

## Demand is rolling for year-old deck

*The investment to alleviate Hinsdale's parking crunch seems to be paying dividends*

Hinsdale's downtown parking deck marked one year of operation last month, and its inaugural performance review seems favorable.

"It's served the intended purpose, and that was to relieve some of the parking demand in the downtown area," Brad Bloom, Hinsdale's assistant village manager, said of the 319-space facility. "I certainly think it's worked very well and surpassed our expectations."

The main expectation — and hope — was that employees of downtown businesses would avail themselves of the free deck spaces, thereby protecting on-street metered parking for patrons. That vision has materialized, according to Bloom.

"At the this time, we're seeing parking turnover and we have parking availability (in the downtown) and I think we're meeting the demand for parking," he said.

Police Chief Brian King echoed that assessment.

"There's a greater turnaround in the vacancy rate in the central

business district both during the day and in the evening," he said. "It appears that the deck is working as planned."

The two-tier deck on Garfield Avenue near First Street was constructed as a joint effort between the village and Community Consolidated Elementary District 181. The village footed the bulk of the \$9 million cost for the project and controls the 189 spaces on the lower level. The district, which provided the land adjacent to Hinsdale Middle School, has primary use of the 133 spaces on the upper level, which is also the student drop-off point, when school is in session. Those spaces are available for village use after 5 p.m. and on weekends, except when a school event is planned.

Mike Duggan, District 181's facilities director, said the project reflects good intergovernmental cooperation.

"The partnership with the village regarding the parking deck has been a great success. We've been able to collaborate on usage with the village on special events for the district and the village,"

Duggan said. "Our HMS teachers and staff have enjoyed being able to park close to the school and that has freed up street parking around HMS. It has also provided a safe place to drop students off for school. We look forward to a continued partnership with the village."

Merchants also seem to appreciate the additional capacity. Eva Field, president and CEO of the Hinsdale Chamber of Commerce, said she's heard good feedback from chamber members.

"I'm hearing a lot of positive comments, both aesthetically and the value of having more parking in the downtown area," Field related.

She said it took time for the deck to get on people's radar as an option. Now she acknowledged having trouble finding a spot in lower level if she arrives at 10 a.m. or later.

"Every time I park there, it's pretty full," Field said.

Ten permit spaces are reserved for commuters on the lower level. None of them were occupied on a recent weekday morning. Bloom said that's due in part to the pan-

demic's impact.

"(The deck) is not being used by commuters," he said. "We're really not back to the same pre-COVID demand level we had before."

With school still on summer break, the top level provides nice additional capacity, Bloom said.

"I see a lot of cars parking up there in evening hours and accessing the stairwell to connect with the walkway to First Street," he said.

King reported no criminal incidents at the deck, and Bloom said it was built with security in mind.

"It's well lit, and you can view the deck easily," Bloom said. "Over 55 cameras are installed throughout the deck."

He said the facility has also become an attractive amenity for businesses considering opening shop in the village.

"We've heard from a number of prospective retailers who are thinking of moving to Hinsdale with the availability of the parking deck," he said.

The chamber's Field said the investment is paying dividends.

"Hands down it's a good thing all the way around," she said.

**Complete retreat** — Sandy Williams' book, "Images of America — Hinsdale," describes how KLM became a park in the village. "The KLM Lodge, a dining and recreation hall for the women's retreat (for employees of International Harvester), was built in 1926. It was designed by Hinsdale architect R. Harold Zook based on an earlier plan for the Legge home intended for the site. A dormitory followed, along with tennis courts, swimming pool and a convalescent cottage. In December 1973, International harvester donated the retreat property to Hinsdale for use by the general public."

# Governor ends debate on masks in school

*Pritzker announces mandate for schools as one of three strategies designed to fight spread*

Despite Gov. JB Pritzker's announcement Wednesday mandating masks for all children in preschool through high school, Hinsdale's Dr. Uma Levy said she doesn't regret starting a petition calling for masks in District 181 schools.

