

Next principal of Monroe School named

An experienced school administrator and Illinois native is the new principal of Monroe School.

The Community Consolidated District 181 Board approved a oneyear contract with Kristin Reingruber at its May 4 meeting.

Reingruber comes to District 181 after 13 years with North Palos District 117, where she served most recently as principal of Glen Oaks Elementary School and previously as assistant principal (Oak Ridge Elementary School), curriculum team leader (Oak Ridge Elementary School) and Technology Instruction Coordinator (districtwide). She began her career as a fourth grade teacher at Irving Elementary School in Berwyn District 100.

"We are impressed with Mrs. Reingruber's qualifications and look forward to her taking the helm at Monroe School," said board President Margaret Kleber. "We have high standards for our school leaders, and Kristin's track record proves that she has the drive and qualities that we look for on our administrative leadership team."

Reingruber, who lives in Brookfield with her husband, Mike, and kindergarten-age son, Tyler, is an Reingruber Illinois native originally from

the small town of Ladd. She said her drive to serve as an educator springs from an innate desire to help others.

"I've always felt like I'm the kind of person who wants to take care of people and do whatever I can to meet their needs or help them become a better version of themselves," she said.

"Kristin's enthusiasm, passion for education, focus on collaboration and success in her previous leadership roles made her a standout candidate for this position," said Hector Garcia, District 181 superintendent. "We are excited to introduce her to



the Monroe community and look forward to her joining our administrative team."

A former volleyball player, Reingruber said her "coaching mentality" drives her leadership style.

"I like to listen to people and understand their perspective," she said. "When

you see where someone is coming from, you can work with them and see what will best meet their needs. I appreciate that everyone is different, so you have to meet them where they are and coach them to that next

Teamwork is another cornerstone of her philosophy.

When we all come together for a collective purpose and work together to meet the needs of our students, that's when we experience success. It's not an individual thing but something that we all have a hand in," she said.

In coming to District 181, Reingruber said she's particularly excited about the unique attributes of Monroe.

"It's clearly a special school and I love how the Living Garden and Monroe Bees bring the community together," she said. "I'm looking forward to working with a new group of leaders and teachers. It's inspiring and invigorating for me to challenge myself and try something new."

Formerly a triathlon and Ironman competitor, Kristin describes her family as "outdoorsy and active."

"We do a lot of hiking, a lot of walks and runs," she said. "We love to be out in nature."

Her first official day on the job will be July 1. She replaces Justin Horne, who will be the new principal at Timothy Christian School in Elmhurst, where he and his family live. She will earn \$109,000 her first

Town's past stands out in the present

Hinsdale's stewards of preservation share their favorite specimens from the rich landscape

May is Historic Preservation Month, and who better to weigh in on the observance than members of Hinsdale's historic preservation commission? The Hinsdalean asked commissioners to each submit a structural selection — be it residential or within the historic downtown — that represents the kind of vintage architecture that for which the village is prized.

Commissioner Sandy Williams, stumped by the challenge of choosing one from the plentiful options, instead contributed her thoughts on the value of such timeless treasures.

"Every well-maintained older structure that displays the quality and style of another century adds to the character of Hinsdale. Our village is a beautiful, diverse, old community. Our historically significant homes, large or small, tell the unique story of Hinsdale's past. These tangible remains importantly reveal who we were and what we value today."

Here are the picks from the other commissioners:



• 419 S. Oak. This was the home of Mr. Clarke, our former village president, who, with the assistance of the American Legion chapter, led the fund drive to raise the money to build the Memorial Building. — *John Bohnen*



• 46 S. County Line is a Tudor Revival designed by R. Harold Zook. The home, built in the 1920s, has been thoughtfully restored by its new owners, whose attention to detail and restoration is amazing. While building this home, Zook incorporated several geometric patterns into his design, including a large chevron pattern over one of the three fireplaces on the first floor. My favorite, however, are the numerous wood cutout four leaf clovers that adorn the front of the home. The home boasts traditional Cotswold cottage features, which make the famed architect's homes so distinctive, as well as ornamental ironwork, exposed beams and intricate brickwork. — *Alexis Braden*



