Dist. 181 students, staff return to school

Kristin McDaniel was happy to see her seventh-grade son Brady head back to class Tuesday at Hinsdale Middle School.

"I know that he, in order to be successful, really needed to have part time within the school and having that access not only to the teachers but the social aspect as well," she said.

A supporter of the hybrid model, she said she was hoping to see her older children, Hinsdale Central sophomore Cooper and freshman Maisie, back in class as well. They are currently on a fully remote schedule.

She praised administrators — especially HMS Principal Ruben Peña — for their work to get kids back in class, even though the plan to split learning between in-person and remote is not perfect.

"The schedule is much more convoluted than I would have liked it to be," she said of the A-B-C-D day schedule the kids rotate through. "It's confusing. It's confusing for parents."

Superintendent Hector Garcia said there are likely to be some adjustment pains.

"The first two weeks of school are a transition period where students are reviewing skills from the spring and teachers and students are getting acclimated to safety protocols and getting to know each other," he said. "We feel the third week will feel like we are fully back in the swing of things as we provide all of our students with a safe and academically challenging learning environment."

Eighth-grader Leah Theoharous agreed that the schedule will take some time to master.

"It was a little confusing," she admitted. "To be honest, I kind of relied on my friend to remember where we were going."

Although Theoharous was happy to see her friends and meet her teachers Tuesday, she believes receiving either fully remote or fully in-person instruction would be smoother.

"I do like seeing people at school, but I think it would be better if we did it online. I feel like that would be easier," she said.

Despite the schedule, McDaniel said it was a relief to see her son get

on his bike and head off to school.

"They actually went to school and they talked about coming back the next day," she said. "It was a very, very long spring break for him."

Garcia said he sensed a lot of delight in the schools even with the focus on safety measures.

"All of our in-person students and staff were thrilled to be back in the classrooms and did a terrific job of adhering to safety protocols. The atmosphere was positive, calm and relaxed at each of the buildings and it was a joy to see so many of our

students again," he said.

Remote instruction also seemed to get off to a good start.

"Our remote learners were also engaged and ready to go in their at-home classrooms and attended productive live sessions with their teachers," Garcia said.

A one-hour interruption to Internet service caused a temporary hiccup, he reported, but didn't derail the day.

"Our staff and families remained flexible and were able to jump right back in once it was resolved," he

said.

The school checked the temperature of each entering student and hopes that more parents complete the online self-certification forms.

"By just the second day of student attendance, we already have many of our schools in 100-percent compliance and anticipate districtwide compliance by the end of the week," he said. "We know that other challenges will arise, but we are thrilled with our staff's safety efforts and our students' adherence to the new protocols."

Overdose spike prompts doc to speak out

Hinsdale’s Dr. Fitzgerald would like to see naloxone more readily available in town

Their deaths often are not recorded in the daily statistics tracking COVID-19 fatalities and often don’t make the evening news.

But the grief is just as profound for families of the 53 people who died of an overdose in DuPage County from the start of the quarantine until the end of June.

“I have reached out to multiple rehabilitation leaders and they confirm the increase in those seeking rehabilitation, drug use relapse and instances of fatal and non-fatal overdoses in their patients and community,” Dr. Richard Jorgensen, DuPage County coroner, stated in a press release issued Aug. 20.

In 2019, 46 people in DuPage County died of an overdose between Jan. 1 and June 30. That number jumped to 70 this year, a 52-percent increase.

These statistics are particularly devastating because overdose fatalities can be prevented, said Dr. Ruchi Fitzgerald of Hinsdale. As an addiction medicine specialist with the Addiction Medicine Fellowship Program at Rush University Chicago, part of her job is to educate the community about the benefits of naloxone, which is available as a nasal spray and an injection. The drug is more commonly known by its brand name, Narcan.

“I think that having naloxone available is really important, because if we do have it on hand and people are able to give that first dose and call 911, there is a chance someone can avoid an overdose,” Fitzgerald said.

She praised the coroner and Hinsdale Police Chief Brian King for working together to make sure all officers carry Narcan. All members of the Hinsdale Fire Department carry it as well, King said.

