D86 awards final referendum bids

The Hinsdale High School District 86 Board awarded more than \$5 million in bids last week for the final phase of the \$140 million renovation project voters approved in an April 2019 referendum.

The bids include most of the work to renovate and upgrade 89 classrooms at Hinsdale Central next summer.

The nine bids awarded at the Nov. 17 meeting are for

- electrical work, \$2.8 million
- flooring, \$519,000
- general trades, \$396,500
- demolition, \$355,225
- acoustical ceiling, \$306,475
- drywall and rough carpentry, \$264,000
- masonry, \$248,900
- painting and coating, \$168,240

The bids came in at \$6.3 million, about \$400,000 higher than the \$5.9 million budget. As a result, the board rejected all bids related to fire suppression (low bid \$111,950) and HVAC/temperature control

(\$958,000).

The scope of work will be adjusted to align with the budget and the packages will be re-bid, board President Erik Held said. The district expects to spend \$37,000 for fire protection and \$25,000 for HVAC, according to a document from Pepper Construction. If those bids come in as anticipated, the project will be \$224,000 under budget.

Board member Jeff Waters assured residents that Hinsdale Central will be "more than in compliance" with state fire codes.

"This was an upgrade," he said.

Once the HVAC and fire suppression are re-bid, the district will have issued all bids for hard construction costs, according to Josh Stephenson, chief financial officer.

The board has awarded almost 100 bids in nine phases for the \$140 million project.

"The only remaining items that may need to be bid would be soft costs for phase 4 (e.g. moving services)," Stephenson wrote in an email. Work on the classrooms will be completed next summer.

'Future ready' facilities improvements are in the final phase at Hinsdale Central

MEETING ROUNDUP

Hinsdale High School District 86 Board:

Among other business Nov. 17, board members:

- voted 7-0 to approve a resolution estimating the 2022 corporate and special purposes property tax levy at \$94.9 million, a 5.8 percent increase over last year. The board will hold a public hearing on the levy at its Thursday, Dec. 15, meeting.
- had a first look at the staffing framework for the 2023-24 school year from Cheryl Moore, assistant superintendent of human resources. The district has been notified that 39 teachers are planning to retire in 2025 and 2026. Moore said she would like the board to agree to a framework in December, as it will guide scheduling and staffing decisions that need to be made early next year.
- learned the finance committee discussed extending the contract with busing company First Student. Despite a 26.5 percent rate hike for busing and 19.3 percent for special education transport, the cost is still lower than what other companies are charging, committee Chairwoman Debbie Levinthal said.

Fall leaf pick-up will continue in Hinsdale

The village's annual fall leaf pick-up program continues through Dec. 5.

The program is designed to keep village streets cleaner and safer and to help keep leaves out of sewers and storm drains. The village provides free, unlimited weekly curbside collected of leaves in kraft paper yard waste bags. Plastic bags will not be picked up.

Pick-up runs for a total of six weeks in conjunction with regularly-scheduled weekly yard waste pick-up by Republic Services. Leaf pick-up is complimentary; other yard waste will require a yard waste sticker.

Bagged leaves should be placed in the parkway along

the curb by 6 a.m. on scheduled pick-up dates. Bags may not exceed 34 gallons or 60 pounds.

Do not put bags in the street, and do not blow or rake leaves into the street as it causes issues with storm water drainage.

In some cases, due to volume, collection may run behind (i.e., Monday collection being completed on Tuesday); however, every household will receive one collection in each of the six weeks.

Residents also may choose to keep the leaves on their property to be composted for use as mulch. The village forester highly recommends the use of compost for keeping plants and trees healthy.

Slight increase in new COVID cases in town

The DuPage County Health Department reported 11 new cases of COVID-19 in Hinsdale over the past week, bringing the total number of cases in the DuPage County portion of Hinsdale to 4,282, compared to 4,271 last week. The Cook County Health Department no longer reports on cases specific to Hinsdale.

The number of cases per 100,000 population in DuPage was 14.1 on Nov. 21, com-

pared to 13.3 on Nov. 16. The community level has dropped to low.

District 181 reported five new positive cases from Nov. 16-19, including three students, a teacher and a staff member, for a total of 115 districtwide since school opened.

District 86 reported seven new positive cases at Hinsdale Central as of Nov. 18, bring the total to 50 since school opened.



Village preparing for sesquicentennial

Hinsdale's 150th anniversary is coming up and a group of village staffers and community members have some big ideas on how to celebrate it.

