

## Summer road construction is on schedule

Despite a slightly later start than usual and several rainy days in June, summer road construction is proceeding on schedule.

"Right now, all the work has been utility installation," village engineer Dan Deeter said. "Unless it's a thunderstorm, they can work through the rain. They can dig a ditch in the rain."

This year's list of improvement projects is significantly smaller than last summer's and affects fewer major thoroughfares.

"This is about half the size of last year, so it shouldn't be as big an impact on residents," Deeter said. "We are scheduling some things to avoid the heavy use times."

In addition to considering the time of day at which the work is done, planners also considered whether to start the projects early or late in the season. Work on Grant Street between Eighth and Ninth began right after school ended.

"We're trying to get that done before school starts up again," he said.

The reconstruction of Hinsdale Avenue from Stough to Monroe will be one of the last projects to be completed.

"We're leaving that open until the swimming pool season is over," Deeter said.

Next week, work will begin on the streets and parking lots at Katherine Legge Memorial Park. Access will be limited to parents with kids attending programs at the Children's Montessori Language Academy.

"For that week, we'd prefer if the dog walkers and Frisbee players and paddle (tennis) players park somewhere else," Deeter said. "There will be a lot of

activity to get the interior roads and the parking lots resurfaced."

He suggested park users look for street parking on 60th Street across County Line Road.

Drivers on Garfield Avenue might have encountered some detours this week, as storm sewers are being replaced on North Street from Washington to Garfield and a portion of Garfield from North to Ravine. There was a possibility the work would be completed by the time this article was published, Deeter said.

In addition to the work approved earlier this year, village officials plan to address 10 additional streets at an estimated cost of \$418,000. All of the work is resurfacing, except for Garfield, which will be patched.

The streets are

- Allmen Avenue from Ninth to the south end
- Chestnut Street from Vine to Lincoln
- Clay Street from Maple to Chicago
- Grant Street from North to Hickory
- Minneola Street from County Line to Justina
- Quincy Street from Maple to Chicago Avenue
- Ravine Road from County Line to Phillippa
- Vine Street from Maple to Chicago Avenue
- 600 block of Washington/Lincoln alley (portions)
- Garfield from First to 55th

The village had budgeted \$6.8 million for summer road work, and the bids approved in April came in at \$6.2 million. The additional work, which trustees are slated to approve July 16, will bring the total to slightly more than \$6.6 million.

# Travel holds lessons for Hinsdale family

*Three-week summer vacation gave Roberts clan taste of four very different destinations*

For the children of John and Claudine Roberts, travel is as much a part of their education as homework — and much more fun.

“You’re teaching your children they’re part of the global community,” Claudine said of the many lessons learned from exploring other places and cultures.

This summer’s Roberts family adventure featured a celebration of John’s parents’ 50th anniversary aboard a small cruise ship in the Aegean Sea of Greece. But the Hinsdale family took the long

way to get there, making stops in Iceland, Norway and Barcelona before finally arriving in Athens.

Iceland was a bucket-list item for the Roberts family.

“It was an easy trip but a world away,” Claudine said.

John, Claudine and children Jackie (17), Julianne (15) and Jake (11) visited the Blue Lagoon and took in the beauty of Iceland before heading to Norway.

“We stayed in a quiet, peaceful, remote place up in the hills,” Claudine said. They shared fires in the evening, saunas during the day and just enjoyed spending some quiet time together — something

that doesn’t happen often for this busy family.

“We enjoyed hygge,” she said, speaking of the feeling of calm and coziness that is central to the Danish culture.

Experiencing other cultures is a big part of every Roberts family excursion, Claudine said. And the more cultures her family experiences, the more they see that despite peoples’ differences, they are all very much the same.

“That’s the real lesson,” Claudine said. “We’re teaching them that the world is really a pretty small place.”

The lessons continued as the family met up with John’s parents and

brother in Athens.

For more than a week they cruised the Aegean Sea aboard a small ship. The size of the ship meant it could port in places that are inaccessible to larger vessels. Each time the ship made a stop, the Roberts children were the first to disembark, eager to explore whatever that locale had to discover, Claudine said.

