New '988' number connects callers to suicide/crisis lifeline

A new national Suicide & Crisis Lifeline — 988 — will offer another option for individuals experiencing a crisis or any other kind of emotional distress.

The Illinois Department of Human Services Division of Mental Health launched the free, confidential lifeline July 16. Trained professionals will offer compassionate care related to suicide, mental health and/or substance abuse to individuals and concerned family members, friends and caregivers.

"This resource resonates with us at the foundation because it really does advance our shared vision to promote good mental health and wellness," said Greg DiDomenico, president and CEO of Hinsdale-based Community Memorial Foundation. "It's an easy-to-remember number that you can call if you need help or someone to talk to.

"It's accessible to all folks in our region and across the state 24/7 and 365," he continued. "It's something that we're going to continue to promote. We want to encourage people to use it and make 988 just as common as 411 or 911."

Previously callers could reach the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline network by dialing (800) 273-TALK. The new three-digit number will make services more accessible, said Beth Murin, the foundation's program and communications officer.

"That clunkiness is a barrier to access," Murin said, referring to the old hotline number. "We want everyone to say '988' — to know it like they know 911."

The new number also is open to more callers, Murin noted.

"They're sort of rebranding, so it's not just the Suicide Prevention Lifeline, it's the Suicide Prevention and Crisis Lifeline," she said.

Callers will have the option to select the Veterans Crisis Line or to speak to someone in Spanish. If a caller with an Illinois area code does not select either option, he or she will be routed to an Illinois Lifeline Call Center. If after three minutes the call is not answered by a live person, the caller is routed to a national backup affiliate network, which

includes call centers that operate in other states.

The foundation will continue to promote the Crisis Text Line, available by texting the word "NOW" to 741741. Texting and chatting options are not yet available through 988.

"We know Crisis Text Line users tend to skew younger and they prefer the text and online chat model," Murin said. "I think it's important for us to continue to use Crisis Text Line as that avenue for texting and chatting. It's two doors to the same house."

The text line also offers opportunities for people to reach out for help when making a call is not possible.

"If they are in school and they are at their desk, they can't call," Murin said. "They can text if they are in a crisis situation in a classroom."

The national lifeline and the crisis textline both offer an alternative to calling the police in the event of a mental health emergency.

"They estimate 90 percent of calls can be deescalated via talk, text or chat," Murin said. "That's remarkable. That removes a significant burden on local law enforcement."

DiDomenico said 988 and the textline will complement each other.

"We're really grateful to our colleagues at the Illinois Department of Human Services to promote this," he said. "Right now, we're going to keep both, again based on the more resources, the more we know there is help, the better."


The crisis text line also provides general data about the type of person accessing it so the foundation can partner with other area agencies to provide needed resources.

"We want people to have access to the services, not waiting lists," DiDomenico said. "Funding programs, funding counseling, funding services like the Living Room are really important as part of the overall vision."

A statement from the National Alliance on Mental Illness/Illinois concurred, praising the state's investment in call centers and work to establish and coordinate mobile crisis response teams of mental health professionals.

Teachers gain new knowledge of their own

Co-directors learn more about students, staff during Central's six-week summer school

The months of June and July are precious to most teachers. After all, having summers free is one big perk in an often stressful and difficult job. But Hinsdale Central High School teachers Susan Grady and Jordan Stob said they'll never regret trading in a part of their summer break to serve as co-directors of summer school.

"I have loved it all," said Stob, who joined Grady for the first time this summer. Grady, known as "Frau Grady" to students in her German language classes, has worked on summer school since 2020.

As co-directors, Grady and Stob assume roles ranging from curriculum director to principal. They determine class schedules, hire teachers, organize bus routes and tend to the inevitable but unexpected issues that arise throughout the six weeks of summer school.

Their jobs as summer school directors actually begin long before the weather turns warm. Grady said planning begins in November and continues throughout the conventional school year. Summer school itself is the easy part, she said, because she no longer has to balance

her responsibilities as summer school director with the duties of her regular teaching job.

When Grady took on the summer school position in 2020, it turned out to be an even bigger job than expected. After COVID-19 hit in March 2020, she and the rest of the summer school staff did a quick pivot to offer online classes. They also added "resolution management" classes to help students resolve incomplete grades resulting from the stresses of the pandemic.

