## Educators adjust to e-learning context

Even before Gov. JB Pritzker announced Tuesday that Illinois schools will remain closed through April 30, leaders in Hinsdale High School District 86 were preparing for an extended period of online instruction.

One of their decisions was to cancel spring break, set to take place this week, opting instead to have students participate in e-learning. Superintendent Tammy Prentiss said she responded to 200 emails Sunday from parents and students about the decision. She said she is confident she made the right decision.

"I feel that this weekend and this week is a psychological milestone for the community," she said. "I think it's becoming really real now. It's really important when you are in trauma or you are unsettled to keep things as routine and as normal as possible," she said.

The decision will keep students connected

with their teachers, social workers and counselors, she added. It also will mean the final day of school can be moved up a week from May 28 to May 21.

At last week's school board meeting, Prentiss recognized the decision would affect teachers who are struggling to find care for their own children or who had planned to spend time this week preparing virtual lessons for students.

"We continue to find ways to support our teachers because we recognize this is going to be a marathon and not a sprint," she said.

Board member Kevin Camden, who attended the March 26 meeting in person, said he greatly appreciated the work of his daughter's world language teacher and the accessibility of instructors.

"The uncertainty is really the biggest problem for the students," he said, adding that the repetition and rigidity of a daily schedule is helpful.

At the state level, Monday marked the switch from what had been designated as "Act of God" days to "remote learning days."


"Remote learning will look different for every district and maybe even for every school. School districts will create plans based upon their local resources and their needs," Pritzker said at his Tuesday COVID-19 news conference in Chicago.

Prentiss said District 86 was in an excellent position to institute remote learning after electing last spring to take advantage of a new state process that allows e-learning to be used instead of snow and emergency days. The district was required to develop a plan and submit it to the DuPage County Regional Office of Education, hold a public hearing, work with the teachers union and receive board approval.

A 63-member advisory group convened by the Illinois State Board of Education has issued a list of remote learning recommendations. The group encourages a "do no harm" approach when it comes to grading and suggests a pass/incomplete grading model.



# Parking occupies many towns' agendas

*Three nearby towns offer insight into ways Hinsdale can manage its expanding supply*

With the downtown parking deck scheduled to be completed in a couple of months, Hinsdale officials are exploring ways to optimize use of an expanded central business district parking supply for visitors, business employees and commuters.

The two-level, 319-space deck going up at First Street and Garfield Avenue will be shared with the adjacent Hinsdale Middle School. The village will have exclusive use of the 189 spaces on the lower level, which represents a 40 percent increase in the downtown's parking capacity.

Officials are considering a proposal to offer free on-street parking for up to three hours and free parking for up to six hours in the deck. Employees would be instructed to use the deck in order to keep the street spaces open for business patrons. But some village trustees would like to maintain on-street parking fees for nonresidents, who studies suggest take up about 80 percent of the spaces during peak times. Doing so, they believe, would prevent all of the current meter revenue from being lost and would encourage use of the free deck. Village staff have presented other methods for replacing that nearly \$200,000 in annual revenue, among which are increases to vehicle sticker and commuter permit prices.

Neighboring communities, of course, also have faced similar questions when it comes to managing their central business district parking supply. To better understand parking needs of shoppers, employees and commuters, The Hinsdalean examined three surrounding towns with similar characteristics to Hinsdale to see how they addressed the issue (see sidebar for more details).

In Elmhurst, free three-hour parking is available throughout the central business district. Daily parking spaces are available for \$2. The city uses license plate reader technology to make sure drivers are not moving from one space to another to try to park for more than three hours.

The village conducted a parking study in 2015 in advance of the opening of the 689-space Addison Avenue parking deck.

"The first and foremost policy goal should be that adequate free shopper parking spaces should be provided for in appropriate locations to meet consumer demand," the study report read. "(W)here free shopper parking spaces are maintained, the spaces should actually be available for use by consumers at all times, in

order to benefit the entire (central business district) and the city as a whole. To achieve this goal, parking by commuters and employees in free shopper parking spaces should be discouraged."

City residents and nonresidents and treated equally in the parking system. The study concluded that central business district employees also are very likely to be consumers within the downtown.

