D181 eyes \$3.5 million in summer work

The Community Consolidated Elementary District 181 Board has given administrators the green light to prepare the specifications and bidding documents for \$3.5 million in facility improvement projects proposed for the summer of 2023.

At Monday night's meeting, board members authorized the projects following a presentation by Mike Duggan, the district's director of facilities.

The costliest projects on the list include an estimated \$500,000 for floor replacement and moisture mitigation at The Lane School; \$476,000 for remodeling at Oak School to create two addition-

al classrooms along with meeting and office spaces; and \$476,000 to remodel the media resource center at Elm School, which involves replacing nine classrooms and offices surrounding the MRC that were constructed with temporary, non-soundproof metal walls.

Additionally, Monroe School's MRC will be renovated with new equipment, interiors and furnishings for an estimated \$238,000; The Lane School playlot and parking lot will be replaced for a projected \$238,000; and both Monroe and The Lane will receive door and hardware security upgrades for an estimated \$178,000-\$238,000 each.

Duggan stated that the district generally tries to keep the total cost of work at \$2 million or lower. But

in his memo to the board, he cited expiring replacement cycles and increased security concerns as driving factors behind the larger than normal projected capital outlay. And an acute need for classroom, office and collaborative space at Oak for next fall compelled officials to advance that project on the schedule.

"This is our fifth year of our rolling 10-year master facilities plan," Duggan said, noting that last summer's \$2.5 million price tag also exceeded the average. "Each year the plan is tweaked to include the highest-priority projects."

Board member Sinead Duffy, chair of the board's finance committee, said the increasingly stringent requirements in areas such

as school security measures and playground accessibility usually translates into higher costs

"Now that we're making playgrounds more accessible for everybody, the type of costs involved in a playground today versus 10 years ago are significantly different," Duffy said. "The requirements for schools and for the district are very different."

Duggan shared that assessment. "(The estimates) are out of date, so we try to increase them every year, adjust them every year based on the most current information," Duggan told board members.

Duggan expects to provide the board with firmer cost numbers in February after bids have been received.

Only D86 race will be contested in April

Candidates equal number of open seats for village board, library board and D181 board

Hinsdale voters will see only one contested race on the ballot when they head to the polls April 4.

Five candidates will vie for three seats on the Hinsdale High School District 86 Board in the consolidated general election. Kay Gallo of Clarendon Hills, former D86 board member and board president, is seeking to return to office. Also running are Asma Akhras of Darien, Andrew Catton of Hinsdale, Cat Greenspon of Burr Ridge and Deborah Willoughby of Westmont.

None of the three candidates whose terms are expiring — board President Erik Held and members Cynthia Hanson and Kathleen Hirsman — are running for re-election. The three ran together on a slate in 2019, with Held and Hanson seeking their first terms and Hirsman her second.

Held said he had to submit a request to run to his employer, UBS, as he did four years ago when he ran for his first term. In 2018, the approval came back in two days.

"This year it was a little bit over a month," said Held, who is a first vice president of wealth management with UBS. "There was a heavier degree of review involved in it."

The business climate has changed, as has his role on the board, he said. Although he was approved to run conditionally, he said further conversations with management and his team "made the decision for me."

"I would have loved to have run. There is just so much positive that is going on in the district, and I love being a part of it. I hope in some way I'm going to continue to be a part of it," he said, indicating he would consider running again in two years.

Hirsman said after two rewarding terms, it's time to move on.

"It was a wonderful eight years," she said, noting that she's had the opportunity to serve under five or six different board presidents. "I so appreciated the different dynamics of each board. 'It's been a great experience.'"

Hanson, a former Gower Elementary District 62 Board member, said she is "incredibly proud" of the work of the district during her tenure.

"Given I've spent the last eight years serving on local school boards, I am stepping away and looking forward to focusing more of my time with my family and in other areas of community service that are important to me," Hanson said.

District 181

Four candidates are running for four seats on the District 181 board.

Incumbents Asim Aleem and Margie Kleber of Hinsdale and Sinead Duffy of Clarendon Hills are running for another term. Newcomer Meg Cooper of Burr Ridge, executive director of the D181 Foundation, also is seeking a spot on the board.

Aleem was appointed Aug. 1 to fill a vacancy, and Duffy is completing the

end of her first four-year term. Kleber served two four-year terms before being elected to a two-year term in 2021.

