Land Rover opens, landscaping unfinished

The Land Rover and Jaguar dealership in Hinsdale opened for business at its new 336 E. Ogden Ave. site last week, but neighboring residents and village officials say items related to the project still need to be completed.

At Tuesday's village board meeting, Village President Tom Cauley used his president's report to address residents' concerns about the absence of landscaping that the Bill Jacobs dealership agreed to install on the east side of the property facing Oak Street.

"The ordinance that we passed called for eight-foot bushes there, and there are not eight-foot bushes there now," Cauley said, noting other plantings slated to go in adjacent to the Franklin Avenue cul de sac. "The only reason why we can't dothat right now is just the weather."

Village manager Kathleen Gargano said her staff plans to meet with dealership officials to work on a landscape design for that Oak Street access point that residents can accept.

"We would work to have a final plan in concept by mid-February so that (residents) would know what would happen, and (the landscaping) would be planted during springtime," she said.

The delayed installation of the concrete boundary wall along the back of the site has also been a point of contention with residents. Cauley said the wall has now been installed and "looks fabulous." Light poles originally planned for the site were deemed too tall.

"Once we learned about it, we went out there and told them these light poles are too high, and we shortened them," Cauley said.

During citizen comments, Oak Street resident Edward Wavak said the dealership has been keeping the lights on too bright after closing.

"We do need to make sure that the lights dim at night, pursuant to the ordinance," he said.

And Wavak also urged officials to apprise the business of its responsibility regarding sidewalk snow removal and the need to keep car transport trucks off residential streets.

"Delivery of vehicles clogs up Oak Street, and they should have the trucks in the parking lot," Wavak

Gargano said the village can institute regulations to compel that.

"We can look at restricting truck access from Oak and Fuller, which would then force them to have to come in off of Ogden, briefly go down Oak, and then turn around," Gargano said.

At the outset of his remarks, Cauley spent several minutes defending the agreement that kept the dealership — Hinsdale's single biggest sales tax generator — from leaving the village in exchange for sales tax relief and re-purposing the deteriorating former GM training center facility in the process.


"I really do think this Land Rover arrangement was very good financially for the village, and we're committed to resolving any remaining issues with the residents," he said.

Trustee Jerry Hughes said the dealership is both an important revenue source and an enterprise patronized by many Hinsdale residents.

"It's not as if it's a business that's of no interest to the people who live here," Hughes said. "It's something that many residents like having in town."

Land Rover's former location next door at 300 E. Ogden Ave. is expected to go up for sale, Cauley noted, and another dealership is at the top of village officials' wish list.

Cafetorium does double duty at new HMS

Spacious room filled with natural light offers more than a place for kids to eat lunch

The 6,650-square-foot space was home to 50 actors, 22 crew members and 300 audience members for the final performance of this year's musical, "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown" at Hinsdale Middle School Saturday night.

Less than 48 hours later, more than 700 kids ate lunch in the same space during a two-hour period on Monday.

Such is life at the HMS cafetorium, a multipurpose room designed for day-to-day functionality and special occasions.

On a daily basis, the 5,000-square-foot cafe seats 240 students at circular tables of eight during each of the three lunch periods. That seating arrangement is quite a bit different than what students knew in the old HMS commons and required some adjustments in dining groups, Assistant Principal Rocky May said Tuesday.

"We used to have long foldable tables that accommodated eight on a side. The round tables of eight have had some social ramifications," he said. "We actually rehearsed it the whole last week before break last year."

He appreciates the natural light that fills the space and the ease with which he can monitor students, who have only one way in and one way out. And when the weather is nice, students can exit doors on the south side of the cafetorium to enjoy some fresh air.

He also noted the stage, which runs almost the entire length of the east side of the room.

"The raised stage is a nice feature in this setting," he said.

Ashley Sipka, vocal music and drama teacher at HMS and one of the directors of "Charlie Brown," agreed.

"I'd say the greatest advantage is all the black," she said. "We have a black floor, black walls, black ceiling, black curtains, so the kids pop on stage, especially when they are well-lit."

The vibrantly colored costumes for the musical really

stood out, Sipka noted.

"I don't think they would have shown up nearly as well in the old commons space," she said.

The old HMS commons, an open space in the center of the school which also served double duty as lunchroom and performance space, did have one advantage the new space does not.

"It was a gem in terms of sight lines," Sipka said. "When you sat people in the commons, you could put kids every which way and they would be visible."

That's not the case with a traditional raised stage. But the new space offers many features the old one did not.

"We have the state-of-theart lighting system, and we've honestly barely scratched the surface of what it can do. It's going to take years to figure it all out," she said.

The self-contained nature of the space — which May

also mentioned — makes it a better spot for preparing a show.