The ship stopped frequently to allow passengers to explore Grecian towns and swim in the sea’s crystal-clear water, which also held lessons for Claudine’s children.

“The water was just so clean and clear and deep,” said Claudine, which was a reminder to the children of the importance of caring for the earth.

The ship also stopped in Ethisis, Turkey, on its way back to Athens.

But the Roberts clan wasn’t done yet.

“When we go, we go hard,” Claudine said.

They followed the cruise with a couple of days in Budapest, where they soaked in the warm water of the Turkish baths before heading back to Barcelona for the last days of their nearly three-week excursion.

John is the designer of the family’s worldly outings.


“He’d be a travel agent if he wasn’t an attorney,” Claudine said.

He ended this summer’s family’s trip with a taste of home, surprising the family with an Eddie Vedder concert at one of the city’s Olympic venues. Vedder, a Chicago-area native, wore a Walter Peyton jersey as he performed.

“Even though we were in Barcelona, we felt like such Chicagoans,” Claudine said, with the concert reminding the family once again of how small the world can be.

The family’s next excursion likely will be to Central America, where they’ll explore the Panama Canal and yet another culture and way of life. But Claudine said no matter where the family goes or how far they travel, every trip ends with one final lesson.

“Home is pretty great,” she said.

# Central grads join talents in web series

*Mockumentary gives friends opportunity to showcase talents in front of, behind camera*

Laura Nelson and Evelyn Landow weren't gardeners before they created their web series, "Garden Doc."

"We're still not," Landow said.

The setting for the friends' first artistic endeavor together was chosen strictly out of convenience.

"We have ourselves a 48-hour deadline to come up with an idea for a collaboration," Landow said. "We had to work with what we had."

And what they had was a garden. Or rather, Landow's mother had a garden.

Shot at Landow's home in Hinsdale, the resulting mockumentary is presented in six short episodes that are comedic, heavily improvised and frequently break the barrier between actor and audience that's sometimes known as the fourth wall.

The two Hinsdale Central graduates met while participating on the Central forensics team. After going their separate ways — Nelson to study drama and Landow to study film making — they reunited in 2018 at a concert by Kelly Hannemann, also a Central graduate and a mutual friend.

It didn't take long for the two to reconnect and to decide to combine their talents into a project.

"What we initially thought would be a fun experiment

for ourselves turned into a nine-month-long project involving artists from high school, college and the Chicago theater community," Nelson said.

They wrote all six episodes together, with Nelson in front of the camera and Landow, for the most part,

behind it. Much of the dialogue is improvised, which allowed Nelson to use some of the skills she learned while taking classes at Improv Olympics in Chicago.

Nelson said the character she created in "Garden Doc" has parallels to herself.

"She dreams big, she's

very enthusiastic and a little oblivious," Nelson said.

"Garden Doc" takes the viewer in unexpected directions and introduces the audience to a colorful bunch of characters. Kelly Hannemann and her band, Aunt Kelly, provides music for the show.

The result of their collaboration is far from what the two originally set out to create.

"I wanted to make something super serious," Landow said.

But lately, comedy has assumed a lead role in her creative endeavors, perhaps due to the time she's spending helping out at Second City's Harold Ramis Film School.

"I think there's more comedy in our future," said Landow, who has big hopes for this creative partnership. For now, she's just happy to collaborate with Nelson and the other talented folks who have made their first project possible.

"It's exciting to see the response from people we went to high school with," as well as the encouragement they've received from others in the Chicago theater scene, Landow said.

Meanwhile, Landow is doing freelance film and editing work and working toward the release of an album. Recorded with some fellow Hinsdale Central alumni, the recording will be titled "The Mirror Within."

Nelson, who works part-time for Stafford Communications in Hinsdale, is currently performing in a play called "The Killer" at Trap Door Theatre in Chicago.



# Teens help open doors for striving peers

Julia Paulman and Ben Rasmussen of Hinsdale were moved by what they heard at a Greenhouse Scholars committee meeting, reflections from a talented but under-resourced young woman from Waukegan who had no one to help her navigate the college application process.

"She didn't have any counselors, any parents that had experienced what she was trying to do," Rasmussen related.

