Trustees take action on filming requests

Almost a year after Hinsdale trustees first discussed commercial filming requests and regulations, they have approved changes to make the process easier on staff and residents.

One of the biggest changes in the amended ordinance is the implementation of a refundable application fee of \$500 for small productions and \$1,000 for large productions.

"Essentially we have added some fees that are commensurate with the staff effort required in order to process these," said Trustee Jerry

Hughes, chairman of administration and community affairs.

The fees also should help limit the number of companies who make requests to film in town and then choose another location, assistant village manager Brad Bloom said.

"Filming companies would back off in the past after staff had spent a lot of time," he said.

The application timeline also will be lengthened to 15 business days for small productions and 30 days for large productions. The previous timeline was 14 days for feature films, seven days for television episodes and three days for photography.

"It just gives staff enough time to

review these and give them thoughtful consideration," Bloom said.

Residents also will be notified five or 10 days in advance of filming, depending on the size of the production.

Filming hours will be limited to 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., with no set up allowed prior to the start time and no cleanup after. The ordinance continues to prohibit filming on Sundays and major federal holidays.

Residents also will be limited to three consecutive days of filming at their home and 10 days a year in total.

Village staff looked at ordinances in North Shore communities where

filming is quite common and incorporated the best practices, Bloom said.

"We're trying to walk that fine line, because we have a lot of residents who actually enjoy having their homes used for this purpose," he said.

The conversation was prompted last year after film crews and road construction created a troublesome mix.

"We had a situation with a commercial filming event in southeast Hinsdale that caused some consternation," Hughes said.

The changes, which will go into effect immediately, were approved unanimously.

Referendum money adds twist to budget

Bond sales, construction costs will factor into District 86 fiscal reports for next few years

The Hinsdale High School District 86 Board Sept. 26 approved its first operating budget since the \$139 million referendum passed in April. And officials say the receipt and subsequent spending of those bond proceeds will alter the look of financial statements the next several years.

The board voted Sept. 26 to approve a fiscal year 2020 budget with \$108,630,818 in revenue and \$108,578,843 in expenses, resulting in a projected surplus of \$51,974. Staff salaries and benefits constitute just about \$83.4 million of those costs, an increase of \$741,000 over last year and a little more than three-quarters of the operating budget.

Josh Stephenson, the district's chief financial officer, informed board members in his budget presentation at the Sept. 12 meeting that construction projects completed this summer were paid for with referendum proceeds. The \$4.4 million originally allocated for the work was redirected "to address the backlog of equipment in need of replacement and complete small scale renovation work that falls outside the scope of the referendum."

He said the influx of revenue from bond sales — \$70 million already sold and another \$35 million slated for later this fiscal year — followed by staggered payouts as various facets of the plan are carried out will cause considerable rises and falls as the project schedule unfolds.

"These projects do not fit cleanly inside of a fiscal year. They will occur over the next three years,"

Stephenson said. "So that creates some fluctuations in what will be the fund balances for the district over the next three years as these items are included.

"That's because we're generating a significant amount of revenue from bond proceeds sales this year, but we won't incur a lot of the expenditures for the capital projects until following fiscal years," he added.

The start date of work, he noted, will play a role in the look of the balance sheet. "If we're able to start some work in April or we're pre-buying materials, we may expend more than we originally anticipated within the fiscal year and we may need to do a budget amendment before the end of the fiscal year," he said.

Expenses related to project design and construction have been included in the 2020 budget.

Board member Marty Turek pressed for a fixed amount to be allocated annually in the operating budget for facility maintenance and improvements.

"I think this board would be proud to set into motion a dedicated percentage of our budget going to facilities," he said. "I think it's good practice to do it in a year when we don't even need it."

Board member Kevin Camden, finance committee chair, said such earmarking is already in the works.

"It needs to be in there because every year we get these 'surprises' that we should be budgeting for," he said.

Stephenson said incorporating referendum funds was "not a big deal" but a new wrinkle.

"It's just something we've never done," he said. "We've never had anything this size and complexity going on within our fiscal year."

Sterigenics plans to 'exit' Willowbrook

SPRINGFIELD — Sterigenics, a medical supply sterilization company linked to increased cancer risk in the DuPage County area, said Monday it plans to "exit its ethylene oxide sterilization operations in Willowbrook."

Since February, Sterigenics was prohibited from using the gas by a seal order from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency, which effectively forced its closure.

A consent agreement between the state, DuPage County and Sterigenics approved earlier this month gave the company clearance to install the necessary equipment for its facility to reopen, however.

Sterigenics stated in a press release Monday it could "not reach an agreement to renew the lease on its Quincy Street facility in Willowbrook in the present environment," and blamed the "unstable legislative and regulatory landscape in Illinois" for its decision not to reopen.