“I believe that, on average, the police department administers Narcan to individuals that are overdosing up to about six times a year,” he said, noting that not all those instances involve a Hinsdale resident.

Fitzgerald would like to see naloxone available in public places like the Hinsdale Public Library and private residences.

“We want to really take it to the next level and have naloxone in everyone’s home — particularly if you have teenagers, if you have young adults who

may be home from college living with you,” she said.

A prescription is not needed to obtain Narcan, Fitzgerald notes. People can go their pharmacy, present their prescription card and obtain the drug.

“You can keep it in your home. You can keep it in your purse,” Fitzgerald said. “You never know when you might use it and save someone’s life.”

Grant Glowiak, director of youth ministries at Union Church of Hinsdale, and Penny Johnson, director of Christian education and administration manager, both received training to use the Narcan nasal spray in April 2019 at Hinsdale Middle School. The event was conducted by the Hinsdale Fire Department in partnership with the DuPage County Health Department.

“As a church, we’re planning on offering another training for folks in the community,” Glowiak said, noting the surge in overdoses in the county. “We don’t have that date set yet.”

He sees helping those who struggle with substance use disorder as part of the church’s mission.

“For us, it’s a fairly straightforward expression of who we are. We are called to love God and love our neighbor — and particularly to love our neighbors whom society has deemed not worthy of love,” he said.

“What better expressing of loving your neighbor is there than saving your neighbor’s life?” Glowiak added. “It should not be controversial. For some reason it is.”

Fitzgerald agreed that administering naloxone is not condoning drug use and said society needs to re-think how it views substance use disorder.

“This is not a character flaw. This is not a moral failing. This is an illness. This is a chronic disease,” she said. “If we treat it like it’s a flaw or a failing, we lose lives.” Many college kids are working remotely from home and some young adults who lost their jobs might have returned home, Fitzgerald said. They and younger siblings might be tempted to alleviate their stress and anxiety by taking a pain pill they find in their parents’ medicine cabinet, possibly heading down a road toward a heroin

addiction.

King reminded residents that they can drop off prescriptions and other drugs in the container at the police department, 121 Symonds Drive.

“No questions asked,” he said. “That is in the police department lobby that you can get to 24 hours a day.”

Police also work diligently to arrest those who are selling or distributing drugs in Hinsdale, King said, and to educate the community about the dangers of opioids and the resources available in the community.

“If a family is in crisis, we can put you in contact with competent resources,” King said. “There’s no shortage of competent resources here in the village. We don’t want anyone to walk alone.”

Fitzgerald believes residents who are informed will be willing to do what they can.

“I think that our community is always ready to help and engage in public health issues if they have the information,” she said. “Even just one death in the Hinsdale-Clarendon Hills-Western Springs community is too many.”

COVID-19 cases on the rise this week in town

The number of Hinsdale residents who have been diagnosed with a confirmed case of COVID-19 hit 343 on Sept. 8, compared to 318 a week ago.

The DuPage County Health Department reported 314 confirmed cases in Hinsdale and the Cook County Health Department reported 29 confirmed cases in the village.

A total of 168 confirmed cases and 33 deaths are associated with ManorCare in Hinsdale, according to the Illinois Department of Public Health. Those numbers include residents and staff who might not be DuPage County residents.

Amita Hinsdale Hospital had four confirmed COVID-19

patients and five patients awaiting test results on Wednesday, a spokeswoman said.

DuPage County has reached 15,453 confirmed cases, including 539 deaths, up from 14,632 cases and 534 deaths a week ago. The number of confirmed cases in towns neighboring Hinsdale are as follows:

- Burr Ridge, 234
- Clarendon Hills, 146
- Oak Brook, 177
- Western Springs, 201
- Westmont, 533

[il.gov/electionoperations/VotingByMail.aspx](https://www.elections.il.gov/electionoperations/VotingByMail.aspx). Ballots will not start being mailed until Sept. 24. It could take four to five business days to receive the ballot.

