## Dist. 86 favors 10-lane pool at Central

The Hinsdale High School District 86 Board has given the green light for a 10-lane pool at Hinsdale Central, following administrators' recommendation but departing from a pre-referendum pledge to build a six-lane swimming facility to match the one at Hinsdale South.

A majority of board members voiced support for moving ahead with designs for a larger Central pool, saying it made sense from both a programmatic and economic standpoint.

Board member Kathleen Hirsman described how her position shifted from initially opposing a new Central pool to now backing a 10-lane-by-40-meter pool after hearing from Central administrators how a six-lane pool would force some aquatic courses into classrooms.

"The notion that we have to cut our instructional time for programs that are completely dependent on in-pool

experience struck a chord with me," Hirsman said. "It doesn't come as much solace to me to say, 'I kept a promise,' and now we have a pool that's not big enough to meet the instructional needs of the students."

Board President Nancy Pollak apologized to anyone feeling betrayed by the board's action but said her position was based on the district's long-term benefits.

"This particular decision has implications for the next 60 years," Pollak said. "Based on research and the opinion of the experts, the need for the larger pool for now and for the future has been demonstrated."

Board member Kevin Camden, the staunchest opponent to the larger pool plan, said he was not comfortable shifting from the "political calculus" that led the board to promise same-sized pools to gain referendum support.

"To my mind, nothing has changed ... that should cause me to change my vote to a larger pool for Central,"

Camden said. "It never had to do with equity. It had to do with representations that I made as a board member to the community."

Board member Keith Chval, chair of the facilities committee, told his colleagues that the committee voted to recommend construction of a 10-lane pool at its Sept. 3 meeting.

Before the successful \$139 million facilities referendum in April, the board scaled back its plans for the new Central pool from 10 to six lanes as a concession to opponents, for whom the disparity between the schools' proposed pools was considered a primary complaint. The additional \$3.5 million cost for a 10-lane pool can be offset by value engineering, Lance Tritsch of Pepper Construction told the board. He laid out several design adjustments to save \$1.27 million on the project, and district architect Rick Cozzi of Arcon told the board that another \$3 million in potential pool savings have been identified since the facilities committee meeting.

"That's part of the process. This is a fluid process," Cozzi said. "We will continue to refine and find ways to make sure the project comes in on budget. That's all of our jobs, and in the end, we will be there."

Several board members said they would act to reverse the decision if more detailed designs in November project a higher cost that could impact other facility improvements.

Board members Cynthia Hanson and Eric Held both expressed support for an eight-lane compromise. Held said he could go along with a 10-lane pool as long as the cost remains in line with the budget.

"I can support (a 10-lane pool), using, however, that escape hatch in November," he said.

Hanson would not sign off on 10 lanes.

Held said he was sensitive to the opinion among some community members that the decision is viola-



# Cannabis shops not welcome in town

*Trustees express desire to opt out of allowing recreational dispensaries in the village*

Hinsdale trustees Tuesday signaled unified support for prohibiting recreational cannabis-related businesses within the village.

During a first read discussion of an ordinance to ban such establishments, trustees said the village should opt out of allowing dispensaries under the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act that Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker signed into law in June.

"This is not a way that the village should be pursuing a revenue-generating opportunity," Trustee Scott Banke remarked. "This is just not what this community represents, and I feel strongly that this is not something that we would ever want to pursue."

Trustee Luke Stifflear said the village

might miss out on economic benefits as the new industry takes root, but that revenue is not the only consideration.

"From a community standpoint, we have to balance that versus what type of community we want Hinsdale to be," Stifflear said, later expressing doubt that cannabis business proprietors would even be interested in setting up shop in Hinsdale.

Under the new law, personal possession of up to 30 grams of cannabis is legal for Illinois residents at least 21 years of age, with lower limits for nonresidents. Municipalities may not restrict the private possession and consumption of adult-use cannabis authorized by the act. However, the law prohibits the use of cannabis in public places, schools and childcare facilities among other locations, and allows towns to adopt and enforce

local ordinances to regulate possession and public consumption of cannabis consistent with the act. The law goes into effect Jan. 1, 2020.