Sheetal Rao, who is completing her first four-year term, is not running for re-election. She told The Hinsdalean she's grateful to have had the opportunity to serve.

"I am going to be focusing a bit more on my career," Rao said, citing her work with a start-up environmental nonprofit, Nordson Green Earth Foundation, over the past 18 months. "I'd like to focus more time on that."

She also is in the midst of a medical fellowship in climate change and searching for a full-time position in that field.

Hinsdale Village Board

Trustees Scott Banke and Luke Stifflear and newcomer Alexis Braden, a member of the Hinsdale Historic Preservation Commission, are running uncontested for three open seats on the village board. Trustee Laurel Haarlow is not seeking re-election.

"It's been a privilege to serve on Hinsdale's board of trustees," Haarlow said. "While I will miss this involvement, after four years I'm ready to focus on other interests."

A lottery for ballot placement will be held at 9 a.m. Wednesday, Dec. 28, at Village Hall, 19 E. Chicago Ave., for candidates who submitted their nominating papers simultaneously when filing opened at 8 a.m. Dec. 12 or during the last hour of filing Dec. 19.



Hinsdale Public Library Board

The library board has an unprecedented six seats open in the April election, three with four-year terms and three with two-year terms.

Six individuals have filed to run for those seats.

Incumbents John Bloomfield and Megan Davia Mikhail are seeking four-year terms along with newcomer Magdalena Sokolowski.

Incumbent Kim Kiyosaki and newcomers Chun Ye and Ying Zhou are running for the two-year terms.

Incumbents Julie Liesse, Denise Wong and Emily Zeng are not seeking another term.

Liesse is nearing the end of almost eight years on the board, six of which she served as president.

"It's been a wonderful and challenging and rewarding experience," she said. "But I'm getting ready to downsize and am not sure where I'll end up. So it's time to move on."

She said she is thrilled to have six excellent candidates, including three incumbents, on the ballot.

"I know I'll leave the library in good hands, especially with our new strategic plan in place," she said.

Village ends good year, looks to 150th

The village ends 2022 with a reserve balance of over \$5 million, which represents 26 percent of the village's annual operating expenses. Given a predicted recession in 2023, the village's budget for 2023 is even more conservative than usual. The village continues to enjoy a AAA bond rating from Standard & Poor's, a distinction only 8 percent of Illinois municipalities can claim.

Based on positive feedback, the village has formalized its outdoor dining program. The village adopted design standards to provide for consistency among restaurants. This year, the village added outdoor lighting and planter boxes to make outdoor dining even more attractive. We continue to work to improve the outdoor dining experience, which is a great way to attract residents and nonresidents to our beautiful downtown.

The village continues to have

vibrant retail businesses. Our 3.9 percent retail vacancy rate is lower than many neighboring communities. Hinsdale remains a much sought-after location for retailers. Another luxury auto dealership is planned for Ogden Avenue, across from the existing dealerships. This addition will further strengthen the village's sales tax base. The village board remains committed to doing all that it can to ensure that our local businesses prosper.

The village board makes infrastructure improvements a high priority. In 2022, among other projects, the village reconstructed Garfield Street in concrete. Village streets are now all in good shape; a big change from five years ago. In 2023, the village will make further infrastructure improve-

ments, including much needed repairs to the water tower near Hinsdale Central High School. That work, which will cost \$1.5 million, will be funded through American Rescue Plan Act funds and a contribution from the Illinois Tollway, requiring very little of the village's own funds.

This year, the village board also approved a

historic preservation program to preserve Hinsdale's historic homes. The program's financial and zoning incentives are intended to encourage preservation of these valued structures.

The village board remains committed to minimizing adverse impacts from the I-294 expansion. In 2022, the village negotiated an agreement with the Tollway Authority to expand Woodland Park, and to replace a

planned above-ground drainage ditch with an underground water storage tank, thus creating even more parkland.

The Tollway has also replaced the pedestrian bridge between Hinsdale and Western Springs, which is located next to 47th Street. In addition, the village is working with the Tollway to redevelop the Hinsdale Oasis with the goal of increasing revenues the village receives from new restaurants opened at the Oasis.

Hinsdale looks forward to 2023, when the village will celebrate its 150th anniversary. Community volunteers are planning activities to commemorate this milestone.

I want to thank the board members, committee members and the village staff for all their hard work in 2022.