"I'm still happy that I did it because there have been instances where the board and the district have kind of gone against recommendations or changed their mind," said Levy, who has two children in Community Consolidated Elementary District 181. "I don't think it was a wasted effort and it is overall great news."

Her change.org petition garnered 710 signatures in its first eight days, but it also made her a target for those who don't want their kids wearing a mask.

"I have had to endure a lot of attacks through social media and online and email regarding this issue," said Levy, who practices with Northwestern Medicine Pediatrics in Glen Ellyn. "The majority of arguments I'm hearing appear to be very emotionally based and not really based on scientific evidence."

She acknowledged that people don't enjoy wearing a mask.

"It's not fun. It's an inconvenience. I'm just happy a lot of people agree it's the right thing to do right now," she said.

In his Wednesday afternoon press briefing, Pritzker pointed to a 10-fold increase in positive cases since that number hit its lowest level earlier this summer. Hospitalizations and ICU rates have doubled in the past month, he said, adding that children are not immune.

Given the lower rates of vaccination among teens ages 12 to 17 and the lack of a vaccine for children under 12, he said he is requiring all schools, preschools and daycare facilities to adopt the CDC guidance and require masking for all.

"My goal has always been to safely bring all kids back into the classroom at the start of the school year and, crucially, to keep them there," Pritzker said.


Masks will be required for all indoor recreation and sports activities as well.

He also is requiring vaccinations for all state employees who work in congregate facilities such as veterans homes, psychiatric hospitals and correctional facilities, effective Oct. 4. Finally, a universal mask mandate is in effect for all long-term care facility workers, residents and visitors.

Dr. Ngozi Ezike, director of the Illinois Department of Public Health,

offered more detailed numbers concerning youth who are contracting COVID-19 and landing in the hospital.

"They can absolutely get COVID-19 and they can absolutely spread it to others," Ezike said. "Masks are a critical tool to interrupt transmission of the virus."

Levy noted the delta variant is as contagious as chicken pox.

"I think it's very important for people to keep in mind that we are not over this pandemic," Levy said. "The delta variant is a game-changer."

## What is the delta variant?


The delta variant is a mutation of the original virus and has a different genetic makeup. Viruses often mutate, explained Dr. Bela Nand, chief medical officer at Amita Health Adventist Medical Center Hinsdale.

A mutation can occur when an error occurs while a virus is making a copy of itself. As those errors accumulate, they change the surface of the original virus and can diminish the efficacy of vaccines.

"We know this because we study it every year through the influenza virus," Nand said. "That is why the flu shot has to be updated every year."

A different type of mutation occurs when two viruses go into one human cell and combine to produce a totally different virus with a different genetic makeup. These abrupt changes are called novel viruses.

The delta variant, first identified in India in December, is an example of



this type of antigenic shift.

"Within a matter of months, this particular variant has spread over 98 countries around the world. That's how contagious it is," Nand said, noting that 80 percent of the virus strains now in the U.S. are thought to be the delta variant.

Individuals are not informed whether they have the delta variant when they take a COVID-19 test, but the Illinois Department of Public Health tracks the number on its website at <https://www.dph.illinois.gov>. Out of 10,557 cases on Monday, only 840 were identified as the delta variant.

"Strangely enough, in Illinois delta is not the predominant virus strain at this point," Nand said.

But that doesn't really matter, she added.

"We just have to do the same precautions and the same vaccines and the same tests," she said.

The bad news is the delta variant is twice as contagious as the original virus, Nand explained, and can be transmitted by a vaccinated person to someone who has not been vaccinated.

The good news is the likelihood of a breakthrough infection is very small, and those who contract it typically aren't having symptoms.

A day before Pritzker made his announcement, she said she supported the CDC guidance calling for people to wear masks even if they have been vaccinated.

"Whether you are vaccinated or not vaccinated, wear the mask," Nand said Tuesday.

That's 110 percent true for schoolchildren, she said.

"Everybody should wear masks," she reiterated. "Why should we put our children at risk, even if there is a very low chance they could get it?"