All requests by mail must be received by Oct. 29, and all in-person early voting requests must be made by Nov. 2.

Tollway drives use of virtual resource

Hinsdale residents can stay abreast of \$4 billion Tri-State project, including local impact

The Illinois Tollway has created an interactive online tool to let people know about the scope and progress of the Central Tri-State Tollway project.

The Project Virtual Open House at tri-state.consultation.ai was recently unveiled by the agency to offer access to maps, videos, photos and other information as an alternative to traditional community meetings that have been curtailed because of the pandemic.

"Recognizing the challenges posed by COVID-19, the Tollway is opting to transition from in-person, large-group meetings to the virtual open house format offering public access to interactive content from the comfort and safety of their own homes," the Tollway states in a press release.

The Tollway says the 22-mile, \$4-billion reconstruction and improvement project is necessary to provide congestion relief, improve mobility, reconstruct old infrastructure to keep pace with transportation demand and address regional needs. Video simula-

tions on the site aim to show the positive impact of the work, with estimated travel times dropping dramatically from current levels and more driver-friendly interchanges with Interstates 88 and 290.

"In addition, the room offers traditional exhibits including an aerial corridor map that illustrates noise wall locations, proposed lane configuration and new/existing stormwater detention areas. Here visitors also can input an address within the corridor map to zoom to a specific location to see what is happening nearby," the release stated.

Hinsdale residents can see evidence of the work as crews rebuild the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railway bridge over I-294 to accommodate the widening of the expressway. Two lanes are being added in both directions to the expressway section adjacent to the village, and the Tollway purchased several village properties to facilitate the expansion. A bypass bridge, or shoo-fly, will allow freight and commuter rail operations to continue during bridge reconstruction. Portions of Veeck and

Peirce Parks will be closed throughout the project.

During negotiations with Tollway officials to mitigate any adverse impact from the project on the village, the Tollway agreed to accommodate soccer and Hinsdale Little League schedules at the parks and to build new sound walls before taking down the old sound walls to prevent traffic noise from affecting nearby residents. New noise walls have been installed adjacent to Peirce Park.

Brad Bloom, Hinsdale's assistant village manager and director of public safety, said the project has proceeded smoothly from the village's standpoint.

"While the village has received some inquiries from residents regarding noise and other issues, the Tollway has been responsive in addressing those concerns," he said.

Bloom said the village continues to collaborate with the Tollway and Western Springs on "final design" elements and continues to monitor Tollway compliance with the intergovernmental agreement the village has with the Tollway.

Peirce Park also will benefit from the

Tollway's installation of a new culvert drainage pipe, which will extend the park 53 feet to south, and the Tollway is covering the \$2.1 million cost for stormwater relief work for southeast Hinsdale that has been taking place in and around Veeck Park and the Highlands Station area.

Although the Hinsdale Oasis overpass will be removed, village officials said the Tollway gave assurances that the sales tax revenue the village receives from the oasis once the project is completed will at least match current levels. The Tollway also used dirt excavated from the downtown parking deck site in its road project, saving the village the cost of disposing of the soil.

The virtual open house invites visitors to submit feedback.

"The Illinois Tollway values public input and believes that Tollway customers are best served when a variety of perspectives on the issues are shared," the release states.

Reconstruction of the BNSF bridge is scheduled to continue through 2022. The entire 22-mile project is expected to be completed by the end of 2025.



Hinsdale teen empowered in face of community threat

Hinsdale's Alexandra Collins was quite familiar with the Sterigenics industrial sterilization facility in Willowbrook when she learned about its decades of emitting ethylene oxide, a gas linked to cancer risks.

"I used to run on the street across from the Sterigenics facility in Willowbrook," said the Hinsdale Central junior. "I realized that my health could actually have been getting worse when I was doing something to try and improve my health."

Deeply concerned, she and her older sister, Catherine, co-founded Students Against Ethylene Oxide or SAEtO, to effectuate a ban on EtO emissions near schools and homes. She and fellow activists wrote letters to elected officials, attended community meetings and worked to educate others about the possible carcinogen.