MEETING ROUNDUP

Hinsdale High School District 86

Among other business Dec. 15, board members:

- held a public hearing on and approved 2022 property tax levies of \$94.9 million for corporate and special purposes and \$12.2 million for debt service and public building commission leases, for a total levy of \$107.1 million. No district residents spoke at the public hearing.

- approved a two-year contract renewal for Keith Bockwoldt, chief information officer, effective July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2025, at an annual salary of \$192,642

- heard a report on the annual comprehensive financial report for fiscal year 2022 from Andy Mace of Wipfli LLP, the district's auditor, who issued a clean opinion.

"Only about probably 25 percent of all Illinois school districts receive a clean audit," he said. "Hinsdale 86 is truly adhering to the best practices of external financial reporting."

- approved a change order with a \$653,199 credit for value engineering items for phase four bid period five of the future ready facilities project

- reviewed a report on costs associated with strategic plan accomplishments as requested by board member Peggy James.

"I was a little surprised that it didn't have more of a presentation feel," she said. "It felt like it was a little bit more of a worksheet to me."

She plans to meet with Josh Stephenson, chief financial officer, to request some additional information.

Central hires new AD to replace Jones July 1

When Hinsdale Central athletic director Dan Jones retires at the end of the school year, he will be replaced by Mike Jezioro. The Hinsdale High School District 86 Board approved the hire Dec. 15.

"I'm really looking forward to continuing the academic and athletic excellence at Hinsdale Central and working with the staff, students and community members to continue those standards," he told board members after the vote.

Jezioro has spent the past five years as the athletic and activities director for South Elgin

High School. He has almost 20 years of experience in secondary education and high school athletics that have included stints coaching softball, wrestling and football. He also taught math at two high schools and was a dean of students at Glenbard East High School.

He has a bachelor's in math with a minor in secondary education from Elmhurst College and a master's in education administration from Governors State University.

Jezioro received a one-year contract with a base salary of \$160,000.

COVID numbers inching up


The DuPage County Health Department reported 28 new cases of COVID-19 in Hinsdale over the past week, bringing the total number of cases in the DuPage County portion of Hinsdale to 4,365, compared to 4,337 last week. The Cook County Health Department no longer reports on cases specific to Hinsdale.

The number of cases per 100,000 population in DuPage was 26.9 on Dec. 20, compared

to 26.7 on Dec. 13. The community level remains at medium.

District 181 reported 12 new positive cases from Dec. 14-19, including 11 students and one teacher and one staff member, for a total of 165 districtwide since school opened.

District 86 reported 10 new positive cases at Hinsdale Central Dec. 16, bringing the student total to 73 since school opened.



Library enjoyed 2022's return to 'normal'

For everyone at the Hinsdale Public Library, 2022 brought a welcome return of the things we love best: in-person events, answering questions at the help desks, the hum of activity during finals week and, mostly, seeing you back in the stacks or in our study rooms.

Post-pandemic, our book circulation and patron visits to the building have been on the rise again and finally began to look more normal in 2022 — especially as our summer activities brought families back to the library in droves. Some 1,200 young patrons registered for our Summer Reading Club — not quite back to 2018's all-time high, but triple the number of participants from 2020, and 30 percent higher than last year.

It felt like a return to normal when we were marching through down-

town Hinsdale again, giving away children's books at the Fourth of July parade with the help of our Friends of the Hinsdale Public Library. Ditto when we welcomed more than 80 very enthusiastic and competitive players at our fall Trivia Night. Our rotating art exhibits are back as well, and our librarians are again visiting local schools with their curated Great New Reads lists.

But 2022 wasn't just about returning programs. After we launched our Junior Advisory Board, our 24 young board members hosted one of the year's most popular programs, an Escape Room for their fellow teens.

There are silver linings in every

cloud, and over the past three years all of us, staff and patrons, have discovered indispensable ways to provide and access content. For instance, the outdoor summer story-times we started hosting at Hinsdale parks have become part of our regular offerings. Many of our adult events now are hybrid programs, with the choice of attending in person or online — or watching the recorded program as well.

Our digital collection continued to expand to meet the demands of our nearly 9,000 cardholders; one of the headlines this year was new, daily access to The New York Times, The Wall Street Journal and Washington

Post for HPL cardholders.

