## D86 tackles Transition Center crunch

*Growing enrollment drives search for more space to serve students with disabilities*

To address surging demand for Transition Center services, Hinsdale High School District 86 is poised to spend \$3.8 million to lease and remodel an additional 11,500 square feet of space to accommodate students next school year and beyond.

At their Dec. 17 meeting, board members discussed an administration recommendation to rent two suites at 361 Frontage Road in Burr Ridge to ease overcrowding at the district's Transition Center across from Hinsdale South High School in Darien. The center provides life and vocational skills instruction to young adults with disabilities between the ages of 18 and 22 from the Hinsdale Central and Hinsdale South communities.

Officials say about 20,000 square feet of space is needed to serve the population, which has grown from 24 students in 2013-14 to 97 this school year. The Transition Center has less than half that recommended space. The district rents two additional spaces for \$14,400 a month.

Chief Financial Officer Josh Stephenson said

the larger rental space could consolidate those two sites, and opportunity exists for gaining more room to eventually replace the center.

"It could potentially be a long-term solution to house the full program at this site," he said.

Officials also examined adding on to the current facility or constructing a secondary building, but the estimated costs — including more than \$12 million for a new building — and protracted time frame were not attractive.

"The addition would have to be along the east side of the property. It would be a very long, skinny addition. It would not be very useful space," Stephenson said. "We'd be overlapping a large-scale construction project in the midst of the large-scale referendum construction projects."

"We don't think it is the best solution at this time," he said.

Board member and finance committee Chairman Eric Held said he supports the rental facility.

"It's a good location, it's within the district, it's not very far away from the South campus," he said of the site.

Renovation costs could be funded by a debt certificate which is paid with operational funds, officials reported. If the district went with the recommended 10-year option, the monthly rent would be \$17,729, which would be funded by a federal grant.

Transition Center enrollment has been climbing for several years as its range of services and programs have expanded. Brad Verthein, assistant superintendent for student services, said that trend will continue.

"I think it's safe to say that that (enrollment) plateau is not going to occur in the next four to five years," he said.

Stephenson underscored the goal of ultimately bringing all programs under one roof.

"The ideal long-term solution would be to have one location for operational and instructional efficiency," Stephenson said. "There's flexibility here to potentially grow our square footage at this rental location and have the full program there long-term."

The board is expected to revisit the issue at a future meeting.

The Hinsdale Village Board, Community Consolidated District 181 Board and Hinsdale High School District 86 Board are not scheduled to meet the week of Dec. 28 to Jan. 1.

## MEETING ROUNDUP

### Hinsdale High School District 86 Board

Among other business Dec. 17, board members:

- approved the 2020 tax levy in the amount of \$87.8 million for the district's capped funds. This amount does not include debt service levies on existing bonds totaling about \$12.1 million.
- listened to administrators update the district's return to school plan, including the expectation that students be on-screen when they are learning from home unless given special dispensation and announcing the formation of a task force to help plan and implement a diagnostic and surveillance saliva testing system. Hinsdale Central Principal Bill Walsh also urged community members to volunteer to help with in-person lunch service.
- were presented with changes to the 2020-21 school calendar, including making Jan. 7 the first day of second semester classes. Jan. 4 and 5 will used as remote learning planning days, and Jan. 6 is now an institute day. The school year will end May 21 to accommodate construction as part of the Future Ready Facilities plan.
- awarded bids related to the Future Ready Facilities work at both campuses, including demolition services for \$1.1 million, tile for \$521,000, resilient and carpet flooring for \$926,000, elevators for \$304,500, fencing for \$352,960 and landscaping for \$357,470.
- approved the allocation of \$15.2 million in bond premium funds to pay for upgrades to 171 district classrooms and the purchase of 183 unit ventilators. The funds are the result of favorable bond sale market conditions to finance the Future Ready Facilities work.
- approved a contract with Southern Bleacher Co. Inc. for \$1.2 million to complete work on the grandstand bleachers at Hinsdale Central and various Americans with Disabilities Act improvements at Hinsdale South in conjunction with the Future Ready Facilities plan.
- approved multi-year contracts for school and district administrators, with annual salaries for the 2021-22 year to be determined by July 1. Hinsdale Central Principal Bill Walsh, whose current salary is \$172,003, was given a three-year contract through June of 2024. Hinsdale South principal Arwen Pokorny Lyp also received a three-year deal; her current salary is \$168,355.

## Increase in COVID-19 cases trending down

Forty-six Hinsdale residents have tested positive for COVID-19 over the past week.

The DuPage County Health Department reported 36 new cases, and the Cook County Health Department reported 10 new cases.

That brings the total number of reported cases in the village to 943, up from 897 last week.

Amita Hinsdale Hospital was treating 15 confirmed COVID-19 patients and had seven patients awaiting test results on Tuesday, a spokeswoman said.

