## Dogs now must be on leashes in Hinsdale

Residents soon will see fliers in town reminding them that all dogs now must be on a leash in public areas.

Trustees approved an amendment to the village code Tuesday that requires owners to leash their dogs, effective immediately. Previously the code required dogs to be restrained, which could mean on a leash or under voice command.

The ordinance also allows the police department to impound dogs that are involved in serious attacks on humans or on dogs,

cats or other domesticated animals until DuPage County Animal Services determines whether the dog is vicious. In the past, owners could pick up their dogs immediately after an incident.

The change does not mean normal nips and bites between dogs would have to be reported, Police Chief Brian King told trustees.

"That would not trigger this," he said. "It's based on the seriousness of the attack, the circumstances surrounding the attack. It's also based on the history of the animal."

Trustees first discussed the proposed changes May 7 and noted a woman was attacked last year by

three large dogs that were not on a leash after she picked up her small dog and held it over her head to protect it.

Police personnel reviewed four years' worth of data on dog bite incidents in the village and the incident mentioned above is the only one that would require county notification, King said.

Village staff has recommended a communication plan that involves sending a mailing to all registered dog owners on file, handing out fliers to businesses that provide services to dogs, posting fliers at the train station and village hall, providing information on social media and the village website and

including details in the eHinsdale electronic newsletter.

Trustee Neale Byrnes noted that some dog owners sent in letters opposed to leashing their pets and said he's tried to keep an open mind. Ultimately he voted to approve the changes.

"I'm a dog lover. I walk a dog every day," he said. "Every once in a while, I see a dog coming at us and I'm like, 'Oh, what's going on here.'"

The amendment, which does not affect off-leash hours at Katherine Legge Memorial Park, passed 4-0. Trustees Luke Stifflear and Laurel Haarlow were absent from the meeting.

# Diamond Lake a second home for Ushers

*Four generations of family have spent their summers enjoying a simpler life at the lake*

When the calendar hits June 1, Amy Usher starts feeling a little anxious.

Her internal clock is telling her it's time to do something she's done since she was a little girl — get in the car and make the 2 1/2 hour trip to Diamond Lake, Mich.


Amy's family has been vacationing at the lake since her grandfather bought a property there — which her parents now own — in 1937.

"Growing up I spent every summer at the lake. As soon as school let out, I went up there with my mother, stayed until the day before school started and came back," said the Hinsdale resident and Clarendon Hills native. "My kids are fourth generation on the lake."

The lake, which is about 120 miles from Chicago, initially was a popular summer home locale for residents

place for me to stay up there with the kids as much as we could," she said.

One of the main sources of entertainment for the family is the Diamond Lake Yacht Club, where their kids — Duncan, 18, Courtney, 16, Leo, 15, and Kirsten, 11 — learned to sail, swim, golf and play tennis.

"It keeps them busy, and through that they have lots of friends," Amy said. "They love to go there."

Other favorite activities are water skiing, fishing, watching fireworks on the Fourth of July and enjoying local produce.

"We love to pick and eat the local fruits," she said. "It's one of our favorite things to do."

Getting a boating license is a rite of passage at the lake — and one that comes at the tender age of 12.

"That sort of Independence you get in terms of being able to drive to your friends' houses is pretty neat," Amy said.

Her kids seem to love the time at the lake as much as she does.

"Our neighbors have a water trampoline and they let us go on it, so I like to swim out there," Kirsten said. She and Leo enjoy hanging out with friends and said they doesn't get homesick even though they are away for almost three months.

"It's been something I've done all my life," Leo said. "Since we have such good friends up there and there are so many things we can do, I doesn't feel strange. I don't really get homesick."

The family plans to travel to Norway this month, but Usher said they typically don't take summer vacations.

Summers at the lake have changed a bit as the kids have grown up and have more responsibilities here in Hinsdale. Duncan spent weekdays last summer working here. He'll do the same this summer. The younger siblings are still spending most of July and August at the lake.

"As the kids get older, they might have jobs here, so that may change a little bit, but I still hope to spend the majority of time there if possible," Amy said.

She also hopes they will have the same great memories she does from spending their summers at the lake.

"Hopefully it's sort of in their blood and they will want to return and spend time there whenever they can," she said.

around South Bend, Ind., who could get there in less than half an hour. When Amy's dad and his family, who lived in nearby Mishawaka, would head up to the lake, they would ride the horses they kept at their farm.

"You can still see in the old garage that they have where the stalls were for the horses," she said.