She also encouraged people not to let COVID-19 eclipse general health concerns, such as chest pain or shortness of breath.

"Don't ignore those things. Get your health back on track and come to the hospital," she said, noting most people who work in hospitals are vaccinated and all are wearing masks.

"Don't ignore your health as you are fighting a pandemic," she advised.

# COVID-19 numbers on the rise over past week

Ten new Hinsdale residents have tested positive for COVID-19 over the past week.

The DuPage County Health Department reported 10 new cases, and the Cook County Health Department reported no new cases.

That brings the total number of reported cases in the village to 1,846, compared to 1,836 last week.

Amita Hinsdale Hospital had six confirmed COVID-19 patients and one patient awaiting test results as of

Wednesday, a spokesman said.

The rolling seven-day positivity rate for Region 8, which includes DuPage County, was 4.6 percent on Saturday, compared to 3.7 percent a week prior.

Illinois has administered 13.3 million doses of vaccines. An average of 28,250 doses are being administered daily, compared to about 17,776 last week.

More than 59.6 percent of DuPage County residents are fully vaccinated.

# Barber's retirement is 'end of an era'

Rossi sells Nick's Silver Shears after 62 years, but clients will still find him there weekly

One day before retiring from his 62-year career in Hinsdale, barber Nick Rossi was still gaining new customers. As Steve Zilk of Willowbrook sat in Rossi's chair for the first time on July 29, he soon became aware that he was in the care of a local legend.

People waved as they passed by the storefront's window on Hinsdale Avenue and longtime regulars dropped in with farewells and wishes of good luck as Rossi carefully trimmed Zilk's hair to his new customer's satisfaction. Like every customer before him, Zilk had no appointment. Rossi accepts walk-ins only.

"Have a drink on me," said one man, dropping in to congratulate Rossi and to drop a handful of cash next to the cash-only register. Rossi responded with a simple wave of his straight-edge razor.

"I'm not one to make a big deal of these things," said the 83-year-old, known in Hinsdale as "Nick the barber."

"Nick the barber" began his career in Hinsdale at what was then Sam's Barber Shop. As the new guy, Rossi was relegated to the chair at the back of the shop.

"That's the way it worked," Rossi said. "You started in the back and you moved your way up."

He purchased the business in 1974, and the shop's first chair has been his for 47 years. And while Nick has watched Hinsdale change through his storefront window, the view inside the shop known as Nick's Silver Shears has stayed much the same. The shop's three barber chairs date back to 1960 and customers walk through the original door, hung in 1912 when the building opened as an undertaking business.

Although not visible to the casual visitor, barbershops today are much different than they were when Rossi welcomed his first customers to the shop at 32 E. Hinsdale Ave.

"It used to be a place to hang out," Rossi said. In the early days, men would come to the shop not only for regular haircuts and shaves, but to play cards and spend time with friends. That, Rossi said, was a "real barbershop," and it's something he misses.

That's not to say that regulars don't still drop in for a chat. When Jim Elder of Hinsdale needs a trim, he makes a point of being at the shop when

Nick opens the doors. That way, said Elder's son, Chris, the two men can spend time chatting before the day gets busy and customers start filing in.

Three generations of Elder men have entrusted their hair to Rossi's shears. In the days prior to Rossi's retirement, Jim, Chris and Chris' son Matthew all stopped in to wish him well.

"It's the end of an era," said Chris Elder, whose father Jim has been visiting Rossi's chair since 1974.

But not everything will change as Rossi hands over the keys to new owners Alex Frausto and Allyson Bergquist.



"We really want to embrace the heritage of this place," said Frausto, who said he learned a lot from his initial encounters with Rossi. As an homage to its longtime owner and the business he built, the shop will be known as Dying Breed Barbershop and will specialize in short haircuts for men and women.