"It's a really nice challenge," Grady said of summer school, and a good use of her master's degree in school administration. When her longtime friend and colleague, Stob, completed her own master's degree in school administration, Grady encouraged her to join her as co-director.

"She pushes people to get outside their comfort zone," Stob said of Grady. And while summer school certainly was unfamiliar when Stob began the position late last year, she said she's already looking forward to doing it again.

Together the pair oversee six weeks of classes divided into two three-week semesters. The classes are taught by 30 teachers and attended by 260 students. Some classes take place online, while others

are in the classroom. Classes, which ended July 21, were taught from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday through Thursday.

This summer's class offering included 18 courses in the first three-week semester and nine in the second semester. Each co-director took the lead during one of the two semesters, leaving the other with a

little more of her summer to enjoy.

Summer school at Hinsdale Central isn't only for completing incomplete classes. It's also a way for students to add classes that don't fit into their fall or spring schedules. Civics, consumer education and health are all required for graduation and are all offered as summer classes.

"A lot of students take those courses during the summer," Grady said, freeing up time for other classes during the regular school year.

Grady and Stob said the job of summer school director requires the wearing of many hats, which has led both to a greater understanding and appreciation for the roles of those working outside of the classroom.

"There's always a way to help a kid," said Stob, who as summer school director has seen how staff members in every part of the school strive to support Central's students.

Both teachers said their summer jobs have left them with a "wider vision" and a deeper understanding of their students and their lives outside of the classroom. That

understanding, Stob said, will make her a better teacher when she returns to the classroom this September.

She'll also return with a few new acquaintances. As co-director, Stob said she met fellow Central employees whom she might never have encountered in her regular teaching position.

"Now, I know them by name," she said of her co-workers in finance, communications, food service, security and other departments throughout the school.

With summer school behind them, Stob and Grady will take a little time to relax before spending another part of summer preparing for the school year ahead. Stob is teaching a new class next semester, while Grady said she has three new novels in her curriculum. And soon after fall classes begin, they'll turn their attention to planning for summer school 2023.

Increase in number of new cases holds steady

The DuPage County Health Department reported 35 new cases of COVID-19 in Hinsdale over the past week, bringing the total number of cases in the DuPage County portion of Hinsdale to 3,963, compared to 3,928 last week. The Cook County

Health Department no longer reports on cases specific to Hinsdale.

The number of cases per 100,000 population in DuPage was 45.1 on July 26, compared to 35.5 on July 19. The community level remains high.


"Similarly, providing access to crisis stabilization centers means tackling major gaps in all treatment options, from a shortage of in-patient beds to demand for 'Living Room' drop-in centers in every community," the statement reads. "Staffing these systems also demands an acceleration of efforts to build a larger and more diverse behav-

ioral health workforce.

"While 988 adds much-needed capacity and momentum, the journey is just beginning," it concluded.

DiDomenico encouraged people to continue to discuss mental health, starting at the kitchen table.

"Talk about it within your families, within the workplace," he said.



Shouvlin's kind nature shined through

After tragic accident in February, Hinsdale woman lives on in the hearts of her loved ones

Mary Elaine Shouvlin was known by many attributes: witty, stylish, loyal, cat lover, social justice champion.

To her childhood best friend in Hinsdale, she was simply "Mares."

"We spent all of our summers together," Cyndy Travis said. "She was very smart, always willing to try things and do things."

And Mary adored her hometown, maintaining a residence in Hinsdale even as a new love named Raphael Shouvlin meant frequent trips to Florida, where he wanted to retire. She kept the house in Vero Beach even after her husband passed away in 2017 after about a year of marriage. But Mary's heart was here, according to older sister Martha Kelly, recounting the events of Feb. 7.

"She had finally decided to sell the house in Vero Beach and was driving to Hinsdale and told me she would text me from Chattanooga," Kelly said.

The text never came. Instead an Illinois state trooper arrived at 1:30 a.m. with a knock on Kelly's door in Geneva.

"He told me that there had been an automobile accident and that Mary had died at the scene," she said. "It was very tragic, very sad."