Now more Chicago-area folks spend summers at the lake. The lake houses have changed, too.

"The lake has become very built up, lots of teardowns, fancy big houses," Amy remarked.

That's not true of her parents' home or the one down the street she bought with husband Ed 15 years ago.

"We're old school lake house people," she said. "We have our tiny little old cottage that we squeeze our family of six into. We put in our own pier. You're not a true lake house owner until you actually have to put in the pier and the water is freezing."

When she first met Ed, she learned he, too, had an affinity for lake houses. His family for years had spent summers at Eagle Lake in Wisconsin.

"When we started dating, we could understand that lifestyle," she said. "Instead of spending weekends in the city, we both preferred to go to the lake."

They would alternate between visiting his parents in Wisconsin and her parents in Michigan. At some point after starting their own family, they decided to buy a place of their own.

"We settled on Diamond Lake because we thought it was a better

# MEETING ROUNDUP

## Hinsdale Village Board

Among other business at Tuesday's meeting, trustees:

- indicated they will approve an appropriations ordinance for fiscal year 2019-20 totaling \$59,153,024. The ordinance is required by state law in order for the village to spend the money it earmarks in its annual budget. Trustees held a public hearing on the ordinance, at which no residents spoke. A vote on the ordinance is set for the Tuesday, July 16, village board meeting.

- approved a change order for \$418,453 for the 2019 infrastructure project in order to schedule 10 additional streets for resurfacing and patching: Allmen Avenue from Ninth to the south end, Chestnut Street from Vine to Lincoln, Clay Street from Maple to Chicago Avenue, Grant Street from North to Hickory, Minneola Street from County Line to Justina, Quincy Street from Maple to Chicago Avenue, Ravine Road from County Line to Phillippa, Vine Street from Maple to Chicago and portions of the 600 block of the Washington/Lincoln alley. Garfield Street also will be patched from First to 55th.

Another \$99,390 will be allocated for crack sealing on 25 streets. The items will be up for a vote July 16.

- discussed the purchase of two new police department patrol vehicles for \$73,174 to replace two aging cars. Trustees will vote on the purchase July 16.

- unanimously approved the appointment of several individuals to village commissions for three-year terms ending April 30, 2020, or to fill unexpired terms as noted. Chris Elder and Charlie Russ (2020) were appointed and Robert D'Arco and Peter Boomer were reappointed to the finance commission. Alexis Braden (2021) was appointed and John Bohnen, Bill Haarlow and Jim Prisky were reappointed to the historic preservation commission.

Darren Baker and Chris Boruff were reappointed to the parks and recreation commission. Julie Crnovich, Jim Krillenberger and Mark Willabee were reappointed to the plan commission.

John Podliska and Kathryn Engel were reappointed to five-year terms on the zoning board of appeals. Craig Milkint (2020) was appointed to the board of fire and police commissioners.

"It's very difficult for us to do our work without having the input of commissioners on the various commissions," Village President Tom Cauley said.

# GPS data not admissable in Razny case

*Federal judge rules police collection of location data in 2017 robbery is unconstitutional*

The Hinsdale police's collection of global positioning system data for the vehicle of one of three suspects in the armed robbery of Razny Jewelers two years ago was unconstitutional, a federal judge has ruled.

On May 15, U.S. District Judge Gary Feinerman granted a motion by defendant Tobias Diggs, 24, of Chicago, to forbid the use of historical GPS data gathered by Hinsdale police at his trial. The data was obtained from the firm servicing the vehicle's GPS technology.

"The GPS data at issue here fits squarely within the scope of the reasonable expectation of privacy identified"

by previous findings, wrote Feinerman in his opinion, citing those rulings. "Moreover, 'the retrospective quality of the data here' impinges even further on privacy concerns... by enabling the police to 'travel back in time to retrace (Diggs') whereabouts'."

Accessing a historical database of GPS information amounts to effectively "tailing" the suspect for time span for which the data was provided, he wrote.

The case is being prosecuted by the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Northern District of Illinois. In addition to Hinsdale police and the U.S. attorney's office, the Chicago office of the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's Homeland

Security Investigations and Oak Lawn police worked on the investigation.

According to the opinion, Hinsdale police obtained more than a month's worth of GPS location data for a vehicle associated with Diggs, who was indicted in the Razny armed robbery March 17, 2017, along Marvon Hamberlin, 39, of Chicago, and Joshua McClellan, 29, of Oak Lawn. They're also charged with transportation of stolen goods and using, carrying and brandishing firearms during a crime of violence.