Trustees also discussed regulating medical marijuana dispensaries. The use of medical marijuana was legalized in Illinois in 2014, and medical marijuana businesses cannot be prohibited outright, only regulated in terms of their proximity to residential districts, schools and child care facilities, among other sites. The state-imposed distance limitations on medical cannabis dispensaries were recently lifted, meaning the village would need to institute its own distance requirements or other zoning limitations to restrict medical cannabis dispensaries' proximity to schools and other areas.

Village President Tom Cauley favors

a local ordinance mirroring the state restrictions that were lifted.

"To the extent that we cannot prohibit medical marijuana, that we keep it away from schools and recreational facilities," Cauley said.

Stifflear said those restrictions, because of the village's residential character, would effectively keep those dispensaries out, too.

Trustee Neale Byrnes asked if the village could opt in to permitting recreational marijuana businesses at a later date. Stifflear replied in the affirmative.

"If we determine at a point in the future that we want to allow for it, then so be it," Stifflear said.

There were no comments from the public on the matter. The board is expected to vote on the ordinance at its Oct. 1 meeting.

# D181 budget shows slight increase in spending

Community Consolidated Elementary District 181 plans to spend just a little more than \$1 million more on operating expenses in fiscal year 2019-20 than it did last year.

The school board voted 6-0 Monday to approve the budget, which shows operating revenues at almost \$69.6 million and operating expenses at almost \$65 million.

Property taxes make up about 90 percent of the district's revenues, coming in at \$62.9 million.

"The lifeline for our school district is the local property tax," Mohsin Dada, chief financial officer, told board members. "We are very fortunate to have a solid tax base."

Other revenues include the corporate personal property tax (\$405,000), state revenue (\$2.8 million) and federal funds (\$891,600).

The bulk of expenses for the district — some 83 percent — are for personnel. Salaries are earmarked at \$44.9 million, an increase of 2.3 percent. That additional \$1 million includes \$150,000 for lane change salary increases (pay raises for teachers who complete additional education) and one additional teacher, if needed, at \$75,000.


Employee benefits are budgeted at slightly less than they were last year — \$9.06 million compared to \$8.99 million — following a drop in claims last year and aggressive negotiations with insurance companies, Dada told The Hinsdalean.

"We feel we have been very, very fortunate in our employee benefits, and that has really given us significant stability, but this may not go on forever," he said.

The budget for purchased services also decreased by 4.3 percent to almost \$5.8 million. The reduction is the result of continued savings in cost of transportation, liability/workers comp insurance, software licenses and technology services, according to the presentation.

The budget also includes \$200,000 of initial funding for districtwide STEAM supplies and equipment.

A \$780,000 transfer to debt service is also included as part of a five-year plan to abate property taxes that

were levied but not required. By abating taxes rather than setting a lower levy, the board preserves the ability to collect the full amount allowed by law in subsequent levies.

A \$2 million transfer to capital projects is designed to build reserves for any unforeseen repairs to facilities

beyond those scheduled annually.

The total budget for all funds — which includes debt service and capital projects — is \$79.8 million, up 2.4 percent from last year.

Dada included several charts in his presentation comparing spending in District 181 to other comparable districts. The 2018 operating expense per pupil of \$16,246 falls about midway on the list of 23 comparable districts and comes in well below the \$27,441 spent by Kenilworth Elementary District 48.

The district's teachers are among the highest paid in the group, and the district devotes the highest percentage of operating expenses — almost 64 percent — to instructional services.

"Every board wants to make sure that most resources go in the classroom," Dada said. "We are the highest in the comparison. We are spending 64 cents of every dollar in the classroom."

He also noted the district is on the low end when it comes to fund balances, or cash on hand at the end of the fiscal year. Board policy calls for fund balances totaling 35 to 50 percent of total expenses. "We are more than the minimum but less than the maximum," he said.

Dada also highlighted unfunded liabilities, including \$8 million in IMRF pension liability (for non-certified staff members) and almost \$4.2 million for the district's share of \$261 million in TRS net pension liability.

"Those are all claims against our fund balance, so we are really not as fund balance-rich as we think," he said.

The proposed budget has been on public display since Aug. 15. No one spoke at the public hearing the board is required to hold before adopting the budget. District officials have until Oct. 16 to file the budget with the county clerks of DuPage and Cook counties and the state.

Board members complimented Dada on the work he and his team have done of the budget and district finances as a whole.

"You've worked really hard over the last several years to ensure we can save where we can save so we can provide educational opportunities to our students," Meeta Patel said.

