Trustees: Ryan proposal still too dense

Board wants development with fewer than 200 units, IDOT's OK for turn lane on Adams

Before the Hinsdale Village Board will refer Ryan Companies' plan for a senior living facility on Ogden Avenue to the village's plan commission, density and traffic concerns will have to be addressed.

That's the message trustees sent to Dave Erickson, Ryan Companies' vice president of real estate development, after listening Tuesday night to Erickson outline the third and latest version of a proposal to redevelop almost 33 acres at Ogden and Adams Street owned by the Institute of Basic Life Principles.

Ryan Companies presented its first plan for a 330,000-square foot, 262-unit complex to the village board in January of 2020. A revised concept went to the plan commission in June of last year, but the company temporarily suspended its request in July. The firm was back before the village board with a new iteration last September but withdrew it in October after residents and trustees offered strong objections.

"Over the last 19 months, we have been listening and adjusting and listening and adjusting," Erickson said.

The number of total units has been reduced from 267 to 245, and the main building is now 40,000 square feet smaller, he said. Changing the building's orientation has provided greater setbacks along Ogden Avenue, increasing them from 50 feet to 114 feet and even 181 feet in some areas.

"The view from Ogden Avenue — it's going to appear much smaller," he said.

The new plan also calls for a 12-acre park with 10 public parking spaces and a pedestrian path along Adams Street.

"If and when something gets developed to the north, we'd provide that pedestrian connection to the space," Erickson said.

The developer would like to add a left turn lane on Adams for drivers looking to exit the property and head east on Ogden Avenue.

"We'll work with IDOT to get that approved," Erickson said.

The company will waive the facility's membership fee for the first year for Hinsdale residents, saving

them \$4,000 to \$15,000, he said. He also pointed to an internship partnership with Hinsdale High School District 86 as another benefit of the development. The \$100 million private investment in the village will provide \$20 million in property tax revenue over the next 20 years to District 86 and Community Consolidated Elementary District 181 without generating any additional students.

"We are proud to present this plan," he said. "We feel like it has improved significantly since the fall. We feel like it is respectful to the neighbors.

"We respectfully ask for your referral to the plan commission," he added. "We would really like to get in the process and get to the plan commission and that public hearing."

Village President Tom Cauley was the first to respond, saying he supports a senior living facility as an appropriate use of the site. But the 6- to 8-percent reduction in density is not enough.

"I was thinking something like a 30- to 40-percent reduction," he said. "I do think it's just too dense."

The left-turn lane is a critical part of the plan, he said, indicating he would like to see IDOT agree to the lane before the village would approve the development.

"I just don't think we punt on it and say, 'I hope it works out,' " he said.

When asked about allowing ingress and egress only off Ogden, Erickson said Ryan Companies asked IDOT about the possibility.

"They don't want additional curb cuts there," he said.

Other village board members agreed they support the concept of a senior living facility at the site. Trustee Michelle Fischer said it would be nice to be able to transition a parent from independent to assisted living to memory care in town, if necessary.

"I think there's just some nuances we have to figure out, especially traffic," she said.

Residents who attended the meeting — many of whom stood with protest signs outside village hall before it began — were not happy with the revised proposal, either.

Eric Missil, a resident of Chval Drive in Oak Brook, said the building will be three times the size of a Home Depot or Lowe's.

"That's nuts," he said. "We don't want a building that big."

Robert Ludwig, who lives on Bonnie Brae in Hinsdale, said the property is a treasure to the western suburbs and encouraged trustees to think of its best possible use.

"I don't have the solution but I know there are alternatives," he said

Trustees are scheduled to vote on whether to refer the project to the plan commission at their Aug. 10 meeting.

ONCE UPON A TIME

MEETING ROUNDUP

Hinsdale Village Board

Among other action at their July 13 meeting, trustees:

- agreed to issue almost \$3.1 million in general obligation bonds to refinance a \$5 million 2012 bond issue at a lower rate, saving residents an estimated \$154,875
- listened as Village President Tom Cauley read a proclamation declaring July Parks and Recreation Month, noting that "parks and recreation are vitally important to establishing and maintaining the quality of life in our communities, ensuring the health of all citizens and contributing to the economic and environmental well-being" of the community and the region.
- voted unanimously to create a new class of liquor license classification for restaurants that serve only breakfast and lunch, such as Yia Yia's and Egg Harbor Cafe, to sell liquor from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Currently the liquor code allows restaurants to serve alcohol to patrons from 11 a.m. to midnight on Friday and Saturday and from 11 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. on Sunday through Thursday.
- approved a temporary increase in police officer staffing so a new officer can be hired for an expected vacancy. The force currently has a 30-year veteran who is eligible to retire at any time, Police Chief Brian King said. It takes eight full months to get an officer through testing, into the police academy and through the field training program.