• 101 S. Washington, the old Gap building (and current site of Marcus), built in 1927 by the architect William G. Burfield for Hinsdale State Bank. It's a classical revival design, and facades are of terra cotta articulations and brick masonry. — Frank Gonzales



• The Hinsdale Memorial Building, "a gift from a grateful community," completed in 1928. It is elegant, restrained, enjoys pride of place in Hinsdale's front yard, and it establishes Colonial Revival as one of Hinsdale's primary and timeless architectural styles. More importantly, by choosing to model the building on Independence Hall in Philadelphia, it makes direct reference to our nation's founding and is therefore an appropriate home for our village government and our public library. Most importantly, it was constructed with private donations from village residents as a memorial to the Hinsdaleans who served and died in World War I,

and to that memorial have been added the names of other Hinsdaleans who have paid the ultimate price in the wars and conflicts that have occurred in the century since. — *Bill Haarlow*



• My choice would be 106 E. Eighth St. In the late '90s (my firm) designed the restoration of the original roof structure and front porch that had been eliminated at some juncture in the distant past. This allowed us to create the third-floor ball room. Part of the project was to enlarge the home to the south, which required the addition to match the original house at all level of detail including millwork, stairs, tile, lighting, etc. The finished addition is seamless with the original house. We had awesome clients and we had so much fun restoring the house that it still remains one of my favorites. — *Jim Prisby*



• I am going to call out the R. Harold Zook home at 347 N. Elm St. This historic home is already well-known as a significant home in our village, due to the local celebrity status of its architect. However, my guess is very few know that this home, built in 1936, is a twin to Zook's own home, now sitting at Katherine Legge Memorial Park, as the interior layout of both these homes are extremely similar, and it is their placement on their lots that causes a second look. — *Shannon Weinberger*

Most of known COVID cases at ManorCare

A total of 167 Hinsdale residents have confirmed cases of COVID-19 as of May 12, compared to 126 a week ago.

The DuPage County Health Department reported 159 confirmed cases in Hinsdale and the Cook County Health Department reported 9 confirmed cases in the village as of May 12.

Included in Hinsdale's totals are 147 cases and 19 deaths associated with ManorCare, according to the Illinois Department of Public Health.

Amita Hinsdale Hospital had 25 confirmed COVID-19 patients and 10 patients awaiting test results on Tuesday, a spokeswoman said.

DuPage County has a total of org.

5,117 confirmed cases, including 259 deaths, up from 3,922 cases and 206 deaths a week ago.

A total of 3,062 cases in DuPage, including 601 deaths, are related to long-term care facilities in the county.

Hinsdale Restaurant Week goes virtual

Campaign to boost local dining options during shutdown will serve up tasty dishes

Hinsdale's first Virtual Restaurant Week is set for May 18-24. Don't worry — the food will be real. And delicious.

At Vistro, chef/owner Paul Virant's carryout menu will feature a family meal for four with fish and chips, celery root remoulade, a choice of salad (little gem, Caesar or kale) and bread pudding for desert for \$60.

Virant recently resumed carry-out service at Vistro (and Vie in Western Springs) May 1 after closing the restaurants completely for six weeks. In addition to the family meals, Vistro is offering select menu favorites, cocktail kits and more. This past Sunday Virant offered a special Mother's Day brunch menu.

Business has been good, he said.

"It's a unique week because we have Mother's Day and we're doing stuff for that, too," he said last week. "We're going to have a good week."

Given Gov. JB Pritzker's Restore Illinois plan, which allows restaurants to open in Phase 4, Virant does not expect to welcome customers back to his dining room until the end of June at the earliest.

"Hopefully what we're doing makes sense," he said. "We're going to continue to do the family meals for four. That will change each week to keep things interesting and then we'll have an additional a la carte menu."