# MEETING ROUNDUP

## Community Consolidated Elementary Dist. 181 Board

Among other business Monday, board members:

- voted to amend the school calendar to move the March 6 teacher institute day to Feb. 28 to coordinate with professional development offered by the DuPage County Regional Office of Education. That means students will have school on March 6 and will be off Feb. 28.

- learned sixth-day enrollment for the 2019-20 school year is 3,778, just one student higher than the sixth-day enrollment last year

- listened to an update from facilities director Mike Duggan on the parking deck the village is building adjacent to the Hinsdale Middle School. Heavy hauling will take place for about three more weeks and crews will begin installing footings fairly soon, he said.

“The precast for the major parts of the parking deck are already in production,” he said. “They’re on schedule. Things are moving along.”

- reviewed about \$1.5 worth of summer facilities projects that were completed in the district. The biggest line item was \$493,710 to replace doors and hardware at Elm and Clarendon Hills Middle School to improve security and accessibility. All expenses are part of the fiscal year 2019-20 budget.

- approved donations including \$10,050 from The Lane School PTO for funds for chorus, art enrichment, differentiated instruction, Fine Arts Night, literacy, the library, physical education and the teacher fund

## Hinsdale Village Board

Among other business Tuesday night, Hinsdale trustees:

- approved a new illuminated ground sign for Eve Assisted Living, 10 N. Washington St. The sign will be located in the middle of the block on Washington Street, behind the lot line and the building. It will replace an illuminated wall sign on the east wall of the main building.

- approved changes to the zoning code defining a major adjustment rather than a minor adjustment. Making this change, officials say, allows more flexibility at a staff level, will save applicants time and money, and keeps the board from having to hear otherwise benign requests as it permits adjustments to be granted by staff. To provide some level of oversight, staff approval would be contingent upon review and approval by the chairs of both the zoning and public safety committee and the plan commission.

- discussed a proposed agreement with the law firm of Ryan and Ryan to provide legal assistance at a cost of \$475 an hour in negotiating and drafting an intergovernmental agreement with the Illinois Tollway to lease and redevelop the Hinsdale Oasis. The board is scheduled to vote on the agreement at its Oct. 1 meeting.



The tight end and wide receiver, respectively, joined the Chicago Bears as undrafted free agents for the preseason training and game schedule.

As a result of their performances, the Bears kept Ives on its 10-member practice squad while the New York Jets signed Bunting to theirs. In this Q&A, the two share what it means to be a pro — and what their hometown means to them.

**What was your reaction when the Bears brought you in as an undrafted free agent?**


**Bunting:** When I got the call from Coach (Matt) Nagy and the Bears, I was ecstatic. I was thankful and excited for the opportunity to continue my football career.

**Ives:** I was thrilled when I initially got the call. It was an honor to be signed by my hometown team and have a chance at playing in the NFL.

**How would you describe your training camp experience?**

**Ives:** It was unlike anything I had ever experienced. Having thousands and thousands of fans out in the summer heat watching practice was special as it confirmed my previous belief that Bears fans are the best in the league.

**Bunting:** Training camp with the Bears was great — they run a tight ship and it's a top-notch program. I played really well in camp and throughout the preseason. Ultimately, my film from the preseason with the Bears would prove to become my resume for the other

teams that were interested in picking me up.

**Was there an instance when it really hit you that you were playing in the NFL?**

**Bunting:** I would say it really hit me when we had our first open practice at Soldier Field toward the end of camp. The energy in that place is contagious and there was a pretty good showing, even though it was just a practice.

**Ives:** Walking into the locker room for the first time and seeing my locker was the first time it really hit me. Then, weeks later, when we were getting dressed for the first preseason game, I got chills seeing my name on the back of the jersey.

**What that first preseason game like?**

**Ives:** It was an exciting experience. It was my first time stepping out onto

Solider Field padded up and in front of fans. Something I dreamed of doing.

**Bunting:** My first preseason game was a blast. I had a handful of receptions for 77 yards in my Bears debut, which was incredibly special for me. My father passed away in 2015 from brain cancer, and 7 was his favorite number, so it was almost poetic that I would have 77 yards in my Bears debut. That one

tion of trust but stressed that the board needs to trust its professional educators and engineers.

Hinsdale Central Principal Bill Walsh read from the administration's recommendation, saying a 10-lane pool would make swim team practices more efficient, provide more pool access to community swim groups and avoid displacing pool-based courses to classrooms to make room for freshman swim instruction.