Counties report no new COVID-19 cases

No new Hinsdale residents appear to have tested positive for COVID-19 over the past week.

The DuPage County Health Department reported three fewer cases than it did last week, and the Cook County Health Department reported no new cases.

That brings the total number of reported cases in the village to 1,827, compared to 1,830 last week.

Amita Hinsdale Hospital had no confirmed COVID-19 patients and no patients await-


ing test results as of Monday, a spokesman said.

The rolling seven-day positivity rate for Region 8, which includes DuPage County, was 1.5 percent on Saturday, compared to 1.1 percent a week prior.

Illinois has administered more than 12.8 million doses of vaccines. An average of 20,794 doses are being administered daily, compared to about 20,182 last week. More than 58 percent of DuPage County residents are fully vaccinated.

Fund in man's memory benefits ill pets

Zach Leathers Medical Fund covers expenses for most severe cases at the humane society

Sultan the German shepherd was hit by a car last November, leaving him with a broken front left leg. It was left untreated for months and, by the time he was taken in by Aurora Animal Care & Control and subsequently handed over to the Hinsdale Humane Society, the leg was infected.

Addressing the injury previously would have stretched the humane society beyond its financial means. But thanks to the newly created Zach Leathers Emergency Medical Fund, Sultan's leg was removed and his life sayed.

"We were able to do the amputation, and Sultan is now up for adoption, doing great and hoping to find his forever home," said Jacki Rossi, the humane society's business development director.

Sultan's story is one of several heartwarming testaments to the fund's impact. It was established last month in memory of local resident and animal lover Zach Leathers to help provide care for prospective pets with special medical needs that have been taken in by the humane society's Tuthill Family Pet Rescue & Resource Center

Leathers, a 2008 graduate of Hinsdale Central High School, passed away in August 2014 at the age of 24. His mom, Winnie, said in a press release that Zach would often hop on his bike and ride to the animal shelter to look at the residents.

"Zach was always the one volunteering to bring the critters home from his class for the summer," Winnie Leathers related when the memorial fund was unveiled June 6. "Our house was the resort for all those animals."

Specifically, monies from the fund are to be used to

- allow the humane society to respond in a timely, urgent manner to an animal with great need so no animal will wait for emergency care
- help offset the cost of diagnostic radiographs, heartworm treatment, corrective and emergency surgeries, specialized diagnostic assessments and eye care, and laboratory testing for the special needs animals received
- provide resources for volunteer foster households who are critical in providing a quiet space for the animals to heal
- purchase surgical supplies and medications for the dogs and cats that are spayed/neutered for rescue groups and for other shelters, which average about 50 per month
- underwrite support for partner organizations when they are in need in keeping with the belief that a community is stronger when working together

Dr. Kristin Tvrdik, the humane society's medical director and staff veterinarian, said the fund will alleviate the scramble that occurs when urgent cases arise.

"Because pets often come to us in need of special medical help, this fund will help us provide immediate care

without worrying about having to raise funds for the care that they need," she said. "It will offset the costs of special treatments and surgeries that might be required."

Tvrdik shares another success story in a video posted on the humane society's website, recounting the saga of Paco the stray cat who arrived from Chicago Animal Care and Control with an injured back left leg.

"He had a chronic injury to the hip joint, where the hip was very uncomfortable. His knee was also affected," Tyrdik said.

Treatment would undoubtedly require resources the humane society couldn't cover on its own.

"We were able to get him the care he needed through an orthopedic specialist to determine that amputation was the best option for Paco. He gets along fantastic on three legs," she related.

"We would not have had the availability (to do that) as fast as we did without the Zach Leathers Emergency Medical Fund."


Rossi said the fund affords the humane society a more effective fundraising tool to cover these kinds of services.

"A lot of people that have utilized our local clinic have been a big outlet for donations to (the fund)," she said. "It helps with those cases that we get in that obviously we wouldn't have planned for."

A total of four animals have been treated in just the few weeks since it launched, Rossi reported.

"It's just such a beautiful way to honor Zach," she said.

Hinsdale woman meets youth in the midst of pain

Nancy Parkinson has learned that helping children heal from the loss of a loved one is less about leading and more about listening.