The village was incorporated on April 1, 1873, and members of the 150th Anniversary Committee hope to commemorate the event in a variety of ways.

One option is to create a new patio on the south side of the Memorial Building, facing Chicago Avenue and Burlington Park.

"We want to reconstruct the plaza, rededicate the plaza as something memorable for the community and also provide opportunities for potential sponsorships," said assistant village manager Andrianna Peterson, who is leading the planning efforts.

Jeff Valentino of Hollander Design presented three possible concepts for the plaza at the Nov. 16 Zoom committee meeting. Valentino, a Western Springs resident, is doing the work pro bono. He said he enjoys spending time in the village and almost moved here

"I have always loved this building," he said. "One of the reasons I love it is it reminds me of the East Coast, where I grew up."

The plaza and new landscaping would make the building's entrance more inviting, he said.

"This was always intended to be the front door to Hinsdale," he said.

The patio's paver bricks could be inscribed in honor or memory of residents, he noted.

The committee also discussed adding back the roof railing that was at one point removed from the Memorial Building building.

The village's tentative budget, which has yet to be approved by the village board, has earmarked \$96,000 to restore the railing.

Another committee member suggested replacing the fountain in Burlington Park.

"There are a number of ideas that have been brought forth that are what I would call infrastructure related projects," Peterson said. "Whether or not those are all appropriate for the 150th are something that still needs to be discussed."

Anywork on the Memorial Building, for example, would need to be reviewed by the Historic Preservation Commission and approved by the village board, she noted.

The village is working to create a comprehensive calendar of activities that will take place during the village's sesquicentennial year.

The village is considering hosting a fireworks show on or near the summer solstice June 21. The preliminary budget includes \$100,000 for 150th events.

Meetings are being held with various groups and agencies in town to coordinate events. For example, the Hinsdale Public Library and Hinsdale Historical Society already have planned programs and/or exhibits on historic homes in town, significant women in village history and other topics.

"I think that's what it's all about — trying to encourage everyone to be part of the yearlong activities in whatever manner they want to," Peterson said.

A new logo also has been created pro bono by a relative of a committee member.

"I can't say enough about all of the good people who are donating their time and talent to the village to accomplish this," Peterson said. "It really is a difference maker."

Peterson said she also hopes residents will keep this landmark anniversary in mind as 2023 approaches.

"There is a lot of work being done to plan for the events for next year and we want people to think about how they might want to be a participant," she said. "If they want to memorialize a family member during the celebration, there's probably going to be ways to do that."

Once the new logo is finalized, the village will start sending out materials about the anniversary.

"People will be seeing more and more about that in these upcoming weeks," Peterson said.

The Hinsdalean has its own plans to commemorate the village's 150th anniversary. Starting with the Jan. 5 issue, the paper will devote Page 7 each week to a story or photo related to the village's history or upcoming anniversary events. The paper also will publish a special section next year.

Helping others one of joys of holiday season

Jaclyn McNamara rose to the ranks of president of the Hinsdale Junior Woman's Club quickly. She said that's partially due to her inability to say no, but mostly because of her commitment to the good that's accomplished by the organization's 271 members.

McNamara was new to the community when she joined the 73-year-old organization in 2017. She said she joined as a way to meet her neighbors and stayed to make a difference in the lives of neighbors in need.

"You don't think the need is in your backyard," said McNamara, who said she was surprised to learn of the community's food pantry and the demand for its services. Each holiday season, the HIWC partners with the HCS Family Services pantry to provide holiday gifts for families and individuals throughout the community. Known as Gift of the Season, the program is expected to provide gifts for 317 people this year, McNamara said.

"It's anywhere from an 80-year-old grandpa to a 3-year-old little girl," she said of those who will receive gifts through the program and the 152 members who adopted individuals or families this year.

By adopting someone on the HCS Family Services list, a participant agrees to provide items on that person's wish list. The items might be for the person to keep or to use as gifts for their loved ones.

Members of the HJWC Outreach Committee gather on Dec. 10 at Redeemer Lutheran Church in Hinsdale to organize and distribute donations. Members are on hand to wrap gifts in paper to reflect whatever holiday the recipients are observing or recipients can choose to take paper home to wrap gifts themselves.

Club members donate the wrapping supplies, while Hinsdale merchants pitch in to provide other necessary items. Fuller's donates bags to help transport gifts and members of the Hinsdale Central Hockey Club will help carry gifts to peoples' cars.