License plate reading is also expected to be implemented in Hinsdale, according to Brad Bloom, assistant village manager and director of public safety. "Recently we have been discussing the technology side to find out how to interface the license plate readers with the enforcement and back-end support software," Bloom said.

Downers Grove also uses the technology, according to the village's communications director, Doug Kozlowski.

"We do use license plate readers for enforcement of on-street time-zoned parking," he said. "If there's a time limit on the spot, that's where they use the license plate readers."

Kozlowski cited the downtown parking study in the village's 2019 year-end review, which prioritized the development of a long-range parking plan. Downers Grove worked with a consultant to address the increasing pressure on parking supply. Officials learned, among other findings, that on-street parking occupancy had increased since 2011 by 4.9 percent while off-street parking (deck and

several surface lots) decreased by 6.5 percent. The village's transportation and parking commission is currently reviewing the study to inform its recommendations.

Kozlowski indicated that merchants and employees of the central business district comply with instructions that they use the lots set aside for their use.

"We do have employer permits on a quarterly basis for designated areas for \$25 a quarter," he said.

In La Grange, village manager Andrianna Peterson said the town continues to analyze and refine the apportioning of its parking supply.

"La Grange, like many of our neighbors in the western suburbs, seeks to manage parking in a way that balances the interests of a myriad of stakeholders, such as residents, customers, business owners and employees, commuters and students," Peterson said. "We employ a multi-disciplined approach to managing this dynamic issue. Our management team, in concert with the village board, community and economic development commission and our business community, regularly evaluates parking matters.

"Periodically the village also undertakes a comprehensive review of local parking dynamics through parking and related studies," she added.

A number of surrounding municipalities have grappled with — and continue to tweak — their downtown parking systems. While each town has unique characteristics, Hinsdale would seem to have a abundance of case studies to draw from.

## Parking puzzle

Here are how three of Hinsdale's neighbors — all on a commuter rail line and with at least one parking garage — manage their parking supply.

### Downers Grove

- **Visitors:** free parking is available on the street in front of most stores in one- to four-hour increments, designated by posted signs. Free parking is also available in several surface lots and on levels one and two of the parking deck on Curtiss Street.

- **Employees:** several lots are designated for employee parking along with a portion of the Curtiss Street parking deck's second level. Employee parking permits are required and cost \$25 a quarter.

- **Commuters:** several lots near the Main Street train station are designated for permitted commuter parking; permits cost \$372 a year. Daily fee spaces are available for \$3 on levels three, four and five of the Curtiss Street parking deck.

### Elmhurst

- **Visitors:** free three-hour parking is available throughout the downtown. Daily coin spaces for extended parking are available for \$2 a day.

- **Employees:** several lots are designated for employee parking. Full-time employee parking permits must be purchased for \$35 per month, \$105 per quarter or \$400 annually. Parking permits for part-time employees (working less than 25 hours a week) can be acquired for specified lots at no charge.

- **Commuters:** several lots, or portions of lots, near the Elmhurst train station are reserved areas for permitted commuter parking lot; permits cost \$400 a year.

### La Grange

- **Visitors:** free three-hour parking is available on the street and at many lots throughout the downtown. The parking deck at Sixth and Harris avenues is free with a four-hour limit. Another 300 metered spaces on Burlington and Hillgrove avenues allow payment with a smartphone app or coins.

- **Employees:** parking is available with a free decal in one of three lots from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

- **Commuters:** parking is available in one of the decal-only lots for \$50 per month.

# MEETING ROUNDUP

## Hinsdale High School District 86 Board

Among other business at their virtual meeting Thursday, board members:

- voted 6-1 to set the staffing level at 375.4 full-time equivalents for Hinsdale Central, Hinsdale South, the Transition Center and HAVEN for the 2020-21 school year, a increase of 3.9 FTE from this school year. An "ideal" plan the board reviewed at its March 19 meeting called for an increase of 9.3 FTEs, which would have provided lower class sizes across the board.

Many requests in that plan were addressed in the revised "flat" plan administrators were directed to create, Superintendent Tammy Prentiss said. But the revised plan does stick more closely to the 25:1 student-teacher ratio the board has set as a maximum.

Board member Erik Held said the additional \$500,000 needed to pay for the ideal plan should instead be dedicated to the capital improvement fund.