They reportedly took more than \$200,000 in merchandise, then sold or disposed of some of the stolen items in the Chicago area as well as

Atlanta.

Feinerman found that because Diggs did not "voluntarily assume the risk of turning over a comprehensive dossier of his physical movements," the police could not rely on the so-called third-party doctrine to justify its data protection.

"The government points to no decision holding that the doctrine also applies when a third party is authorized to collect only a limited amount of information but exceeds its authorization and collects much more," Feinerman wrote. Again quoting from prior rulings, Feinerman stated that "the Supreme Court has long recognized the need to exclude evidence obtained in

violation of the Constitution's protections. Indeed, unless one of the various exceptions (the exclusionary rule) applies, exclusion will run not only to the unconstitutionally obtained evidence, but also the fruits of that evidence — the so-called fruit of the poisonous tree."

At a June 10 hearing, Feinerman continued the prosecution's motion to reconsider the ruling to July 30. The charge of using and brandishing a firearm carries a maximum sentence of life in prison. The conspiracy and robbery counts each carry maximum sentences of 20 years in prison. Transportation of stolen goods is punishable by up to 10 years.

## D181 hires director of assessment, instruction, evaluation

She will be responsible for developing and facilitating district, school and classroom level systems of assessments.

The goal of this work is to foster continuous improvement in the areas of

curriculum, instruction, assessment, program effectiveness and innovations that enhance student learning.

Miller previously served in several roles at Valley View Community Unit District 365U in Romeoville over the course of eight years, most recently as the assistant director of assessment and continuous improvement. She was also the school psychologist in Oswego Community Unit District 308 for four years.

Miller is a Nationally Certified School Psychologist and is pursuing her doctorate in education leadership at Western Illinois University with anticipated graduation in 2021. She

received her bachelor's in psychology and English at Lewis University in 2004.

Miller said her background in psychology brings a unique perspective to her observation of students and analysis of data.

"It is through this lens that I build rapport with other educators, learn about the students on my caseload and establish relationships with families," she said. "I'm looking forward to bringing those skills to the forefront of my work with the students, staff and families of District 181."

Miller is passionate about the creation and utilization of effective

assessments and also a fervent supporter of the Multi-Tiered System of Supports process.

"I deeply believe in this student-centered continuous improvement process and have personally witnessed the positive effects this work has on student learning," she said.

Miller is a member of the National Association of School Psychologists, Illinois Alliance Administrators of Special Education and American Educational Research Association.

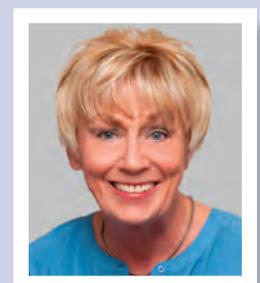

### Eich finds second career as full-time dad

Steve Eich is about to be the father of a middle schooler. But he's not scared.

A former middle school teacher who went on to teach 24 years at Glenbrook South High School, he knows a thing or two about relating to teenagers.

After decades spent surrounded by children, Eich's days as a retired teacher still revolve around children. But this time, they're his own. He and wife Nancy, a special education teacher at Hinsdale Central High School, are parents to 11-year-old Bobby and 8-year-old twins, John and Emily.

Bobby was a toddler when Eich ended his teaching career to become a full-time, stay-at-home dad. He said he's grateful for the opportunity to focus all of his attention on parenting. While other dads are scrambling to get out of work early for their children's activities or squeezing in family time on the weekends, Eich never misses a moment.

"I'm there for everything," he said.

As the family's stay-at-home parent, Eich keeps the house clean and organized, shops for groceries, cares for the lawn, plans meals and pays the bills.

"I have a whole new appreciation for my mom," Eich said.

Like most children their age, the Eich kids enjoy video games and computers. But Eich said having an older dad has exposed them to some of the things he loved about being a kid — the freedom to ride their bikes around the neighborhood and to play in the nearby park until dusk. He said he tries to strike a balance between the childhood he had and the world his kids are growing up in.

He said he tries to keep things simple, with minimal rules but

solid expectations.

"We teach 'Team Eich,'" he said. "We look out for each other.

Other than basic respect for others, especially family, Eich's only steadfast rule is that homework is completed first thing after school.

Lack of homework is just one of many things that Eich loves about summer. He calls it the best time of year, with long days to fill — or not.