There are two bills — House Bill 3885 and House Bill 3888 — currently moving through the Legislature that would, respectively, give home rule municipi-

palities greater authority to ban emissions of the gas and phase out its use over a period of years. They are expected to be on the table for discussion when the General Assembly returns for fall veto session on Oct. 28.

Both measures would build upon Senate Bills 1852 and 1854, which were signed into law earlier this year creating what both sides agreed were the strictest regulations on ethylene oxide in the nation.

State Rep. Deanne Mazzochi, an Elmhurst Republican, was the chief co-sponsor of SB 1852, known as the Matt Haller Act. She criticized the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency for its rubberstamp approach.

"While today's announcement can be viewed as a solid victory for residents of Willowbrook and surrounding communities, we are prepared to go further to make sure the Illinois EPA ends these lax oversight practices," said in a statement released Monday. "The state as a whole will benefit from an Illinois EPA that does its job correctly to ensure that the air we breathe is safe."

State Sen. John Curran, a Downers Grove Republican who was among the first public officials to speak out against

the company, was the Senate sponsor the act. He also opposed any avenue for Sterigenics to reopen.

"This is tremendous news for the people of Willowbrook and the surrounding communities," Curran said in a statement. "The risks involved with this facility reopening were simply too great to the public health. This announcement from Sterigenics is the direct result of the tireless advocacy of Stop Sterigenics and other community organizations, who have proven once again that when we all work together, we will not be stopped. Now it is our job to remain vigilant in continuing to protect the health of those we serve."

Stop Sterigenics, a grassroots group, said it would continue to push for further regulation of ethylene oxide. That was echoed by House Republican Leader Jim Durkin of Western Springs, who is sponsoring the bill that would give home rule municipalities the authority to ban ethylene oxide emissions.

"Sterigenics got the message that we were never going to let them reopen their doors and poison our communities again," said Durkin, who represents the Willowbrook area.

Sterigenics was just one of 26 facilities

in Illinois permitted to use or emit ethylene oxide, an IEPA spokesperson said in July. Two others — Vantage Specialty Chemicals and Medline Industries — are located in Lake County and have faced increased pushback from community members in recent weeks, including from the activist group Stop ETO in Lake County.

Last week, Pritzker's office said the governor was receptive to further regulation of ethylene oxide that might emerge from the upcoming veto session.

"He is committed to signing the measure and the administration will strictly enforce it," spokesperson Jordan Abudayyeh said.

Last week, representatives of the Illinois Manufacturers' Association, Illinois Chamber of Commerce, Illinois Biotechnology Industry Organization and the Chemical Industry Council of Illinois sent a letter to General Assembly members to oppose "any additional efforts to further restrict or ban the use of ethylene oxide in Illinois."

"The economic hit of an ethylene oxide ban would be significant, with an initial loss of at least 1,500 jobs in Illinois, including unionized positions," they said in the letter.

Falcons coach dies unexpectedly Sunday

Coaches, players and families involved in Hinsdale Falcon Football are among those mourning the loss of Mark Koschik of Clarendon Hills.

Koschik, 47, the father of three, died Sunday at Hinsdale Central High School while coaching his son's Varsity Gold team.

"The Falcons family and our community is deeply saddened by the loss of Mark," said Jay Novatney, Hinsdale Falcons president. "He was an outstanding veteran Falcons football coach for his two boys.

"But more than that, he was

a wonderful human being, a devoted husband and a loving father. Falcon Football and Cheer has always been about 'family' and we ask that the entire community come together, as we are, to support Mark's family and honor and remember him."

The Hinsdale Fire Department received a call for full arrest about 10 a.m. Sunday, a spokesman said. Six firefighter/paramedics arrived at the scene in two ambulances and a fire engine. They took Koschik to the hospital shortly after they arrived.

Koschik was a senior portfolio manager at Exelon in Chicago.

Volunteer brings library to homebound patrons' doorsteps

Any reader will tell you that books can make the world a bigger place. For those who find it difficult to leave their homes, a book or a movie can provide a much-needed glimpse at a world beyond their own four walls.

Pat Allen is one of three local women who bring the world to homebound Hinsdaleans in the form of books, movies and magazines each week. Organized by Hinsdale Public Library patron services assistant manager Martha Kennedy, the library's Doorstep Delivery service allows homebound patrons to benefit from the library's vast collection of materials without ever leaving home.

Participants work directly with Kennedy to determine which materials will meet each person's needs. Patrons can request particular titles or Kennedy can make suggestions to match a person's interests. With more than 1 million books and more than 102,000 movies in the library's collection, the options are nearly endless.