"At the end of the day, we had talked about how we can't spend \$139 million in referendum dollars to improve these schools to then fast forward and realize we've gone years or decades of not doing any capital improvements because we've had other issues along the way," he said.

Board member Kevin Camden, the only board member to attend the meeting in person, voted no.

"I don't like to see classes creeping north of 22 and 23 in fundamental areas," he said.

- unanimously approved bid packages related to construction projects at the high schools, including a \$278,100 bid from Otis Elevator Co. for 20 elevators, and landscaping bids for \$328,900 from Breezy Hill Nursery for Central and for \$46,000 to Landworks Ltd. for South.

- agreed to hold another meeting of the facility naming committee and postpone a recommendation on naming the new swimming pool at Hinsdale Central. That recommendation was set to be made at the April 9 meeting and now will be made April 23. Policy committee Chairman Kathleen Hirsman had inadvertently not been invited to the meeting.

- heard public comment from several residents in the Hinsdale South attendance area who believe the staffing decisions for the 2020-21 school year indicate the board does not prioritize curriculum alignment, as the enrollment disparity between the two schools means fewer opportunities for South students


## PLAYGROUNDS ARE CLOSED

# Family ties grow stronger for Sullivans

*Working and studying from home provides more time to enjoy the simple things together*

Mike Sullivan hasn't been traveling to his office in the Loop for a few weeks now, but he's been busier than ever.

"I have been crazed all day and am going to be even crazier after 3 p.m. when everyone calls to see what they should do after the shutdown," Sullivan said the afternoon of March 20, minutes before Gov. JB Pritzker issued his stay-at-home order. Sullivan has been an attorney for 29 years and currently is head of the labor and employment group at Goldberg Kohn Ltd.

"I've been on the phone almost continuously during these five days with employers all over the country trying to sort out what to do and how to do it," he said.

Of course, he's not home alone. His wife Michele and his daughters, 18-year-old Gabrielle and 11-year-old Mia, are there, too.

As CEO of the household, Michele is used to working from home, Mike noted.

"She has taken on the job of home-schooler as well," he said.

E-learning is going well, Michele said Tuesday. Gabrielle, a senior at Hinsdale Central, is working independently from the desk in her room while Mia, a sixth-grader at St. Isaac Jogues School, is stationed at the kitchen table. Mike and Michele praised Mia's teachers in particular for the work they're doing. "St. Isaac Jogues' teachers have done a phenomenal job con-

tinuing with the lesson plans just as if they were at school," Michele said, citing FaceTime calls with teachers, entertaining and informative YouTube videos and platforms that allow students to share videos of their work.

The girls are participating in other activities virtually as well. Mia can watch some dance classes from Expression Dance Studio in Westmont on YouTube and participate in others on Zoom. Gabrielle has been doing yoga classes online with a group of friends.

"It's amazing with the technology we have today that they are able to participate in some of these things virtually," Michele said.

Of course many things cannot be conducted virtually. Gabrielle will miss her senior prom and likely will not be able to participate in a traditional graduation ceremony at Central before heading to the University of Illinois.

Like others in the Class of 2020, she was born in the months following Sept. 11, her dad noted. "Now she's got to worry about whether she is going to be the first generation to not start college on time," he said.

Although the Sullivans have family members they have not been able to see and likely will not be able to vacation in Italy this summer, they appreciate

the slower pace and the chance to spend more time together. Michele and the girls are enjoying long afternoon walks before sitting down with dad for dinner. The 10-by-10-inch canvasses and acrylic paints Michele bought before the stores closed have kept the family busy in the evenings.

"I have no experience painting whatsoever, but I've been pleasantly surprised how well our paintings are turning out for all of us," she said.

Other highlights for Mike have included watching Gabrielle vote for the first time and receiving friendly greetings from other runners in town, he wrote in a March 17 email to

The Hinsdalean.

"And finally, during this Lenten season when my faith demands more thoughtful attention to self-reflection, I prayed tonight with my indefatigable 11-year old for those less able to bear these difficult times — and for those who don't have families or friends to comfort them," he wrote. "She inspired me to reflect and share these thoughts about my first two days of 'remote seclusion.'"

Mike and Michele have noticed the efforts people are making to connect, whether by waving hello while on a walk or making the most of a virtual meeting.