Fortunately she found Greenhouse Scholars, a nonprofit organization in Illinois and three other states that provides personal, financial and professional support to exceptional young adults and prepares them to serve as leaders, role models and change agents.

Paulman and Rasmussen, both rising Hinsdale Central juniors and members of Greenhouse's student planning committee, were compelled to engage more of their peers in the agency's work. Their brainchild: Scavenger Challenge for Scholars.

"We wanted to involve as many kids and young adults as we could, since it's a teen run

event," Rasmussen said. "A lot of Greenhouse Scholars are our age or just a little older."

At 3 p.m. Thursday, July 11, teams of four or five youth will gather at Hinsdale's Burns Field in an odyssey to complete tasks including taking unusual team photos, finding or fashioning innovative items and cracking a code to decipher a mystery message (see Page 22 for details).

The hunt is a precursor — or an alternative — to a more formal evening fundraiser at Butterfield Country Club, which they admit is not the most young adult-friendly gathering. "We were just thinking of an interactive thing to do before the night event that kids can do," Paulman said.

With the scavenger hunt extending to 10 p.m., Rasmussen hopes participants will pour their creative juices into meeting the challenges. The tasks reflect the life hurdles Greenhouse Scholars have to overcome, he suggested, such as poverty, violence and severe family circumstances.

"It was just really eye-opening to see all these kids that actually go

through the program," Rasmussen remarked. "I feel like (those youth) should have just as much opportunity as someone who lives in a more wealthy area." Paulman said preparations for the scavenger challenge began in February.

"I think it's really important to take time out of your day to schedule things like this," Paulman said.

Rasmussen values the ability to give others a hand up, saying it doesn't require a huge investment. But he admitted summertime events are a hard sell.

"It's a tough time to get a lot of people to go," Rasmussen admitted. "But people have been very supportive and, even if they've been unable to take time out to come, they've donated or helped in a different way."

The woman whose story inspired them is now a college sophomore with a vision of establishing a Boys & Girls Club in her hometown as a way of paying her opportunity forward.

"She wants to assist more people on their journey," Paulman said.

But that was then and here's what we have now: Vietnam as a vacation paradise.



## OBITUARIES

### William Henry Webster Sr.

William Henry Webster Sr., 98, died June 26, 2019, at his retirement home in Little Rock, Ark., after a brief illness.

William was born in 1920 in Chicago, the second son of William Henry and Mary Warren Webster. He grew up in Hinsdale and was active in Boy Scouts (an Eagle at 14), National Honor Society and school musicals. He was awarded nine athletic letters and was class president.

He attended Cornell University in Ithaca, N.Y., where he played varsity basketball and football, and was a member of Chi Psi fraternity. Having attended CMTC at Ft. Sheridan and college ROTC, he volunteered for pilot training in the Army Air Corps and received his wings and commission on Dec. 12, 1941. After stateside training in attack aviation, he went overseas in September 1942 to Australia and New Guinea, where he flew 42 combat missions in A-20 (Havoc) and B-25 (Billy Mitchell) bombers with the 8th Squadron, 3rd Attack Gp., 5th Air Force. He was shot down twice but survived each time with only minor injuries and burns. He was awarded the Silver Star, two Air Medals, two Purple Hearts and six campaign citations. After he completed his tour of duty, he was sent home in December 1943. After recovering from malaria, he spent the next two years with assignments as B-25 instructor pilot at Randolph Field, Base Operations Office at Waco and Aircrew Personnel Officer at Training Command Headquarters in Ft. Worth. He was released from active duty as a major in June 1946.

He began his business career in July 1946 in the securities business and later the securities side of banking at National Bank of Commerce in San Antonio. With the strong encouragement of his employer, he continued his flying in the active Air Force Reserves as a squadron commander in Military Air Transport Service in C-47s and C-54s, including two summer tours in the Berlin Airlift. Recalled to active duty for the Korean War, he flew C-54s and C-97s as a squadron commander in Pacific Division of MATS. Released from active duty in July 1953, he returned to his banking career in San Antonio where he attended night law school at St. Mary's and three summer sessions at Rutgers Graduate School, New Brunswick, N.J. He was made Senior Trust Officer at NBC in 1958, while simultaneously maintaining his flying proficiency as deputy director of operations for Pacific Division, MATS, flying C-97s and C-124's.

