Three historic homes set for demolition

Historic preservation commission frustrated with inability to protect structures

In the midst of a possible moratorium on teardowns and changes to the zoning code, the Hinsdale Historic Preservation Commission conducted a regular slate of business at its March 4 meeting.

The commission's task last week was to review applications to demolish three homes in the Robbins Park Historic District, all of which are listed as contributing structures. Public hearings were scheduled for the homes at 716 S. Oak St., 419 S. Oak St. and 641 S. Elm St. The hearing on 419 S. Oak was canceled because the homeowner was unable to attend.

At 716 S. Oak, Arnold Kozys of Willow Springs wants to tear down the 1928 Classic Revival house, former home of the Dean family, to build an 8,000-square-foot arts and crafts style home on the lot. The property is actually three lots totaling 1.38 acres that the homeowner has applied to consolidate.

Commissioner Alexis Braden questioned whether any historic elements have been incorporated into the design.

"This is the historic district and while this is a lovely home, I'd love to see more of how you see this tying into the existing street, especially replacing this great Revival home," she said.

She also noted that a group of citizens had launched a petition to save the home, and she had signed it.

"They are sharing their concerns about why this is coming down," she said. "It is structurally sound and it is architecturally significant."

"If you wanted an open floor plan, you could have bought anywhere," she added. "This is one of the gems of our town."

Commission Chairman John Bohnen also emphasized the structure's historic significance.

"This is one of the iconic homes in town," he said.

Attorney Peter Coules, representing Kozys, commented on commissioners' desired outcome.

"I will go on the record to say, and I feel pretty confident, that the tone is nobody sitting up there really wants this house to come down, no matter what I say to you all tonight,"

Residents weigh in

Several residents expressed opposition to the demolition of historic homes at the March 4 historic preservation commission meeting. Here are a few of their comments.

"My house will be the only remaining historic home on the block. All the others have been knocked down." — **Sara Davis, 324 E. Seventh St.**

"One of the reasons we bought our house was because it looks right across at the Dean house. It's a gorgeous house. It sickens me that it's going to come down. But ... that being said ... it needs a lot of work." — **Julie Brunini, 717 S. Oak St.**

"I think this is heartbreaking that these three homes might be torn down. This neighborhood is very, very special and I'm really, really afraid if every year we lose three or four houses like this it's really going to lose that character." — **Jennifer Reenan, 329 E. Sixth St.**

"I understand why people want new and open floor plans. It just would be so sad to see this one go." — **Ashley Dean Killpack, daughter of Howard and Diane Dean**

"My big worry is that southeast Hinsdale is now beginning to look exactly the same." — **Sara Barclay, 433 E. Third St.**

"They are truly magnificent houses (on Oak) and the best in Hinsdale, so when I drive by them, I say to my brothers, 'Wow, they are amazing. Look at that grand house.'" — **Greg Warren, sixth grade, 340 Hampton Place**

State coronavirus cases now number 19

First cases reported outside of Cook County as governor criticizes response from the feds

SPRINGFIELD – Illinois health officials Tuesday announced the first cases of coronavirus illness in people outside Cook County. The victims, a McHenry County resident in his late teens and a Kane County woman in her 60s, are likely the state's first cases of "community spread."

Neither of these cases have a travel history to an affected area or a connection with other known cases. Though officials are still investigating, they believe these are the first known instances of the virus spreading throughout the population without a clear origin.

The two are among eight new cases of the illness known as COVID-19 that officials announced Tuesday during a news conference in Chicago, bringing Illinois' total to 19. The other six new cases are Cook County residents: four men and a woman in their 40s, a woman in her 60s and a man in his 70s.

The eight new patients are in isolation and doing well, officials said. Public health officials are reaching out to people who had close contact with them.

"We want everyone to start thinking and preparing now for the virus to circulate more widely in the community," said Dr. Ngozi Ezike, Illinois Department of Public Health director. "Social distancing will be important to slow and reduce and dampen the effect in our community. This may include canceling large events."