Virant is excited about the

Vistro Snack tray, a riff on a Wisconsin supper club relish tray, and the steak frites with an aged strip steak and homemade steak sauce. A favorite dessert is the Sundae Fun Day Kit with hard packed ice cream (vanilla, roasted strawberry or cookie dough), house sprinkles, homemade magic shell topping, toasted pecans, seasonal fruit preserves and whipped cream.

At Giuliano's, owners Cathy and Mick Weisz have been working to perfect curbside and no-contact delivery since the dining room was closed in March.

"I feel very fortunate for what we do have right now," Cathy said. "We have great customers. We've been very, very lucky."

The restaurant's diverse menu offers something for everyone, she said, from chicken tenders and buttered noodles for kids to more sophisticated dishes like rigatoni and vodka sauce.

"People don't think of Giuliano's for burgers or ribs but we've got it," she said.

Many have been placing orders for healthy options.

"Our harvest bowl has done really well. The market salad has done really well," Cathy said. "It makes me tear up thinking how amazing our customers have been."

At a time when the dining room is closed and catering business has been lost, she and Mick appreciate the opportunity to be part of the restaurant week promotion — and everything else the village has done.

"By letting us sell wine and beer, just trying to help us manage this crisis, they have been very supportive," she said.

Cooking up the plan

The idea for Hinsdale's Virtual Restaurant Week came from another suburb, said Heather Bereckis, superintendent of parks and recreation for the village.

"We saw the city of Wheaton

was doing a virtual restaurant week," she said. "We said, 'Why not try it?'

"With everything going on, I know everyone is really struggling," Bereckis added. "We want to make sure we're drawing attention to our local businesses."

The village and its economic development commission already sponsor a restaurant week in March. The virtual version will include establishments that have participated in that and some newcomers. (For a list of participating restaurants visit https://www.hinsdaledining.com.)

"Ultimately the goal is to just get as much publicity out there for all of them as possible," said Sammy Hanzel, recreation supervisor, who also is working on the event.

Jill Sunderson, chair of the village's economic development commission, said she hopes the week reminds residents that restaurants are a vital part of the village's charm and residents' quality of life.

"Virtual Restaurant Week is one additional way to keep our residents safely engaged with our local restaurants during a time when it's easy to disengage," she said. "We hope this virtual event continues to drive awareness that our favorite restaurants are open curbside for many of the familiar meals that we've grown to love over the years."

Program strengthens teen's commitment to service

Volunteer work has always been part of Dot McCarthy's life. From preparing breakfast for guests at the PADS homeless shelter to raking leaves for senior neighbors, McCarthy said she enjoys giving back to her community any way she can.

Involvement in Community Memorial Foundation's second annual Young Community Changemakers program allowed her to take her commitment to service to a whole new level.

The Young Community Changemakers program, also known as YC2, is a leadership development program designed to educate and empower local youth to become the next generation of philanthropists.

"It's something that allows you to be more in charge and directly involved," McCarthy said — a rare opportunity for someone her age.

Made up of juniors and seniors from Nazareth Academy and Lyons Township High School, YC2 is an opportunity for young people to explore the needs around them. They then decide as a group how to best address those needs through \$15,000 in funding.

Before deciding where the funding would go, students agreed to focus their efforts on equity in health care and education. They then reviewed applications from almost 40 area programs. The group's work took a turn earlier this year when schools closed due to the COVID-19 crisis. Meetings became virtual, but the work continued, resulting in the decision to split the money between Alivio Medical Center, and School and Tutors on Wheels, now known as TEACH.

McCarthy said she came away from the experience with a wider, more realistic view of the needs of nonprofit organizations within the community. Among other things, she learned about the behind-thescenes needs and overhead costs that must be met in order for any organization to effectively pursue its mission. She also gained a clearer understanding of how to best use her own resources.

"This experience really changed my views on what philanthropy actually is," she said.