"A 10-lane-by-40 pool would enable the grade nine students and the aquatics and/or life-guarding classes to use the pool simultaneously. The two classes will be to swim the width of the

pool versus the length of the pool," Walsh said.

The tension surrounding the issue was evidenced early on when, following the audience communication period, Camden's frustrations boiled over concerning accusations of a lack of board transparency posted on social media.

"For those of you that have complained that we're not transparent and we don't do enough by way of broadcasting board meetings and other things, shame on you!" Camden exclaimed. "Listen to what board members say at the board meetings.

"We've all wrestled with this," he said later. "Nobody arrived at a quick decision."

## Post 250 helps keeps vets visible in community

Jack Orbell's service with Hinsdale American Legion Post 250 began six years ago when he said yes — grudgingly — to one simple request.

"They needed some walkers for a Memorial Day parade one year and my uncle dragged me over, and I kind of stayed," he said.

Orbell not only stayed, he's starting his second year as post commander. His family's lineage of post members includes his uncle and his great-uncle. The grandfather and uncle of Orbell's son-in-law have been active in the post as well.

As commander, Orbell oversees business of the post and its 111 members, veterans whose service spans from World War II to Iraq and Afghanistan. One of the post's primary purposes is to educate the community about the service and sacrifice veterans have made. Each year members visit Hinsdale schools on Veterans Day and talk with students about the cost of preserving their freedom.

"The schools really do a nice little presentation for us and honor us along with the grandparents and parents (who served) of any

of the students," he said. "It's good that they are still thinking about veterans and not forgetting how they have the things they have or where it all started or came from."

Orbell was drafted into the Army in 1970 and served from August of that year until April 1972. He spent six months in San Francisco before being shipped out to Germany, a safer destination than six of his buddies faced.

"Three went to Vietnam, three went to Korea," he said.

Spending 10 months overseas in a job with weekends off gave him the chance to see a bit of the world, with visits to Paris and England.

When he returned home, he resumed his job with the Westmont Post Office, which he held until he retired 10 years ago.

Losing WWII veterans like George Hogrewe, who passed away earlier this month, is difficult for the post, Orbell said.

"He was really involved, and he was a good guy," he said of Hogrewe. "It will be a loss for us. We're all dealing with it. We were really thankful that he was here Memorial Day to (read) his last


Thankfully, the reading was recorded.

"He'll live on," Orbell said.

Orwell and other post members worked yesterday to install 100 small American flags on the lawn of the Memorial Building as a reminder of the post's centennial this year. The upcoming milestone resonates with Orbell as a reminder of the service others have put in before him.

"It means that there have been a lot of dedicated veterans that want to stay together and help other veterans and the students and helping out everywhere in the village, whatever we can do, to be represented," he said.

## Railroad safety work is impressive, unfinished

When we see tragedies taking place in other communities or other parts of the country, it's not unusual to think "That wouldn't happen here."

Of course as wonderful a community as Hinsdale is, it offers no real protection from loss.

No one knows that better than the family of Hinsdale's Lauren Wilson, whose life was cut short when the car she was riding in on March 2, 1994, was hit by a train at the village's Monroe Street crossing.

Her father, Dr. Lanny Wilson, has spent the quarter century since working as chair of the DuPage County Railroad Safety Council to prevent further tragedies along the tracks. The council's mission is to prevent deaths and injuries at railroad crossings and along railways.

As we approach the start of the sixth annual Illinois Rail Safety Week (Sept. 22-28), sponsored in part by the DuPage Railroad Safety Council, it seems a fitting time to highlight that group's work.

The council supports four-quadrant gates and would like to see them installed at every highway-rail grade crossing in the Chicago area.

In 1994, when the DuPage Railroad Safety Task Force first formed, there were no four-quadrant

gates in Illinois. Today there are 137, the most in any state. One is at the Monroe Street crossing.

The council also supports the "Sealed Corridor" approach used in North Carolina as a cost-effective measure for more densely populated areas like the one we live in.

Through the council's efforts, the first photo enforcement pilot project at railroad crossings took place in DuPage County. The council also has lobbied for tougher penalties for those who cross the tracks when the gates are down.