Born Mary Duncan in 1956 to parents George and

Bernice, she grew up on North Bruner Street and attended Monroe School and Hinsdale Junior High School. Kelly, nine years older, remembered riding bikes together to the pool and later attending Mary's debutante ball.

"I hardly knew anyone in town by then, and they had to find me a date," Kelly said.

Travis lived on the village's east side and came into Mary's orbit at age 12.

"Both our families belonged to Hinsdale Golf Club and our dads put us in junior golf," Travis related in her remarks at Mary's memorial in March. "We became golf partners (she was better than me) and we remained friends for life."

Tennis was another of the pair's avid pursuits, and they relished the chance to serve as ball girls at a Virginia Slims women's tennis tournament in Lake Forest.

"Our tennis pro said that were enough tennis crazies to do this," Travis joked from her home in New York. "It was pretty exciting that we got to see Billie Jean King and Margaret Court and Evonne Goolagong."

After attending Hinsdale Central for the first part of her high schooling, Mary graduated from Emma Willard School in New York. She attended DePauw University in Indiana but came home to care for her ailing father before she was able to complete her studies, Kelly said.

Travis characterized herself and Mary as "party girls" in early adulthood, going down to Rush Street for the night life

"We would get dressed up," Travis said. "She always looked good. She always knew what to wear."

Kelly said Mary lived with their widowed mother, whose passing in 2001 was heart-rending for her sister. Moving into her own place on East Maple Street helped the healing.

"Hinsdale was her home," Kelly commented, noting the politically engaged Mary would invariably have CNN on the TV whenever Kelly visited.

Mary worked as a mortgage processor and underwriter in the condominium lending industry.

"They sent her everywhere because she was so good at it," Travis said.

Mary attended Travis' wedding in 1999, and the two stayed in touch by phone and email over the years and through COVID.

"We planned a reunion once traveling became realistic, but my heart hurts so much that time ran out for us," Travis said.

The accident also claimed the lives of two of the three cats who were traveling with Mary. Kelly was able to find the surviving feline a new home.

"A really nice family adopted the cat," Kelly said. A memorial was set up in Mary's name at the Hinsdale Humane Society

While going through her sister's belongings, Kelly found

three gifts — one for each of Kelly's three children — that Mary had planned to present.

"She never got around to getting them engraved, so I got them engraved for her," Kelly said. "She loved all three of my children."

"I think she was a kind and caring person. She was always willing to help people," she continued.

Both Kelly and Travis cited Mary's distinctive laugh and sense of humor as the traits that come to mind most in their memories of her.

"I know her life mattered in how she shared her spirit and kindness to all she was friends with," Travis said. "She was a good person. She would stand by you no matter what."



Hinsdale woman lends voice to gun control fight

Hinsdale’s Alison Kozlow is a busy working mom of two preschoolers. Activism was not on her to-do list.

But when seven people were gunned down and dozens more injured while watching the Highland Park Fourth of July parade earlier this month, she became a woman on a mission. Kozlow joined the March Fourth movement to galvanize public support and lobby Congress for stiffer gun control measures.

“What we’re trying to do with the March Fourth movement is ban assault weapons federally,” Kozlow said. “We want to make sure that all communities are protected.”

It was while watching her village’s own Independence Day parade that she learned the horrifying news. Another mass shooting, and one so close to home, had left her feeling despondent. She sought out others similarly disheartened.

“A friend of a friend had posted on Instagram that she wanted to see who else was as frustrated as she was,” Kozlow related.

The frustrated poster was Kitty Brandtner of Winnetka, March Fourth’s founder. Kozlow responded and was enlisted to help handle the

start-up group’s social media messaging the first couple of days as it gained traction. Response was strong, and two weeks ago more than 500 supporters, including Kozlow, traveled to Washington D.C., to speak with legislators and march at the Capitol to demonstrate their determination.

“I traveled to D.C. with four others from Hinsdale and Clarendon Hills, along with others from Hinsdale,” said Kozlow, gratified to have representation beyond the North Shore. “We just started figuring out how can we use our voices to help enact change.”

March Fourth members also reached out to families impacted by the school shooting in Uvalde, Texas, in May, helping furnish resources for individuals to join the rally.

“They weren’t able to fly to D.C. without the help from donations from others,” she said.