In January 1961 he moved to Louisville, Ky., to take the job as the executive vice president and senior trust officer of Citizens Fidelity Bank. Again, he was encouraged by the bank's board of directors to stay active in the Air Force Reserves by accepting the appointment as wing commander of the Kentucky Air National Guard's 123rd Tac Recon Wing, involving almost 2,800 officers and men, four Groups and 50 RB-57's and later RF 101 jets. His promotion to brigadier general was confirmed by the U.S. Senate

in December 1964. After 25 years of active duty and active reserve service, he retired to inactive status in 1966 as a command pilot with more than 8,000 hours of military flying in multi-engine bombers and transport planes.

In January 1968 he moved to Orlando to become the co-founder and president of Trust Company of Florida. When it was bought out by a national bank, he and his family moved to Little Rock in August 1969 to become head of the trust department of Union National Bank, where he served 16 years until mandatory retirement moved him aside. The next day he took a job as associate director of the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas and served there from 1986-2010.

His business honors include serving as American Institute of Banking Instructor in various trust courses, two-year term as president of Central Arkansas Estate Planning Council, and a three-year term (1978-81) on the executive committee of the Trust Division of American Bankers Association, the first Arkansan to be so selected.

In his 50 years in Little Rock, his civic activities included serving as chairman of Pulaski Co. Chapter of American Red Cross and treasurer of several organizations: Arkansas Symphony Orchestra, Arkansas Opera Theater, St. Joseph's Home for Children and the Cammack Village Fire Department. He also was a member of the administrative board of St. Paul United Methodist Church (and a choir member there for 29 years) and Rotary Club 99.

An active sports enthusiast, he continued his interest in basketball and football after his playing days were over by officiating high school, college and military base football and basketball games from 1946-60. Also, as a member of Country Club of Little Rock, his competitive golfing won him the senior championship there for four years in the early 1980s.

He married Betty Alice Baldwin of Muskogee, Okla., in May 1942, and they were confirmed travelers with more than 50 trips to foreign countries. In 2006, he self-published "The Fabulous Future Behind Us," his account of their 60 years of travels at home and abroad.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Betty, who passed away in 2008; and by his son, Michael W. Webster.


He is survived by his son, William H. Webster Jr.; his daughter, Lynn Webster; and one granddaughter, Celeste Oram.

# ASK AN EXPERT

CHARLES ZAYED & EMMIT FLYNN, ENTREPRENEURS

## How did the two of you start your business?

When Charles Zayed contacted his friend and fellow Hinsdale Central graduate Emmitt Flynn about the idea of starting a clothing company, Flynn admits he took a moment to mull the idea over.

As a college freshman, he already had a lot on his plate. But he also loved the idea of putting his lifelong love of art to work in a way that might also put some money in his pocket.

Less than a year ago, Zayed and Flynn launched a joint venture known as Awful Cloth. The company sells shirts, hats and other items that bear Flynn's original designs.

"I hand draw every one," he said.

Flynn's interest in becoming a business owner in college grew from a desire to put his artistic skills to work. For Zayed, it was about pizza.

As a freshman living in a dorm at Indiana University, he was tired of spending money on pizza. So Zayed invested in a quesadilla maker. Soon, the smell of his cheesy concoctions drew hungry

neighbors to his room — neighbors willing to pay for his creations.

That sparked something, Zayed said. He quickly grew to love the idea of making something that someone else wanted to buy, and soon, Awful Cloth was born.

With Flynn attending Fordham University in New York and Zayed in the Midwest, Awful Cloth's two-person executive meetings are held via Facetime. Time zones and busy schedules can make it tricky, but both make Awful Cloth a priority. Between meetings, Zayed is researching new products and marketing techniques, much of which pertains to social media.

"Our demographic is 16- to 24-year-olds. That's the best way to reach them," he said.

Zayed looks back to his high school days as his inspiration for the clothing company. As social chair at Hinsdale Central, he once came to school in a white T-shirt that embellished in black marker. The message on the shirt was in support of a football player who had found his way into trouble.