"Rehearsals on my stage are awesome. I don't have the basketball team running through after a game," Sipka said

The stage will be used for performances again next week for the winter concert on Dec. 19, then in January for the sixth-grade musical and in March for the one-act plays

Perhaps the most important attribute of the new stage is the response it has elicited from student actors.

"Even though we have sight line issues in the new space, the kids feel so special on our state-of-the-art stage," Sipka said. They see that gorgeous stage space ... (and) they feel like professionals.

"We may have to work a little harder to make sure they're all seen, but they sure feel good about the space."

MEETING ROUNDUP

Hinsdale Village Board

Among other business Tuesday, trustees:

- approved a 2019 village tax levy for \$13.7 million, which includes \$3.42 million for the Hinsdale Public Library. After approved debt service abatements of about \$3.18 million, the total levy will amount to just over \$10.5 million.
- affirmed village support for a pedestrian bridge at 47th Street as part of the Illinois Tollway's expansion of the Central Tri-State Tollway. The Hinsdale and Western Springs communities were given surveys by the Tollway to determine if the bridge should be rebuilt at its current location in a residential area connecting Minneola Street in Hinsdale with Maple Street in Western Springs or relocated to 47th Street, linking the villages' Veeck and Spring Rock parks. Trustees have expressed support for the 47th Street location, but Brad Bloom, assistant village manager, told trustees that Western Springs residents have indicated support for keeping it where it is. Others in Western Springs, however, agree with Hinsdale.

"The park district in Western Springs supports the 47th Street location. The police department in Western Springs supports the 47th Street location," Bloom said. The Tollway, he explained, has directed the towns to reach a consensus or lose the bridge.

"If there isn't a consensus between the two communities, the bridge is not going to be built," Bloom related. Village President Tom Cauley said he sided with the 47th Street location after designs showed that a new bridge at Minneola would look like "an obstacle course that weaves in and out" due to a switchback to comply with ADA regulation. Bloom said Hinsdale residents adjacent the bridge are unanimously opposed to keeping it there

• approved the purchase of a new patrol vehicle for \$44,000. On Sept. 3, a police Ford Explorer XLT Police Interceptor was involved in an accident and deemed totaled by its insurance carrier, which provided \$16,775 toward a replacement. The village's capital improvement plan budgeted \$44,000 for the purchase; the cost after insurance is expected to be \$27,225.



Hinsdale police take part in road safety campaign



He has had quite a successful career as well, spending 17 years at Northern Trust Co. before starting his own firm, which he

later sold.

"You have to really want to go to work every day. That's the job you have to find and I found it very early," Burridge said.
"Investing is such an intriguing business — and money maker. You can work and get rich at the same time.'

His financial success naturally led to his involvement in philanthropic endeavors.

"It seemed to me if I made good money, I should give some of that back. I've had that feeling and way of life for a long time."

The causes he has supported are too numerous to list, ranging from the Burridge Center for Securities and Valuation he established in 1999 at the University of Colorado (his alma mater) to serving as chairman of Blue Cross of Illinois to being a director and former chairman for Wellness House in Hinsdale.

Success in life can be boiled down to two decisions, he said. when asked what advice he's given his three sons, Dick Jr., Scott and Peter.

"There are only two things

important in life — the person you marry and the job you have. The rest of it is just busy work," Burridge said.

Oh, and invest your money.

"The first thing you do is take your savings out, your investment money out, and you never have to worry about retirement."


Dick Jr. said his father has had immeasurable influence.

"His conviction regarding how to succeed as an investor has had a huge impact on me, my colleagues and our clients, making it impossible to quantify the impact he has had during his career/ life," Dick Jr. said.

Next month will mark 10 years since Burridge lost his wife of 51 years, Nan. And he can't get around as easily as he once did. But the challenges of advancing age have not dampened his spirit.

"People make up their minds at age 70 that life is over," he said. "Change is inevitable. Change occurs for all of us. It's how you adjust to that change and welcome it and grow with it."

Nutcrackers cue memories of Christmases past

I should have taken more nutcrackers.

My mother-in-law wanted me to take more. She wanted us to take lots of things as she and my father-in-law were clearing out the Western Springs house they had lived in for almost 50 years.

Sandra had struggled with rheumatoid arthritis and other ailments for years, and eventually the stairs proved too much for her. She and my father-in-law, John, were moving into a condo at Lake Hinsdale Village, where everything would be on one floor and their unit had a view of the lake.

Unfortunately, she spent very little time there before she ended up in the hospital, then in rehab, then in assisted living in Lombard.

But we didn't know that at the time. We only knew they had six weeks to move out and she was envisioning a packing process — in which we'd come over for dinner and look through some things and

take what we wanted — that we estimated would require at least a year.