House Bill 1808, which calls for the prohibition of assault weapons, passed out of the body’s Judiciary Committee last week but has not yet been taken up by the full House of Representatives.

“We were hoping to get a vote from the House this week, but it just hasn’t been

settled yet, so we really want to encourage folks to call their representatives,” Kozlow said.

Kozlow and husband, Jimmy, moved to Hinsdale in February 2020 just before the pandemic hit. That complicated their introduction to town, but they’ve since fallen in love with it.

“It offers everything you want from the city but in a scaled-down fashion,” she said.

Kozlow credits her mom for encouraging her to fight for what’s important. It’s been rewarding for her to turn that counsel into action.

“What I’ve realized in the past three weeks is that your voice matters, and that by just getting up and fighting for something you believe in and getting an army behind you, things can change,” she said.

That Instagram page that

started with just a couple hundred followers now has more than 18,000 from across the nation. Kozlow plans to keep fighting.

“Assault weapons do not belong in the hands of civilians, period,” she asserted, “so we don’t have to be scared to send our kids to school or watch a parade with our families.”

Join police in the National Night Out celebration

Police sometimes have to break up a party. But this week, they're inviting you to one.

Hinsdale and Oak Brook police are hosting a National Night Out celebration at 5 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 2, at Oak Brook's Central Park West, 1500 Forest Gate Road.

National Night Out was introduced in August 1984 through an already established network of law enforcement agencies, neighborhood watch groups, civic groups, state and regional crime prevention associations and volunteers across the nation. The first National Night Out involved 2.5 million neighbors across 400 communities in 23 states.

National Night Out is designed to make communities safer, more caring places to live by promoting partnerships between police and the communities they serve. Millions of neighbors across thousands of communities, including more than 125 towns in Illinois alone, will participate in the annual event this year.

"The best way to build a safer community is to know your neighbors and your surroundings," U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison stated on the NNO website. "National Night Out triumphs over a culture that isolates us from each other and allows us to rediscover our own communities."

The celebration here, which begins at 5 p.m. with the singing of the National Anthem, promises fun for all. A helicopter landing is scheduled for 5:15 to 6:15 p.m., with a K-9 demo from 6:15 to 6:45 p.m.

Hinsdale police will take on Oak Brook officers and Oak Brook Park District staff in an ice cream relay at 6:45 p.m.

Kids can have their faces painted and visit a balloon animal artist from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. Touch a Truck, a bouncy house, wagon rides, sack races and a hula hoop contest also are part of the fun. Food and a popcorn cart will provide munchies and McGruff the crime fighting dog

will make an appearance.

The Oak Brook Park District will close out the evening with a showing of "Zootopia" at dusk after National Night Out activities have concluded.

As part of the community-building effort, food pantry donations will be collected for HCS Family Services in red bins at the event. Recommended donations are peanut butter, jelly or jam, ready-to-eat canned soup, canned tuna, canned chicken and hot breakfast cereals such as oatmeal and rice cereal. Personal care items such as bar soap and body wash, along with dish soap and laundry detergent, also are in demand. Please make sure the "use by" date has not passed.

Hinsdale is fortunate to be a community that is not riddled by crime and that has a good relationship with its police department. Come out Tuesday to celebrate that — and to support our local police.

Forays into more of Pure Michigan don't disappoint

Working remote is nothing new. I've done it while I've been sick, while my husband had COVID and the first two years my daughter went to sleep-away camp in Holland, Mich.

But I've never worked remotely "on the road," so to speak, where I've stayed in a different hotel every night. That's what I did last week as I accompanied my husband, Dan, on sales calls. We dropped Ainsley off near the shores of Lake Michigan Monday and hit the road Tuesday, traveling some 558 miles to Traverse City, then Mackinaw City and back again. Along the way we stopped in Cadillac, Petoskey, Cheyogan, Carson City and Grand Rapids.

During previous camp weeks, we spent all our time at the Courtyard Marriott in downtown Holland. I could work in our room or the bistro downstairs. This year my office traveled with me. My morning routine included consulting Yelp for a spot near Dan's first sales call where I could work while he met with customers.

I loved writing and editing from different coffee shops whose Wi-Fi passwords were things like

"Ghirardelli" and "cupcakes," but I found being on the move all the time a bit discombobulating.