Though the state's case total is 19,

Gov. J.B. Pritzker said "several" have since recovered and returned to normal life. Ezike said all current patients are "stable."

Officials also updated the most vulnerable populations, the elderly and people with underlying medical conditions, on how they can best guard against the virus.

"We are asking our older adults to limit their activities in the community, especially large indoor events," Ezike said. "We are also recommending long-term care facilities and nursing homes to restrict visitors under the age of 18 and those with obvious colds, influenza or potential COVID-19 infection."

Chicago Public Health Commissioner Dr. Allison Arwady advised people over the age of 60 or with underlying conditions to not attend large gatherings and encouraged people with underlying conditions to stock up on medications.

"As we potentially see additional spread of this disease, we don't want people coming into the medical system who don't need to be there," she said.

Pritzker said he is working with county election boards on possibly moving polling places out of nursing homes. On Monday he announced the Quincy Veterans Home would move its polling location for the March 17 primary election. He also said it is possible the deadline to obtain an absentee ballot could be extended.

Pritzker slams federal response

Tuesday's announcement came one

day after Pritzker announced he had issued a state of emergency decree in response to the coronavirus threat. Pritzker said Monday the disaster proclamation is "an operational procedure" in part allowing the federal government to reimburse costs related to the state's response and making State Disaster Relief Fund dollars available, according to the governor's office.

He said 13 other states have enacted similar measures, including California, Washington, Oregon, Utah, Kentucky, New York, Florida and Maryland. His action, he added, is the "next phase of our continued effort to stay ahead of these changing circumstances."

Tuesday he expressed his discontent with the national response.

"I am very frustrated with the federal government," the governor said, as U.S. cases of the virus surpassed 800 on Tuesday. "We have not received enough tests."

Pritzker said the state would like to be able to test any person who shows symptoms or just wants to be tested, but said federal officials have not kept their word.

"We've been told now for days and days and days — indeed weeks, I would argue — that there are commercial labs that would be coming online," he said. "I was just told today commercial labs would be coming online within days. Once again, I've been told the same thing again. We haven't seen it."

The only places able to test for COVID-19 right now are the three state-run labs in Chicago, Springfield and

Carbondale.

Pritzker also criticized the Trump administration's decision to forgo the World Health Organization's COVID-19 test, which has been used on hundreds of thousands of people in Europe and Asia, in favor of its own test.

"We could have been using that weeks ago here in the United States," he said. "It's been too long already."

AG warns of scams

Illinois Attorney General Kwame Raoul is urging people to not fall victim to email and social media scams related to the virus.

"According to the CDC, there is currently no known treatment for COVID-19. People should be aware that any email or website offering a 'cure' is a scam that should be avoided," Raoul said Tuesday in a news release.

He says products such as chlorine dioxide, hydroxychloroquine, essential oils, silver, elderberry and garlic are being falsely advertised as treatments and cures for the virus.

Raoul also encouraged Illinoisans to be cautious when donating to coronavirus-related charitable causes, since fundraisers and charities are required to register with the AG's office.

Among his tips to prevent getting scammed include not donating if the solicitor uses high-pressure tactics or asks for cash, confirming the charity exists when you receive an email or text asking for a donation and being wary of "look-alike" websites.

Schools, village taking steps to ward off coronavirus

The village of Hinsdale and local school districts report that they are closely monitoring developments regarding the coronavirus.

Brad Bloom, assistant village manager and director of public safety, said Wednesday that village manager Kathleen Gargano has been participating in COVID-19 informational conference calls at the state, county and regional levels.

No village events or meetings had been canceled due to the pandemic, but that crews hired to clean its facilities were asked to provide additional cleaning sessions, he added.

The Hinsdale Public Library posted on Facebook this week that it has removed toys and puzzles from its children's department to "keep these frequently touched (small) items clean and sanitized."