"In particular I had to go to a meeting where I actually saw some faces of my friendly workmates. We're trying to do that so we remember each other," Mike said with a laugh. People were reluctant for the online gathering to end.

"I think everybody is craving some social interaction outside of their own house," he said.

In his email, he shared this hope for fellow Hinsdaleans.

"(A)s we fret over canceled spring breaks and social gatherings, I hope that we can focus some of our repurposed energy on what is most important in our lives: our health, our families, our neighbors and friends, our faiths."

## Cotter appointed to fill vacancy on D181 board

Cotter was seated at the board's March 23 virtual meeting to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Bill Merchantz. Cotter's term will run until the consolidated general election on April 6, 2021.

"We were fortunate to have a strong group of candidates apply for the board vacancy and appreciate their interest in serving the D181 community," said Meeta Patel, board vice president. "We look forward to Mr. Cotter's contributions to the board and the unique perspective his legal and construction expertise will bring to our district."

Cotter has lived in Hinsdale for more than seven years and has a kindergartner at The Lane School. He cited his legal background and years of business experience among his qualifications.

"I have a strong desire to contribute my efforts to make D181 the best it can be for my

daughter and the rest of the students in the district," he said.

Cotter currently serves as vice president and general counsel for Cotter Consulting Inc., which provides construction program and project management services in Chicago, Milwaukee, and Dallas. In particular, Cotter leads his company's human resources function, giving him valuable insight into recruiting talented professionals. He is also experienced in analyzing financial statements and using data sourced from those documents to develop strategies to manage costs and understand where investments will have the greatest impact.

"I believe this knowledge is fundamental to serving as a steward of taxpayer funds as a D181 board member," Cotter said.

Applications from district residents to fill the seat were accepted through March 6. The board interviewed three candidates the week of March 9 before selecting Cotter to fill the vacancy.

## St. Pats Day crackdown unlucky for some drivers

Hinsdale police have announced the results of the St. Patrick's Day "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" campaign.

Officers made one arrest for driving under the influence of alcohol and issued seven seat-belt citations, along with 13 citations for speeding, three for operating an uninsured motor vehicle, two for underage possession of cannabis, one for driving with an expired license, one for distracted driving and 10 for other violations.

"Impaired drivers are a risk to everyone on the road," said Hinsdale Deputy Police Chief Thomas Lillie. "We strongly enforce traffic laws for one reason — to save lives."

### Author, consultant is grateful for her hometown

A single sentence changed Colleen Bordeaux's view of the world and her own future.

The lifelong Hinsdalean was a student at University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign when she entered a study abroad program in Capetown, South Africa. Her work there included a volunteer position at an orphanage, where four women cared for 84 children.

During orientation, Bordeaux, then Colleen Kelly, was told to avoid asking the kids what they wanted to be when they grew up.

"I wasn't to ask them, they said, because, 'They can't be anything.' I was shaken to my core."

Bordeaux said it was then that she realized the opportunities she had been afforded simply by the circumstances she had been born into. And it was then that she made a commitment to herself to use those gifts for the good of herself and others.

She's now making a career of helping people and whole companies tap into their greatest potential. As senior manager in Deloitte Consulting Chicago's human capital consulting practice, Bordeaux

helps companies to design wellness programs, and learning and development opportunities, and to develop healthy, dynamic cultures within their organization.

Bordeaux holds a degree in print journalism from University of Illinois. The world of print journalism was changing quickly when she graduated in 2008. Bordeaux left South Africa, and college, without a clear path for her career.

It was an internship with the corporate communications department of McDonald's Corp. that started her on the path to consulting. But she's never let go of her love of writing.

She is the author of a monthly blog and in 2019 Bordeaux published her first book. "Am I Doing This Right? A Philosophical Guide to Life in the Age of Overwhelm" topped the Amazon New Release & Best Seller list.

"I was blown out of the water at the response I got from the book," said Bordeaux. She said the book encourages the reader to search for what sets them apart and calls on them to explore the answers to seven key questions. The answers

to those questions, Bordeaux said, can lead people to more fulfilling lives.

Bordeaux currently is on a six-month sabbatical as she explores the topic of how the human workforce remains essential as technology claims more and more jobs.