Community Consolidated District 181 reported seven

new cases from Dec. 16-18, including three students, two staff members, a teacher and an administrator.

Hinsdale High School District 86 reported 12 current positive cases Dec. 18, with 95 people in isolation and 67 in quarantine.

The rolling seven-day positivity rate for Region 8, which includes DuPage County, was 10.8 percent on Friday, compared to 11.8 percent a week prior.

# Pandemic didn't stop progress in 2020

Due to the pandemic, Hinsdale's revenues declined by \$1.9 million in 2020. Sales tax, food and beverage tax and parking permit revenues all declined dramatically.

Fortunately, years of prudent financial management paid off in 2020. Despite the \$1.9 million revenue decline, we maintained the same level of police, fire and public works services residents have come to expect. Moreover, we will end 2020 with a reserve balance of \$8.2 million, which represents 43 percent of the village's annual operating expenses. In other words, we have weathered the pandemic successfully so far, and we are poised to come out of the pandemic financially strong.

I am happy to report that we opened the parking deck off of Garfield Street in July 2020, which solves the decades-old parking problem in

our downtown.

I was also pleased to see that outdoor dining has helped our local restaurants through this difficult year. Outdoor dining has worked so well that the village board will be considering whether to continue outdoor dining post pandemic.

Despite the pandemic, the vacancy rate of commercial businesses in Hinsdale remains low — at just 4 percent. The village is fortunate to have such a thriving business community, and the village board is committed to doing all that it can to ensure that our local businesses prosper.

The village board remains committed to making further major road, sewer and drainage improvements in coming years, while maintaining the

village's AAA bond rating.

Despite the pandemic, the village continued to improve its roads and sewer system and to solve drainage problems. As a result of our road-improvement efforts, over 94 percent of Hinsdale's roads are now rated in "good" or "excellent" condition. The village also constructed 2,100 feet of water main improvements on Chicago Avenue

to replace a 100-year-old major water main. In addition to village-funded work, the Illinois Tollway and the village performed \$2.1 million of work to eliminate a long-standing flooding problem near Highland Park and Chicago Avenue.

The new Land Rover/Jaguar dealership on Ogden Avenue officially

opened for business this year. The dealership had considered moving to another community, which would have significantly reduced Hinsdale's sales tax revenues — revenues needed to maintain the level of service residents have come to expect. The village board is proactively encouraging sale-tax-generating businesses to locate in our commercial districts, so long as those businesses fit with the surrounding neighborhood.

The village board remains committed to minimizing the impact the widening of Interstate 294 has on the village and continues to work with the Tollway to address resident concerns as part of this project.

I want to thank the board members and the village staff for all their hard work in 2020.

# Library staff found new ways to serve

For the staff and trustees of the Hinsdale Public Library — as for all of you — 2020 wasn't the year we expected. But HPL continued working to serve the community by opening doors — albeit in new ways.

A year ago, I wrote about the engaging programs and special events that had given so many Hinsdaleans a reason to come to the library. We had to flip that in 2020. In response to the pandemic, the library building was closed from March through early July, and again beginning in November.

Although the building has been closed, our staff has worked behind the scenes to find new ways to deliver services to patrons. Instead of browsing in the stacks, patrons took advantage of our contactless pickup; we had fulfilled 3,621 curbside pickup orders through the end of November.

Similarly, we expanded our selection of digital materials — both books and movies — and patrons responded, especially in the early days of sheltering in place. Overall patron use of our ebook and streaming services has increased by more than 40 percent this year, and by year-end, patrons will have borrowed more than 50,000 digital titles through HPL.

Residents are turning to us for captivating, comforting and stimulating materials, especially in these trying times. We've issued 439 new library cards this year, for a total of nearly 9,000 cardholders, and added 906 new ebook users.

Although we all were disappointed

to suspend our in-person programming, the library staff found creative ways to deliver popular events like our annual trivia night, held on Zoom in October. And instead of coming into the building for programs, families and children picked up Book Boxes and nearly 1,000 different take-home kits for crafts, STEAM activities and family challenges.

We also brought the library to you. Our youth and young adult services manager, Ridgeway Burns, earned national publicity riding our HPL book bike to drop off materials at residents' homes. And kids of all ages came out on Dec. 16 for Jingle Books: A horse-drawn sleigh and Santa met families at three

Hinsdale parks to deliver books and movies and make spirits bright.

The board and our management team used the unexpectedly quiet time in the building to work on needed maintenance and repairs. We replaced our skylights with new energy-efficient models. We installed a new ADA-compliant ramp to make our downstairs Community Meeting Room usable for everyone. In 2021, look for a new family-friendly, gender-neutral bathroom that makes us accessible to all.

Like you and your family, we approached this challenging year as a time to learn and grow and to prepare to serve you even more effectively in 2021 and beyond. Hope to see you at the library — in person — soon!