Sterigenics permanently closed the Willowbrook plant last September under mounting lawsuits and public pressure. In June, Collins was presented with a Brower Youth Award by Earth Island Institute in recognition of

her role in the campaign.

"I was incredibly honored," she said of getting news of the award. "I was jumping up and down and ran to tell my parents."

It came with a \$3,000 check, a major infusion of cash for a teen-run organization.

"It gives us a great ability to reach more people and participate in workshops on environmental issues," she said. "For me, what really spurs my environmental activism is just seeing friends in the community struggle with cancer or their parents getting cancer."

Collins takes pride in her demographic's involvement in the movement. She recalled attending a Illinois Environmental Protection Agency panel presentation on Sterigenics in May of last year, eager to get answers.

"We had brainstormed a lot questions to ask the scientists about the harmful effects."

When she inquired how young people can reduce their exposure to cancer-causing elements, one panelist dismissively responded by saying, 'Students should not

smoke.'

That just fueled her motivation. "(Adults) have this mindset that students are not concerned about their health, or they're not willing to make changes to live a healthier life," she said.

Another passion for Collins is coding. As an outgrowth of SAEtO, she and several other female members launched EtO-Free to push for transparency in product manufacturing and labeling.

"Six girls and I coded our own website to review EtO-free beauty products," she said. "It's just amazing to have a group of all girls coding together and also fighting to keep our community safe."

"I'm a huge advocate for females in STEM," Collins added.

SAEtO chapters now exist across the country and one is even starting up in Guatemala.

Collins is thankful for the accolades, but one result stands out.

"I can say that Sterigenics closing has been a huge win," she said. "That day will always be in my memory banks."

Honoring one another is heart of Patriot Day

“Today, let us remember that our union — forged and strengthened through adversity — will never be broken and that the immeasurable sacrifices of our patriots will never be forgotten.

— **Presidential Proclamation on Patriot Day, 2019**

For those that bore witness to the horrific events of Sept. 11, 2001, the annual observance is forever embroidered with sadness and grief. Nearly 3,000 people lost their lives in the multiple acts of terror perpetrated in the name of hate. Among them were Hinsdale residents Jeff Mladenik and Bob Rasmussen.

Tomorrow marks the 19th anniversary of that unfathomable, unforgettable occasion. We call it Patriot Day, in large part because of the astonishing feats of selflessness and life preservation by first responders and ordinary Americans in response to those bent on destruction and death.

In last year’s Patriot Day proclamation, President Donald Trump recalled the images

many of us watched from Ground Zero in New York City or learned of from loved ones of passengers aboard the United Airlines or American Airlines flights that had been turned into missiles.

“First responders instantly rushed into harm’s way to save their fellow Americans from the wreckage of the attacks,” the proclamation stated. “On board United Flight 93, a group of heroic individuals braced themselves to stop hijackers from hitting our nation’s Capital.”

Astonishing courage in the face of unbridled evil, providing a source of deep inspiration even as we mourn and remember the victims. The confusion and disbelief so many of us felt soon was replaced with seething anger that such heinous acts could be committed and a consuming desire for vengeance.

But we had seen the face of hate, and that was not the form that justice could take. Sandy Dahl, wife of Flight 93 pilot Jason Dahl, put it this way: “If we learn nothing else from this tragedy, we learn that life is short and there is no time for

hate.”

New York City emerged from the ashes, church attendance returned to its pre-9/11 levels and, nearly two decades later, that primal urge to lash out seems to have gained a foothold in our political discourse and tribalist tendencies. What’s lost in the shrill rhetoric is that we share a love of country that should compel us to treat one another with a respect that transcends party affiliation.

“Even the smallest act of service, the simplest act of kindness, is a way to honor those we lost, a way to reclaim that spirit of unity that followed 9/11,” remarked President Barack Obama in one of his tributes to Patriot Day.

Regular Americans demonstrated extraordinary acts of bravery on that day. But extraordinary acts need not be restricted to time of calamity and catastrophe. They can be extended everyday. May those who stepped up then, and those who put themselves in harm’s way today, whether on the battlefield or in the ICU, be our shining light.