Working in establishments that serve food presents another challenge if you are, A) trying to be a conscientious customer and not take up a table for two hours after purchasing only a cup of coffee, or B) low on willpower. So my coffee drinks often were accompanied by a cherry scone or cherry muffin or the occasional chocolate chip cookie.

Working in the car makes it easier to avoid such high-calorie treats, but it is dependent on a strong cell signal and hotspots and is not ergonomically correct. The scenery — especially in the northernmost part of the state — also can be quite distracting.

The benefit of working in local spots (I avoided Starbucks when I could) is meeting the local patrons. I met a lovely gentleman at State Street Coffee in Cheyogan. We struck up a conversation and after learning

what I do for a living, he advised I check out the St. Ignace News if I could find one in Mackinaw City. His suggestion gave us an excuse to traverse the Mackinac Bridge in order to pick up a copy of the paper at its offices — and to say we went to the UP.

At another coffee shop in Petoskey, I learned of a college major I hadn't

heard of before: anthropological linguistics — the study of the relationship between language and culture. It often involves working on languages that have no written record, and is a good major for those considering law school, at least according to one barista.

Stumbling across interesting people in interesting places is one of the amazing parts about a trip like this. Another wonderful thing is that at the end of the work day, you're on vacation. Wednesday night we spent the evening relaxing in front of a firepit on the little beach at the back of our motel in Mackinaw City, enjoying a spectacular view of the bridge and

Lake Huron. Had we not indulged in a piece of four-berry pie a la mode for dessert, we would have enjoyed roasting marshmallows for the complimentary s'mores.

Saugatuck remains my favorite spot in Michigan, and the standard against which I measured every other town we visited. But this trip did whet my appetite to visit other parts of the state. I'd love to spend time at the Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore, take the ferry to Mackinac Island and stop in Frankfort, the favorite Michigan destination of reader advisory board member Bill Facinelli.

I would enjoy a visit to Detroit as well, since I've only seen it from the highway while driving home from Toronto. And a visit to Lake Superior would allow me to check off all five of the Great Lakes — which I would like to learn more about before my next trip.

I suppose that is one of the things I enjoy most about traveling to new places — the desire it sparks to discover even more.



If you live in Hinsdale and get a call from someone telling you your toilet is running, it might not be a prank. It might be Karen Buccieri.

Hinsdale's water billing clerk pays close attention to the water use of all 6,800 customers on the village's water system. When she sees signs of a potential leak that could be wasting water and costing a customer extra money, she lets them know.

"I go through the leak report every day," said Buccieri, who joined the village staff 11 years ago.

Buccieri was looking for a part-time job that would leave her weekends free when she came upon Hinsdale's need for front desk help. A few years later, she was asked to take on the full-time job of water billing clerk. Like the position that brought her to Hinsdale, Buccieri's current job includes plenty of opportunities to interact with the people of Hinsdale. That's the part of the job Buccieri said she enjoys most.

"In my heart, I feel like I work for them," said Buccieri, who

often is the first person that a new resident encounters at Village Hall and the last person they talk to when they leave. When someone calls to open a new account for their new home, Buccieri also guides new Hinsdaleans through getting their vehicle stickers, parking permits and any other village-related business.

In addition to knowing whose pipes are leaking, Buccieri knows who is moving in and out of the village, as it's her job to open new accounts and close old ones.

"I'm always sad when a house closes and they move away," said Buccieri, whose job is busiest when the real estate market is hot.

Buccieri said her job has taught her a lot about how the water systems in the village and in peoples' homes work. She's learned that wine cellars require water to keep their contents cool, and that food dye can be used to locate a toilet leak.

Customer service is at the heart of all she does, Buccieri said. But even she has her

limits. After guiding a resident through the process of checking for a toilet leak, Buccieri said she had to refuse his request that she fix the toilet, too.

Water customers are billed every other month, with half receiving bills one month and the other half the next. Billing week is always a busy one for Buccieri and her part-time assistant, Becky Srejma, who audit every bill before it hits the mail. When late fees and disconnection notices are necessary, they're always preceded with a phone call from Buccieri.

"I call every one of them to let them know the account is in arrears," she said.


Those calls are among the estimated 60 calls Buccieri makes or takes in an average day.