Frausto has invited his predecessor to join him in the shop on Wednesdays for as long as Rossi wishes to do so. So while Nick's Silver Shears is no more, Rossi's regulars don't have to start shopping for a new barber just yet. And, as always, they don't have to make an appointment

### Stories keep family close through pandemic

Living across the ocean from your family is hard enough. Add a global pandemic, and keeping in touch becomes a real challenge, especially for those who aren't yet old enough to have their own cell phones and social media accounts.

Eliana Villone wasn't about to let COVID-19 get between her and her young cousins living in Italy. So while she was unable to visit in person, she found another way not only to keep in touch, but to help her young cousins learn English in her absence.

"A lot of little cousins are just learning English," said Villone, who is entering her senior year at Hinsdale Central High School. To help her cousins, and to keep them entertained while they sheltered at home, Villone began making video recordings of herself reading popular children's books and timeless classics.

She sent the videos to her cousins, but the audience soon grew, Villone said. Cousins shared the videos with older relatives, who then sent them to their friends.

"A lot of people ended up getting them. Even the adults really liked them," Villone said.

Included in the 20 to 25 videos were recordings of "Pinocchio" and the entire series of books by Eric Carle, including "The Very Hungry Caterpillar." She included some picture books for the youngest cousins as well as stories for the older children. Each was recorded to show both Villone and the book itself.

"They could read along with me," she said. Soon, she began to see her work pay off.

"They responded to me with audio messages in English," Villone said, and she could hear their language skills improving.

Villone said the process of creating the videos was a lesson in patience for herself, as some videos took several tries to get them right. While reading "Pinocchio," for example, she accidentally skipped a page and had to start over again.

Villone said her entire family lives in Italy, with the exception of her parents and brother.

"Italian is technically my

first language," said Villone, whose immediate family lived in Germany and Mexico before making their way to the United States.

"Living in other places gives you a more broad perspective on life," said Villone, who isn't ready to settle into one place just yet. A strong study abroad program is a must as she begins her search for a college, where she is likely to study international relations.

In the meantime, the soon-to-be senior said she's looking forward to her return to school.

"I'm really excited just to get back," she said, and to enjoy what she hopes will be a typical senior year.

Villone usually visits her family in Italy twice each year. After nearly two years, she finally made it back for a visit in late July. Even if she never misses another visit, Villone said she plans to continue sending videos.

"It kept me connected with my family," she said. "It's still a good way to keep in touch."

## People-pleasing can be dangerous motive for board

In the span of six weeks, the Hinsdale High School District 86 Board voted to dismantle plans that had been in the works for months or even years.

Board members voted in June to halt the shift to an integrated math curriculum and then in July rejected “physics first” as the appropriate science sequence for all students.

We wonder what they will tackle next.

The board majority, which consists of four newcomers who beat out three incumbents in the April election, has been operating under the rallying cry that it is doing the will of the people who elected them.

Board members and their supporters have made implicit and explicit references to a “mandate” to reverse the previous board’s decision on the math and science curriculums.

The winners in the April election, who received anywhere from 3,565 to 4,501 votes, certainly outpaced the incumbents, whose totals ranged from 1,773 to 3,097. But even the highest vote count represents less than 60 percent of district parents and a significantly

smaller portion of district residents as a whole. Keep in mind voter turnout in April was less than 17 percent.

Of course, supporters of the new board majority have been very vocal about their opposition to both curriculum changes. But do those supporters speak for the entire district? If 100 or even 200 people offer public comment in support of a particular decision, does that mean the position is supported by the majority of district residents? If the same number of people had come out in favor of integrated math and physics first, would the board have voted differently?

Many seem to have lost sight of the fact that these changes were set in motion by a desire to align instruction at Hinsdale Central and Hinsdale South high schools. Instead of focusing on that goal and a desire to make science and math more accessible to all students, those who support the status quo seem to be prioritizing an elite group of students who excel in those subjects and plan to pursue a STEM career.