Stellar ribs perfect end to unofficial summer

Dan and I love to grill.

We don’t use a traditional charcoal grill (takes too long) or a Green Egg (too pricey) or one of those Weber wood pellet grills (too new). We have your standard issue Weber gas grill, a Father’s Day gift for Dan a few years back to replace a cheap Charbroil he had rebuilt twice. His favorite part of the gift? Fuller’s Home & Hardware assembled AND delivered it.

The recipes we enjoy making aren’t too complicated, either. Many of our favorites — including the chicken satay and peanut sauce recipe I’ve shared here — originate from a Kingsford cookbook my mom picked up for me in a hospital gift shop for \$2.99.

I have a long list of recipes I’d like to make, including several from “Peace, Love and Barbecue.” The book, a gift from Slonoff, was written by Mike and Amy Mills, his mother’s cousins. I’ve also saved stacks of Bon Appetit’s annual grilling issue.

I was flipping through the pages of these old issues a few months back and came across a recipe

titled (not at all humbly) “The Ultimate Ribs.”

“Remember making these?” I asked Dan.

He did. How could he forget? It took days to prepare them. (OK, only two days, but that is 1 and 3/4 more days than we typically spend on dinner.)

They were delicious, but too much work, so the very next time we had a taste for ribs, we found another recipe with half the ingredients and a third of the effort.

“We should make those again this summer,” Dan said.

Enter Labor Day weekend, 2020. Much to all our chagrin, COVID-19 did not disappear over the warmer months, as promised, and we are definitely not back to normal. When it came time to discuss our menu for the holiday weekend, we knew right away what to make.

With no plans whatsoever, we had nothing better to do than cook. I pulled the July 2004 issue out and turned to Page 95.

The recipe is daunting. Eighteen ingredients for the brine and two rubs. The Key West barbecue sauce alone has 17 ingredients, including seven different kinds of juice.

And so the preparations began. I started purchasing the ingredients a full week in advance, with the expectation that if I split up

the recipe (first buy for the sauce, then the brine and rubs) I would be more likely to remember everything I needed. My third trip to the store Sunday morning for dry mustard and regular mustard proved me wrong.

The good news about these ribs is you don’t have to do all the work at once. You can make the sauce up to a week in advance — or in the morning, if you’re not quite that prepared. The brine is pretty simple, and if you split the racks, you don’t need to search for giant 2.5-gallon zipper bags for the brine. A regular old one-gallon bag will suffice.

You can’t whip these up in a jiffy, however. The time from soaking the wood chips to putting the ribs on the table is in excess of three hours.

But, boy, was the investment worth it.

The meat was tender and juicy and the caramelized burnt ends — courtesy of the second rub — were delicious. The sauce was sweet and spicy and the perfect compliment to the ribs.

If you have kids, I’d suggest cutting back on the cayenne pepper — unless you want to assure there will be more leftovers for you to enjoy.

There are fancier rib recipes (like the fennel-spiced ribs with tangy apple-mustard barbecue) and more exotic ones (coconut-marinated short rib kebab with peanut-chile oil) and ones you can make in the Instapot (which just seems wrong).

But these ribs, well, the recipe didn’t lie.

ASK AN EXPERT

MICHAEL WILLIAMS, PSYCHOLOGIST

How is COVID-19 affecting how people grieve?

COVID-19 has left many on the cancer journey feeling alone and isolated, said Michael Williams, a Wellness House psychologist.

Patients have to go to treatment alone while their caregiver waits in the car. Support groups can no longer meet in person and must be held via Zoom.

And when someone dies, the pandemic prevents people from reaching out the way they normally would. Intimate caregivers, who have been in fifth gear trying to support their loved one through this difficult time, often suffer the most.

"All of the usual things that help people come in for a smooth landing are not in the usual intuitive places," Williams said. "It's often a rough landing for people, a crash landing for people."

"It's a double trauma — the blow of the person dying and now what would help them cope they don't have."