"The phone is always busy," Buccieri said, and she's always on the other end of the line, ready to answer questions, take payments or guide residents to a co-worker who can give them the answers they need.

Orchestra keeps its rhythm

West Suburban Symphony Orchestra turns 75, bounces back after COVID

In the aftermath of World War II, Chicago's suburbs boomed as families sought more spacious environs. But the desire for an urban-like fine arts scene gave rise to groups to meet that demand, groups like the West Suburban Symphony Orchestra.

Next month marks the 75th anniversary of the founding of WSSO. Originally established in 1947 through the former West Suburban YMCA in LaGrange Park at the request local residents, the Hinsdale-based organization now boasts a chorus, a chamber ensemble and an orchestra for summer performances.

"It was started by the YMCA as a community group and just grew," said Rich Lukes, WSSO president since 2000.

Lukes, a cellist, joined the symphony in 1989 at the suggestion of a friend during a period of rebuilding.

"(The orchestra) had a very low string count. It was small at the time, maybe closer to a full-size chamber orchestra," he said. "We were called one of the best kept secrets in La Grange and Hinsdale."

Membership gradually increased and numbers between 60 and 70 today. Shortly after Lukes became president, Peter Lipari was hired in 2001 as the music director and conductor, the sixth in WSSO's history. Lipari recounted living in England at the time with his family when the position opened, although he had been wielding the baton for several Chicago-area troupes on a regular basis.

"I had kept my fingers in the pots over here when I came to audition for West Suburban," said Lipari,

relating the series of fortuitous circumstances that enabled him to win the audition. "The stars lined up for that to happen."

Two years later the West Suburban Symphony Singers chorus was established, followed by the founding of the West Suburban Symphony Chamber Orchestra in 2004 and the West Suburban Symphony Festival Orchestra in 2008. Principal trombonist Corey Kirkpatrick, WSSO member since 1988, said he's proud to play with such a well-regarded company that takes on formidable works by composers like Gustav Mahler and works like Mozart's "Requiem."

"We've always had great conductors and the reputation of the orchestra is really good," Kirkpatrick said. "The bar is set pretty high for us as musicians to play challenging works."

Fitzpatrick, Lipari and Lukes all have fond memories of the symphony's trip to England in the summer of 2003 for several performances, including a stop in Lipari's previous town of residence, where they

were treated to a sustained standing ovation.

Lukes recalled a funny moment when the group played in central London on the Fourth of the July.

"The man who was introducing us said, 'We're here today to mourn the loss of the Colonies,'" he related with a laugh.

Hinsdale Central High School's auditorium has been the symphony's longstanding home base, but performances are also held at local churches and more recently at North Central College's Wentz Hall in Naperville. It's a fitting venue as Clarence Dissinger, a North Central graduate and former Lyons Township High School music director, was a founding father of the WSSO.

"I think it's one of the best venues in Chicago," Lukes said of Wentz Hall.

Lipari said having to shut down for 15 months due to the pandemic was difficult and the symphony is regaining its footing.

"We're taking baby steps. We're doing it in a responsible way that keeps our audiences safe and our

players safe," he said, suggesting the circumstances impart more meaning to the 75th anniversary. "We're celebrating because we're marking the fact that we're back."

People can be part of the celebration this Saturday, July 30, when the festival orchestra performs "Cinema Classics" from 7 to 8:30 p.m. at Cantigny Park, 1S151 Winfield Road in Wheaton. The program will feature film score favorites, including a medley of John Williams' greatest melodies and music by Danny Elfman, Jerry Goldsmith, Stephen Sondheim, Hans Zimmer and more.

Lipari said he hopes to engage audiences after having to shut down performances during the pandemic.

"We're hitting back with something we know will be an audience pleaser," Lipari said. "We're even playing something from 'Gremlins.'"

The group will also play "Svengoolie Variations," a piece written for the WSSO by Downers Grove composer Thomas Maslan that many Chicagoans

will recognize.

Lipari said he tries to offer a diverse mix of music, both in terms of content and composer.

"In every concert but one (this coming season), we are performing either a piece by a woman or a person of color," he said. "The public is changing, and we know that young people have a lot of options, so we're trying to draw them in."