None of this would be an issue if the professionals hired to run District 86 agreed. But

both revamps had the support of the district’s assistant superintendent for curriculum and the teams who developed them. These individuals — who have dedicated their careers to educating students — seem better qualified to evaluate how effective the curriculums would be than district residents, even if they are STEM professionals. An individual who works in science, technology, engineering or math isn’t automatically qualified to determine the best way to teach those subjects to teenagers.

One of the quickest ways to dishearten teachers and administrators is to display a fundamental lack of trust in their abilities. That’s also one of the quickest ways to lose people to other districts.

Maybe that’s the goal here.

Moving forward, we offer the new board members a word of caution. Be careful about giving too much weight to public opinion. Otherwise you might find yourself reinstating the buffer zone, approving a zero levy, abandoning Future Ready Facilities projects or voting to disregard the mask mandate.

## Former chief hopes story will keep saving lives

Pat Kenny made a list of promises to his wife, Eileen, before she died in 2016.

The final one was to write a book about their son Sean’s struggles with mental illness and death by suicide in 2006. The former Hinsdale fire chief had been traveling the country for years sharing with other first responders his experience about losing his son.

“You can’t tell enough people, and emotionally it’s not good for you,” Kenny remembers his wife telling him. “Write the book and tell the story so it can help people.”

The next day, Eileen went into a coma, and she passed away a few days later. Kenny didn’t really believe he would fulfill the promise.

“How mad could she be at me if ended up on the other side and I didn’t write the book?” he said.

But he kept hearing from people — including recently retired assistant Hinsdale fire chief Tim McElroy — who encouraged him to write. Eventually, more than two years later, he connected with a consultant who

helped him convert his talk into a 40-chapter narrative. “Taking the Cape Off: How to Lead through Mental Illness, Unimaginable Grief and Loss,” was published in November and will be released on Audible this fall.

“Now it’s just kind of got a life of its own,” he told me Tuesday when we caught up at the same Starbucks where I interviewed him more than five years ago for an article on suicide. “Stories people have sent me have touched me.”

He cited one from a father who admitted to calling his late son-in-law a coward, even in front of his widowed daughter.

“I’m so sorry,” he told Kenny. “I just didn’t get it. That won’t happen again.”

Kenny said he knew immediately what the book’s title should be. When we talked back in 2016, seven months before he lost Eileen, he shared the following quote with me about allowing

himself space to grieve following his son’s death.

“You have to take the cape off,” he said. “We wear the cape all the time. I’ve got to save people. My job is to come to you on your worst day. I can’t have a bad day. You continue to wear the cape until the cape chokes you and you can no longer perform.”

He said he experienced the same feeling of extreme helplessness watching his son struggle with mental illness as he did watching his wife battle cancer.

“They both were terminal illnesses, but people looked at one as, ‘Look at this courageous battle this mom is putting on,’ ” he said.

They saw his son’s condition as a character deficiency. His goal is to work to eliminate that stigma.

“You don’t choose it,” he said of mental illness. “It chooses you and you work really hard to manage it. It doesn’t make you any less of a person. Many times it makes you more of a person because you

have to battle it to make a good life.”

Kenny has fulfilled the other promises he made to Eileen as well. He continued to work as Western Springs’ fire chief until his retirement earlier this year. He traveled to Ireland as they had planned to do and he didn’t sell his house.

He also found space in his heart to love again. He said he doesn’t think of it as moving on.

“I don’t have to leave them behind,” he said of his wife and son. “I can still live a life and enjoy life and bring them with me to be part of it. That was an awakening that allowed me to move forward.”

While he is being mindful about self-care and the number of speaking engagements he accepts, Kenny said he will continue to spread the message that we should view mental illness the same way we view physical illness.

“We haven’t gotten to where we need to be yet,” he said.

### This old house has story to tell

The house next door to us is going to be torn down. I know that isn't news in this town where old homes are torn down everyday.

But there are many things that happen all the time — every day — and until they happen to you, well, they don't mean as much. I should add that while it is accurate to say that homes are torn down all the time, it is not accurate to say that it has happened on our block. In fact, except for a couple of homes on the edges of our block, it, and the homes on it, have pretty much remained as they were for the past 80 to 100 years. There have been renovations, family room additions, new roofs, new kitchens and new bathrooms. But the bones of the homes, the historic street-scene, has remained intact. That is about to change.

