

D86 announces plans for school start

Hinsdale High School District 86 schools will open next week with a variety of COVID-19 mitigation strategies in place, including universal masking.

The district's goal is to maximize consistent, full-time, in-person instruction, Superintendent Tammy Prentiss said in introducing the plan.

"All of these strategies matter and we use them," she said. "Working together, they provide the best defense."

In addition to wearing masks, as mandated Aug. 4 by Gov. JB

Pritzker, students will be seated 3 feet apart in classrooms and will have the opportunity to participate in PCR testing on a weekly basis (possibly more often based on level of community transmission) and to avoid quarantine, if the Illinois Department of Public Health approves a "test to stay" protocol. The DuPage County Health Department has the final say on which option can be used in each case, Prentiss said.

The board voted 6-1 to use the Shield Illinois PCR test, which is being paid for by the state through federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief funds, to all students and staff. A third party

agency will handle collecting the saliva samples and reporting the results.

"Any unvaccinated student or employee that is participating in or leading extracurricular activities must participate in the Shield screening program in order to access that activity," Prentiss said.

Rapid antigen tests will be available at no charge if needed.

District officials also will encourage all students to get the vaccine. "We will absolutely continue to promote those opportunities for students to be vaccinated," Prentiss said, noting 54 percent of 12- to 17-year-olds in DuPage County are fully vaccinated. At Hinsdale

Central, 45 percent of students have filed proof of vaccination, she added.

Students who are home sick or under quarantine will not have access to Zoom instruction but will work with a staff member from the Student Success Center to keep current on their assignments.

If the transmission level remains in the "high" category, events like districtwide staff training, curriculum night and parent-teacher conferences will be held virtually, Hinsdale South Principal Arwen Pokorny-Lyp said.

The district is still working on a

D181 readies for full in-person school year

Ensure in-person learning and adhere to safety measures to limit COVID-19-related interruptions.

Those are primary 2021-22 school-year goals for Community Consolidated School District 181, according to Superintendent Hector Garcia, as schools prepare to welcome back students Monday, Aug. 23, to full-time in-person instruction.

"We know how difficult it is for a student to be in person and then

have to be online," Garcia said at Monday's board of education meeting. "We're going to do everything possible to ensure that they're here with us, in person, throughout the entire year."

To achieve that objective, which hasn't been possible since the 2018-19 calendar, the district will adhere to Gov. JB Pritzker's Aug. 4 statewide mask mandate for preschool through high school students and staff, regardless of vaccination status.

Following federal and local guidelines, students will be distanced at

least 3 feet apart in classrooms and at least 6 feet apart in lunchrooms, when their masks will be removed. Elementary students will be able to go home for lunch.

"We're going to continue many of the practices that we had in place during the spring," Garcia reported.

The district will use LOOP Medical Center to manage weekly COVID surveillance testing with noninvasive nasal swabbing conducted at home. The optional testing is offered at no cost to the district or families.

"The nice thing about LOOP is

we'll receive the results in less than 12 hours," reported Rick Engstrom, assistant superintendent of business and operations.

Currently, students who test positive and close contacts will need to quarantine for 10 days after the contact's last exposure to the positive case if no symptoms develop. Officials are hopeful that the DuPage County Health Department will at some point shift to a seven-day quarantine period guideline that is being followed in other states.

more than 20 years ago, Greg White never forgot the energy of those eateries and the joy they brought to diners. He long dreamed of owning his own pizza restaurant, and on July 16, that dream finally came true.

White is the new owner of Baldinelli Pizza at 114 S. Washington.

"I really fell in love with the Hinsdale area," said White, who purchased the restaurant after a five-year search for the perfect segue from workforce management to restaurant ownership.

Along with the pizza that Baldinelli fans have come to love, White said he will introduce his own honey beer crust as an option, along with new appetizers and a vamped up bar selection. He said he wants to create a place where families can have fun with their kids, coworkers can gather for an after-work drink and people can just hang out with their friends. He's planning some interior changes to allow for more seating and to make the back room more accessible from the main entrance.

"We're trying to bring a more fun and playful environment for people to come in and have some pizza," White said.

Carryout and delivery also will be available.

"There will be a rebranding coming," said White, whose restaurant will be known as Sauced Pizzeria. Until then, fans of Baldinelli can visit knowing that the pizza they love is here to stay, even if it has a new name.

Dying Breed improves on

The changes at what was long known as Nick's Silver Shears are subtle, but they're not going unnoticed, said new owner Alex Frausto.