### Assembly chair anxiously awaits 2021

December 23 is a date that holds a place in Hinsdale's culture and history. For generations the evening has been reserved for the Hinsdale Assembly's annual ball — the culmination of a year's worth of work and involvement by the program's debutantes and honor guard.

"In 57 years the ball has never not been held on Dec. 23," said Laurie Eichelman, chair of the 2020 Assembly board. She said the decision was made back in August to stray from tradition in the interest of safety. The young women and men will postpone donning their white gowns and tuxedos until June 27.

Eichelman said the year promises to be a busy one, with plans to have the traditional ball just six months after the June event. But the 29 hard-working members of the Assembly board are up to the task.

The Hinsdale Assembly's class of 2020 includes 21 young women and 18 young men, all 2020 high school graduates, who made a commitment to learn about the many needs of their community

through projects and activities held throughout the year. The group began volunteering and supporting service initiatives in January of their senior year. Although COVID-19 restrictions limited some activities this year, the class of 2020 held a carnival for children who had attended the St. Thomas Hospice bereavement camp, played bingo with seniors at Bethlehem Woods retirement community in La Grange, assisted at the HCS Family Services food pantry and helped to clean up and organize Amita Hinsdale Hospital's behavioral health facility.

"We try to give these young adults the chance to experience a diverse variety of community service," Eichelman said.

The mother of four became involved with the program when her oldest daughter took part in 2014. So far, all three of Eichelman's daughters have "bowed" as part of the program, and she hopes her son, now in eighth grade, will one day choose to be part of the honor guard.

Eichelman said the Hinsdale Assembly isn't just about dressing

up in fancy dresses and suits. In its 57-year history, the program, including the annual ball, has raised more than \$3 million for the Hinsdale Hospital Foundation, supporting such initiatives as the Amita Health Cancer Institute and St. Thomas Hospice Care.

Money raised at the June 27 event, as well as the Dec. 23, 2021 ball, will benefit the Amita Behavioral Health Medicine Institute.

It's been a difficult year. Along with postponing the ball, the class of 2020 missed out on the three-generation tea that brings moms, daughters and grandmothers together each year and the debutante/presenter waltz. But they will be back, Eichelman said, and this tradition will continue to benefit the community and build charitable young adults long after the pandemic has passed.

"We have a full class for next year," she said.

She's looking forward to celebrating that tradition in June and December next year.







## Spooky stories not just for Halloween in Victorian era

We usually associate ghost stories with Halloween, but Victorian England considered them to be an essential part of the celebration of Christmas. In fact, they were so integral that magazines often published serials in the weeks leading up to the holiday and authors often wrote spooky tales specifically for the season.

Some historians say the pairing began with the Druids, who believed that the membrane between the living and the dead thinned out during the dark of winter. So, much the way we appreciate a good fright in safe company, they gathered around fires and bonded over the tales a part of their solstice customs. As Europe gradually adopted Christianity, this was one of the old traditions that was folded in. When Oliver Cromwell came to power, his Puritanical beliefs fueled

the 1644 ordinance that abolished the Christmas holiday.

Although the Restoration paved the way for celebrations to again happen, few people did so — until Charles Dickens stumbled upon a platform to share his ideas about child labor and assisting the needy. The first edition of "A Christmas Carol" was published on December 19, 1843 and the entire run sold out within the week.

Very quickly, the story of Scrooge became a handbook for how to celebrate Christmas. Victorians embraced Dickens' interpretation of the holiday including caroling, feasting, gifting and ghosts.

While many of those ideas continue

today, somehow the ghosts faded away. There have been attempts to revive the tradition, yet none have taken hold. But don't let that stop you from dabbling in a true Dickensian holiday by sharing a ghost story around the fire.

Fortunately, many of the original Victorian Christmas ghost stories are available electronically. From our website at

<https://www.hinsdalelibrary.info>, click on Digital Resources then Downloadables. If you've never used our digital resources, there are short videos to guide you through the process for Hoopla, Kanopy, and our eMedia Library. (If ghost stories aren't for you, you can also download or stream other seasonal movies, TV

shows and music from there.)

Start a new holiday tradition this year by reading "The Old Nurses Story" by Elizabeth Gaskell (1852), "The Kit-Bag" by Algernon Blackwood (1908), "Between the Lights" by E. F. Benson (1912), "The Dead" by James Joyce (1914) or "Smee" by A.M. Burrage (1931). Considered by many to be the king of Christmas ghost stories, try M. R. James' "Ash Tree" (1904) or "Treasure of Abbot Thomas" (1904), "Warning" (1925), or "The Stalls of Barchester Cathedral" (1910).

And, finally, some other of Dickens' dark tales written specifically for the holiday include "The Trial for Murder" (1865), "To Be Read at Dusk" (1852), "The Signal-Man" (1861), and "The Haunted House" (1859).