Our home was built in 1928, the same year as our neighbor's home. I have pictures of those houses, the first two on our block, as they rose from an old, barren potter's field in what would then be, and still is, known as the Robbins Subdivision, so named for Hinsdale's founder, William Robbins.

A traditional brick Georgian, our home was built for \$5,000 and, in the 1950s, was passed from the original owners, the Parkers, to their daughter and her husband, Betty and Jim Ware, who raised their family there. We purchased our home from the Wares almost 30 years ago. So, we are only the second family to own our home. Paradoxically, our neighbor's home, a brick

Mediterranean style with a tile roof, has had several owners, three of whom owned the house during the time we have lived here. Until now, that house was sufficient, was loved, was enough.

Now I know things change. I am a realist and understand how the market works. But I have to tell you, I didn't expect the neighboring demolition process to make me feel the way it did. Strangers disassembling the house, walking out the front door with doors, light fixtures, moldings. People digging up plants, loading them into plastic tubs to be replanted in places those plants had never been. It felt a little like the scene from "A Christmas Carole" after Scrooge dies and they are selling his curtains and bedsheets to the local scavenger. Perhaps I am being too dramatic — but it kind of did.

I am not writing this to make people stop tearing down houses. Many have tried that and it just doesn't work. The world moves on and, I guess, the houses go with it. I am writing this because, as you know from most everything I write, I believe in the importance of the stories of our lives. Houses have stories, too. So, I wanted you to know a little about these homes. Standing as they have side by side for almost a century, the stage for the memories of so many lives. Telling their story is the least I can do.





# IT TAKES A VILLAGE

## BRIAN KING, POLICE CHIEF

At the time of the infamous Brown's Chicken Massacre in Palatine in early 1993, Hinsdale Police Chief Brian King was a detective with the Wilmette Police Department. The horrific incident, in which seven restaurant employees were killed by two robbers, led to groundbreaking interjurisdictional collaboration to solving murder cases — and a new opportunity for King.

"I was lucky enough to get on a start-up task force that supervised homicide investigations for the towns just north of Chicago," he related.

He spent 30 years with the Wilmette Police Department, rising through detective sergeant, patrol commander and deputy chief roles before ultimately ascending to the chief's post. He spent eight years in that post before accepting the offer to lead Hinsdale's department just over four years ago.

"I've been blessed to work in a very wide diversity of assignments," King said.

In particular he cites conducting criminal investigation and developing training programs as dimensions of the job he finds most fascinating. The state is leveraging his

expertise to teach homicide investigations to officers from around the Chicagoland area.

"I've probably instructed people in most of the municipalities in Cook County and fair share of them in Will and DuPage counties," King said. "It's a nice change of pace."

A LaGrange Park native, King worked as a community service officer in Hinsdale in the 1980s while on break from his schooling at Xavier University in Cincinnati.

"I was looking for a job and I just happened to see an ad," he recounted.

Although a political science major, King was intrigued by the field of law enforcement. It became a full-on pursuit after joining Wilmette's force.

"I became very passionate about policing," he said. "I worked undercover, and then after four years I was promoted up into detectives."

King's tenure in Hinsdale has been marked by a lot of personnel turnover, as the department has replaced 60 percent of its patrol force since 2017, mainly due to retirement.

"So this is a young, very vibrant agency," King said. "That's a significant (turnover), but also it provides

an opportunity to form a culture in the organization that carries on past me."

He said he has tried to instill an ethos of compassion and integrity.

"Just treating people fairly — no matter what their circumstances, no matter how the contact begins — and being a person of your word," King said of the character traits he tries to cultivate.


Thankfully, Hinsdale rarely experiences violent crime. But that doesn't mean security can be taken for granted, King said.