The board and staff used the changes of the past three years as a jumping-off point for our strategic planning process. That six-month process was an opportunity for us to conduct the most thorough quantitative and qualitative community research in more than a decade. The result is a three-year plan that has us pumped up and looking forward to 2023. Look in your mailboxes in January for an update on what we found and how that will shape what's ahead in materials, facilities, events and technologies.

On behalf of the entire board and staff, I'm wishing you and yours a healthy and very happy new year.

And as always, see you at the library!

Minister’s calling is working with young people

Like many teenagers, Grant Glowiak didn’t consider himself the smartest, most athletic or most talented of his peers at Lyons Township High School. But at his church’s youth group, none of that mattered.

“Standard cliques didn’t necessarily apply in that space,” said Glowiak, who grew up attending First Congregational Church in his hometown of Western Springs. Now, as associate pastor and director of youth ministries at Union Church in Hinsdale, Glowiak said he wants to create an equally safe place where teens know they don’t have to perform to be accepted and loved.

“My love for them is not based on what their highs and lows are,” Glowiak said. “They’re worthy of love simply for being children of God.”

Glowiak’s job isn’t one that’s easily left at the office, but that’s something he said he knew when he and his wife, a lifelong member of Union Church, decided to move to Hinsdale in 2019.

“That does not bother me. I like being part of the community,” said Glowiak, who joined the staff of Union

Church in 2015 and was ordained in 2021.

Glowiak graduated from Grinnell College in Iowa with a degree in religious studies, and although the curriculum was academic rather than faith-based, Glowiak said the people he met at college made him even more aware of the needs of others and more dedicated to fighting for social justice and equality.

The years following graduation prepared him for ministry, as well. Glowiak took on the role of caregiver for his father, who was suffering from Alzheimer’s disease. Glowiak said the response of his church to his family’s situation helped to solidify his decision to complete his seminary work and become an ordained minister. He spent nine years attending Chicago Theological Seminary part time to qualify for ordination.

As director of youth ministries, Glowiak said he wants to help the church’s youngest members find compassion for those in need and the passion to work toward change.

“There are a million worthy causes in the world,” said Glowiak. Through activities

such as work tours, he exposes young people to some of those causes and challenges them to answer the question, “Who makes your heart hurt most?” The answer to that question, Glowiak said, reveals the place where that person is most likely to make a difference.

Glowiak said his interest in social justice drew him to Grinnell, and he remains

dedicated to those issues as an ordained minister. He said he encourages members of his church to make an effort to understand things like gender issues, rather than just write them off as something wrong.

Ultimately, Glowiak said, his job is to convey the messages of the Bible, God and Jesus. In addition to leading youth activities, Glowiak

preaches regularly. Often, he said he finds himself speaking not just about the needs of others, but the needs of his own congregation.

“We all have a hole to fill,” he said. It’s a hole that can’t be filled with money, cars or big houses.

“The way you fill that hole is by serving others.”

How can holiday trash be kept out of landfills?

From the dazzling displays of decorations to the parties teeming with presents and plates of goodies, the holidays are not exactly a time of moderation.

Amidst this celebratory crescendo of consumption, we can offer a gift to Mother Nature by making recycling and repurposing seasonal traditions as well. While the holidays come and go in a wink of St. Nick's eye, the garbage left behind in landfills leaves an impact on the environment for generations. But there are simple ways to keep promoting joy to the world by diverting items that can be recycled. It can also potentially save your family money by identifying items that can be reused in creative ways.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency estimates that the average American household throws away nearly 125 pounds of trash in a normal week. From Thanksgiving to New Year's, the heap grows by about 25 percent, or a staggering 940 pounds of waste generated during that period.

The promising news is that roughly 80 percent of what is discarded during the holidays could be recycled or reused. And it doesn't take as much effort as you might think.

Right outside your front door, the village of Hinsdale will collect real Christmas trees for free when placed at the curb during the weeks following New Year's Day. All decorations and trimming must be removed. An artificial tree is treated as a bulk item, however, and requires two garbage stickers for collection.