Nazareth Academy Principal

Therese Hawkins said McCarthy was an obvious choice for the YC2 program.

"Dot fully embodies Nazareth's pillars of scholarship, service, spirit and unity," Hawkins said. "Her personal qualities of optimism, compassion and desire to leave a positive mark on her world are inspiring and make her an outstanding role model as a young woman."

Even while sheltering in place, McCarthy and her family have found ways to serve by sewing masks and making cards for seniors.

"We're very lucky in that we are able to give to others," she said.

As she prepares to enter her senior year, McCarthy has begun to consider what she will study in college and where she will go. She said any path she chooses will include ways to give of her time, talent and treasure. Thanks to her experience with YC2, she said she has a better understanding of how to use those gifts for the greatest good.

On-street dining is just an idea — but a good one

Beep, beep, beep. Let's back up a bit.

Despite the media hype that might suggest otherwise, Hinsdale will not offer outdoor dining on its downtown streets in the near future. Village officials are not planning to violate Gov. JB Pritzker's five-phase plan to Restore Illinois.

What they are doing is starting a conversation about steps the village could take to expand restaurant capacity once eateries are allowed to reopen in phase 4. Many expect that won't happen until the end of June at the earliest, but the time to plan is now (as Village President Tom Cauley notes in a letter to the editor on Page 11).

Even though this idea still isn't fully formed, we are as intrigued by it as are Cauley, village trustees and village manager Kathleen Gargano.

Yes, there are many concerns that must be addressed: How will the plan ensure an even playing field for all establishments? What about restaurants like Nabuki that are thriving with carryout? What about the retailers who were forced to close for weeks and finally have been able to open for curbside pickup?

But we believe these obstacles can be overcome if all parties work together in a spirit of collaboration and creativity.

Street closures could be limited to a certain night of the week, like Thursdays to replace the Uniquely Thursdays series that is likely to be canceled. Or they could occur only on weekends when many retailers are closed. Outdoor seating could be limited for each restaurant to the number of tables it lost indoors due to social distancing requirements.

Or maybe the key to making this work is to think even bigger and transform most of the downtown into a pedestrian mall during July and August. The parking deck is set to be open by that time, which would allow convenient parking with easy access to the central business district.

Restaurants along Washington Street could be furnished with a platform to account for the slope of the street. Retailers could take advantage of space outdoors to showcase their wares and ensure social distancing for customers. A concierge area in the parking deck could serve as a pick-up area for merchandise from any store

in town.

We know there are other considerations to be addressed and other questions to be asked, with parking for employees who work downtown at the top of the list. But it is a discussion worth having, and we encourage the village to assemble a task force of restaurant owners and retailers to work with the village's economic development commission on the concept. Spend the next few weeks developing a plan that will be ready for implementation when phase 4 begins.

Some business owners downtown already have expressed concerns. We encourage all merchants to focus on the possibilities for the central business district as a whole and to devote their energies to finding creative fixes for any problems they anticipate.

Hinsdale is filled with intelligent, creative and committed business owners and residents. We are confident they can work together to brainstorm innovative ways to bring patrons to town this summer. That way, when we finally reach phase 5 and return to normalcy, there will still be some businesses for them to patronize.

And so many more of us have found the challenges of this pandemic are taking a toll.

We have a story on Page 17 of this issue talking about the struggles our health care professionals are facing and some of the resources that are available to them and the general population.

I thought I'd take some time today to share some of the strategies I use to try to maintain good mental health. Maybe some will resonate with you.

• Practice gratitude I've kept a gratitude journal for close to two decades. At first I scoffed at the idea as simplistic and ineffective.

I had no understanding of the power it has to refocus your attention on things that are going well, even on the worst days.

• Seek professional help

In a 2013 column titled "My name is Pam, I have a therapist" I admitted, for the first time in print, that I had been seeing a therapist for more than decade. (Previously I had identified all her good advice in my column as coming from a friend.)

I still see her (or have phone conversations with her, as of March) for help with everything from adjusting my perspective on daily matters to coping with major life issues.