"Hinsdale's a low-crime community, it's not a no-crime community," he remarked, saying perpetrators today cover wider areas. "Crime is more regional now and less local than it used to be."

The majority of incidents are "quality of life" issues involving neighbor disputes, mental health or addiction issues. Enlisting local organizations like churches or The Community House counseling center to help with the response is vital.

"I think we're most effective when we are networking with community organizations to look out for the best interests of the residents," King said.





Arline was welcomed and supported during her final chapter by many precious friends and caregivers at Congregational Home in Brookfield,



## Choirs emerge from pandemic pause

*Singers anxious to return to in-person rehearsals and live performances this fall*

Members of the Hinsdale Chorale had long anticipated the group's 20th anniversary celebration, which

would poetically occur in the spring of 2020. But like so many things in that year, the milestone passed without the fanfare it deserved.

The 20th anniversary concert is one of three that

the chorale was forced to cancel while the world sheltered against COVID-19. Longtime member Kristi Freitager said it's by far the longest stretch she's ever endured without singing.

But the musical drought came to a long-anticipated end when the choir gathered for an outdoor performance on June 13.

"That was fun," Freitager said. "We all missed the whole process."

Regular Monday evening rehearsals for the Hinsdale Chorale are scheduled to resume on Sept. 13 as the choir prepares for "From Silence to Gloria." The pair of performances, set for Saturday and Sunday, Nov. 27 and 28, will celebrate not only the holiday season ahead, but the world's journey through the pandemic.

Singers interested in joining the choir for its fall return can schedule an audition at <https://www.hinsdalechorale.org>. Auditions will be held in late August.

As of now, singers will not be required to wear masks, Freitager said. But they will need to be vaccinated.

With all 20 members fully vaccinated, the Jolly Boys men's chorus recently gathered for an outdoor rehearsal — the first in-person practice since early 2020. Members of the Jolly Boys kept their voices working throughout the pandemic with online lessons led by director Vicki Lowczyk. It wasn't the same as a face-to-face rehearsal, member and ensemble President Frank Kobes said, but the Zoom sessions left the group better prepared as rehearsals begin for the fall season.

Kobes said the Jolly Boys plan to resume regular indoor practices in September. Normally held at The Community House, Kobes said they are still waiting to hear whether they will be welcomed back, due to COVID-19 precautions.

"We plan to be together, in person, somewhere," Kobes said.

The group's performance schedule is equally uncertain. December is typically a busy month for the Jolly Boys, with seven or eight performances scheduled throughout the area. But so far, they have only one performance booked for the holiday season.

"Hopefully, we will add a few more," Kobes said.

For years the Downers Grove Choral Society has spent Monday nights rehearsing at the Indian Boundary YMCA. But with the facility's shortened hours due to COVID-19, the group is searching for a new place to practice.

"All of the venues are being finalized now," said choir member Elizabeth Patterson.

After three concerts presented via Zoom, the Choral Society emerged from its extended pandemic pause to perform an outdoor concert in Fishel Park in Downers Grove on May 23. Wearing masks specifically designed for singing and standing six feet apart, the choir presented a program called "Spring Hallelujahs."

The choir is preparing for its fall season by auditioning new members. Anyone interested in an audition is encouraged to visit the choir's website to sign up for a voice hearing on Aug. 23. To ensure everyone's comfort and safety, choir members will have the option to attend rehearsals remotely via Zoom.

As of now, Patterson said, all members are fully vaccinated. While vaccines aren't strictly required of members, they are strongly encouraged. That could change, she said.

"We will follow CDC guidelines," she said. If vaccines, masks or social distancing are recommended, it's the Choral Society's plan to follow the advice.






Average Sales Price\*

## Central's Naisbitt nets coaching honor

*Varsity tennis leader recognized after his squads win six state titles in 11 years*

John Naisbitt took over as Hinsdale Central head boys varsity tennis coach in 2010, shepherding the program to runner-up and fifth-place state meet finishes his first two seasons.