"It's important to have time to just do nothing," he said.


Eich said his kids don't seem to mind that their dad is older than other kids' parents, or that he often is mistaken for their grandfather.

## Time to stop dreaming of parking solution

Perhaps it was a dream, too flatteringly sweet to be substantial.

After decades of debate over how to solve the parking problem in downtown Hinsdale, three years ago a solution appeared.

If voters passed a \$53.3 million referendum in November 2016 for a new Hinsdale Middle School, the village and school district could build a two-level parking deck in conjunction with the project. The referendum passed and plans called for the new school to open in August of 2018, with the deck to be completed shortly after.

What could possibly go wrong?

Well, first a group of residents filed a lawsuit contesting the validity of the referendum results. Construction was put on hold until the litigation was resolved.

Then Hinsdale trustees learned that the need for separate foundation walls for the school and the parking deck would add \$253,400 to the cost. The price tag already had jumped from \$4 million to \$4.5 million when trustees decided to create 189 spaces, rather than 118, for village use on the lower level. With the district's spaces on the ground level, the deck was at 319 spaces.

By August 2017, the price had risen to \$6.2

million. That same month, the Community Consolidated Elementary District 181 Board — realizing it would be too expensive to try to expedite construction to make up for time lost during litigation — approved a new schedule with an opening date of January 2019 for HMS. That pushed the deck's opening until early spring.

Village trustees and school board members took full advantage of the delay, spending more than a year hammering out a 33-page intergovernmental agreement regarding construction and maintenance of the deck. When they finally signed the deal in March 2018, the projected deck completion date was moved to summer of 2019.

Clearly that date won't be met, either.

Since last fall, both sides have been in negotiations regarding the appropriate load capacity for the deck along with other unidentified matters. Mediation began Feb. 8, and a Feb. 12 announcement indicating the parties had reached a mutual understanding on "most open design issues." In March, we reported the village had asked Wight and Co. to redesign the parking deck to provide for increased loading. Arbitration would be the next step in the process if the two sides couldn't reach

agreement on the issues that remained open, we were told.

Then we heard nothing — until April, when we learned the village was soliciting bids for work on the deck. Trustees had planned to award bids at their May 7 meeting, but the item was pulled from the agenda. That same week we wrote an editorial arguing the time had come for parking deck discussions to be made public.

What have we heard since?

Nothing.

It's been 125 days since village and school officials began mediation. We struggle to understand how, after a year negotiating the details of an intergovernmental agreement and a proclamation four months ago that resolution was at hand, an agreement is still elusive.

Dragging out the process this long is irresponsible — to merchants and shoppers in town who would benefit from improved parking, and most importantly, to taxpayers.

125 days. That number appears on our cover today, and it will remain there — updated each week — until the issue is resolved.

The notion of a downtown parking deck is no longer simply a dream. The countdown for it to become reality is on.

He is survived by his wife, Marilyn H. Kelly, nee Sullivan; his son, John P. (Judy) Kelly;





Not the line of work Smith envisioned for herself three years ago, to be sure.

"I really wanted to do event planning, and I wanted to travel. I never wanted to do my own thing," she said.

When an opportunity in the staffing industry proved unfulfilling, Smith started to lean more into a side venture that she and her mother had waded into. Souvenir soaps that Smith's parents brought home from a spa in Hot Springs, Ark., were a such a big hit with friends that they ordered more.

"At the volume we were ordering, (the spa) told us we might as well just become a wholesale client," Smith said.

But she had her reservations, having witnessed the constant demands that self-employment can impose with her mom's accounting practice.

"You're always on call, and your finances can be inconsistent," she said. "I didn't want to do it."

The wholesaling business grew into a boutique, first in Yorktown and now at Orland Park Mall, selling custom-made products. Smith said her good sense for scents had lured her into the full-time role before she realized it.

"It chose me, but I didn't choose it," she said of the business. "I've always loved fragrance. I like pretty things. It just comes naturally."

Smith found a handmade soaper in Spain to create the concepts that spring from her imagination, like strawberry swirl cupcake soap or black tie — complete with bow tie and buttons.

"She's extremely artistic. Almost anything I ask her to make, she can make it," Smith

said. "I try to design new soaps every two months or so."

Smith does all her own concocting when it comes to many of the other items on the shelves. How long did it take to perfect making scrubs, for instance?

"A year to a year and a half," she replied. "The oil (for perfume), that took me a long time. I made a lot of batches of oil."