Wellness House, which

switched to virtual program delivery the day it closed its doors in March, has been working to compensate for that lack of in-person contact.

One benefit of virtual meetings of the bereavement group Williams facilitates is that family members who live elsewhere in Illinois are able to participate. And even on screen, he finds ways to help participants connect through "microinteractions."

"Part of the texture that helps that culture be sustained over Zoom is people are Zooming in from their homes or their offices," he said. "There's their cat, there's their dog, there are the voices of their loved ones."

So Williams will ask a participant to talk about a pet or a plant that is visible in the background.

"It's how we are made as humans, to take in information about our fellow traveling humans. The same in grief," he said.

He also encourages participants to share what is helping them process their grief during these unusual times, such as spending more time outdoors, FaceTiming with relatives or finding way to

practice their religion other than attending services (saying prayers, for example).

For some, the loss of a relative or friend can make the dangers of COVID-19 less of a concern. They might think, "What does it matter anymore? Who cares if I wear a mask?" Williams said. He reassures them their loved one would want them to remain safe.

Others find the way the pandemic has changed their lives offers comforts as they grieve.

"There are also people who say, to my own surprise, 'This has been a blessing, COVID, because I'm at home more, and so I'm here sequestered with the rest of my family while I am missing my loved one who has died. In some ways, because of COVID, I have more connectedness during this time of grief,'" he said.

Others find their journey has better prepared them to deal with COVID-19, which, like cancer, has many unknowns.

"There are people who have said, 'Boy, because of cancer I have muscles that have helped me deal with COVID,'" he said.


other categories.

Music schools make notable shift

Students, teachers find new harmony with in-person instruction forced to rest

At Hinsdale's School of Rock, over the last six months, the beat has gone on(line).

Danielle Fitzsimmons, general manager of the music school at 116 S. Washington St., said the school was able to quickly pivot March 20 when they had to close under a statewide COVID-19 shelter-in-place order.

"Everything happened really quickly. I felt like one day I was going over safety protocols and then the next day the entire country shut down," she said of the Saturday closing. "School of Rock (corporate) had tools for us to use immediately. There was really no down time. By that Monday, we were able to offer remote lessons."

For students and staff that didn't have the necessary equipment, the school found a solution.

"We were able to loan out equipment to our staff and provide guitars and drums to those who were need of that for at-home practice," she said.

The school's annual live spring show was transformed into a blend of recorded parts by students.

"I'm just very grateful for the flexibility of our staff and our School of Rock community," Fitzsimmons said. "Everyone was wonderful."

On July 6, the school began resuming in-person private lessons and group lessons.

"One of the major changes that we've made here is preparing our school so that everything can be done at a distance, including special face shields for our vocalists," Fitzsimmons said. "All students and staff wear masks."

Marissa Cuttica, whose 13- and 7-year-old daughters study at School of Rock, was impressed was the school's agility.

"(My 13-year-old) did online learning from the week it was shut down. They even did her performance group classes," Cuttica said of her daughter Ella, a guitarist and vocalist.

One of the benefits of the online experience, Cuttica noted, is parents' greater ability to eavesdrop.

"It's nice to hear what they're working on," she remarked.

Cuttica is confident in the school's safety measures.

"They're with the same kids on a regular basis, and they rotate into different rooms and keep them spaced out. She keeps her mask on the whole time," she said.

At American Music Institute, with a campus in Clarendon Hills, Executive Director Remus Badea sites at least one silver lining to subsisting online: record participation in the school's violin contest last month.

"I think doing a competition online is probably the way to go," Badea opined of the annual event that attracts nationwide entrants.

Submissions numbered 56 compared to 35-40 in a normal year.

"It's so much easier access for people and their not needing to travel," he said.

Of course, the circumstances have had plenty of downsides, like the cancellation of AMI's summer camp and postponement of the American Youth Symphony Orchestra's inaugural year.

"We had to delay that until the fall of 2021," Badea lamented. "It's a matter of keeping everybody safe."

Group lessons were canceled,

but private instruction was able to transition to a remote format in the spring with little disruption.