Along with books, movies and magazines, Kennedy said Doorstep Delivery volunteers also

have dropped off children's books and puzzles for patrons with visiting grandchildren.

Allen said she believes more people could benefit from the service, which she learned about during one of her many trips to the Hinsdale Public Library. She saw a notice about Doorstep Delivery and decided to add the program to her list of volunteer roles.

Allen, Marian Jablonski and Melissa Reedy take turns visiting people on the Doorstep Delivery program each week. They bring selected books, DVDs and magazines to the person's door and pick up items that are ready to be returned.

Some patrons prefer a face-to-face visit, while others simply leave their items at the front door for the volunteer to retrieve.

Allen said those on the program are extremely grateful for the service. She's even received small gifts in appreciation of the service.

"Recipients don't have to be elderly," Allen said. Hinsdale Public Library cardholders who are recovering from surgery, injury or illness or who are adjusting

to life with a new baby have also used the service.

"It could benefit so many people who probably have no idea that it exists," she said. "There's plenty of opportunity for more people to get on that list."

After careers as a flight attendant and attorney, Allen now spends her time traveling, volunteering and reading. She said her travel often influences her book choices. In preparation for an upcoming trip to Morocco, she read both fiction and nonfiction books about her destination.

When she's not preparing for her next travel adventure, spy novels are Allen's books of choice, along with whatever her two book groups are reading.

Reading has always been important to Allen, who finds her way to the Hinsdale Public Library at least once a week. She said she is grateful that through Doorstep Delivery, she can bring the library she loves to those who can't get there on their own.

Keep it one toké over the (boundary) line

Hinsdale Tuesday joined a list of Chicago-area suburbs that have decided to prevent recreational marijuana dispensaries from operating within village boundaries.

LaGrange Park, Naperville, Libertyville and Bloomingdale already have prohibited these businesses, which will become legal in the state as of Jan. 1, 2020. We imagine more will do the same.

We're pleased to see Hinsdale trustees are not lured by the promise of tax dollars that others have found so intoxicating. Revenue estimates range wildly, from \$440 million to almost \$700 million a year. Municipalities would receive just a fraction of that amount, of course, but local taxes of up to 3.5 percent could add up.

We're also pleasantly surprised that state legislators were willing to allow local governments to opt out of recreational weed sales.

That's not the only surprise in the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, which Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker signed into law in June. (Illinois, by the way, is the only state in which the legislature — not a ballot initiative approved by voters — legalized recreational marijuana use.)

The law offers a host of incentives for people

who have been in trouble with the law for using pot to open dispensaries, and for such shops to be located in areas plagued with poverty and unemployment that have high rates of arrest, conviction and incarceration related to the sale, possession, use, cultivation, manufacture, or transport of cannabis.

Is Hinsdale such an area? Absolutely not.

Is someone who qualifies for these incentives likely to choose Hinsdale as a place to set up shop? Probably not.

But the details of the law illustrate that legalizing the sale of weed is designed to do more than fill state coffers with tax dollars. It's designed to be a make-good to those who've been arrested for or convicted of certain marijuana-related offenses.

Perhaps, as is often the case, legislators' intentions are good. If cannabis laws have been "disproportionately" enforced, then making amends might be in order. Chicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot spoke to that point in an op-ed piece in the Sept. 17 issue of the Chicago Sun-Times.

"While I believe cannabis legalization is long overdue, I want to do it in a way that uplifts the economic life of our neighborhoods and resi-

dents, particularly those in our black and brown communities who have borne the brunt of the war on drugs," she wrote.

Putting individuals in a position to run a retail establishment selling the product that got them into legal trouble in the first place seems risky. Proponents say anti-marijuana laws were ill-conceived in the first place and that those punished deserve some remedy. We believe that's a slippery slope.

And not everyone agrees that opening dispensaries in high-crime, low-income areas is the right way to bring about economic revitalization.

"Minorities have said to me we don't want this stuff in our neighborhood," Democratic state Rep. Marty Moylan of Des Plaines was quoted as saying in a May 6 article in the Chicago Tribune. "There's other ways to generate revenue, not on the backs of our children and young adults."

We don't want it in our neighborhood, either.

As many as 295 dispensaries could be in operation in Illinois by 2022, according to Marijuana Business Daily.

We're glad none of them will be in Hinsdale.

During your brief interaction you assessed his skin tone, hair style and his vernacular and decided he couldn't possibly attend an elite university.


If that wasn't enough, you chose to continue your shaming with your commentary in The Hinsdalean





ASK AN EXPERT

CHRISTOPHER GEORGE, ONCOLOGIST

What questions do cancer patients ask?