• Feel the feelings In an NPR podcast, Sesame Street's Grover reminds kids of all ages that it's OK to be sad.

"Everybody who is alive gets sad from time to time, and that is OK," he said.

Sadness, anger, frustration. The only way we loosen the hold these emotions have on us is by feeling them and letting them go.

• Seek out diversions Denial is not a helpful strategy when it comes to dealing with difficult

situations, but endless rumination isn't helpful, either. It's also exhausting.

When I find myself immersed too deeply in COVID-19, I take a break. I've enjoyed escaping into Dan Brown novels and episodes of "Lego Masters" and heading outside for some fresh air.

• Help others

"The fragrance always stays in the hand that gives the rose," Hada Bejar writes. So true.

When I reach out to others, by sending a card or making a phone call or dropping off dinner, I help them feel better. I inevitably end up feeling better, too.

• Laugh

"Laughter is the best medicine," the old saying goes. And there's actual evidence that laughter is good for us. It reduces pain, allows us to tolerate discomfort, reduces blood sugar levels and helps blood vessels function better, according to an article in Psychology Today.







SWEET ALI'S GLUTEN-FREE BAKERY

The majority of the sales at Hinsdale's Sweet Ali's Gluten-Free Bakery have historically come from walk-in patrons.

When COVID-19 altered that history two months ago, owner Ali Graeme knew her store had to adapt.

"Most of our orders were not pre-orders," she said. "People were calling without a clear idea of what they want and didn't know what we had."

With no display cases of goodies to steer their selection, phoning customers required significantly more staff time to complete their orders. A more streamlined point-of-sale (POS) system was needed.

"We made taking orders more efficient working with our POS suite," Graeme related. "We've tried to build up our online menu so it's easier for them to decide what they want."

Since opening at 13 W. First St. in 2009, Sweet Ali's has built a loyal following locally and around the country. So much growth, in fact, that in February work was completed converting the adjacent storefront into a expanded bakery. That has turned out to be a mixed blessing.

"We were on top of each other

in the (old) store, so we could do more social distancing within the bakery, which that was the good part," Graeme said. "But the bad part was we now had that additional expense."

Graeme said her shop transitioned to curbside service a couple days ahead of Gov. JB Pritzker's executive order.

"We felt something big is going to happen. I don't think I really understood what all that meant," she remarked.

After a quiet first week under the new restrictions, Graeme said the front of the store was reconfigured and reopened to allow social distancing.

For those not wanting to exit the car, the store has been permitted to mark the parking spaces out front with numbers to coordinate order pickups.

"We had to organize our processes a lot," she said.

On the baking side, ingredients in high demand universally — like eggs and yeast — have proved difficult to acquire at times. Paper towel consumption is impossible to avoid, Graeme admitted, but the staff has learned to make in-house hand sanitizer.

"In challenging circumstances, people rise up and do things they didn't think the could do," she said.

The store has also added savory family meals to its menu for those that need a break from cooking, and she's selling DIY baking and cookie decorating kits for those spreading their culinary wings.

"We're trying to adapt to a customer base looking to do more at home," she said.

Having some staff with children remote learning at home means dealing with employee absences, which usually translates into more hours for Graeme.

"We have to rethink the business. You've got the production side, and then you've got the planning side," she said, noting that, when restrictions are officially lifted, she'll be taking a cautious approach.

Whatever the future holds, Graeme said Sweet Ali's expects to be a part of it.

"We plan to be around, to be nimble and to try and figure it out," she said. "I am optimistic. I think we put together a good product and we try to make it easy for people to access.



SALT CREEK HOLDS BLOOD DRIVE

Seventy-four donors participated in a May 5-6 blood drive hosted by the Salt Creek Club in Hinsdale.

The drive was run by Versiti, a local blood supplier that supports 73 hospitals in the Chicagoland area, including Amita Hinsdale Hospital.