When school personnel made his change his shirt, it sparked something in Zayed.

"The shirt thing really got to me, because that's how I expressed

myself," he said.

Now, people are supporting his creativity, one sweatshirt, T-shirt, hat or sticker purchase at a time.

Friends occasionally send Zayed and Flynn photos of people they spot wearing their products. And a recent incident on a plane let Flynn know his company was more than a creative venture between friends.

As he sat sketching a potential design for a new shirt, the woman sitting next to him asked, "You know Awful?"

"I am Awful," Flynn responded.

Zayed said the company name draws on the double meaning of the word "awful."

"Awful means bad, but it also means inspiring and full of awe," he said.

And as long as his customers are buying his products, he's fine with them seeing it either way.

Flynn, who is studying political science, said he's not sure if he'll one day be a lawyer who designs apparel or an apparel designer with a law degree. One way or another, he expects Awful Cloth to be part of his life, and Zayed's life, for many years to come.

## Shakespeare's underdog

*First Folio presents 'Henry V' as its summer theater production*

Mayslake Peabody Estate in Oak Brook will transform into an epic field of battle next week, theatrically speaking.

First Folio presents Shakespeare's "Henry V," which tells the story of this English king, focusing on events immediately before and after the Battle of Agincourt in 1415, during the Hundred Years' War. To save his country and prove himself worthy of the crown, the brash king invades France, only to find himself facing an army 10 times the size of his own at the legendary Battle of Agincourt.

This will be director Hayley Rice's second time at the helm of this tale of heroism, romance and more, having directed an all-female cast at Chicago's City Lit Theater two years ago. First Folio co-founder and executive director David Rice — and Hayley's father — approached her about bringing it to the suburbs.

"I said yes, instantly yes!" Rice said. "It's such a large show, and it's such a complex show. I think (First Folio) is ideal because it's an outdoor space. The conventions of space there are a little looser, a little less defined."

In another boundary-crossing move, she enlisted the actor from her previous "Henry V" production to reprise the role: Diana Coates.

"What you need of Henry is a presence — a commanding presence that allows the audience to say, 'I would follow them into a war I know we're going to lose.'"

Coates exudes that quality while presenting audience members with a nontraditional person inhabiting the titular character.

"The minute you cast things in a way that the audience doesn't expect, the audience suddenly looks at the show in a new way," Rice said. "They're able to see it fresh and see things that they've never noticed before."

Coates said when the idea was proposed to her, she quickly accepted.

"After finishing it the first time around, I thought, 'This has to be done outside,'" Coates remarked, citing the freedom space affords for battle scenes and incorporating weaponry.

Playing a traditionally male role was not strange, she said. Shakespeare, of course, had men portray female characters in his stagings. But she said this co-ed production has challenged her approach in an unexpected way.

"It's forced me to kind of focus in even more on the similarities and not the differences, because the differences are obvious," she said. "What makes this person human, and what can I find in there that kind of grounds him and brings him down to earth for a modern-day audience?"

Coates, for her part, has definitely had to build her stamina, especially for the Battle of Agincourt.

"I think all of us are in a lot better shape now," she quipped. "There's a lot more that's being asked of me physically and emotionally."

She and Rice praised stage combat specialist Rachel Flesher for her choreography of the clash. Rice expects audiences to be dazzled by the action.

"She's done a really great job staging this battle and giving it a scope that I don't think we've seen before on this stage," she said.

Onlookers may even feel like they're in the fray, and the audience is also spoken to directly in Shakespearean style of breaching the so-called fourth wall.

"I think people are going to be surprised by how much they are involved. It's a bit more interactive, and I'm excited about that aspect," Coates said.

Projecting one's voice in an outdoor setting takes sound technique, Coates commented, particularly when speaking in Welsh, French and Cockney accents, among those featured in the fray.

"We've had a few lessons on making sure you're using your diaphragm and not your throat. It's not just about volume," she said.

Coates looks forward to delivering audiences a portrayal of a commanding king who is still dependent on the support of others to reach his goal.

"I hope they take away that no matter how strong or in control someone appears to be, everyone does need someone else to accomplish things and make it through situations," she said.