McNamara said recipients' wish lists often include necessities such as cleaning supplies and gift cards for food and other household items, pointing once again to

"It's really eye opening,"

Club participation in Gift of the Season is greater than ever, McNamara said. This year, in addition to hundreds of HCS Family Services patrons, members of HJWC will provide gift cards for 40 foster children through a partnership with Lutheran Child and Family

Services of Illinois.

"This is our largest year yet," McNamara said.

While Gift of the Season is a big undertaking for HJWC, it's one of many projects taken on by the club each year. On Dec. 11, HJWC will once again host the 5K Jingle Dash. The run will fund a scholarship program to help philanthropic high school students attend college.

The second annual Jingle Dash steps off from Robbins Park at 8 a.m. After the run, participants will enjoy snacks and photos with Santa and Mrs. Claus. The Jingle Dash is organized by the club's Education Committee. More information about Jingle Dash and HJWC is available at hjwc.us/jingledash.

Ooops, busted. But in my defense, I only eat bacon on BLT's made with my husband's homegrown tomatoes.





MARGE CHAPELLO & MARILYN LINDBERG, CHURCH BIRTHDAY ORGANIZERS

What's involved in planning a church's 100th anniversary?

While gathering materials for Hinsdale's Redeemer Lutheran Church's centennial, anniversary committee Co-chairs Marilyn Lindberg and Marge Chapello came across a compelling video clip.

"Ralph Klein (former Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago professor) was the speaker at our 75th anniversary event, and he was trying to think ahead to our 100th, how life would be," related Lindberg, whose husband found the footage. "He said, 'Let me be the first to wish you Happy Anniversary in the year 2022.' Everybody was just stunned that we had that video."

It was a remarkable moment during a remarkably smooth series of commemorative activities. As preparations to mark the milestone began about a year ago, the ladies admitted that COVID-19 loomed in the background.

"We were hesitant in the beginning," Chapello said. "It was like, 'Let's make this calendar, but we might have to adjust it.'" "We were worried, with the pandemic, how many people are really going to attend these events?" Lindberg added.

Fortunately the best-case scenario unfolded as all of the scheduled events came to fruition, kicking off with an opening party in May, the month the church was founded as an English-speaking offshoot of crosstown Zion Lutheran in 1922.

"It was actually very well attended," Lindberg said. "We had finger foods so people didn't have to touch everything."

Both said there was a palpable reunion-like spirit among celebrants as they gathered as a body to observe the historic occasion.

"It kind of was the end of the pandemic for them, in a way. Everything was so well-attended. They just seemed really happy to be together," Lindberg said.

A Trivia Night in June and an outdoor picnic in August were also highly successful. A time capsule was buried during the picnic.

"A lot of people came back for that that had not been in church since the pandemic," Lindberg said.

Then in October, two of the church's former music directors performed a concert.

"We had a great celebration of music and food and entertainment," Chapello said.

Retired longtime pastor Don Balster, now in his 90s, delivered his well wishes via video, and several of the church's recent interns recorded videos recounting their funniest moments from their experiences.

Chapello and Lindberg said they wanted the celebration to bridge the past and the present.

"We were trying to make it welcoming so other people outside of church could come in and participate — young and old and everybody in between to make it very inclusive," Chapello said.

The commemoration culminated in a special service and lunch Oct. 30.

A current Redeemer member traces his lineage all the way back to one of the six families that founded the church.

"That was a real risk for them, to break away from the German Lutheran church," Lindberg said of the pioneering families.

"I think if they could look forward 100 years, they would be proud," she said.

"Probably a little surprised," Chapello added with a laugh.

Pizza is in the eye of the beholder

Mick Weisz teaches me how to make my favorite, topped with one of his favorites

Pizza is pizza.

It's not nearly as complicated as the chocolate mousse cake chef Mick Weisz had to make for the final of his baking class in culinary school. Or many of the other dishes on the menu at Giuliano's, which Weisz owns with his wife, Cathy.

But it is delicious — especially when topped with roasted garlic paste, homemade tomato sauce, mozzarella, sliced tomatoes, goat cheese crumbles and basil, Weisz' version of a pizza margherita. It's my favorite pizza on Giuliano's menu — and has been for more than two decades.

When I arrive Monday morning, Weisz has already started preheating the oven to 450 degrees, which takes about an hour, as this is no ordinary oven. The 1942 rotary style pizza oven — which can bake 36 pizzas at a time — used to be a staple in Chicago pizzerias.