Frausto and Allyson Berquist took over the Hinsdale main-

Rossi joins Frausto and Berquist on Wednesdays, and while customers now can book appointments via phone or on the website (dyingbreedbarbershop.com), they also welcome Rossi's walk-in customers whenever possible.

One customer who recently dropped in for a cut told Berquist he had been coming to the shop for more than 30 years. After his initial visit to Dying Breed, he said that wasn't about to change.

Dying Breed provides short cuts for men, women and children, along with shaves. They also offer a line of hair

and beard care products.

Hours are from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday-Thursday, 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Friday, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, and closed Sunday and Monday.

Experts in beauty share

Registered Nurse Amie Martin opened Aesthetic Mentor as a training ground for medical professionals interested in the art of injectables. Nurses, physicians, dentists, nurse practitioners and physician associates interested in offering med spa services such as Botox and fillers to their patients can turn to Aesthetic Mentor for private training, group instruction and follow-up support.

Along with clinical instruction, the experts at Aesthetic Mentor help providers with marketing their new skills and services.

"We can help with the business aspects of the industry," Martin said.

COVID-19 cases show increase in Hinsdale

Twenty-five new Hinsdale residents have tested positive for COVID-19 over the past week.

The DuPage County Health Department reported 23 new cases, and the Cook County Health Department reported two new cases.

That brings the total number of reported cases in the village to 1,894, compared to 1,869 last week.

Amita Hinsdale Hospital had seven confirmed COVID-19 patient and two patients awaiting test results as of Wednesday, a spokesman said.

The rolling seven-day positivity rate for Region 8, which includes DuPage County, was 6 percent on Saturday, compared to 5.3 percent a week prior.

Illinois has administered almost 13.7 million doses of vaccines. An average of 39,011 doses are being administered daily, compared to about 24,695 last week.

Almost 62 percent of DuPage County residents are fully vaccinated. In the 60521 ZIP code, 67 percent of residents have had one shot and almost 63 percent are fully vaccinated.

MEETING ROUNDUP

Community Consolidated School District 181 Board

Among other business Monday, board members:

- heard a presentation on ALICE, a training course for staff and students on strategies for survival in the event that a school intruder enters the building with intent to do harm. The training focuses on cases where, in addition to a lockdown, the teacher and students may take extra precautions to barricade the entrance of the classroom and/or to evacuate the building. The cost for the program is approximately \$12,000 to \$14,000, which includes access to all online courses within the ALICE School Safety and Wellness Suite, curriculum and eLearning support. It is scheduled to be implemented at the start of the 2022-23 school year.

- approved a memorandum of understanding with the Hinsdale-Clarendon Hills Teachers' Association agreeing to provisions related to live-streamed instruction and sick leave due to a positive test for COVID-19.

- received the following donations: \$490.05 (for a total of \$3,212.55) from the Office of the Illinois Secretary of State for a School District Library Grant Award to benefit the district's library media programs; \$13,064 from the District 181 Foundation to benefit teachers by paying for the June Institute Day speaker, individual summer learning course fees and professional development; and from the HMS PTO, \$2,000 for furniture to outfit a calming room. \$575.20 for sixth-grade dictionaries, \$2,100 for supplies for students in need and \$305.26 for the end-of-year staff luncheon.

Vocalists don't let COVID stop the music

Grace Richards and Vyktoria Saulis have always found ways to share their love of song with the world around them. A pandemic wasn't going to change that.

Richards and Saulis are co-founders of Song for a Smile, a nonprofit dedicated to bringing joy with personalized video recordings of requested songs, as well as concerts, performed and recorded by Richards, Saulis and their musical friends.

Richards has been singing for nursing home residents since she was 11 years old. But that was no longer possible when such facilities closed their doors to visitors due to COVID-19. Rather than fall silent, she mentioned the idea of Song for a Smile to Saulis.

"We started the next day," Richards said,

They began by offering Valentine's Day greetings to residents of the Villa St. Benedict nursing home near Benet Academy in Lisle. The 32 volunteers recorded 38 songs.

"That was way more than we were expecting. It was an immediate success," Richards said.

"Some of the men ordered songs for their wives," Saulis added.

Saudis said the musicians benefit as well as the recipients by giving them a platform to sing and perform.

"It was a great situation for everybody," she said.

The video messages were sent via email, allowing the sender and the recipient to watch and listen over and over again.

Saulis focuses on community outreach, volunteer recruitment and nursing home participation, while Richards takes care of the business side of the pair's endeavor. She handles the website, legal issues and video production.