Rice is eager to reveal this version

of the well-traveled historical drama to theater-goers.

"There so many ways you can tell the same story, and some work and some don't," she said. "I enjoy talking to audience members later and hearing about things that I didn't even intend to put in the show. I love seeing what audiences pull away from that. They'll get what they get from it, and I cannot wait to hear what it is."

At the end, she aims to speak truth through the performance.

"I'm interested in reflecting the world I live in on the stage," Rice said.

Shows are at 8:15 p.m. Wednesdays to Sundays, July 10-Aug. 18, on the outdoor summer stage in the forest preserve at 1717 W. 31st St.

Tickets are \$34-\$44 for adults, \$29-\$39 for students and seniors, \$10 for children 13 and under and \$25 for preview shows (July 10-12).







## Future cheerleaders hone skills at camp

*Skyhawks program helps girls learn the basics of cheerleading — and have some fun, too*

Friday morning is the final session of Skyhawks cheerleading camp in Robbins Park, and Coach Katie and Coach Emma are leading a group of girls in a series of sprints, stretches and lunges.

Soon it's time to practice the cheer participants will perform later at the Skyhawks Flat Football Camp, which meets at the other end of the park. They've been working on the one-minute routine to "Cheerleader" by OMI all week.

"Find your spots," Emma Smith instructs the girls.

"Spread out! Find your windows," Katie Svensson adds.

The girls run through the routine without music so they can focus on remembering the next eight-count sequence and executing the moves cleanly.

"Remember that last one is a tuck jump, so our knees are coming into our chest," Smith tells the girls.

"When we say, 'Let's go Skyhawks!' be super loud," Svensson instructs, reminding the girls of the audience they will face in just a couple of hours.

The second run-through ends with a louder "Let's go Skyhawks!" and a more enthusiastic "woo!"

Now it's time to add the music. More practices follow, with the girls attempting to perform the routine without any prompts from their coaches.

Temperatures are climbing — it's been hot all week — and soon it's time for another water break. This one is extended with a game of "steal the pom." The girls cheer louder for their teammates than they do rehearsing, which Svensson brings to their attention.

"You guys are more excited about this game than cheerleading," she says.

But the games are an important part of keeping camp fun, Smith says — especially with participants who range in age from 12 to just 6.

"Three hours isn't a super long time, but it's a long time just to do cheerleading," she says.

When asked what they enjoy most about the camp, many girls pick the games.

"They get really competitive," says Sophia Mendez, who enrolled in the

camp with her sister, Olivia.

Others enjoy the opportunities they've gotten to create their own cheers. The girls are split into groups, Smith explains, and given three moves they must include. After some time to create the cheer and practice it, they perform for their peers.

"I'd say the most fun part is probably choreographing your own dance," Kendall Miller says.

After the break, it's time to get back to work. Smith reviews the different moves the girls have learned this week: high V, low V, T, broken T, right L, left L, daggers and candlesticks. Then she counts them off to do the jumps, namely pencil, X, tuck and toe touch.

"This one is in our dance," she says before they do a tuck jump. "It's

got to be really good."

Smith, who just finished her freshman year at the University of Denver, relies on her exposure to a variety of sports to lead the camp.

"My experience is mostly in soccer, but I've done a lot of coaching, which is why I'm doing this," she says. "Because it's a basic, beginning camp, it's nothing too crazy."

She enjoys watching the girls learn the routine she created and making up their own cheers.

"It's cool to see them get creative and add their own personality into their routines, too," she says.

Despite some very warm mornings, the girls have done a great job staying focused.

"I think they've done really well," she says. "The dance is pretty short

and we did that on purpose because we want them to learn it on their own and remember the steps without having to rely on Katie and me so much."

Svensson, a rising junior at NYU, enjoys the opportunity to create relationships with the campers.

"They're all so sweet," she says. "Honestly I love hanging out with them. I love the moment during the week when they come up to you and randomly give you a hug."

The girls, who are energetic and excited while practicing the routine, always get a little bit nervous when they have to cheer in front of the boys, Svensson notes.

"But it turns out really well," she adds. "They all do really well in the end."