As the black tie soap suggests, Luxurious Lathers serves many clients who are getting married. Gift baskets are popular, and the Orland Park store also hosts private parties, where guests can make a personalized bath bomb or perfume.

Through it all, Smith is learning firsthand what entrepreneurship entails.

"I do the packaging, the labeling. I order everything. I do our website," she said, noting that her mom handles the books.

While the tasks can seem overwhelming at times, Smith said the experience has opened up an educational bouquet like no other.

"I've learned that I can do a lot more than I thought I could."

### *Talented cast of teen performers brings ABBA favorites to life*

It’s Tuesday afternoon in Kettering Hall at The Community House, and Paula Taylor is offering a few pointers to the cast members of “Mamma Mia!” before they do their first dress rehearsal of the show.

As she offers her instructions, you can hear the sound of a drill running in the background as a crew member attaches a shutter to one of the backdrops. Another group is working to secure a “brick” wall that stands stage right.

In a little more than 48 hours, the curtain will rise on this Stage Door Fine Arts production. But Taylor and her fellow co-founder and director, Don Smith, are used to tight timelines. They just closed another show, “Beauty and the Beast,” Sunday night.

“We do these shows back to back,” Taylor said. “A lot of times in the past, we’ve

had the sets behind each other so we can just take one down and there’s the next one for the next show. There was no way to turn the Beast’s castle into a Greek island, so it’s like starting from scratch in just three days.”

The show has other challenges as well. Several of the teenage cast members play characters of a significantly more mature age. Maybe as old as their parents.

“They are doing awesome,” Taylor said.

The ABBA songs that serve as the soundtrack for the musical require the teens to rise to the occasion as well.

“Every single song has ensemble background vocals, but it’s not meant for the ensemble always to be on stage,” Taylor said.

That means the actors have been able to focus just on the vocals.

“It’s been good training for them,” she said.

Back to rehearsal on

Tuesday. A few more details are finalized and everyone is ready to begin.

“Places!” Taylor calls, and the theater goes dark. Smith offers a few words of welcome over the loudspeaker, the lights come up and the music is blaring. All of a sudden, it feels like 1970.

The show, of course, is not set in the ‘70s. The story takes place in 2000, on the eve of 20-year-old Sophie Sheridan’s wedding. She’s determined to find out which of three men are her father, and to help her in her quest, she’s invited all three to her wedding — much to the chagrin of her mother, Donna. Unlike many shows, when the lyrics and the book are written at the same time, this musical’s plot had to incorporate song lyrics written decades ago.

“The storyline is not the most amazing, but it’s still fun,” Taylor said. “The draw is with anybody 30 and older, really — all of the people that we know. Parents

from ‘Beauty and the Beast’ (actors) — they are the most excited. It’s been a super fun one.” Seventies songs call for ‘70s costumes, of course, which are anything but understated.

“We do have two sets of shiny jumpsuits, one for a number that is in the middle of the show and then a finale number,” Taylor said. “They are something! They are awesome. They are all wearing silver go-go boots.”

The show is triple cast, meaning more than one trio gets to sing “Super Trouper” clad in one of the red jumpsuits. In addition to providing more roles, the triple cast offers a learning opportunity for young actors as well.

“We do that to give them more opportunities for parts,” Taylor said. “I also like it because it teaches them also to be in an ensemble and kind of humbles them that way.”



already getting looks from college scouts. The power game is the approach he prefers.

"My serve and my forehand," Nathan replied when asked the strengths of his game. "I like when my opponent is coming to the net and hits it to my forehand and I rip it down the line."

In addition to elevating his ranking, he also finds reward in expanding his circle of friends, both playing partners and those across the net.

"I just like the people that I get to play with and people around me when I play," he said

Among today's tennis luminaries, Nathan likes watching the entertaining French player Gael Monfils, and, as a lefty, is inspired by fellow south-paw Rafael Nadal.

His nickname "Hot Dog" was bequeathed by his coach, who's a fan of Nathan's brand hot dogs. Nathan said his temper can sometimes run a little hot, but he tries to maintain control.

"When I'm playing someone I'm not supposed to lose to, I'm emotional on the court," he said. "But if he's my level or better than me, I don't tend to get upset."

Playing tournaments means a lot of time on the road, but Nathan is accustomed to the routine.

"It's fun for me, so I enjoy doing it," he said. "It doesn't really get in the way of anything else."