"It's called the future of work," Bordeaux said. "It basically looks at how technology is changing how humans interact with each other."

Through work with the Art Institute of Chicago and Second City, she's exploring the teaching of creativity and other human skills in the workplace. Creativity, empathy and communication, she said, are things technology can't replace.

Looking back on her childhood, Bordeaux remains grateful for the safe, nurturing environment she grew up in.

"Hinsdale is an amazing breeding ground for people who can change the world," said Bordeaux, who remains determined to be one of those people.

## Volunteering looks a bit different this April

“Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can.”

Is this ever a time to do good.

Normally we would extol the virtues of altruism in this space the first week of April because it's National Volunteer Month. But helping others is even more important as we face the challenges created by the COVID-19 pandemic.

In some ways, it's also more difficult.

The volunteers who were busy organizing spring and summer fundraisers have had to put plans for the gala or golf outing on hold.

The ones who work at HCS Family Services — who enjoy stocking the shelves and helping clients choose their own groceries — now are staffing a drive-through pantry. They're pre-packing groceries and loading them in the trunks of cars lined up along the circle drive outside of the Memorial Building.

Others can't volunteer because the place

where they donate their time — schools, churches, libraries — are closed.

And yet people are finding a way to help.

One new customer at Café la Fortuna recently bought a coffee, put a generous gratuity in the tip jar and then handed owner Angela Lavelli \$500 to help her get through these tough times.

A group of Hinsdale Central High School students led by Dov Chen is working to raise funds and conduct supply drives for first responders and health care providers. As of Wednesday, the group had raised about \$35,000 — including an anonymous donation of \$8,600 — through crowdsourcing and had collected donations of masks, hand sanitizer, gloves and laser thermometers. As of March 25, members had distributed more than 2,000 N-95 face masks, 6,000 surgical masks, 1,600 gloves and 100 bottles of hand sanitizer to 30 institutions, including Amita Hinsdale Hospital. On a slightly larger scale, local businessman Al Koplín is spearheading an effort to raise \$250,000 for ventilators and other equipment needed

by frontline medical staff at Amita Hinsdale Hospital, such as portable ultrasound machines, defibrillators and personal protective equipment. The initiative should come as no surprise — his family has donated more than \$5 million to the hospital and its program over the past 21 years.

Sometimes the best way to support others is to share your gratitude. The Community House on Monday launched its a “Seven Days of Thanks” campaign, inviting residents to show their appreciation for those working to slow the spread of COVID-19 or provide necessary services under the constraints of social distancing. Simply make a sign or video and tag The Community House on social media posts with the hashtag #7DaysofThanks.

A special group has been designated for each day: 1. health care providers 2. teachers 3. grocery workers 4. first responders 5. civil servants 6. counselors 7. nonprofit organizations. (We can't imagine thanks to any group would be unwelcome at any time.)

Despite my attempts to keep a positive attitude as we shelter in place, I'm not doing as well as I'd like.

My husband's cousin was hospitalized Monday with COVID-19. She is on an antibiotic, her brother told us, and the doctor is optimistic about how her lungs sound.

My mom, her sweetheart and my father-in-law are all in lockdown at their assisted living facility. So far no cases have been reported in their building, but someone in the nursing home across the parking lot has tested positive.

I FaceTimed Saturday with my friend from college, who's a nurse in a Chicago hospital. She is struggling. Her work, as you might imagine, is incredibly stressful. Concerns that she might be bringing the virus home means time off is stressful, too.

I made the mistake of reading an article about summer travel Sunday. It effectively ended my fantasy that we might be able to

take our vacation to New York and Boston in June.

I see the “save the date” cards on my fridge for graduation parties and weddings and my heart breaks for all the plans that will have to be altered.

I also find I have less and less patience when I see groups of kids or adults walking together outside.

“Are you related?” I want to shout out of my car window as I drive home from work or while I'm out walking by myself. So far I've been able to keep quiet, but one of these days ...

And then, I find moments when I am able to move beyond the heartbreak.

Every day at work I hear heartwarming stories of the good people are doing to help others here in Hinsdale. And I know that in towns like ours across the coun-

try, people are making all kinds of sacrifices for one another.