## Let it snow, let it snow, let it snow

*Winter sports enthusiasts hope for snow, freezing temps to enjoy outdoor activities*

The winter of 2020-21 will bring on a case of cabin fever the likes of which we've never seen before.

After living with the coronavirus pandemic for nine months, we're ready for life to get back to normal.

If the weather will cooperate, some favorite winter activities can help us all get through these next few months. Several area parks and forest preserves offer the opportunity to take advantage of winter weather — once it arrives.

### Cross country skiing

Hinsdale's Katherine Legge Memorial Park, 5901 S. County Line Road, is a popular spot for skiers once enough snow falls.

More than 70 miles of groomed trails for cross country skiing are available at DuPage County forest preserves such as Fullersburg Woods in Oak Brook, Waterfall Glen in Darien, Blackwell in Warrenville and Danada and Herrick Lake in Wheaton. Visitors who aren't classic skiers should use the inside of the trails to avoid damaging the set tracks.

In Cook County, people can hit more than 350 miles of ungroomed trails with their own skis or visit Sagawau Nordic in Lemont, a premier full-service cross country ski center with rentals, lessons and groomed and tracked trails. Ski rentals are available from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. and cost \$15, \$10 for seniors and \$40 for a family. A lesson/rental combo is \$30 a person. The center is open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., weather

permitting, seven days a week through early March.

### Ice fishing

Anglers can ice fish at most forest preserves in DuPage County, although never at Spring Creek Reservoir in Bloomingdale. For more information, read the fishing guide on the forest district's website. Many bodies of water in Cook County also have been designated for ice fishing.

The forest districts do not monitor ice conditions, so visitors go on the ice at their own risk. As a guideline — not a guarantee — there should be at least 4 inches of clear ice for any activity for one person; 8 inches of clear ice for a group.

### Ice skating

The village-operated rink at Burns Field, 320 N. Vine St., will be set up when temperatures permit. Once frozen, barricades will be placed at the rink to signal conditions and online posts will be made on parks and recreation sites. The village needs four to six consecutive full days of weather below 32 degrees to begin freezing the outdoor rink.

Residents can check on the status of the rink on the village website at [https://www.villageofhinsdale.org/departments/parks\\_and\\_recreation/field\\_and\\_facility\\_status](https://www.villageofhinsdale.org/departments/parks_and_recreation/field_and_facility_status) or on Facebook @HinsdaleParks.

Due to COVID-19, the warming house will not be open this winter.

Ice skaters can skate on lakes at most preserves in DuPage County, except Spring Creek Reservoir in Bloomingdale.

See the ice safety guidelines listed above.

### Sledding

The hill at Madison School, on Madison Street near Sixth Street, is a popular spot for sledding in town.

Sledding is allowed at most DuPage County forest preserves, although never at Spring Creek Reservoir in Bloomingdale, Mount Hoy at Blackwell or the closed landfill sites at Green Valley and Mallard Lake.

Sledding hills in Cook County are open when the ground is frozen and covered with at least three inches of snow. Sledding hills with lights are staffed and open from 10 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. Sunday to Thursday and 10 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday. Lighted hills include Swallow Cliff Woods North near Palos Park (requires 6 inches of snow) and Westchester Woods near LaGrange Park.

The closest hill without lights is Pioneer Woods near Willow Springs. It is open from 10 a.m. to sunset daily.

### Snowboarding

The sledding hill at the Dan Ryan Woods Visitor Center in Chicago features a separate area for snowboarding. Call (773) 233-3766 for snowboard hill status.

### Snowmobiling

Snowmobiles are allowed at four designated Cook County Forest Preserves under certain winter conditions: New Brown Meadow (part of Busse Woods) near Elk Grove Village, Morrill Meadow near Willow Springs, Turtlehead Lake near Orland Park and North Creek Meadow near Chicago Heights. Call the numbers listed on the forest

district website for snowmobile area status.

### Snowshoeing

Visitors can explore Blackwell and Fullersburg Woods in Oak Brook by snowshoe when there is enough snow on the trail. Rentals are available from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on the Blackwell tubing hill (when open) and from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Monday to Saturday at the Fullersburg Woods office. Call (630) 850-8110 for availability.

### Snow tubing

When there's enough packed snow on the hill (usually more than 3 inches), thrill-seekers can snow tube down the 800-foot run on Mount Hoy at Blackwell Forest Preserve in Wheaton. Only district inner tubes are allowed.

If conditions permit, the hill is open 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays through Feb. 28, daily over winter break (Dec. 21 to Jan. 1) and on school holidays (Jan. 15, Jan. 18, Feb. 15 and Feb. 26). The hill is closed Dec. 25.

Inner tube rentals are at the base of the hill and are \$10 per tube per day. Rentals end at 3:30 p.m.