"Really what you're there for is to just normalize things and to help them feel like they're not the only one this has happened to," said Parkinson, a volunteer group facilitator for Buddy's Place childhood grief program. "You're not the therapist for these kids."

Buddy's Place is a dimension of Pillars Community Health, which is celebrating 100 years of providing services in Chicago's west and southwest suburbs. Buddy's Place is celebrating its own milestone this year — its 20th anniversary.

Through both monthly support groups and eight-week sessions in the spring and fall, Buddy's Place comes alongside youth ages 4-18 to support them and their families through bereavement.

Parkinson, who lost her mom as a teen and saw her sister become a widowed mother of young children, makes sure not to inject her own experience in the discussion. Conversations are aimed at unlocking participants' feelings and receive them with a non-judgmental ear

"Your point is not to ask a question and want an answer from that kid. It's really just to throw things out that might trigger them to express a thought," Parkinson said.

Sometimes the result is silence. And that's OK.

"To be comfortable with quiet," she said of an important skill she and other facilitators acquire. "Your job is to give them the physical space and the mental space to share what they want to share."

Parkinson half-joked that, as an empty-nester, these strategies came too late. "There are a lot of tools in this toolkit I could have used 20 years ago," she lamented.

Parkinson previously worked as a speech pathologist, meeting husband Tony — a native of western Illinois — while employed by a hospital in Davenport, Iowa. She also worked at Hinsdale and La Grange hospitals after moving here.

A few years ago, having retired for family reasons, she was seeking a way to serve the community and saw a notice for Buddy's Place. "I just was looking for something else to do, a little more of an endeavor." Parkinson said.

After a comprehensive training program, she worked primarily with teenagers. When approached about facilitating preschool- and kindergarten-age groups in the last year, Parkinson worried whether she could engage them. Her concerns were quickly allayed.

"They expressed just as deep feelings as the teenagers. And, in some ways, they're a little more uninhibited," she said.

At the close of each eight-week session, a ceremony is held where participants exchange rocks and words of appreciation for one another. That's often when those who have been reticent up until then reveal the impact the group has had.

"Some of the kids who've said nothing come up with the most profound things about each of their co-group participants," Parkinson said.

"You feel like you're making good use of your time."

This year the NRPA is also shining the light on the local parks and recreation staff that develop fun and engaging ways to invite the public to make use of these community treasures with Park and Recreation Professionals Day tomorrow, July 16. This is a day to honor all the dedicated professionals who work tirelessly behind the scenes to provide the high-quality programs and infrastructure residents expect.

The services that park and recreation professionals provide are vital for our community — from protecting open space and natural resources to helping fight obesity and providing activities and resources for all people. This has been especially true throughout the pandemic.

Marcel Acosta, executive director of the National Capital Planning Commission in Washington D.C., captured the multi-dimensional benefits of parks in a recent interview with Urbanland.





Water rate restructure means small increase

After about six years with no rate hikes, most Hinsdale residents soon will see a slight increase in their water bills.

The estimated 1 percent increase for an average user will result from a restructuring of the water bill that is designed to keep water revenues at a more stable level throughout the year. Residents are billed every other month for water.

The new rate structure eliminates the charge of \$27.52 for up to three units and instead implements a \$15 flat fee that will be dedicated to infrastructure maintenance and improvements. The usage rate will drop from \$8.25 a unit to \$8 a unit up to 100 units per billing cycle. Residents who use more than 100 units will be charged \$12.38 a unit.

"The benefit of having the fixed rate is you have this dependable source of revenue," said Trustee Matt Posthuma, chair of the board's administration and community affairs committee.

Posthuma noted that water rate increases often drive water use down. "You don't get as much revenue as you might hope from the rate increase," he said.

The \$15 fee will generate \$530,000 a year, and the premium rate is expected to bring in an additional \$220,000 a year. A typical household of four that uses 30 units every two months currently pays \$287.85. Under the proposed rate structure, the resident would pay \$291, an increase of \$3.15.

The village has had an average annual shortfall of \$706,000 in the water and

sewer program over the last four years, said Andrea Lamberg, finance director. The additional revenue will help the village address \$6 million work of water and sewer infrastructure improvements scheduled do be done over the next five years as part of the village's master infrastructure plan.

Village President Tom Cauley said for some time the village's general fund has been subsidizing water main repairs but that this new rate structure would help the system be self-sustaining.

"The money is going to go the water system," he said. "It's not going to go to anything else.

Trustees discussed the rate increase when they met Tuesday and are scheduled to vote on it at their Aug. 10 meeting.