To make you think: “This quarantine is affecting everyone in the work force, but it especially sucks for men. We're losing \$1 for every .79 cents women are losing.”

And to lift your spirits: “Sometimes when you're in a dark place, you think you've been buried, but you've actually been planted.”

## Educators adjust to e-learning context

In District 86, students will receive grades on "formative" assessments, although those grades won't count. They are designed to provide information to teens and their parents, Prentiss said.

"You know relative to that task how well you're understanding it in this remote learning environment," she said.

Grades on "summative" assessments will be included in a student's grade calculation. At the end of the marking period, teachers will compare a student's grade as of March 13 to the current grade and

determine if an override is necessary. The lowest grade a student can receive for second semester either the March 13 grade or an incomplete.

"We will issue an incomplete (if necessary) and we are OK with that," Prentiss said. "We are not using a pass/fail. We want you to show your teacher you have a core understanding of this third and fourth quarter material so you are ready for next year."

All state assessments for spring 2020, including the Illinois Assessment of Readiness, Illinois Science Assessment, SAT and Dynamic Learning Maps Alternate Assessment, have

been suspended. ISBE is working with the College Board to develop options to allow current juniors to take the SAT in the fall.

Prentiss said teachers, parents and students all need to work together during these unprecedented times and praised the work of educators in the district.

"We are working 15 hours a day in meetings and being creative," she said. "We are righting this ship and recreating things — doing things we didn't know we were capable of. "It's a lot of work but it's the right thing to do for our students."

## FULLER'S HOME & HARDWARE

During this season of social distancing and sheltering in place, operating a small business has arguably never been more challenging.

Paula Goss, owner and manager of Fuller's Home & Hardware, 35 E. First St., is grateful to just be open during the stringent COVID-19 restrictions.

"We're lucky that we're considered essential," Goss remarked.

She said the store experienced high demand for household and cleaning supplies at the outset of the pandemic, just as other area retailers did.

"We were busy, with customers buying whatever they needed," she related. "Even doctors were coming for their offices, making sure they had enough bleach and masks."

Shelves have been largely replenished and activity has settled down. Goss encouraged people to call ahead to see if a item is in stock and to take advantage of the store's delivery service.

"Just call and we'll deliver it. Or we'll run it outside to your car," she said. "If we don't have something, I can give them at least some time frame, or see if they're comfortable with using a different product."

Aside from its selection of in-store merchandise, Goss said handyman services comprise a significant portion of the operation. From carpentry to electrical work and plumbing to painting, Goss she has crew members to meet nearly every need. Most of all, she stressed, they do an honest day's work.

"We're very fortunate with the crew that we have because they're good people," she said, noting that her employee roster looks largely the same as it did when the business took over the former Soukup's Hardware in 2004. "I'm really lucky. I've had to replace maybe two people in the last 10 years."

Diagnosing the customer's issue correctly is her mission.

"I try to make sure I understand what their needs are at home, so I can make sure whatever they need, I get them the right men to get the job done as quickly as possible for them," she said.

Goss acknowledged that some people are uneasy in the current climate having workers in their home, and several have canceled previously scheduled appointments.

"You have to do what you're comfortable with right now," she

said.

Spring break, normally a lull point, has been busier this year, with many homeowners eschewing travel plans to follow stay-at-home guidelines. Goss said rapid response to service calls is a primary objective.

"If we can't get there right away, we'll be there the next day," she stressed.

She expressed gratitude for local residents that support Fuller's Home & Hardware and, more broadly, small businesses in town.

"People are still supporting the small stores. They like that you can walk to your hardware store and get whatever you like," she said.

And reliability is key to maintaining that support.

"If you can trust someone to come into your home, you feel like you're in a good community and that you can call on (the business) at any time," Goss said.

She relishes the positive feedback she gets.

"I like when (customers) call up and say that our workers were kind and left them with the feeling that job was done properly," Goss said. "If we can do it, we'll do it for you."

door-to-balloon time, a key measure of quality in emergency treatment of heart-attack patients.

Magnet recognition serves as a tool for the public to judge hospital quality, and U.S. News & World Report includes Magnet recognition among the ranking criteria in its annual "Best Hospitals" report.

sures hospitals' performance in terms of quality, patient experience and nursing engagement, as well as their commitment to nursing research and nursing professional development and education.