When Christopher George became an oncologist nearly two decades ago, the dialogue with his cancer patients concerning treatment were often one-sided.

"People didn't question me very much," George said.

That dynamic has changed, he stressed, and for the better.

"I think patients are taking more ownership of their care," George said. "I like it to be kind of a partnership. I feel like patients are fact-checking you, and it's a good thing."

George, director of medical oncology for Northwestern Medicine's Regional Medical Group, will deliver the Top Docs Lecture "Questions Every Cancer Patient Asks" from 6:30 to 8 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 10, at Wellness House in Hinsdale (see Page XX for details).

"I'm trying to give a talk that would be of interest to cancer patients based on the questions that I get all the time," George said. "I thought it would be a good opportunity to talk to a large group of patients on questions they're going

to ask their doctors or may be afraid to ask their doctors."

Some of the most common: Should I go to the Mayo Clinic? Should I get a PET scan? Should I have surgery?

Surgery, while it might seem like a quick fix, is not always the right course. "Sometimes it's hard to convince patients that surgery is a bad idea," he said. "It's very situational." Regarding PET scans, the answer depends on the patient's case.

"There's the perception that (a PET scan) is a better scan than others. Sometimes that's true. But sometimes it's worse," he said.

Some patients may naturally be sheepish inquiring about a second opinion for fear of giving offense. None taken, George assured.

"I'm very supportive of second opinions. Your doctor shouldn't be threatened or offended if you want to get a second opinion," he said.

Then there's the leafy elephant in the room.

"Almost every single patient asks about marijuana," George related, saying the stigma around medicinal cannabis has clearly dissipated in recent times. "There's a different thirst for information about it in the public sphere."

"We're not sure of the answer," he admitted. "It's definitely a conversation I have every single day. It probably merits its own talk."

Health insurance is another hot topic, and he has noticed the active role that adult children take in the care of their parents.

"Adult children usually have more questions than the patient, especially seniors," he said.

The digital revolution has put "facts" at everyone's fingertips, George noted.

"The internet was obviously around when I started, but it wasn't as ubiquitous the way it is now. Some of the information online is spot on and some of it is garbage," he said.

As a student of western medicine, George generally defers to others on questions about homeopathic treatments. What he finds fulfilling is the authentic, constructive conversations with those facing health crises.

"I like interacting with people. I prefer caring for people that are sick versus preventative medicine," he said, encouraging people to bring their own questions to his lecture. "It's designed to be way more of a conversation than a lecture."



The fabulous flavors of fall

From cocktails to crisps, apples, caramel, squash and more signal start of autumn

The week opened with a taste of Indian Summer, but today it feels like fall.

And with the cooler temperatures comes the desire for heartier, more filling cuisine. At Page's, the chalkboard indicates the imminent return of one of the restaurant's most popular items.

"We're known for our pot roast," owner Cissy Rallo said. "Everybody is patiently waiting."

The tender meat will make several appearances on the menu — served on a dinner plate with mashed potatoes and a veggie, mixed in a skillet with eggs, featured in a sandwich and incorporated into a gooey melted grilled cheese.

Other dishes in demand this time of year are the chili (which comes in a mac and cheese version) and Rallo's famous apple cider doughnuts.

What makes the doughnuts so delicious?

"Love," Rallo said. "Really that's what it is."

The cider obviously plays a role, she adds, but she won't elaborate.

"I don't give away everything I put in them," she said.

There's no secret to one of fall's favorite treats at The Fruit Store. Granny Smith apples, caramel and toppings (peanut, pecan, walnut, Nestle Crunch and Heath) are the three ingredients in these sweet snacks.

The top seller? Peanut.

"It's got that tart apple, sweet caramel, and the nuts pull it all together," co-owner Mick Yurchak said.

Apple also stars in a seasonal dessert from Angelyne Canicosa, pastry chef at Vistro and Western Springs' Vie.

The crisp features apples from Mick Klug Farm in St. Joseph, Mich., rolled oats from Three Sisters Garden in Kankakee and whipped cream and caramel sauce made with cream from Kilgus Farmstead in Fairbury.

Canicosa is using mutsu apples at the moment.

"They are crispy and juicy," she said. "They are great for baking."

The dish is baked in an individual cast iron skillet, which gives it a homey feel.

"I think our food is very approachable. It's probably something you want to come back for and you crave," she said.

With quality ingredients, a delicious dessert doesn't have to be complicated. The crisp is made a handful of items — apples, cinnamon, nutmeg, lemon juice, butter, brown and white sugar, oats and cream.

"We work with some really great farmers," she said. "I think that's what it is. Their products are just amazing."