While the number of vehicle/train collisions is down, trespasser and suicide incidents are on the rise. The council supports the increased use of pedestrian gates, appropriate fencing, pedestrian bike under- and overpasses, channelization and suicide prevention measures. It has set an ambitious goal of reducing trespassing and suicide fatalities by 50 percent by 2026.

The council's work has not gone unnoticed. It has received a host of awards from groups like the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police and the Federal Railroad Administration.

Of course there's still more to be done.

Illinois ranked fifth in 2018 for the most highway-rail grade crossing collisions, with 109 incidents. Seventeen people were killed and 34

were injured.

Hinsdale police offer the following tips to ensure safety when near railroad tracks:

- Do not walk on railroad tracks or in the right of way on either side of the tracks or climb on rail cars.

- Cross the tracks only at a designated public crossing with a crossbuck, flashing red lights or a gate. Crossing at any other place is trespassing.

- Do not cross the tracks until you can see clearly in each direction after the first train passes, as there may be a second train approaching.

- Wait until the crossing signals stop and gates go up to legally cross the tracks.

- Trust the signals, not the senses. A train's position may be closer or approaching speed faster than one may perceive.

- Use extra caution when crossing tracks with a wheelchair, baby stroller or with any other item that has narrow wheels.

- Always cross the tracks at a 90-degree angle.

We encourage all Hinsdaleans to support the work of the council either directly, by donating talents or resources, or indirectly, by exhibiting and encouraging responsible behavior near train tracks. Save lives. Prevent tragedy.

We are built to take the next step, to attend the university of our dreams and learn about places and things we didn't know existed, to meet people we never imagined we would meet and experience life more on our own terms.




Dominic Sanders, 30, 819

### STUDENTS NAMED SEMIFINALISTS

Fifteen Hinsdale Central High School students have been named semifinalists in the 65th annual National Merit Scholarship Program.

They are Chelsea Biala, Thomas Clark, Catherine Collins, Lucy Fischer, Jessy Huang, Kevin Jin, Alyssa Lee, Daniel Leung, Nicholas Lynch, Selena Ren, Max Schwalb, Ava Severts, Daniel Skora, Jackson Stermer and Lauren Witt.

They and the other 16,000 students who have been named semifinalists now have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,600 National Merit Scholarships worth more than \$31 million that will be offered next spring.

More than 1.5 million juniors in about 21,000 high schools entered the 2020 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2018 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, which served as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of semifinalists, representing less than 1 percent of U.S. high school seniors, includes the highest-scoring entrants in each state. The number of semifinalists in a state is proportional to the state's percentage of the national total of graduating seniors.

To become a finalist, the semifinalist and a high school official must submit a detailed scholarship application, in which they provide information about the student's academic record, participation in school and community activities, demonstrated leadership abilities, employment, and honors and awards received. A semifinalist must have an outstanding academic record throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by a high school official, write an essay, and earn SAT or ACT scores that confirm the student's earlier performance on the qualifying test.

From the 16,000 some semifinalists, about 15,000 are expected to advance to the finalist level, and in February they will be notified of this designation. All National Merit Scholarship winners will be selected from this group of finalists. Merit Scholar designees are selected on the basis of their skills, accomplishments, and potential for success in rigorous college studies, without regard to gender, race, ethnic origin or religious preference.

# ASK AN EXPERT

KIMBERLY PAUL, END OF LIFE PLANNING ADVOCATE

## How do we live like we're dying?

"There's a lot more things scarier than death," remarked author, speaker and podcaster Kimberly Paul.

Like suffering, for instance. Paul thinks people often conflate the two, so many avoid facing the truth that one's life will end.

"We're all dying. How do we live with the knowledge that we are dying every day? Would that change the way that we live? If we can get enough people to think about their mortality every day, our priorities would be a little more in lines with who are and who we want to be."

JourneyCare has invited Paul to give two presentations Thursday, Sept. 26 at The Community House in Hinsdale. The lunch program is entitled "Live Well Die Well: A Journey to Find Connection Personally and Professionally," and her dinner talk is on "Following Your Curiosity: Being Brave is Scary" (see Page 28 for details).

Her book "Bridging the Gap"

and podcast "Death by Design" are other outgrowths of her calling in this arena after working in hospice care for almost 20 years. Paul said the stories she heard from patients about death and dying enlivened her resolve to make every moment matter.

"I found myself at their bedsides, learning a hell of a lot more about life than about death," she said.