Ainsley was a preschooler and Dan was traveling and I had work. Their move, to be honest, was one additional stressor at an already stressful time. We already had too much stuff of our own. We wondered why they hadn't started cleaning out the house earlier. And

were surprised by just how emotionally attached Sandra was to soooo many of her possessions.

We saw the move as a good thing
— to a location just a couple of miles
away and a space that would be

We celebrated only one Christmas at their new address, in 2015. The following Christmas she was in the nursing home at Lexington Square and in February 2017, she died.

I think of her often, especially at this time of year. I have so many wonderful memories of celebrating the holidays with her and John.

We'd open presents Christmas Eve at their house, and while John was still working as a mailman in downtown Hinsdale, he did a fair amount of shopping at the jewelry stores on his

route. We'd go around the room, taking turns opening one gift at a time. After we were all done, Sandra always had a sizable stack of small unopened gifts from John.

Then there was the Christmas at our house, when Ainsley was 2 or 3 and Sandra gave her a beautiful new baby doll and a lovely crib. Sandra just beamed as Ainsley put her new baby doll to bed over and over in the new crib, thrilled that her grand-daughter loved the gifts she had

given her.

Our Christmas tree is filled with ornaments Sandra gave us as gifts, beautiful glass globes she discovered on vacation and cat ornaments she gave me when Wrigley was still alive.

I unpacked the nutcrackers Sandra gave me Sunday. She picked out four and sent them home with Dan after he was helping them pack one day. They are charming. I have a chimney sweep, a snowman, a soldier and the one I've always loved, the cheesemonger. They sit on top of a china cabinet that was in Sandra's dining room when she was a child.

I say I should have taken more nutcrackers, but I don't really want them. I long for something else — to celebrate Christmas with the wonderful woman who gave them to me.

Ours is a family of immigrants

More than 10,000
years ago, people
began migrating
from Eurasia to
North America.
Because sea levels
were low, they
could walk across
a small landmass
where the Bering
Straits are today.
Over millennia,
their descendants
spread throughout the
Americas.

Much later, after Columbus, the first Europeans resettled in what is now the United States. In time, people who left foreign countries as voluntary migrants or refugees to seek a permanent home here or elsewhere became known as "immigrants."

Recently, my brother and I pored over family documents that illuminated much of our own immigration historv. We learned that, in the 1720s, one branch of ancestors arrived from Germany to the American colonies. Most others emigrated from **England and Germany** before 1860, perhaps seeking economic opportunities or fleeing tumultuous conditions. Unfortunately, despite my brother's persistent efforts, we have little information about Dad's paternal lineage.

Our son and daughter-inlaw's research echoed many findings and added details about my husband's ancestors. Big picture: Most arrived from England and Germany in New York between 1818 and 1870, including at least one who fought in the Civil War. His mom's relatives were perhaps in Connecticut by the 1770s, but with

"Smiths," it's hard to be sure.

In addition to our ancestors' journeys are stories of those who arrived more recently, all of whom eventually became citizens.

Our son-inlaw moved with his family from England to the

Yukon Territory. He later moved to Montreal and then to Chicago in 1996 for a new job. Our daughter-in-law told us that her mom's family fled poverty in India in the late 1800s by going to Trinidad as indentured servants. Her mom arrived here in 1961 after marrying a man from Peoria.


Our family also includes a sister-in-law who, in 1955 at age 7, came here alone from her impoverished Irish family to live with relatives who had lost a child. She missed her brothers and sisters terribly but eventually reconnected with them. Years later, her daughter married a man from Nigeria who traveled to New York City in 1982 when his father worked at the Nigerian Consulate.

Many in my family are here because our forebears made brave, perhaps desperate decisions to leave their homeland for a better life. Others, as we've seen, arrived in various circumstances. At its very core, ours is a family of immigrants, which is why I find it impossible to imagine our country without sustained robust immigration.



What are some end-of-year financial tips?

Investors have a lot to celebrate in 2019, with the Dow Jones Industrial Average up nearly 20 percent this year. But with big gains come the potential for considerable tax liability if those profits are not prudently managed. That's where Iris Sagrado and Glenn Stears of 360Blue Financial Strategies in Hinsdale come in.

"Mutual fund companies have a lot to distribute in terms of capital gains, so the probability of people being hit (with taxes) and caught by surprise is greater than last year," Stears said.

Sagrado said IRAs have become an even more attractive tax shelter this year after the IRS raised contribution limits, based on one's age.

"If you're under 50, you can put up to \$6,500 this year into an IRA or a Roth IRA. If you're 50 and over, you can do up to \$7,000 on those accounts," she said.

Another option that grandparents, in particular, are drawn to is a 529 College Savings Plan, of which

many states have their own version.