On Tuesday, Hinsdale High School District 86 announced that Hinsdale Central orchestra's spring break trip to Austria had been canceled. In an email to the district community Monday, Superintendent Tammy Prentiss said such activities are being scrutinized.

"We have and will continue to strictly adhere to the travel notices that have been issued by agencies such as the CDC and U.S. Department of State," Prentiss stated. "If a destination is not covered by these notices, we will work with the groups to assess/evaluate the benefits of proceeding with a trip versus the risks it may pose to the health and safety of those who are taking part in it."

She said the schools are being routinely cleaned. "These efforts have and will continue to include an increase in the disinfecting of common touch points such as drinking fountains, doorknobs, locker handles, etc. We are also looking into the purchase or procurement of additional resources (e.g., more hand sanitizer stations) that can support the preventive measures we are already taking in our buildings," Prentiss stated.

In the event a student, staff member or relative contracts or is exposed to the virus, Prentiss said the district will work closely with the DuPage County Health Department and feeder schools to implement emergency plans.

In Community Consolidated District 181, no after-school activities or programs had been canceled as of Wednesday, according to communications direc-

tor Jamie Lavigueur. Students are being encouraged to wash their hands frequently, and staff has ensured that all schools have hand sanitizing stations near lunchrooms, according to a release on the district's website.

"We have been and will continue to perform routine cleaning and disinfecting in our buildings, as well as a deep cleaning on a weekly basis," the statement reads.

Sick students and staff will remain separate from well students and staff until they can leave, the release added, and the district is developing an Emergency Operations Plan specific to contagious disease responses.

Lavigueur said the district administrative team had contacted DuPage County Health Department officials, who said they were waiting for a communication from the Illinois Department of Public Health before they make a recommendation.

"We expect to receive that information later this afternoon," Lavigueur said Wednesday. "This is a rapidly developing situation so our plans are subject to change, but we will continue to update our website with the latest information and stay in touch with our community by email."

Grief support can take different forms

Creating art, writing in a journal, talking with others among ways people can get help

Sometimes the pain of loss is too difficult to express in words.

So Laura Cottrell, bereavement director at Amita St. Thomas Hospice, might ask participants in a grief support group to use a hammer to shatter a bowl.

“Then they put it back together. The bowl is never the way it was before,” she said. “It is held together, but there are holes in it and there are pieces missing.

“The creativity gives them an outlet for emotions they might not know how to talk about or what to say,” she added. “It gives them a place to put how they feel where they otherwise might not know exactly how they feel.”

Cottrell also encourages participants to write in a journal. One of her favorite assignments is to have participants describe the person they lost — using only six words.

“(It) is really, really difficult and really gets them thinking,” she said.

Hands-on therapy can help people open up and think about the grief that they otherwise struggle to put into words. The focus is never on the artistic merit of the finished product, Cottrell

emphasized, but on giving participants an opportunity to release their feelings.

“It’s always about the process that you go through as you do it,” she said. “When you don’t let them out and you hold them in, they are going to come out somehow and they are going to come out sometime.”

Headaches, stomachaches, bouts of feeling short-tempered and other symptoms can be the result of bottling up feelings. She said the simple analogy she uses with kids about coping with grief applies to adults as well.

“Your body is a pop can. When pop cans don’t open, they get bubbles in them and they explode. At some point, that can explode and it’s a big old mess.”

The support groups offered by Amita St. Thomas Hospice give participants who are ready to put their feelings in words the opportunity to share them in a safe environment.

“I wish that people would know that support is out there and while it’s not for everyone, it is for some people and it really does help them,” she said. “It’s nice to know you’re not alone. It’s nice to know you can talk to other people, you can share with other people and you don’t have to do

it alone. It can be very lonely.”

She emphasized the grief groups do not provide therapy, the goal of which is to help a person address a situation.

“Grief is not something you can fix,” she said. “Grief is something you go through, so we are here to support you.”