"I had never edited anything before," said Richards, who has learned to compile collections of submitted videos into full-length concerts for residents of Villa St. Benedict to enjoy.

Song for a Smile's St. Patrick's Day concert was almost two hours long and featured a xylophone player, a jazz quartet and piano, as well as singers. For the Fourth of July, Richards and Saulis organized a collection of patriotic songs record-

ed by singers from as far away as New Jersey and Colorado.

"We were coming from all over America," Richards said.

Song for a Smile also has solidified Richards' interest in pursuing a business career. Saulis, meanwhile, hopes to expand her knowledge of marketing after high school.

To be sure their organization keeps generating smiles beyond their high school careers, Richards and Saulis are recruiting for a board of directors. The duo would also like to see the concept expand to other high schools, and to have their own chapter reach more people.

While working on an "Oldies but Goodies" concert for early fall, Song for a Smile is creating a recorded concert of Disney songs for children at area hospitals.

Volunteers can find information on the organization's website, <https://www.songforasmile.org>. No experience is necessary, and the only requirement is the desire to spread joy through song, Saulis said.

Masks aren't only measure to keep students safe

Students head back to school next week in Community Consolidated School District 181 and Hinsdale High School District 86.

We've already written about the importance of getting vaccines for teens who are eligible and wearing masks. But there is something else we can do as adults to help protect kids this school year. We can pay an extra bit of attention to our driving habits.

Heading back to class is always a change in routine for kids on their way to and from school. That means they might not always be paying as much attention as they should to drivers as they cross the street.

We can do our part to make sure the route to school is a safe one for kids by following these tips from the National Safety Council.

- Don't block the crosswalk when stopped at a red light or waiting to make a turn, forcing pedestrians to go around you, as this could put them in the path of moving traffic.

- In a school zone when flashers are blinking, stop and yield to pedestrians crossing the crosswalk or intersection.

- Always stop for a school patrol officer or crossing guard holding up a stop sign.

- Take extra care to look out for children in school zones, near playgrounds and parks, and in all residential areas.

- Don't honk or rev your engine to scare a pedestrian, even if you have the right of way.

- Never pass a vehicle stopped for pedestrians.

The council also offers these suggestions for drivers sharing the road with bicyclists, noting that children often create special problems for drivers because they are not capable of properly determining traffic conditions.

- When passing a bicyclist, proceed in the same direction slowly, keeping 3 feet between your car and the cyclist.

- When turning left when a bicyclist is approaching in the opposite direction, wait for the rider to pass,

- When turning right with a bicyclist approaching from behind on the right, let the rider go through the intersection first, and always use a turn signal.

- Watch for bike riders turning in front of you

without looking or signaling; children especially have a tendency to do this.

- Be extra vigilant in school zones and residential neighborhoods,

- Watch for bikes coming from driveways or behind parked cars.

- Check side mirrors before opening your door.

Finally, drivers who find themselves behind a bus should follow this advice.

- Never pass a bus from behind — or from either direction if you're on an undivided road — if it is stopped to load or unload children.

- If the yellow or red lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended, traffic must stop.

- The area 10 feet around a school bus is the most dangerous for children; stop far enough back to allow them space to safely enter and exit the bus.

- Be alert; children often are unpredictable, and they tend to ignore hazards and take risks.

Let's all do our part to make sure we share the road safely with students heading back to school.

Michigan trip fires up hankering for grill goodies

Getting ready to go to Michigan in August has become almost as much of a ritual as the trip itself.

We've fine-tuned our packing list over the years and start gathering our supplies — from marshmallow roasting sticks for s'mores to a battery-powered pump to inflate floaties — a week in advance.

I've got a routine at work, too, part of which is to find a column I have previously written to re-run in this space. A favorite of mine has been one I wrote about a delicious grilling recipe — chicken satay with peanut sauce — from my favorite summer cookbook, Kingsford Best Barbecues. My mom found it for me for \$2.99 years ago at the Hines VA Hospital gift shop while my dad was a patient there.

Despite the bargain price, the cookbook has some truly great recipes. The chicken satay is fantastic, but I thought it might be nice to switch things up a bit and share two other recipes from the cookbook.

So here they are. Happy grilling!

Chicken w/Mediterranean salsa

I love this recipe and always make a double batch of Mediterranean

salsa. Like the peanut sauce, it tastes great on just about anything. While the recipes specify briquets, for obvious reasons, we've found they work just fine on a gas grill.