"Now the time to get (the savings plan contribution) in and give it as a Christmas present," Sagrado remarked.

That's not to suggest parents can't open a 529 account, as well.

"(They) can get a tax deduction, also," she noted.

Sagrado urged people who turned age 70 1/2 in 2019 to make sure to take out their required minimum distribution.

"Because if you don't, they charge you 50 percent of whatever needed to come out for the year for any IRAs," she said.

"We want to make sure nobody falls through the cracks," Stears added, citing cases where funds were transferred from one carrier to another but the RMD was not tracked. "We've worked really hard to make sure that nobody gets caught by surprise."

Diversifying one's holdings is a sound strategy for clients, he stressed.

"They might have some that's in tax-free and some that's in tax-deferred and some in long-term growth," Stears said. "We can help through how they have their money positioned and lessen the

amount of taxes that they pay."

December is also a time when clients' thoughts turn to estate planning to provide for their loved ones.

"Everybody's thinking about family," Sagrado said. "Sometimes they have to change their beneficiaries or set up those wills and trusts."

The two teamed up in 2008, a partnership boasting more than half a century of financial planning experience (39 years for Stears, 13 for Sagrado).

"What we've always found is that clients pick up on the chemistry that we have together," Stears commented.

"We still have Glenn's first client from 1980!" Sagrado interjected.

They said the Great Recession is still fresh in people's minds and influencing their appetite for risk. Stears said people's attention now should be on the making the right decisions for an optimal fiscal position heading into 2020.

"As of Dec. 31, a lot of things get locked in," Stears said, while noting that IRA contributions can be made up to April 15. "Being prepared and attending to the details is a lot of what we're doing."





Village holiday traditions shine bright

From luminaria to open house, events give Hinsdale that hometown holiday feel

Part of what makes the holidays special are the traditions that adults and children alike come to know and love. One group of residents is bringing a special tradition back to life this holiday season, while two organizations are inviting residents to annual events that promise to help get folks in the Christmas spirit.

Luminaria tradition reignited

The residents of Golfview Hills will resurrect a longtime holiday tradition this year by setting out luminaria on Christmas Eve. Once a steadfast ritual in the Hinsdale neighborhood, the lights went out on the initiative more than a decade ago.

"My goal was to have 75 residents participate," said Jaworski, who has far surpassed that goal.

More than 100 homeowners will line the streets in front of their properties with candle-lit paper bags at dusk on Christmas Eve. An alternate date has been set for Jan. 1, in the event that weather is an issue.

In the season's spirit of giving, sales of the luminaria kits will benefit

Bridge Communities, an organization that helps people in DuPage County overcome homelessness through mentoring, housing and support services.

Jaworski said her neighbors aren't the only ones to get behind the return of luminaria in Golfview Hills. Generous donations from homeowners and businesses have lowered the cost of the project and increased the amount available to support Bridge Communities to \$2,500.

Jaworski said the luminaria will be displayed predominantly on 58th, Thurlow and Monroe streets. She hopes neighbors in Golfview Hills and beyond will pass through on Christmas Eve to witness the beauty of the luminaria and the magic of neighbors working together.

"It's inspiring. It's an opportunity to find some peace and unity together as a community," Jaworski said, and to share that peace and unity with all who pass by.

Assembly instills lifetime of service for local teens

After spending their first few months away at school, a group of students will return home to Hinsdale over winter break to celebrate their cumulative efforts volunteering and raising money for a vital nonprofit.

I want to get above a 190 average and I would like to get a 600 series.

Will you continue bowling after high school?

There's not many colleges with bowling, but I would definitely do some adult leagues here and there.

Why does coach Alex Hipskind like having him on the team?

Max has been with the program for all four years and has experienced highs and lows during that time period. He always remains the same – unflappable. Max does not allow anything to impact him. He just shows up and bowls for us. His actions are great for the younger guys - he's dealing with a pretty significant thumb injury but does not complain or make excuses. 



Roster size: 20



Who to watch: Senior Cullen Cochlan is a Pitt recruit and is a key component as a returning state qualifier in the butterfly and a relay member finalist; junior Nolan Lahmann swims backstroke and butterfly and the medley relay; senior Michael Benington in the IM and a state qualifier in the 500 freestyle; senior Alex Daw, a Saint Louis University recruit, in the IM and breaststroke; junior John Tischke in freestyle and butterfly; and junior Erkan Ozgen in sprint freestyle, with the potential to fill holes for us.

Season outlook: We don't really know in conference where we fall. There are lot of strong teams, and it looks like LT could run away with it, so we're going to be chasing them both at conference and sectionals. Any given year, we're looking to be a top-10 team.

Head coach: Jason Hayes


Years as head coach: 11 Roster size: 41