Many adults ask Cottrell when they will start to feel better. She said that’s a question she can’t answer.

“Five years from now you might hear a song and it might be a re-triggering,” she said. “You’ll learn ways to help yourself when you’re feeling that. You’ll find ways to take care of yourself when you need to.”

Grief can be especially difficult for aging adults who have spent most of their life with a spouse who is no longer there.

“When you have been with someone for 50 years, how do you start your day again?” she said.

One of the suggestions she makes is for people to keep talking about their loved one.

“You keep that person

in your conversation. You always make sure they are still in your conversation,” she said.

Grief ultimately is an indication of love, Cottrell noted.

“You cry because you loved someone, and you’re so fortunate you loved someone so much,” she said.

Cottrell said she has been amazed at how much sup-

port groups have helped participants.

“Before I came here, I never realized all the grief support that was out there, and I’m constantly amazed that there are so many people that can come to this, how it can change you, how it can support you,” she said. “I wish everybody knew about it, from young to old.”

Resident dedicated to serving families in need

Six years ago Hinsdale's Laura Alter was invited to Hinsdale Infant Welfare Society's Tablescapes, an annual benefit for the Angel Harvey Family Health Center in Chicago's Logan Square neighborhood. Stirred by the auxiliary group's mission, she joined up.

Heading into this year's Tablescapes Sunday, March 22, at the Westin Hotel in Lombard (see Page 20 for details), Alter is now the organization's president, leading the effort to provide care for families in need.

"What we're trying to do is become a beacon of hope for the people that walk into the center and are afraid at how they're going to pay for it. We bridge the gap between what they can afford to pay and what's covered," Alter said.

Angel Harvey provides a full range of medical and therapeutic services, and the event's paddle raise will help underwrite the center's new adolescent anxiety center. Attendees will be able to shop among nearly 20 vendors and enjoy food and drink

demonstrations. Hinsdale's Ben Bradley will serve as emcee of the program, which will include interviews of the clinic's head physician and two women whose families are patients.

"So they can directly about their experience and how the Angel Harvey Center has changed their lives and provided hope," Alter said.

She's excited to see how people will respond to the new venue, new start time — noon instead of 11 a.m. — and shift from early March to late March.

"I think the combination of those things will help," Alter said.

The New York native grew up one of six siblings and remembers accompanying her mom to church as a child to tend the parish garden.

"For somebody that was raising six kids, to find the time to do that and fit that in her day (was inspiring)," she remarked.

Her two teen children, Emily and John, are both on the Hinsdale IWS Junior Board and will be helping out at Tablescapes. Alter is gratified to

see the spirit of outreach take root in her offspring.

"It sets a good example for them, and it shows them that they can be proud of they're efforts as well," she said.

A job opportunity brought Alter to Chicago, and marriage to Tom brought her to Hinsdale, where he grew up. She appreciates the heart for service she's found in the community and within Hinsdale IWS.

"It's a really nice group of women to work with. I've gotten to know people that I would have never known," Alter said.

"It is so rewarding to see you efforts pay off."

She said the goal for this year's Tablescapes is to raise \$100,000 to meet the center's needs.

"I hope that the people in the audience will feel what I feel," Alter said. "By being there they are making a difference in peoples' lives."

And the biggest payoff?

"The most exciting part is going to be to hand over the check."

How to save a home? It takes a village

A teardown wave is once again causing consternation in the village of Hinsdale.

A generation ago, it was the scourge of new McMansions dwarfing neighboring older homes and altering the community's landscape.

Today, in an era when reality programs show us how easily old can be made new, the hand-wringing is over the demolition of vintage homes. Twenty-four homes have been torn down in the Robbins Park neighborhood since that area was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 2008.

The village board is poised to impose a six-month moratorium on demolition permits to provide time to study the matter and, presumably, establish zoning regulations to promote preservation of historic residences. It's tricky business discerning the proper balance between upholding personal property rights and protecting a characteristic viewed as central to the village's identity.