Impressive, right? Not by the Red Devil standard, which prescribed adding to the three straight titles captured from 2007 to 2009.

"We came in second, and it was very disappointing, with a bunch (of players) that had won three titles," Naisbitt said of the 2010 outcome, "That was the real reality check that you cannot take anything for granted."

Fast forward to 2012. Naisbitt was exhorting his state squad while keeping tabs on the overall team point totals.

"I'll never forget that day at the state meet when I got a call that there was a match result that had caused us to be alone in first, and nobody could catch us," he recounted.

Nobody would catch them for some time after that as Central proceeded to reel off four straight IHSA championships.

### Devil-ishly great

Here are some of John Naisbitt's accomplishments in his 12 years as head boys varsity tennis coach:

- 6 state titles
- 3 state runners-up finishes
- 148-6 career varsity won/loss record
- two-time IHSA Coach of the Year
- National Federation of High Schools Boys Tennis Coach of the Year nominee

For his achievements, Naisbitt was honored last week as a Coach of the Year Finalist by the National High School Athletic Coaches Association at the group's convention in Lincoln, Neb. Naisbitt deflected much of the credit.

"It's great reflection of the talent that comes through the hallways of Hinsdale Central and the work of my assistant coaches," he said. "It's really an honor for the whole program."

He gives acknowledgment to his predecessor, Jay Kramer, for cementing the school as a perennial tennis power in his half-century at the helm. Naisbitt was his assistant for nine years.

"You get that it's a culture of very high expectations," Naisbitt said. "Second place is not our goal. We're a title-driven school."

That inaugural title of the Naisbitt era affirmed that he could live up to those expectations.

"That's when I finally felt I could sustain what Jay had handed me," he said. "The four straight titles are really fantastic."

His teams have brought

home two more championship trophies since then to make six in 11 years. Naisbitt considers himself as a bridge between the more authoritarian coaching style of the past and a more open-minded spirit.

"You have to make the adjustment to the 21st century student-athlete," he said, alluding to the range of activities today's youth are involved in. "You have to be more flexible in your approach. We're really trying to be more supportive emotionally and socially with the kids. If you're more flexible, I think you're better able to work with them."

Adaptability was essential this past year, as the team was unable to play its normal schedule of top-rated opponents due to pandemic restrictions. Practices became simulated meets, with players challenging one another in scrimmage matches and Naisbitt shouting praise for good shots and smart tactics.

Jason Huang, a 2017 Central graduate and former Red Devil tennis member, said Naisbitt balances his drive for player improvement with a

emphasis on savoring the ride.

"This mentality keeps the team pushing each other to be better, resulting in such a high level of competition," Huang related. "Even though he likes to push the team, Coach makes sure we are having fun and laughing throughout practice and matches. That's what makes the team work well together."

Naisbitt cited the in-between moments as the camaraderie-building ones in a typically individualistic sport.

"The journey is fantastic — the meals together, the downtime, the rain delays, the laughter and the jokes," he said. "These are what make you come back."

Naisbitt, a social studies teacher, taught and coached at Bolingbrook High School before coming to Central. While coaching is natural pursuit for him, taking charge of Central's legacy was an unexpected responsibility.

"I was fortunate enough to land at the premier Illinois high school tennis program," he said. "I have done everything in my



power to maintain what was handed to me."

Having the depth of talent Central enjoys means making tough decisions on the tournament roster, a task Naisbitt doesn't relish. He relies on "great assistants" like Bill Alex or former wing man Scott Radecki for their insights and collaboration.

"They're enormously helpful to the situation, and if it weren't for them, I would not be here," he remarked.

Swapping stories at the NHSACA convention was a special reward.

"It was just incredible to see the resumes of the coaches there and to see what they're doing," he said. "It was great to meet some legendary coaches."

Naisbitt hopes his legacy is as a coach who continued Central's winning tradition while providing student-athletes with an enriching experience beyond the score.

"I'd like to think that I got the player to buy into the program and to want to come to practice and to want to win titles and have fun along the way."