Village, Tollway still responding to June flood in northeast Hinsdale

Representatives of the Tollway Authority were on hand at Tuesday night's Hinsdale Village Board meeting to talk to residents who had concerns about flooding that occurred in the northeast part of town June 26.

Village President Tom Cauley reported that he sent a letter Friday to residents who might have been impacted.

"In the letter, I indicated the village staff is working daily with the Tollway to restore village infrastructure, roads and sidewalks that were impacted by the flooding event," he said. "I indicated the village is advocating on residents' behalf to ensure that residents are adequately compensated for any flood-related damages

they may have suffered."

He also forwarded a copy of a July 9 letter sent by Manar Nashif, acting chief engineering officer for the Tollway, to the village. The letter states the Tollway's general contractor "immediately inspected drainage paths and pumps to address obstructions and other issues.

"As a result of that inspection, a temporary ramp was removed in an effort to prevent possible obstructions during future rain events," the letter states.

Residents who need to contact the Tollway regarding damage claims should call (630) 246-2930 or send an email to 294tristate@getipass.com. Claim forms also are available on the village website at https://www.vil-

lageofhinsdale.org, Cauley said. He encouraged residents to copy the village at hinsdaleoutreach@villageofhinsdale.org on all emails.

The Tollway's risk management department will coordinate with the contractor responsible for addressing the claim. Nashif wrote, and the residents will be notified of the status of their claims on an individual basis.

Lanyea Griffin, deputy chief of program implementation at the Illinois Tollway, and John Sadler, owner's representative from Omega and Associates, met with about half a dozen residents who attended the meeting.

The Tollway is very concerned about this issue," Cauley said. "They have been very cooperative.'

IT TAKES A VILLAGE

JOHN FINNELL, SUPERINTENDENT OF PARKS AND FORESTRY

Hinsdale has been a Tree City USA community for nearly 30 years, due in no small part to John Finnell.

As superintendent of parks and forestry for the village of Hinsdale, Finnell leads an eight-member team that is charged with the care of almost 15,000 village-owned trees.

"The village is like living in a park," said Finnell, who is in his 15th year as a part of the Hinsdale village staff. Having long admired Hinsdale, its trees and the village's commitment to caring for its urban forest, he didn't hesitate when the opportunity to join the team presented itself.

"When the position opened up, I jumped at it," he said.

Growing up on the east coast, Finnell earned a bachelor's degree in forestry from the University of Massachusetts. Following graduation, he traveled to Paraguay as a member of the Peace Corps. Finnell spent more than three years helping the farmers there to diversify their cash crops, adding tea, citrus trees and trees for firewood to their list of income sources.

In Paraguay and many parts of

the world, trees are an important part of the economy. But Finnell said even trees that don't provide food, materials or firewood have an important role to play. They have the ability to make people happier and more calm.

"That's an important part of the quality of life we provide," Finnell said

Of the eight people on the forestry staff, five, including Finnell, are certified arborists. Finnell said that speaks to the village's commitment to its trees and the benefits they hold for Hinsdale's residents.

Staff keeps a careful inventory of every tree, tracking each tree's health and pruning them as needed. As trees die, staff carefully selects replacements.

"We don't just order them. We want trees that are good the day we plant them and that are going to be good 10 or 15 years down the road," Finnell said.

"We've worked diligently to save our American elm population," Finnell said. While many communities lost their elms to Dutch elm disease, many of Hinsdale's survived.

When the emerald ash borer

threatened the village's 1,400 ash trees several years ago, Finnell said he and the rest of the forestry team did all they could to preserve as many trees as possible.

"The vast majority of them were removed due to infestation," he said, but thanks to their efforts, about 400 healthy ash trees are still growing on village property.

The village's next tree battle likely will be with the Asian longhorn beetle, Finnell said. Although none have been spotted yet, he and the rest of the forestry staff are on the lookout and ready to respond at the first sign of trouble.

"We rely on our residents to call us if they see something unusual or of concern," Finnell said.

Likewise, Hinsdaleans know they can call on Finnell and the forestry staff to answer questions about their trees.

Whether his day is spent preparing a park for a special event or cleaning up after a storm, Finnell said no two days are alike as superintendent of parks and forestry.

"There isn't a normal day," he said. And that's what keeps it interesting.

Having played the lead Ugly in the troupe's spring production of "Honk!", Cole said he's learned how to prepare.

"The memorization (of lines) is not too bad. I'm pretty set to go,"

he commented.

He can't wait for opening night. "I like the acting, singing and dancing," Cole said, naming the song "Oh, Biology" as his favorite number. "I'm excited for all my friends and family to see it."