## Murrill: Hospital will weather the storm

*CEO speaks on providing care, need for social distancing and amazing community support*

For people who wonder whether staying home, practicing social distancing and washing hands makes a difference, the head of Hinsdale Hospital says it does.

"That is critical to us at the hospital. I can't stress that enough," Mike Murrill, president and chief executive officer of Amita Adventist Medical Center Hinsdale and La Grange, told The Hinsdalean Wednesday.

This is obviously a challenging time for everyone at the hospital, but staff are rising to the challenge, he said.

"I think for health care providers — for pretty much all of them — they run to a fight, and I think that's come through here in a big way," Murrill said. "We have daily huddles virtually with our physician leadership and they are fully engaged in working on solutions and talking through the issue.

"I think the challenge is to wade through all of the

information that is out there right now and what is true and what isn't — and what is important information for today," he said.

Hospital officials also are working diligently to make sure they are prepared for the future. News reports have shown many hospitals setting up tents outside, but that has not been part of the strategy at Hinsdale or La Grange.

"You may not see tents at our campuses, but that doesn't mean we aren't thinking about it and planning for the potential surge," Murrill said. "Know that we've got plans for handling surges. Whether we need that or not, time will tell, but we're ready if that should be the case."

Officials also are making sure anyone who requires care is segregated from others who might have COVID-19.

"For Hinsdale (that means) structuring our campus in such a way where patients can feel safe when they come in to deliver a baby or they need

their therapy at the Cancer Institute — creating safe environments for them with appropriate segregation and protection," he said.

Another challenge is making sure resources are utilized appropriately, especially as guidelines for materials like personal protective equipment change daily.

"It's a national issue. We're right in that with everybody," Murrill said of concerns about the supply of equipment. "I think right now it's heavily focused on appropriate use, and I think you're continuing learning more about what's the appropriate type of PPE."

The hospitals' parent organizations, Ascension and Advent, are working to procure equipment and resources. The Illinois Department of Public Health became more involved this week in monitoring the use of beds and ventilators across the state. The hospitals are reporting those statistics twice a day now, Murrill noted.

"We realize if we aren't diligent and aren't smart

about how we use our resources, that's where we get in trouble," he said.

Hinsdale and La Grange, two of 19 hospitals in the Amita network, also are fortunate to be located just minutes from one another, Murrill said. The ability to have experts from two campuses work together is an advantage, as is the ability to coordinate treatment between two locations.

"If we get hit differently at one campus versus the other, we're able to work together to make sure we're managing the patients appropriately," he said.

Both hospitals are checking the temperatures of staff members when they arrive for work and have prohibited visitors. Murrill understands how difficult that can be on families.

"That's where our team can come in and be that smiling face (for a patient) when a loved one might not be able to be there," he said.

Just as hospital employees are working to support patients, community members have been very generous in supporting them, with everything from meal trains to cards and letters and cash donations.

Local businessman Al Koplin and his family are leading a fundraising effort to donate \$250,000 to the Hinsdale Hospital Foundation for ventilators and other equipment.

"You look at his lifetime commitment to Hinsdale Hospital and it really is humbling to consider that and how he stepped up and really brought others along with him on that journey," Murrill said. "A huge thank you to the Koplin family and many others who have stepped up in big ways."

The "Honk for Heroes" parade of cars that passed by Hinsdale Hospital for about 10 minutes Sunday night was another special

show of support.

"My phone was blowing up, and I got text messages and emails the next day of

it," he said. "I think that's an example of people being creative in the current environment but saying we're not going to disconnect, we're actually going to try to connect more."

While health care providers are dedicated to their work, it does take a toll. Knowing the community is behind them makes all the difference, Murrill said.

"I can tell you it brings tears to the eyes of the team as they see these things happen, as they talk about it," he said.

Community members might be experiencing their own anxiety during this time, and Murrill encouraged them to seek out resources at <https://www.amitahealth.com>

"There is a toll that it takes mentally, so how we deal with anxiety during these times is critical as well," he said.

While these times are trying, dealing with health care crises is nothing new for Hinsdale Hospital, Murrill noted. Since the Hinsdale Sanitarium opened in 1905, the facility has treated patients with typhoid fever, the Spanish flu, the Asian flu, the measles and more.