"We've always been pretty tech-savvy, so it wasn't that dramatic of a transition for us to go online," Badea said.

Some students have left because the online format did not meet their comfort level.

"We totally get it. There's a level of attrition that's going to happen," he acknowledged.

While a few in-person lessons are taking place at each of the school's three campuses, the vast majority — 85 to 90 percent — is online, he said.

The school took advantage of the federal Payroll Protection Program funds to help cover ongoing costs.

"That really helped out because there's going to be loss of revenue with so many programs canceled. And there's still overhead," he said. Hinsdale's Music Studio at 28 E. Hinsdale Ave. recently resumed in-person classes, according to owner Mat Scarpelli.

"We've been taking precautions," said Scarpelli, who teaches guitar and drums. "We're wearing masks and keeping our distance."

School of Rock's Fitzsimmons said one of her biggest adjustments is grappling with how much students grew between March and August.

"I feel like everyone is a foot taller!" she exclaimed. "It was hard not to see everyone each week."

She is looking forward to the school's first live performance show next month at The Jam Lab in Brookfield. She also sees lasting merit in online learning.

"I think that just the option of having a virtual lesson is really great new addition to our program," Fitzsimmons said, using the example of a youth whose family moved to Georgia but was still able to study remotely with his teacher here.

Badea agrees, excited about the prospect of international contestants in next year's violin competition. He said families have expressed gratitude for the lessons during an otherwise uncertain season.

"Given all that they've had to do without, having an activity that's still available to them, and interaction with teachers, they've cherished that, which is fantastic," he said.



Preparation key to talking to teens about drugs

As a health educator, the most common question I am asked by adults is, "How do I talk to my teenager about drugs?"

Some of the most important work around these conversations is properly preparing ourselves to have them. There are all types of different drugs in this world and doing research on them all can be overwhelming and for many flat out impossible. A great starting point is to gather information on a specific drug that may be impacting a family/community or simply the most commonly abused drugs by teens, which for many communities are alcohol, marijuana, nicotine (vape products, cigarettes, etc.) and prescription medicine. Having background knowledge can only help in delivering the pertinent information while empowering teens to make healthy decisions regarding these substances.

After gathering this information, plan to have discussions (not lectures) about the effects drugs can have phys-

ically and mentally in the short and long term. Take time to gather what morals and expectations you have for your teen and how you will clearly communicate them. Also, prepare to be asked tough questions and realize you are not going to have all the answers immediately at your disposal. There is value in not being a "know-it-all," which can show young people you are able and willing to learn things with them. Parents are the biggest influence in a teen's life and regularly having these conversations with openness, empathy and support will go a long way.

The Partnership for Drug-Free Kids offers two important tips on talking with your teen and breaking through communication barriers.

- Choose a good time and place
- Choose blocks of time, maybe on the way to or from school. Take a walk

or a drive together, with less eye contact, so your teen won't feel like they are under a microscope. I had the most productive discussions with my teens in the car.

- Remember their brain is still developing

One of the first parts of the brain to fully develop is the amygdala, which impacts experiencing emotions. The prefrontal cortex, responsible for high level decision making, problem-solving and strategizing is not fully developed until about age 25, as the human brain develops from back to front.

This may help (teens and adults) gain a better understanding of why young people sometimes make the decisions they do. In times of haste, teenagers often rely on their amygdala (emotions) rather than their prefrontal cortex (consequences) to make decisions. By no means is this an excuse

for behavior, but rather an opportunity to educate our young people to help them take time to evaluate outcomes before making decisions.

In the past many anti-drug programs told kids to "Just say no", but with time we have found that along with saying "No" we need our young people to also "know." Not only will they need specific pieces of information on drugs, but also tools like decision-making/goal-setting skills and personal/social strategies that can be used in risky situations to help them live healthy lives.

There are many books written to help parents and teenagers understand the dangers of drugs. One I found helpful in leading me to have open conversations with my teenagers was "Sunny's Story," written by Ginger Katz, a mother who lost her son to a drug overdose.