The most convicting lesson for her was to shift her focus off of collecting more stuff and on to connecting with more souls.

"The goal in life is to connect with other human beings. It's about having relationships," Paul said.

The relationships that truly give meaning and quality to life, she stressed, include the transactional yet intimate ones with caregivers who help shepherd people through the final stages. One of her missions is to combat the "compassion fatigue" among those who work in hospice and palliative care.

"People are leaving the field every day because they cannot deal with the grief of seeing their patients' dying," Paul said, "I want someone to be there when I'm dying. How do we better take of

those who are taking care of those who are dying?"

She's currently trekking across all 50 states and Canada in her RV to "educate communities, help people feel more comfortable talking about end of life, and empower individuals to reclaim death as a human experience and not a medical event."

It's not exactly the travel experience she always dreamed about.

"It is absolutely scary," Paul admitted, noting that her "Following Your Curiosity" program deals with her journey.

"I'm on a mission that's larger than me. I think people forget that living outside of your comfort zone is scary."

She said the losses she has grieved give her motivation to equip others with the tools — like advance directives — and the vision to live with no regrets.

"I want people to walk away, hopefully thinking, 'I feel empowered to live. How do I change my life in order to live well?' " she said. "I'm trying to inspire people to realize that (life) will end and that they need to plan for the end of life as well as live life."

## ‘There is hope. There is help.’

*Key message of Suicide Prevention Month is that people are not alone*

The National Suicide Prevention Lifeline is asking people to do one thing in recognition of Suicide Prevention Month in September — #BeThe1To.

Be the one to ... ask. Keep them safe. Be there. Help them connect. Follow up.

That can sound like a lot of responsibility. But Community Memorial Foundation in Hinsdale, which sent out this message to 1,000 recipients via email, wants people to know they aren't alone, whether they are considering taking their own life or trying to help someone who is.

“The message is clear. There is hope. There is help,” said Greg DiDomenico, the foundation's president and CEO. “We have the resources in the community. Please reach out.”

One of the most accessible resources is a national crisis text line that operates 24 hours a day seven days a week.

“Their mission is to take people from a hot moment to a moment of cool calm where there is some clarity around decision-making and support in that respect,” said Beth Murin, communications coordinator for CMF. “A lot of the people at the crisis text line have told me it's not just individuals in crisis who use the text line, it's often a parent or a loved one who needs support and resources.”

Those who text the word “NOW” will be connected to a trained vol-

unteer crisis counselor in under five minutes. A supervisor moderates the free and confidential conversations and can alert authorities if the individual is a threat to themselves or someone else, Murin said.

The text line has generated more than 700 conversations from this community and the data shows it has saved lives.

“This statistic is just incredible — there have been 10 active rescues in our service area as a result of the crisis text line,” DiDomenico said.

Another resource is The Living Room in La Grange, a walk-up facility where people with mental illness who are experiencing an increase in their symptoms can get free support.

More than 470 unique visitors went to the La Grange location in its first 2 1/2 years for a total of 1,500 visits and a return rate of 62 percent.

The Living Room, which also has a location in Broadview, is managed by NAMI Metro Suburban in partnership with Pillars Community Health and Healthcare Alternative Systems and supported by Community Memorial Foundation.

The foundation also supports Mental Health First Aid training for adults who want to learn more about good mental health and ways to intervene with someone who is exhibiting symptoms of

mental illness. People can sign up for individual sessions, and groups can schedule training for one eight-hour or two four-hour days.

DiDomenico also encouraged people to visit the foundation's website at <https://www.cmfdn.org> to view the Mental Health Resource Guide and the Youth Suicide Prevention public service announcement.

### HC offers education, support

Relying on available support is an important message from social workers and school psychologists at Hinsdale Central High School.

They encourage students to be aware of signs of depression in themselves and others — and then to call in an adult for help.

“That's the biggest thing that we put to the students — you're not there to be their clinician or therapist,” social worker Jennifer Cave said. “You're there to listen and not be judgmental and not to give advice.”

“If you're hearing anything with suicide, understand that you are not going to tell them what to do, but look for an adult,” she added. “Ask for that help and don't wait. Don't wait for the next day. Tell someone immediately.”

School psychologist Johanna Bruckner agreed.

“It's a lot for you as a teen to handle sometimes and be the judge of that,” she said. “That's where the adults have to come into play.”