For reference, Lake Forest has leaned heavily toward the latter. Unlike Hinsdale, Lake Forest is a home-rule community with greater latitude in its legislative power. Properties there may be landmarked by the city's historic preservation commission and city council, subjecting the structures to zoning restrictions. The city lays out the

philosophy behind this approach:

1. "Historic preservation of historic properties and structures helps to maintain the established identity of a community and provides an understanding of the past in order to better plan for the future."

That makes a lot of sense. But we need to consider whether giving elected officials that power might cause potential homebuyers to shift their investments to a less restrictive community.

2. "Historic preservation involves the entire community and is considered an excellent tool for economic development and stability."

We hope residents from across the entire community turn out for and weigh in at the public hearing on the moratorium. We'll let you know when it's scheduled.

3. "Historic preservation encompasses many ideas and concepts and can be defined as the identification, protection and enhancement of historic resources."

This speaks to perhaps the most fraught dimension of the issue, with people having different notions of what's worth protecting and what's an enhancement.

4. "Historic preservation goes beyond simply saving old buildings; it is a means of maintaining

a historic character through the preservation of buildings, monuments, landscapes and allowing sensitive infill architecture to continue past traditions."

There is no question that countless towns envy Hinsdale's historic charm, which is on prominent display in the central business district, southeast Hinsdale and all across the community. The virtue in continuing past traditions, however, lies in an understanding and appreciation of those traditions. If residents feel no collective connection to that heritage except for some old structures scattered about, it's hard to make a case they need special protections. We hope the village explores ways to promote education strategies along with zoning ones.

5. "There are many positive reasons to invest in the historic preservation of your property and the community as a whole."

No argument here.

As Hinsdale lacks home-rule powers, it will be up to residents to determine what type of historic preservation ordinances — if any — should be binding and to work with elected officials to implement those decisions.

We hope those on all sides of the issue will make their voices heard.

So glad we had this time together, revue friends

Sixteen years ago, seconds before the curtain rose on my first Community Revue, I received some great advice from our director.

"Remember the moments," he told me.

I still have the list of memories I wrote after the 2004 show, "Hinsdale: The Reality Factor." I have not been as diligent about recording the special moments from subsequent shows, but those three words from Dave Heilmann have stayed with me all these years.

His advice reminds me of a piece I had read in the Trib a few years earlier. Michele Weldon wrote in the late 1990s about how important it is to let go and have a really good time.

"From all those times, those eternal, sacred moments of my life strung together inside me, pearl by pearl, I learned what it is to be happy. I know what it is to be full of joy, how to embrace the second when I am completely content, to hold it close and to make it exist forever, where no one can erase it.

"I know how therapeutic it is

to laugh so hard you can barely breathe and to feel deeply loved, to sense a smile from your mouth to your feet and to be so aware of your own happiness you can feel it spreading inside, replacing the hurt, the damage, the sorrow, cell by cell, molecule by molecule, inch by inch."

I was having a tough year in 2004 and being part of the revue reminded me what it was like to be happy. I experienced so many wonderful moments — pearls, if you will — in the 2 1/2 months between our first rehearsal and our final performance. Instead of feeling deprived of joy, I was overflowing with it.

I remember wondering before my first rehearsal if the revue would live up to my romanticized memories of being in shows in junior high and high school. It did. Two years later I questioned whether the second revue experience could possibly be as good as the first. And it was.

And here I am, days after the final curtain on my eighth show. For some cast members, it was their 12th. For others, their first. No matter how many revues are under our belts, we're all mourning this week.

We take solace in our "Hinsdopoly" Facebook page, where we can watch videos from the show, see photos of our cast parties and read heartfelt messages from our fellow castmates, like this one from first-timer Tim Fowler.

"We should take great care in choosing who we surround ourselves with and how we surround others," he wrote. "I am so very glad I chose to spend the last couple months with you all and that you chose to let me. I have so thoroughly enjoyed getting to know each and every one of you."