Due to Covid-19, many drives have been canceled,

which has led to a severe shortage of blood components for patients in need. Salt Creek Club had originally agreed to host a drive on May 5 and had filled donor slots within days. When Versiti reached out a week before the drive to see if Salt Creek Club would add a second day, as another drive had been canceled, the club quickly agreed.

Mental Health Month right on time

Anxiety around COVID-19 creating new conversations, approaches to mental health

Mental Health Month has been observed the fifth month of every year since 1949. But the month of May has never looked quite like it does in 2020.

"A lot has changed, obviously, in the last couple of months," said Greg DiDomenico, president and chief executive officer of Community Memorial Foundation in Hinsdale. "The coronavirus has affected all of us in different ways. That's why self-care, particularly mental health, is so important."

Among those who are feeling the emotional toll of COVID-19 acutely are health-care professionals and first responders. The normal hospital cycle of diagnosing, treating and sending patients home has been altered dramatically for many, said Hinsdale's Dr. Chris Colbert, assistant program director of the emergency medicine residency program at the University of Illinois at Chicago.

"We don't have that luxury with COVID, and that has an emotional wear on physicians. It has an emotional wear on patients. It has an emotional wear on nurses as well," Colbert said.

The number of COVID-19 patients appears to be leveling off somewhat, he said, but doctors and nurses still have anxiety about contracting the virus themselves or bringing it home to family members. And the hospital environment they were accustomed to has changed.

"We are now working in a hospital where we have N95 masks on, we have face shields on, we have gowns on," he said. "That alone changes the culture of an emergency room."

The recent suicide of an emergency room doctor in New York has helped bring conversations about mental health in the medical community to the forefront, Colbert said.

"That is a positive aspect," he said. "There is a lot of silver lining to this COVID cloud. We are expanding the conversation. We are expanding the conversation on mental health of hospital faculty. We are expanding the conversation on phys-

ical wellness and mental wellness as well. We're expanding the conversation on patient wellness.'

The husband and father of three said the most important thing people can do is to check in on one another.

"Just ask — ask how people are doing," he said. "There is not one person that doesn't have a loved one that is involved with medicine in some capacity."

Mental health resources

People also can check in on themselves, DiDomenico said, using a series of online screenings available through Mental Health America with the clever title "Take a checkup from the neck up."

The site (see sidebar) — offers mental health tests focused on depression, anxiety, eating disorders, addiction and a host of other subjects.

"It's just a screening for you to be able to gauge where you are in terms of mental health and wellness," DiDomenico said, adding that he took one of the screenings himself.

"It actually helped me to put into words what I was feeling," he shared. "It made me also reflect ... and it forced me to help myself understand more how I was feeling."

Many other online resources exist (see sidebar). The foundation has been working to offer grants to help partner agencies like The Community House, The Living Room and NAMI move from in-person services to digital delivery.

"That's what we supported in our urgent response fund was the ability to build their capacity so they can purchase telephones and other technology to be able to meet the need, to be able to pivot to a virtual platform," DiDomenico said.

The Living Room, a drop-in facility with locations in La Grange and Broadview, closed for a time in March but is back up and running with telehealth services.


"Their numbers are back and other mental health providers very much anticipate a real spike in numbers of people accepting their services because of the post-pandemic recovery," said Nanette Silva, the foundation's program director. "They are saying they are going to see – and are starting to see already — folks who haven't accessed mental health services from them in the past, including the medical health-care providers."

The foundation is working with NAMI DuPage and NAMI Metro to move the Mental Health First Aid Training online. The program will be needed even more in the months to come, Silva said.

People of all ages are experiencing stress and anxiety around everything from making a trip to the grocery store to helping kids with remote learning to mourning the loss of a graduation ceremony and celebration, the two said.

"Humans aren't wired for isolation," Silva said. Which is why it's important for people to remember they are not alone, DiDomenico stressed.

"Reach out. You can text, you can call, and there's help."


History of 531 East Sixth Street Home/Land