Don Smith and Paula Taylor, Stage Door's co-founders and artistic directors, said the music was composed by Tom Kitt and Brian Yorkey, who won the Pulitzer Prize for their score for the musical "Next to Normal."

"Freaky Friday has been a really fun show to continue to bring live theater back this year after our creative minds were cooped up for so long," Smith said.

Taylor said the plot gives actors — and audience members — a view from different lenses.

"It's actually a neat concept because it allows both characters to walk a mile in the other's shoes and appreciate the trials, tribulations and lives that the other has to lead," she said.

Tess McArdle, a junior at Hinsdale Central doing her 17th Stage Door production, plays Ellie, who becomes Katherine. She recognized parallels in the show to her own life.

"I see similarities between the script and my own relationship with my mom," she said. "I think it's great show for families, especially moms and daughters.

McArdle is happy community theater can welcome audiences again.

"I love coming to rehearsal and seeing all my friends and getting to put on performances for other people," she said.

Larson, who has been a Stage Door cast member since third grade, agreed.

"We took a break, but now it's back and even more exciting, and we have a lot of enthusiasm for the show," she remarked. "I'm hoping people can come away with a sense of family and love."

Smith said everyone will find something to appreciate in the show.

"It's such a wonderful story about parent/child dynamics. It's also a perfect mix of the three main on stage theatre skills: the vocals are great with some intricate harmonies, the dancing is fun and upbeat, and the acting of the characters really pulls at your heart-strings," he said. "We can't wait to show it to an audience."

Pair paddles to second-place finish

Fuchs, Thomspon just miss winning Midwest championship at competition in Ohio

Hinsdale has no river running through it — or even a large body of water within its village limits. Yet the suburb is home not only to its own rowing club, but to the 2021 Midwest Rowing Championships' second-place team.

Recent Hinsdale Central graduates Alex Fuchs and Christian Thompson recently rowed their way to the finals on Dillon Lake in Nashport, Ohio. The Midwest Rowing Championships brought teams from several states to compete in a variety of events. Fuchs and Thompson represented the Hinsdale Community Rowing Club's Chicago Rowing Foundation West in pairs.

Along with the rest of the 30-some-member Hinsdale team, Fuchs and Thompson practiced two hours a day, six days a week to prepare for the season's competitions, rowing on the DesPlaines River just south of Hinsdale.

Thompson said rowing isn't a sport for someone who wants

to stand out as the star player. It requires every member working together to move the boat quickly and efficiently through the water.

"It's a team sport that you'll be good at if you have good teamwork," Thompson said.

"If you don't try, the whole boat will fail. Everyone relies on one another."

Rowing also requires leg strength, a strong core and cardiovascular endurance, Thompson and Fuchs said.

"Eighty-five percent of your power is going to be your legs," said Fuchs, who supplements his rowing practices with regular trips to the gym.

Fuchs, who joined the club at the suggestion of a friend after his freshman year at Hinsdale Central High School, said rowing taught him to push past his limits. Following the Midwest championships, Fuchs headed to Florida for another rowing competition, where he and his partner placed sixth in pairs.

Club and independent teams traveled from all over the country, including from both coasts, to race.

"The competition was really

good," Fuchs said.

Teams in Hinsdale train in groups of eight, four and two and compete throughout the spring and fall rowing seasons. However, low water levels on the river interfered this spring.

"Only the small boats got to practice during the spring season," Thompson said. He and Fuchs were part of a four-person team, as well, but had to go to Chicago to practice.

The season is over for Fuchs and Thompson, but their rowing days are not. Both said they will find time in the coming weeks to get back on the water, just for fun and exercise.

Rowing takes plenty of energy and discipline, Thompson said, but it's not always about hard work.

"You can see the wildlife as you row past," he said, and enjoy the changing scenery along the river.

There's no rowing team at Indiana University, which both Fuchs and Thompson will attend this fall. But both said they hope to find an opportunity to get back out on the water and continue enjoying the sport.

Hinsdale Community Rowing

What is it?

A sculling club for those interested in recreational and competitive sculling. The club also is committed to stewardship of the DesPlaines River and holds an annual clean-up day to remove plastics from the water.

Who is welcome?

Hinsdale Community Rowing welcomes middle and high school boys and girls from throughout the western suburbs to learn the sport and compete. No previous experience is required.

Where does it meet?

The club's boathouse is at 9951 S. Madison St. in Lemont, about a 30-minute drive from Hinsdale.

When is the next event?