A couple of weeks ago Slonoff shared an item from Seth Godin's blog about fellowship, the kind that features mutual support and a shared journey.

"It's hard to imagine something more reassuring, challenging and productive, all at once," Godin wrote. That it is.

I am so grateful for the people I shared this journey with, starting with Amanda, Gail, Ricky, Robert, Liz and the guys in the band. Thanks for making us and the set look and sound great (or as good as you could, given what you had to work with!).

Dave, thank you for the sage advice so many years ago — and for the love and generosity and talent you bring to each and every show. We are nothing without you.

And to friends new and old — Alisa, Bill, Carl, Craig, Dan, David, Dick, Ellen, Grace, John, Jon, Jim, Laura, Lynn, Megan, Michelle, Neil, Peggy, Sara, Steph, Susan, Teri and Tim — I'm so glad we had this time together.

I can't believe it's time to say "So long."

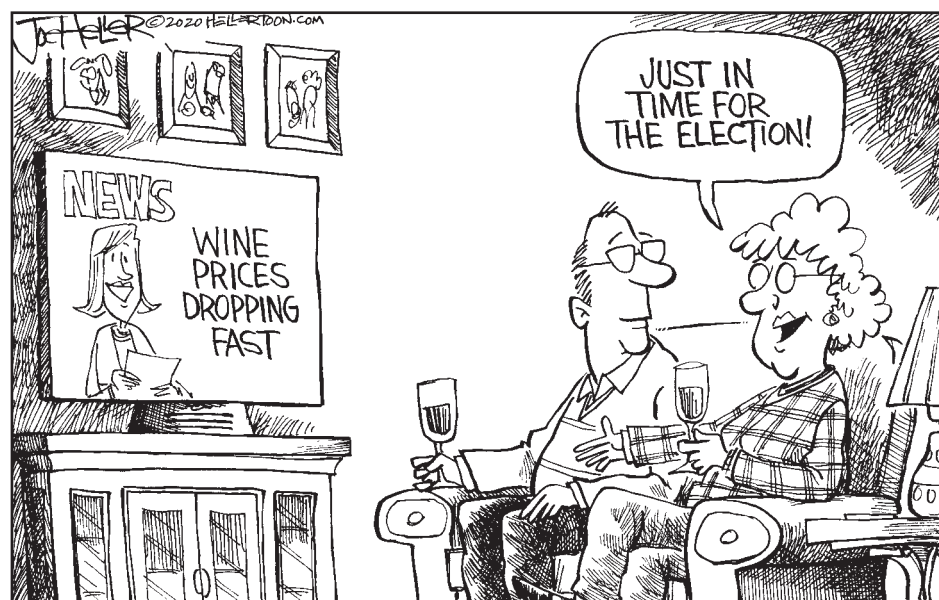
Hinsdale is in no rush to have 5G rolled out here

Coules said. "It's more important what's being put there versus what is going to come down, because what is going to come down is going to come down. It's bad to say, but everybody has the right to do what they want to do with that property."

"Yes and no, Mr. Coules," Bohnen responded, encouraging him to listen to conversation about historic preservation at the March 3 Hinsdale Village Board meeting.

"We're going to find out whether there is sentiment in the village to preserve some of our heritage and some of our historic homes, specifically in the Robbins area but it other parts of town, too," Bohnen stated. "We're at that apex in Hinsdale, Mr. Coules. We're going to make a decision about whether we care about preserving our heritage and our historic homes."

Commissioner Sandy Williams, participating by phone, said the commission's purpose is to protect historic structures in Hinsdale.

"It isn't something we are

doing because we like old houses. It truly is our mission as spelled out in the code," she said. "We're just trying to uphold the code."

When questioned by Bohnen, Kozys said he knew he was buying a house in a historic district and that he would be required to go through a process.