Have some light strands that are losing their powers of illumination? Don't throw them away — take them to one of these nearby recycling locations (by the date noted):

- Oak Brook Public Library, 600 Oak Brook Road (until Jan. 13)
- Westmont Public Library, 428 N Cass Ave. (through January)
- Johanik Fire Station Headquarters, 6015 S. Cass Ave., Westmont (through January)
- Darien Police Department, 1710 Plainfield Road (until mid-February)
- Downers Grove Fire Station 2, 5420 Main St. (until Feb. 10)



The EPA also provides a number of waste reduction tips to make your festivities both fun and environmentally friendly:

- Minimize food waste by carefully planning your holiday menu. The agency reports that more food ends up in landfills than any other single item.
- Make your own refreshments to cut down on excess packaging. Use durable, reusable plates and serving ware when possible.
- Be resourceful when thinking of gifts, decorations and crafts by repurposing recycled items such as glass bottles and aluminum cans, or gently used gift wrap, gift bags, ribbons and bows. Many creative ideas for breathing new life into these materials can be found online.
- Repurpose packaging such as foam peanuts and bubble wrap, and start your own packing utility box to store these materials for future use.
- Use shredded newspaper for packing material in lieu of purchasing new foam peanuts or bubble wrap.
- Reuse holiday cards by converting them into gift tags or decorations.







The library is a wonderful place to visit during the winter. Checking out seasonal books, music and favorite movies feeds your festive spirit. You can relax and explore recipes or do some browsing for gift ideas at your own pace.

We provide all of these opportunities at the library, available whenever you're ready to partake. There is something for everyone. And for those in the community who can't regularly make it to us: we can come to you.

Doorstep Delivery is available to patrons unable to regularly travel to our building. Does your book club check out their books from the library every month? You will still receive a copy. Do you love opening your HPL Book Box? You still can. We work with you to determine your preferences.

Some people like to manage their own holds, and others send a list of requests for us to place and manage. Some patrons request two or three books each week, some take long pauses or check out books as they become available.

If you like to check out recommendations from staff, suggestions can be made based on your reading preferences. Staying connected is on your terms, too. We can set up a weekly phone call or email or check in on a different schedule.

Bounce into winter break

Hinsdale Central Holiday Classic enters seventh year of showcasing hoops teams

The seventh annual Hinsdale Central Holiday Classic will tip off Dec. 26 (weather delayed), setting in motion what has become one of the top winter break prep basketball tournaments in the Chicago area.

Sixteen teams representing 15 different conferences will vie for the tourney crown over four days — Dec. 26-29 — in Central's gym at 5500 S. Grant St. (see the bracket for the schedule and teams participating). The field includes eight programs that won 20 or more games last year and eight conference champions from 2021.

Hinsdale Central athletic director Dan Jones predicted the 2022 HCHC edition could be the best yet.

"Every year it's competitive, but

this might be the most competitive year we've had since we began the tournament," Jones said. "For the most part, everyone has a chance to win every game."

The inaugural 2015 tournament featured defending IHSA 4A champion Stevenson High School and Crespi Carmelite, the title holders of California's Division IV. The fact that more than half of the teams that played in that first HCHC — including Stevenson and, of course, Hinsdale Central — are still in the mix speaks volumes about the event's quality, he suggested.

"They all say it's one of the best because of the amount of talented teams and talented coaches playing games like this in December so they're ready to play big games at the end of the season," Jones said.

Jones, formerly athletic director at DeKalb High School, had host-

ing experience after helping run DeKalb's Chuck Dayton Holiday Classic, the longest running tournament in the state. In a piece previewing the 2015 event on www.hcholidayclassic.com, he expressed confidence that the formula could work here.

"I believed that if we hosted a tournament at Hinsdale Central, with our gym, facility and location, I thought we can have something pretty special that can be around for many years," Jones said.

He tapped Joe Spagnolo, an Illinois Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Famer and longtime director of the Proviso West Holiday Tournament, to manage it. Spagnolo, in that 2015 preview story, said he was attracted to the mission of the HCHC to feature a broad representation of schools.


"There was certainly a void

that was needed to be filled for a tournament that had a balance of teams with different styles from different locations," Spagnolo stated. "We wanted to build some long lasting relationships and went after programs that have been very successful and others that we know were on the rise with some great underclass talent."

The vision has worked, and Jones, hosting his last HCHC before retiring at the end of the school year, encouraged the community to come witness some great basketball so close to home.

"We have one ticket price for all day, so come in and watch as much as you want," he said.

Tickets are \$8 for single-day admission. A tournament pass good for all 32 games is \$25. Tickets are available at the window or online at www.hcholidayclassic.com.