1/4 cup olive oil

3 tablespoons lemon juice

4 to 6 boneless, skinless chicken breast halves

Salt and black pepper

Rosemary sprigs for garnish

Combine olive oil and lemon juice in a shallow glass dish; add chicken. Turn breasts lightly to coat with mixture; let stand 10 to 15 minutes. Remove chicken from dish and wipe off excess oil. Season with salt and pepper.

Oil hot grid to prevent sticking. Place chicken on grill and cook, covered, over medium briquets, 10 to 15 minutes until chicken is cooked through, turning once or twice.

Garnish with Mediterranean salsa.

Mediterranean salsa

2 tablespoons olive oil

2 tablespoons white wine vinegar

1 clove garlic, minced
2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh basil or 1 teaspoon dried basil leaves, crushed

1 tablespoon finely chopped rosemary or 1 teaspoon dried rosemary, crushed

1 teaspoon sugar
1/4 teaspoon black pepper

10 to 15 kalamata olives, seeded and coarsely chopped (can substitute black olives)

1/2 cup chopped seeded cucumber

1/4 cup finely chopped red onion

1 cup chopped seeded tomatoes (about 1/2 pound)

1/3 cup crumbled feta cheese

Combine oil, vinegar, garlic, basil, rosemary, sugar and pepper in a medium bowl. Add olive, cucumber and onion; toss to coat. Cover and refrigerate until ready to serve. Just before serving, gently stir in tomatoes and feta cheese. Makes about 2 cups.

Seafood kabobs

This recipe is simple, delicious and great if you're watching your carbs!

24 large sea scallops
12 medium shrimp, shelled and deveined

1 can (8.5 ounces) whole small artichoke hearts, drained and cut in halves

2 red or yellow peppers cut into 2-inch pieces

1/4 cup olive oil

1/4 cup lime juice

Lime slices and sage sprigs for garnish

Thread scallops, shrimp, artichoke hearts and peppers alternately on metal skewers. Combine oil and lime juice in a small bowl; brush kabobs with lime mixture.

Oil hot grid to help prevent sticking. Grill kabobs on an uncovered grill, over low briquets, 6 to 8 minutes. Halfway through cooking time, baste top with lime mixture, then turn kabobs and continue grilling until scallops and shrimp firm up and turn opaque. Remove kabobs from grill and baste again with lime mixture. Garnish with lime slices and sage sprigs.

"Put down that phone and throw the ball, already!"


"Is it time to eat yet? ... What about now?"



Village residents may see higher water bills as new rates take effect

Starting Wednesday, Sept. 1, some Hinsdale residents may see an increase in their water bill.

In order to ensure the municipal water system is properly funded for years to come, the Hinsdale Village Board has changed its billing structure to a fixed fee and variable rate structure.

Under this structure, all village residents will pay \$15 every two months, along with a variable rate tied to water usage. Revenue generated from the fixed fee will be used to fund village projects to improve water infrastructure,

ensuring a safe water system.

Proposed projects include making repairs to and repainting the water storage standpipe, continuing the funding for annual localized drainage studies and projects, and funding for annual water main and sewer lining projects in accordance with the village's five-year Capital Improvement Plan.

The minimum charge for variable water usage has been eliminated. New variable water rates include a premium rate for usage over 10,000 centum cubic feet (ccf) per billing cycle. Residents will be

charged \$8 for each 100 ccf up to 10,000 ccf per billing cycle and \$12.38 for each 100 ccf over 10,000 ccf per billing cycle.

Other rates may apply for non-residents and high-volume users. The average homeowner will see an increase of \$1.58 per month. Some residents may see a decrease.

This will be the first change in village water rates since 2015 and follows both local and national trends in evolving rate structures of how residents pay for water, according to village officials.

SAMMY HANZEL, RECREATION SUPERVISOR

Anyone who has attended Hinsdale's Fourth of July celebration, sifted through the parks brochure or clicked on the village's website has witnessed firsthand the work of Sammy Hanzel.

As recreation and marketing communications manager for the village, Hanzel not only plans a host of special events but also lets people know about them through banners, website posts, brochures and flyers.

"If it's printed, I probably worked on it," said Hanzel, who joined Hinsdale's staff five years ago, soon after graduating from Indiana University.

With a degree in recreation and an emphasis on tourism, hospitality and events management, Hanzel started in the recreation department but has since assumed roles that impact many village hall departments.

"I've just taken on more and more," she said of her expanding realm of responsibility, including last year's redesign of the village website and supervising the Hinsdale Community Pool.

her defined role with the village.