"A lot of places probably don't use them these days because there is a big footprint and they're not the fastest in the world and they cook pizzas a certain way," he said.

Then we grab a ball of dough which has been proofing for 24 to 48 hours, coat it in flour and send it twice through the dough sheeter, another piece of equipment Weisz purchased used when he open the restaurant 25 years ago.

"That and the oven are really a piece of American engineering that are pretty amazing," he said.

The dough is a basic concoction,



You don't have to throw the pizza dough up in the air to make a tasty pie, but it sure is fun. Giuliano's owner Mick Weisz did a great job teaching me how to make my favorite pizza on his menu, pizza margherita. (Jim Slonoff photos)

made of pizza flour (which has a higher gluten content), eggs, salt, sugar, yeast and oil. The restaurant mixes up to 50 pounds at a time.

I place the dough on a board sprinkled with corn meal — to help it slide off into the oven — and use a cardboard pizza ring to cut it into a perfect circle. Then I start layering on the toppings, starting with the garlic paste and ending with the goat

cheese, an unusual ingredient for this type of pizza.

"I'm a huge goat cheese fan," he said.

The sauce is very similar to the one Weisz first started making when he opened the restaurant.

"It's not a really sweet sauce. There's not sugar in it really at all," he said.

While ingredients to his marinara sauce have remained the same, the quantity he makes has not. When the restaurant opened, he said he made about five gallons a week. Now he makes 40 and it doesn't always last seven days.

We slide the pizza into the oven where it bakes for about 20 minutes.

When it comes out, I sprinkle it with basic chiffonade and cut it into squares using a giant knife. My squares are not very even and I can't seem to cut all the way through the crust on the end pieces. (I will never complain about that when I order a pizza again!)

The pizza is delicious, which is why it's one of the restaurant's top sellers, along with the Giuliano's special, topped with grilled portobello mushrooms, sausage, house roasted green peppers and onions.

Chicago is synonymous with deepdish, pan-style pizza, but Weisz has a different view.

"Probably the more popular Chicago-style pizza is the pub style, thin crust, cut into squares," he said. "Most Chicagoans, I think, eat that more than the pan style that everyone knows being Chicago-style pizza."

As a kid in Elmhurst, Weisz grew up eating pizza at Mama Maria's, Roberto's and Two Brothers. His favorite pizza is topped with sausage, hot giardiniera and goat cheese. Because of the type of oven he uses, the sausage can be put on the pizza raw, giving it extra flavor as it bakes. Speaking of sausage, the restaurant goes through about 200 pounds a week, along with 500 pounds of dough and four pounds of fresh basil, just to name a few ingredients. Those ingredients top hundreds of pizzas each week — 300 on a Friday night alone.

I'm happy with my one.

1 teaspoon fresh thyme

2 cups yellow onion

3 clove cloves minced garlic

1/2 cup white wine

1 cup cooked spinach or leftover greens

3 cups turkey, shredded


1/3 cup all-purpose flour

2 1/2 cups reduced sodium chicken or turkey broth

2 tablespoons soy sauce

2 tablespoons nutritional yeast, optional

2 cups herb stuffing mix, coarsely chopped



DIRECTIONS

1. Preheat oven to 350°F. Grease a 3-qt. rectangular baking dish well with dairy-free butter substitute. For cashew cream, in a blender combine drained cashews, 1 1/2 cups fresh water, and a pinch of salt. Blend on high speed until completely smooth, 1 minute.

2. Cook pasta according to package directions. Sear mushrooms in dry pan over medium-high until well browned on one side, 3 minutes. Add 2 Tbsp. of butter substitute and stir. Add thyme, onions, and garlic; cook and stir 3 minutes. Stir in wine; cook until liquid is almost evaporated, 4 minutes. Stir in leftover greens; cook, stirring constantly, until any free liquid evaporates. In large bowl stir together shredded turkey, mushroom mixture, and cooked pasta.

3. In a large saucepan heat 3 Tbsp. butter substitute over medium until foamy. Whisk in flour; cook, whisking occasionally, 3 minutes. Gradually whisk in broth and soy sauce until combined and smooth. Increase heat to mediumhigh; cook, whisking often, until mixture begins to bubble, 4 minutes. Whisk in 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. black pepper, and the cashew cream; simmer, whisking often, until thickened, 4 minutes. Stir in nutritional yeast (if using). Add cashew mixture to pasta mixture; stir



Head coach: Spencer Anderson Seasons as head coach: 1st No. of varsity members: 20