### Golfer brings strong drive

As a 12-year-old last year, Hinsdale's Caroline Owens had to play eight tournaments in Illinois Junior Golf Association's Youth Development Program to notch her first title.

This season she did it in four, carding a 3-over 39 over nine holes to win last week's YDP event at Downers Grove Country Club.

"It felt good. I did what I needed to do," Owens said of the victory, including recovering from errant hits and sinking key putts. "If you have a bad drive, you can't just focus on that. You have to move on to the next shot."

some tropical beach.

"We play as a family a lot, and that's a lot of fun," Owens said.

Only one of the family's five members, however, lays claim to a hole-in-one. Make that two holes-in-one. Guess who?

"One was at Twin Lakes in Westmont. The other was at Eagle Ridge in Galena," Owens crowed.

Friendships she's forged with her playing peers lend tournaments a kind of social gathering vibe. But that doesn't alter her objective when she steps to the tee.

"I'm pretty competitive and intense," she said. "I like to do well, and I know that's not going to come from doing nothing. So I try to work hard in order to do well."

Owens, 13, is also an avid swimmer — WEST swim club teammates with Karina Miller — but golf has gradually been garnering a greater share of her attention.

The rising eighth-grader at Hinsdale Middle School hopes to follow in her sister Grace's footsteps and compete for Hinsdale Central, assuming swimming doesn't win back her heart. She knows she still has work to do on her game.


"I want to hit my shots longer and have better putting so I can take strokes off," Owens said.

## Youth deliver fountain of success

*Not yet in high school, these budding sports stars give village lots to cheer about*

Hinsdale has long been a cradle of athletic achievement, with young residents regularly distinguishing themselves on the local and national scenes.

Karina Miller, Nathan Hernandez and Caroline Owens certainly make the grade in their respective sports for this latest edition of our periodic Rising Stars series. Remember these names, for they're likely to make headlines again.

### Success flowing for swimmer

Last year at the state swimming meet, Karina Miller, 10, wasn't sure she'd qualify for the 2019 National Club Swimming Age Group Championships in Orlando. The backstroke/freestyle specialist had some stiff competition, but punched her ticket by clocking personal best times in several events.

"I was so far from the national cut (times), and then I just got it," she said.

And she made the most of it, winning both the 50-yard and 100-yard backstroke events in her age group at nationals in March.

"It was unexpected," the rising Madison School fifth-grader said of her triumphs.

That's understating it for her stunned parents,

remarked dad Brett Miller.

"We knew she was fast, but she was not the favorite to win, and she had dropped so much time during the season that we thought she couldn't drop more," he said. "Karina ended up dropping time in every event she swam that week. My wife and I were in disbelief after the first race finished, and we both questioned each other if the scoreboard was right."

Showing her versatility, Karina placed second in the 100-yard freestyle.

"By the blink of an eye," she said flatly of the photo finish with the race champ. "Two milliseconds."

Add a third place in the 50-yard freestyle, fourth in the 200-yard

to see her rewarded for all of that hard work."

### 'Hot Dog' has court cooking

Nathan Hernandez, 12, has a pretty straightforward goal when it comes to tennis tournaments.

"Win every match," he said.

The rising seventh-grader at Hinsdale Middle School has been wielding a racket since he was 3. That's not surprising considering his housemates — namely three brothers — all play, too.

"My mom loved the sport, and she wanted me to play it. And my dad also liked watching it," Nathan said.

He started playing 12-year-olds when he was 9, and now he's racked up considerable hardware with a slew of wins in both singles and doubles. One of his more memorable matches was recently against the child of a former pro tennis star.

"I beat Lindsey Davenport's son two tournaments ago in Michigan," Nathan recounted. He wasn't phased by the celebrity connection, though.

"It doesn't really matter who's watching," he said, before qualifying that assessment with "unless it's a college recruit or something."

Considered one of Illinois premier prospects at his age level and ranked among the top-100 nationally, it's little wonder he's

freestyle and, for good measure, 21st in the 50-yard butterfly.

She can't put her finger on the source of her talent, although the backstroke has a unique attraction.

"I think I'm better in the backstroke because I can breathe without lifting my head," Karina said.

The nearly daily practice regimen is rigorous, she admits. But the sport is also a release.

"When I swim, I feel free," she's told her family. "It just relaxes me. I just want to be there."

Next up: the Central Zone Age Group Championships in August. Dad is looking forward to catching his elated daughter in his arms again as he did at nationals.

"Karina loves to compete," he said. "We were incredibly happy