"Everything we do is a team effort," she said. "You really get to have your hands in a little bit of everything."

Hanzel, who grew up working for her hometown Wheaton Park District and also interned with the Glen Ellyn Park District, knew a parks and recreation career would be her post-college pursuit. What Hanzel didn't know, she related, was her enjoyment of opportunities to leverage her skills in other areas of municipal business. Hanzel said Hinsdale's relatively small size and the fact that it has a recreation department rather than a park district affords her chances to demonstrate her versatility.

"I wear a lot of hats," Hanzel said, one of which resembles that of a Christmas elf.

Santa's mailbox, which was added last year as a fun way for children to safely celebrate the holidays, is one of the good things to come out of the pandemic, and it will be back this year.

The pandemic forced Hanzel and the rest of the recreation department to get creative when it came to finding safe ways

for Hinsdale residents to keep busy. Along with new events like Santa's mailbox, favorites like Movies in the Park and Lunch on the Lawn were adapted for the times. Other events, like Corks and Forks, had to be put aside. Hanzel said she's hopeful that the successful food and wine event can return soon.

Summer is the busiest time of the year for Hanzel and the entire park and recreation department, and there's still plenty to look forward to in the final days of the season. 

plan for how and where students will be seated at lunch.

"That's where our close contacts are going to happen," Hinsdale Central Principal Bill Walsh said. "They are going to happen in the lunchroom and on the athletic fields and in the clubs."

The library might be used to provide seating space for some at 6 feet apart, he noted.

"We're exploring it," Walsh said. "If you have ideas, I'm open to them. I

don't have all the answers. I'm looking for ideas."

The district is still waiting for the Illinois Department of Public Health to provide a decision tree that will determine what course of action the district must take in response to an outbreak or other serious developments.

Administrators also discussed efforts underway to support students academically and emotionally. Parent Leah Torsberg encouraged the board to reach out to all students, even if they seem to be handling everything well.

"Not every child is going to exhibit the stress or ask for help, but they are distressed," she said. "Whatever it takes, please reach out to every child."

Parent Lisa Pomeroy, a District 86 graduate, criticized the governor's mask order.

"Personally I think masking should be a choice between parents and kids," she said. "It seems like everything has already been agreed to. This is the way it's going to be. He is going to dictate everything."

Parent Polly Ascher said the real

emergency involves the mental health of students.

She also encouraged the board to hire a third party to evaluate the harm masks cause from psychological, physical and academic angles. Teens agreed to get vaccinated thinking their lives would go back to normal, she said.

"They feel deceived," she said. "They will not forget this inhumane cruelty that has been thrust upon them. History will not look kindly upon what we have done."

"We're setting up our entire structure to be ready for that opportunity. We believe that's going to be an option, we just don't know when," Garcia said, noting that universal masking is a prerequisite to that option being available.

Academically, the curriculum will revert to pre-pandemic instructional sched-

ules. Students wishing to learn at home full time need district approval. District and state assessments will be administered in person.

Even with the governor's executive order requiring masks in schools, some residents voiced their opposition to the district going along with it.

"The masks should be optional," said Burr Ridge

parent Jacqueline Parrillo, claiming that herd immunity has been established. "I'd like to see the (district) make a move to mask-optional so we can all serve our children and our liberties."

Parent Benjamin Hughes said he believes children are being adversely impacted by the measure.

"We're losing developmental years in kids that are very

important to learn boundaries and to be able to understand (emotional and physical) responses based on their own actions," Hughes said.

Garcia said navigating the changing pandemic landscape has not been easy.

"This summer has been quite a challenge," Garcia said. "It seemed like almost every week we were receiving new (COVID-19) guidance."

Board President Margie Kleber acknowledged the divisions that exist on mask requirements.

She reiterated that the steps being taken are to promote that goal of year-round in-person instruction.

"I appreciate the frustration. We're all trying to do our best to make sure that our children come to school every day," Kleber said.

After decades spent living and working in Hinsdale, Matt Miller has explored just about every corner of the village. Except for one.

A musician since his teen years, Miller said he has long dreamed of playing on the Uniquely Thursdays stage. It's a dream he will see come true tonight, Aug. 19.

"Getting a gig is one thing. Getting a show that's a part of your life, it makes such a difference," said Miller, who will perform with the rock cover band Reckless from 6 to 9 p.m. in Burlington Park, 30 E. Chicago Ave.