Even adults can hesitate to reach out for help, Cave said. She encouraged them to overcome that reluctance. “It's OK to ask for that help for their kids,” she said. “Sometimes I get that from parents, too — that they would rather work within the family.”

The school has not planned any activities specifically for Suicide Prevention Month, but mental health issues will be discussed in October, which is National Depression Education and Awareness Month.

The school uses part of a curriculum created by Erika's Lighthouse, a nonprofit dedicated to educating middle school and high school students about depression. Students will learn to recognize the symptoms of depression (depressed mood, irritability, loss of interest, agitation, changes in sleep, loss of appetite) in a classmate or friend.

“I think part of the message with Erika's Lighthouse is by looking for signs of depression, looking for signs of any mental health concerns, you are kind of preventing it from getting to that point of someone talking about taking their life,” Bruckner said.

Educators also try to help students learn about other things they can do for good mental health, such as exercising, eating right and practicing mindfulness, paying particular notice to their feelings and behaviors.

“We all need to take care of ourselves,” Bruckner said. “It isn't just for when you have signs for depression.”

### Counselors on the front lines

At the Counseling Center at The Community House, Bob Agnoli and his team treat many middle-schoolers and young adults who are struggling with anxiety. Learning the skills to address anxiety and depression early in life can help reduce the likelihood that someone will find themselves experiencing a mental health crisis later on.

“Part of it is learning coping skills,” said Agnoli, director of mental health services. “Anxiety and stress are going to be there throughout their lifetime. Learning skills to manage those emotions at an earlier age that can then be brought into adulthood, I think that helps someone later in life.”

Developing more tools at an earlier age can help young people avoid dangerous coping pitfalls, such as alcohol and drugs, when they get a little older.

Agnoli encouraged parents who are worried that their kids might be depressed or suicidal to ask them specific questions, such as “Are you feeling bad enough or crummy enough that sometimes you feel like you don’t want to be here?”

“We need to acknowledge the fact that it exists and be comfortable talking about it,” he said.

A yes answer doesn’t necessarily mean the person is suicidal but suggests they would benefit from an assessment.

A person who has specific thoughts of harming themselves or a plan to commit suicide should be taken to an emergency room and possibly hospitalized, Agnoli said.

Whatever the individual shares, he recommends reacting with gratitude.

“I think the first response is thanking the person for being willing to share that,” he said.

“That’s a vulnerable thing to share.”

Agnoli agrees with the professionals at Central that everyone can benefit from paying attention to their mental health, practicing mindfulness and staying grounded.

“I think that’s an important part for kids and even adults to be able to incorporate wellness into their routine, into their life, because without it, it’s hard to live to your fullest potential,” he said.

Parents should be honest with their children about the struggles they face themselves, Agnoli stressed, as silence can lead kids to believe that they are the only ones going through a tough time.

He believes the taboo around mental health issues has begun to fade.

“Things have gotten better,” Agnoli said. “People are willing to talk about those things.”

DiDomenico agreed.

“It has become part of the kitchen table conversation,” he said. “We hear people talking about it and reaching out to not just us but to our grantees as well.”

That doesn’t mean there isn’t more to be done, and DiDomenico believes the key to success is a coordinated approach.

“We still have to work together,” he said. “There is still work to be done around increasing awareness and demystifying the stigma — and we can’t do that alone.”



**Mental health** is something everyone should pay attention to, according to school psychologist Johanna Bruckner. “Not everyone experiences full on depression, but everyone experiences low moods, and all of us need to learn ways to cope with low moods.”

## PANTHERS THWART 11U GOLD FALCONS

The inaugural match-up between the Hinsdale Falcons 11U Gold and new league participant the Oswego Panthers did not go as planned for the Falcons, who suffered a narrow 14-7 loss.

Still, the Falcons played extremely well in nearly upsetting the unbeaten Panthers. Hinsdale's offense clicked early with wideouts Evan Bradford and Jameson Hellenga reeling in passes from quarterback Will Lynch on the game's opening drive, only to fail on fourth down deep in Oswego territory. The undaunted and confident Falcons look forward to getting back on the winning track against Downers Grove this Saturday.

## VARSITY BLACK FORCES OVERTIME

The Hinsdale Falcons Senior Black team lost a tough game to the Oswego

Panthers 20-14 in overtime Sept. 15. The Falcons got on the board first after forcing a Panthers turnover on downs, and Magnus Kumskis capitalized as he took a handoff and found his way into the end zone on a 5-yard run.