"There is no specific law that says you cannot demolish," he said.

Commissioners also held a public hearing on the property at 641 S. Elm St., where Julie and Doug Laux plan to tear down a 1925 French eclectic style home to build what Julie Laux called their "forever" home with a first-floor master suite.

"I was under the impression that you were renovating the home," Braden said to her.

"It was sold as a teardown if you look at the listing sheet," Laux responded.

Commissioner Shannon Weinberger praised Laux for her renovation of 321 S. County Line Road. Laux said she and her husband sold the home at a loss.

"The economics are difficult for a renovation. We nowhere near recouped the dollars we put in the house," she said, adding that it was not suited for an empty-nester couple.

Commissioner Jim Prisby congratulated the Lauxes on coming in early in the design process but said the first question needs to be what is wrong with the existing house that cannot be remedied.

"From this meeting forward, that is where all of my questions are going to go," he said.

Both applicants were asked to return with additional information.

Bohnen, who also lives in the Robbins Park Historic District, empathized with neighbors who spoke at he public hearing. The 1893-home at 244 E. First St. — next door to his — was torn down last week, and all the trees on the lot went with it.

"To have the neighbor come in and clear cut to build a Belgium farmhouse next to me in Hinsdale, Illinois — what can I say? We're all suffering through this," he said.

MICHAEL STROKA, CO-FOUNDER & CEO

What is the goal of the American Nutrition Association?

A healthy diet isn't one-size-fits-all. That's something that Michael Stroka learned the hard way. Despite eating what he believed to be a healthy, balanced diet, Stroka became so ill more than a decade ago, he couldn't go to work. Diagnosed with chronic fatigue syndrome, he was desperate for a solution that would make him feel better.

"That's when I started doing deep, therapeutic nutrition," Stroka said.

He engaged in what he calls a "deep dive" into his nutritional needs, analyzing his vitamin and mineral status, his rate of oxidation, his metabolism. A nutritionist studied Stroka inside and out and finally concluded that his body couldn't thrive on the low-fat diet he had long believed to be healthy.

"When I ate that first meal that was designed for me, I felt like Superman," Stroka said. "Nutrition brought me back to vibrant health."

Ten years later, he's still enjoying

the diet of rich fats, rich proteins, fermented foods and vegetables that he was prescribed. And he's thriving professionally, as well, as chief executive officer and co-founder of the Hinsdale-based American Nutrition Association.

A merger of five nutrition-focused organizations, the ANA was formed late last year with a focus on bringing personalized nutrition to health care. Put simply, the ANA is working toward a day when food and nutrition are treated as medicine.

Stroka said the medical tools and knowledge available today are far more sophisticated than when he went searching for the cause of his problems. With the medical field's ability to analyze a person's genome and microbiome, Stroka said personalized nutrition holds the potential to prevent and even reverse such conditions as obesity, cardiovascular disease, osteoporosis, diabetes and autoimmune diseases.

"Nutrition is the most important lever for preventing and reversing chronic illness and obesity," Stroka said.

He said it's no surprise that more doctors don't address diet as a normal part of a patient's routine care. Stroka said doctors typically receive

no more than three hours of education in nutrition during their training.

"That obviously leaves a lot to be desired," Stroka said.

Through a variety of trainings, certifications and educational tools, the ANA is trying to change that. The association promotes personalized nutrition to scientists and people throughout the medical and nutritional professions.

About 1,300 people have earned the title of certified nutrition specialist — the gold standard in personalized nutrition and the ANA's highest credential. Thousands more have completed webinars, less certifications and trainings.

Membership in the ANA currently stands at about 5,000 professionals and members of the public. Various levels of membership are available, some without cost. More information is available at <https://www.theana.org>.

A resident of Western Springs, Stroka said Hinsdale is a great place to work and a good home for the ANA. He said the host of healthy eating options within walking distance of the ANA headquarters makes Hinsdale a place that he and his staff are proud to be part of.