"They have been a beacon of hope and healing in this community for a long time," Murrill said.

"I am confident we will weather this one as well," he said. "That comes with amazing team members and the show of support from an amazing community. That culmination, together, is what will bring us through this as well."

# CEOs can learn from kids in handling COVID-19

We were all a child once and now perhaps it is time to act like a child again.

That sage advice is not a unique thought. It originates from Mr. Fred Rogers, the same television personality who once advised us to look for the helpers in times of crisis. When you look for the helpers, you find hope. When you think, and act like a child, you find healing.

It is interesting that during this time like no other there are three simple things making a difference: open minds, practicality and kindness. Children are born with open minds. They are not tainted by the bias of experience. They tend to be very practical because their choices are usually between two or three simple options. Do you want to read a book or play with your dolls? Children are also incredibly kind. They crave love and give it back in abundance.

As my clients around the world work to survive, and hopefully thrive again, I am trying to draw from Mr. Rogers in the guidance I give. Thinking, and acting, like a child is not limiting or immature. It is actually quite liberating.

Here are five ways to think, and act, like a child as we strive to lead our

organizations and keep our people safe.

- Convert your limitations into sustainable activities that focus around listening.

The kids who can't go to school are witnessing the patience and giving of their parents. Long after they forget today's science experiment in the kitchen, they will remember their father sitting with them for hours at a time. In times of stress, the best thing we can do for each other is to listen with our ears, and our hearts, and to be assured that our questions are just as important as our answers.

- Look for the light and use that to open new windows.

I have watched children on walks with their family turn tree branches into dinosaur fossils and nature hunts into vocabulary lessons. Every company should think about the top three beams of light in their world right now and use that to stir the imagination and dedication of their people.

- Forgive and forget.

When people are in crisis, they tend to use other people's actions as an outlet for their fear. Are you angry at

the people who were partying on the beach in Florida? Kids get angry for about a minute and then it is gone. Employees will be hurting and will be looking for someone to blame. Get ahead of it and use communication to sweep people into the solution of your collective future. Ask for ideas and get ahead of concerns with transparent communication.

- Use the visual to displace fear of the unknown.

Kids trust pictures because they learn to see before they learn how to talk. When you do FaceTime with children, they smile because they can see and hear their grandparents. Corporate executives can do the same thing. Send your employees a video of you. Make liberal use of video conferencing, not just phone calls. Paint verbal pictures of the top three things you are already doing to get the company back on its feet.

- Smile and laugh, together.

Science proves something we already suspected: laughter is therapeutic and humor can be an important business tool. Our children may not read the

headlines but they know there is tension in the home. None the less, they continue to wake up with a smile and they look up dozens of times a day. The same thing can be achieved in corporate culture. Your master narrative for the crisis must be serious, but it can be delivered with positivity and optimism. Try smiling on the phone. Try sharing some humor about the craziness of your own home right now. Focus not just on your recovery plan but on your strategies for happiness.

My older children remember 9/11. They remember the empty skies and the fear of having their dad covering the story for ABC-News at Ground Zero. They remember terrifying stories of what could come next. However, they also remember family dinners and simple walks around the block. They remember a country coming together to rebuild and restore.

Those memories are helping them get through this week. Together we can do the same for this next generation.

## Reflecting upon a decade of Devilry

*Journey down memory lane with a look back at Central spring sports over last 10 years*

With the status of 2020 spring sports still in limbo, The Hinsdalean has decided to turned back the clock to provide a collection of seasonal Red Devil moments from the past decade that have graced our pages.

**2019** “I was a really timid player at first. During one of my games freshman year, something just clicked and I began playing a lot more intensely. I’ve evolved into a more defensive player, and I’ve honed my skills at being able to block and guard opponents.” — Hinsdale Central senior water polo player Melissa Li on how her game had evolved

**2018** “I think the internal/external challenge of getting over the North Shore “hump,” meaning we have competed with New Trier and Loyola over the last few years, and the next step is beating them.” — then-Hinsdale Central girls lacrosse coach Dan Hartman on his team’s focus. The team finished the season with a 13-3 victory over New Trier in the state championship.

Jay Kramer was a legend and I’m trying my best to fill some really large shoes.