## Summer was sweet for Caroline

*Hinsdale native demonstrates her tennis talent at the Pan Am Games, U.S. Open*

What constitutes an memorable summer? If you're a professional tennis player like Hinsdale's Caroline Dolehide, the season couldn't have served up a much better sequence of thrills and delights than 2019's just did.

To kick it off, the USTA chose Dolehide to represent Team USA at the Pan Am Games in Lima, Peru. It was a smart choice. On Aug. 3, she and partner Usue Arconada became the first American gold medalists in women's doubles since 1991 at the quadrennial sporting event. The duo didn't drop a set en route to the championship, despite a slippery red clay surface and a crowd that was not exactly hospitable to the athletes

from up north.

"We had a lot of confidence," Dolehide said during a visit to Hinsdale right after the games, adding that she and Arconada had won two tournaments in the U.S. and placed second in two others in the months before Lima. "We're really good friends, that's what made it work well. We came here to win the gold medal, and we actually did it."

She said her eyes welled up on the medal stand as the U.S. flag was hoisted to the strains of "The Star-Spangled Banner." But hold the celebration. Dolehide had to rest for her singles final the next day.

The tough, back-and-forth match ultimately went her Argentinian opponent's way in a third-set tiebreaker. That just meant Dolehide received a silver to complement her gold.

"Words can't describe how nervous I was going into every one of those matches," admitted a smiling Dolehide of her singles draw. "Being out there alone and playing for your country, it was very, very nerve-wracking. The atmosphere was just so intense."

As a Pan Am Games singles finalist, she also moves up the priority list for selection to the country's 2020 Tokyo Olympics contingent.

"There's still a little bit of hope, and I still have a little bit of time to get my ranking up," she said. Dolehide's current world rankings are 201 in singles and a career-high 69 in doubles.

There's nothing like winning tournaments to boost one's ranking, and that's what unfolded the week of Aug. 12 as she carried her newfound medalist's confidence into the Thoreau Tennis Open in Concord, Mass. Dolehide needed the benefit of a wild card to get into the tournament, where she proceeded to vanquish a series of higher ranked adversaries and capture the title. A video posted on the tournament's Facebook page shows Dolehide joined by all of the ball kids in a victory plunge in the tennis club's pool.

Next up was the U.S. Open. Dolehide had played in both the qualifying and main draw of New York's Grand Slam event before. But this was different, she said.

"This was the first time that I felt like I truly belonged there and could go really far, in the sense that I just felt calmer in general," Dolehide explained. "Emotionally, and everything else that comes with playing on the biggest stage in the world, plays a huge part in performing. I truly believe that playing in the past, under the lights, in extreme New York summer heat, when Kelly Clarkson

Caroline Dolehide's breakout 2018 season propelled her to a career high world singles ranking of 102. After a slow start in 2019, she's found her stroke in both singles and doubles with impressive performances at high-level venues.

performed on center court, etc., gave me the experience I needed to come back and show what I've learned."

Dolehide made it through the three qualifying rounds. Her reward was a first-round match with China's Qiang Wang, a top-20 player in the world. It was a tight 6-4, 6-4 contest won by Wang (who, incidentally, just kept winning until Serena Williams upended her in the quarterfinals). It was a validating experience, Dolehide said via email from Orlando where she lives and trains.

"I will remember the confidence that came from the work I did before the U.S. Open and seeing it show by winning three singles matches and then learning from my loss against Wang," she wrote.

In the doubles bracket, Dolehide was paired up with veteran and former U.S. Open women's doubles champion Vania King. The unseeded tandem soon

showed they were a natural fit. After a tense three-set opening round victory, they won three straight matches to set up a semifinal against the world's fourth ranked team.

"Officially becoming apart of the 'Final 8 Club' at the U.S. Open was exciting," she said, made even more special by "having most of my family come out to support."

Dolehide, who turned 21 this month, said her maturity as a professional continues to develop.

"My experiences around the world with different cultures and people have taught me how much we all have in common, especially in sport," she said. "The common goal of work ethic is something I look for in people that I surround myself with, and it's really fun to see others try to reach their goals.

"My goal is to maximize my potential, and I am getting closer to that goal every day."