"Traditions are important, but we can't survive if we can't change with changes," Lipari added.

Lukes enjoys hearing positive reviews from audience members and is hopeful the symphony can thrive another 75 years.

"They tell us that they really like what they heard," he said. "I hope (the WSSO) stays as long as possible. I think there's enough people who are involved that will keep it going."

Admission to the concert at Cantigny Park is free with \$10 parking. Seating is on the lawn, and picnics are welcome. For more information on the WSSO, visit <https://www.westsubsymphony.org>.




Average Sales Price*

Sailors complete the Race to Mackinac

Competition, camaraderie keep Hinsdale sailors coming back after decades of racing

Jerry Thomas' 42nd Race to Mackinac is another for the books, and one that he and the crews of all 242 vessels that embarked on the annual race from Chicago to Mackinac Island, Mich., aren't likely to forget.

"It was very challenging," Thomas said upon completing the trek.

He said the crew of the Winnebago worked against three bouts of high winds that peaked at more than 70 miles per hour, as well as heavy rains and thunderstorms.

Thomas said the goal of the six-member crew shifted from speed to safety, and in the end, they achieved both.

"We were all safe, and in this race, that's a success," Thomas said.

The Winnebago finished

the 333-mile race in less than 46 hours — not far from Thomas' fastest finish of 35 hours.

The race held yet another reward for having weathered the weekend's storms. Once the clouds parted, Thomas said he and the crew enjoyed a crystal clear view of a star-filled sky over Lake Michigan.

"It was very pretty," he said.

The 2022 Chicago Yacht Club Race to Mackinac began Friday, July 22, continuing its tradition as the longest annual freshwater sailing race in the world. Sailors come from all over the globe to face the challenge of Lake Michigan's unpredictable weather and the competition of fellow sailors.

The unpredictability of the race is part of what keeps sailors like Hinsdale resident

David Anderson coming back every year. A boat's starting position, the weather and the proximity of other vessels are just a few of the many factors that can affect the outcome of the race. Even after 35 races, every experience is different and every race is an adventure, Anderson said.

At nearly 70, Anderson was the oldest member of the 15-member crew aboard the Sagamore and one of three men from Hinsdale. Hinsdale residents and brothers Michael and David Phlamm also were aboard the Sagamore, using their own years of experience and skills to guide the boat toward Mackinac Island.

The 68-foot yacht finished its journey in just over 43 hours, placing 7th in its section and 17th in its division.

This was the third Mac race for Michael and the first for his brother, both of whom saw their father and grandfather enjoy the sport for many years before becoming sailors themselves.

Michael Phlamm said this year posted new challenges for the entire crew.


"There were a lot more things that could go wrong with the big storms coming through," he said.

He said the timing of the storms left the Sagamore trailing in the calm after the storm, resulting in a ride that was longer than he had hoped.

"We were a hair behind when the wind decided to die," he said. But in the end, Phlamm said his third trip to Mackinac was a success.

"We all made it to the Pink Pony," Phlamm said, speaking of the bar where sailors traditionally celebrate upon completing the race.

Anderson said the camaraderie among the crew and the fun that waits at the finish line keeps him coming back every year.

"At the end is a party with 2,000 of your closest friends," he said.

Like most sailors, he allows himself a day or two to celebrate and unwind on the island before heading back home.

Hinsdale resident and veteran sailor Dave Dickerson skippered his boat, Paradigm Shift, to a 2nd-place finish in its section and a 54th-place finish in its division. Paradigm Shift reached Mackinac Island Monday morning, 46 hours and 18 minutes after leaving Chicago.

With more than 25 races to each of their credits, Dickerson, Anderson and Thomas have all earned the title of "island goat" — a term reserved for sailors who complete the Mac Race 25 times or more.

At nearly 80 years old, Thomas said he has enough wind in his sails for several more races across the lake.

"I'd like to get up to 50," he said — a feat accomplished by only a handful of sailors throughout the Mac's long history and one that would earn him the title of "Double Goat."

Meanwhile, the Chicago sailing season continues, with races scheduled through the end of September.

"We do just about every race that's in the Chicago area," Phlamm said.

But the longest, and perhaps the most exciting, is over until next summer, when sailors young and old, new and seasoned, will once again make their way to Mackinac Island.
