deciding,'" he said.

### Miskatonic Brewing Co.

Josh Mowry and John Wykiewicz had 15 years of experience working for places like Goose Island and Two Brothers before they joined forces to open Miskatonic Brewing Co. in Darien.

Their clout put them in a position to have an agreement with a distributor before they opened their doors in July 2015.

"It's really unusual to have a distributor sign on with you before you have a liquid to try," Mowry said. "They were aware of what we could do from a quality control standpoint and beer standpoint."

After a year, the company was ready to start canning. Sales are now about 55 to 60 percent packaged beer and 40 to 45 percent draft.

The packaging must appeal to the buyer, Mowry said, and he gives credit to his graphic design artist, who is "righteously good." But he doesn't like the beauty pageant aspect of selling beer.

"I think that I'm someone who cares deeply about the

quality of liquid coming out of a brewery," he said. "It can be frustrating when marketing is the most important thing, but I think it's true marketing is the most important thing."

Brewing is a constant tension between consistency and creativity, Mowry said. The brewery produces a full run (that's 30 full-size kegs and 200 cases) of beer every month and a new beer every four to five weeks.

"Probably 40 percent of our volume is stuff we're making over and over again," he said.

The industry is amazingly inclusive, Mowry said, noting that four other breweries gave him their business plans to guide him as he wrote his own.

"We all got here through a lot of help from a lot of people, and we all remember that and we all try to pay it forward," he said.

### Skeleton Key Brewing Co.

A decade ago Emily Szopa found a home brewing kit under the Christmas tree. She, her brother, John, and her boyfriend (now husband), Paul Slayton, were intrigued.

week," Paul said.

The three viewed opening Skeleton Key Brewing Co. as a way to tap into their creative sides. They also saw it is a way to help others open their own businesses.

"Originally, we wanted to open a brewery where we could help home brewers bring that product to market," Emily Slayton said. Liquor licensing laws prevented it.

But the idea evolved into the Brewery Incubator, a 12-week program that invites an aspiring brewer to come in and work with the team.

"The two guys who came through our program first just opened their brewery (Garage Band Brewing) in Plainfield three months ago," Emily said.

The three aren't out to foster more competition, said John, who's also the head brewer. But they do want others to understand the challenges and risks involved in starting such a business.

"We're here to say, 'You can do it — just understand how difficult it is going to be,'" he said.

Despite the proliferation of microbreweries, John believes there always will be

room for another neighborhood spot to enjoy a pint with friends.

"I feel there will never be any shortage of space for things like that," he said.

The three were very conscientious about creating a space where customers — and they themselves — would want to hang out. They've been surprised by just how many regulars they've cultivated.

"It's almost become like a family to us," John said.

Their beer list features classic styles with a twist, such as the pale ale that includes spruce tips Emily harvested herself after earning her foraging certificate.


"It's as local as local gets," she said.

And when they're looking to add a flavor, they try to avoid the obvious ingredient. The maple taste in their Scotch ale doesn't come from syrup, but from candy cap mushrooms.

"John has to come up with new recipes all the time," Emily said. "If you're not challenging yourself to find new ways of looking at things, I think you get burned out pretty fast."

## Golfing phenom stays on course

*Rising Hinsdale Central freshman Thornton is having a sizzling summer*

Hinsdale's Sarah Thornton was surprised to capture victory at her first golf tournament of the Illinois Junior Golf Association season back in mid-April. The cold and windy conditions were not ideal, but her score of 85 was the best among the eight girls ages 14-15 competing at Old Oak Country Club in Homer Glen.

Thornton's next match was May 11 at Deerfield Golf Club, where she triumphed again. And again June 11 at Maple Meadows Golf Club in Wood Dale. And again the next day at Buffalo Grove Golf Club. And so on until she had reeled off eight victories in a row. The eighth was actually back at Old Oak, where she earned the win by shaving seven strokes off her April total.


The 14-year-old said following her process has led to the prize bounty.

"I just want to stay in my routine and just do the best that I can," Thornton said. "I'm not really worried about getting the ball in the hole. And it usually works out."

Thornton's torrid streak was finally interrupted July 1 with a runner-up result at Cress Creek in Naperville. She converted her disappointment into motivation two days later at Cog Hill Golf & Country Club, posting her first sub-par score of the season in a dominant performance. Her 2-under 70 was 12 strokes clear of the next closest player.

"That was really fun," she said of her round that featured four birdies. "Before that I wasn't really making a lot of birdies, but then I started practicing my putting a lot more."

Last year playing in

the 12-13 age division, Thornton displayed her considerable talent by collecting five wins and finishing fifth or better in 19 tournaments. She was second in the Player of the Year points race.

Those were nine-hole competitions, though, and there were question marks about Thornton's prospects playing 18 at the next level. After all, she'd only been playing since age 11.

Those questions have been definitively put to rest, as has the Player of the Year contest. She's won four more tournaments since Cog Hill (and two second places), giving her a point total at the start of this week of 5,012.5. Her closest rival sits at 2,875. But Thornton's keeping an even keel.

"I can't get too excited about my good rounds because there's always going to be bad rounds," she said.

Her coach, Cog Hill pro Kevin Weeks, said Thornton is a star pupil.

"What she's done is amazing," he said. "She does what she's supposed to do, and she practices the right way."

Success can often breed a contented complacency, Weeks remarked. Not with Thornton.

"Especially for a 14-year-old that doesn't have a lot of experience, she's been really good sticking with her process," he said.

They've focused particularly on honing her approach shots into the green to yield shorter putts. And Weeks also has impressed upon her to concentrate on executing each shot and not get caught up in leaderboard watching.

"Don't look at the scoreboard," he instructs. I'm proud of how she sticks with her process and does what she's supposed to do."

Thornton said her drives usually end up in the fairway, which helps put her in good position.

"I'm just working on hitting it straight, and I'm trying to get a lot better around the greens," she said. "I've been trying to forget about my bad shots and kind of just move on."

Thornton's 13th title came July 17 at Deerfield Golf Club, which was also the site of her second title. Just as she lowered her score in the two Old Oak tournaments, she improved her 6-over 78 in May to a 1-under 71. On July 19, she shot 74 in the weather-shortened IJGA-CDGA Junior Amateur, tying for fourth place despite being one of the youngest players in the field.

"I just try to learn from each tournament and get better," she said. "I like getting more course experience. When I play in different tournaments,

it helps me get used to different greens and different places."

Expanding her network of friends among the relatively small community of IJGA regulars has been an ancillary reward.

"It's been really fun getting to know people who have played in those tournaments," Thornton said.

Thornton will soon begin her studies at Hinsdale Central High School, where she also aspires to play for the highly decorated girls golf program. She has visions of playing at the college level beyond that. But there's more development needed before that can become reality, Thornton remarked.

"I'm still working on a lot of things with my swing and around the green. Once I get consistent enough, I think it'll be easier," she said.

Not easier for her competitors, that's for sure.