The band will select songs from their 150-song repertoire that will entertain the crowd while showcasing the percussion, keyboard and vocal skills of Miller, said band founder Lisa Marie Martusciello.

"We play everything," said Martusciello, including dance hits, rock classics and pop songs.

Miller and Martusciello met while Miller was performing with another band several years ago. After inviting Martusciello to join him on stage, she returned the favor by inviting Miller to play keyboard in Reckless.

"It's the best move I ever made," Martusciello said.

She said Miller's keyboard skills bring Reckless to another level, allowing them the instrumentation to perform songs by bands like Van Halen, Journey and Led Zeppelin.

"We get to play songs that have horns in them," said Martusciello, who said Miller's orchestration of "Stairway to Heaven" gives her chills every time, and will likely do the same for the audience.

Miller grew up in Chicago but moved to Hinsdale after

high school. He worked at the Shell station before being hired by the Hinsdale Police Department as a community service officer in 2000 — a position he still holds today. He added security officer at Hinsdale Central High School to his resume six years ago.

"He's the officer friendly of Hinsdale. He takes care of everyone," Martusciello said.

Growing up in a family of seven children, Miller said he and his brother taught themselves music in the garage while the rest of the family played sports or watched them on television.

"I learned to play by ear," said Miller, who started out playing drums and later took on the keyboard. Still playing by ear, he tries to make every song he plays sound like the recording that his audience remembers. He also sings backup vocals and even takes lead on a few songs, some of which will be performed at Uniquely Thursdays.

"It's exciting for us to play for our friends, our neighbors and families," Miller said.

As the summer outdoor

concert season draws to a close, Reckless looks forward to a busy fall and winter. Their calendar is booked through December with weddings, festivals and bar shows.

And while this is the band's first performance in Hinsdale, they've played in Martusciello's hometown of Burr Ridge several times and will return for Concerts on the Green Sept. 9 and Taste of Burr Ridge on Oct. 9.

"There's a lot of talent in this group," Miller said.

But being part of Reckless is about more than making music. Miller said his five Reckless bandmates are lifelong friends who have made him a better musician and a better person.

"In 14 years our band has never had a fight," Martusciello said. "We're really all friends."

Uniquely Thursdays continues Aug. 26 with a performance by Semple Band and concludes Sept. 2 with another locally grown band, the Millennials.

Hinsdale All-Stars reach regionals

Little League 12Us win state title, fall one victory short of world series berth

While many took in Major League Baseball's "Field of Dreams" game last week, the Hinsdale Little League All-Stars were pursuing their own dreams at Little League's Great Lakes Regional in Whitestown, Ind.

The talented team made up of mostly 12-year-olds came within a game of reaching the Little League World Series before a second loss on Friday brought the season to an end.

"It was a great ride with the kids and they had a lot of fun," said assistant coach Ryan McLaughlin.

Gathered at Hinsdale's Peirce Park, where the team's run began by winning the district tournament in June, players reflected on winning the state championship and registering a regional win against Kentucky.

Team member RJ Lewis said the squad's performance exceeded his expectations.

"Personally I didn't think we were going to make it this far," he said. "Going as far as regionals, that's just truly amazing."

The district championship qualified them for the sectionals, where they faced tough tests against Alsip and Burbank. Hinsdale dropped the first game to Burbank, then had to stage a final inning comeback win over Alsip to stay alive in the tournament. They would have to beat Burbank twice to move on to state. So they did just that.

"After Burbank, we weren't as confident," said team member Cam Linn. "Once we beat them again, it felt really good."

That good feeling propelled the team into the state tournament in Paris,

where players were eager to take on Bourbonnais to avenge a 2019 loss at the 10U level that had left a lingering sting.

"Beating Bourbonnais was the most important part of state to us because two years ago we lost to them," said team member Max Judge. "We kind of got our revenge."

By this time the Little Leaguers' belief in themselves was surging.

"We almost completely blew out every team at state," Max added.

Coach McLaughlin said the players were locked in. "They went to state and just really played great and never got behind in any games. They did well at the plate and pitched well," he said.

Head coach Adam Linn said it was a commanding performance.

"That was awesome, to not lose a game," he remarked.

At the same time their

camaraderie was coalescing.

"We bonded as a team really well instead of being just individual players. As the season went on we kind of became just one good baseball team," said team member Owen Sunderson.

At the regional tournament the six participating teams were largely confined to a hotel due to COVID protocols. That dampened the experience a bit but also promoted intersquad connections.

"It was cool being with all the other teams there," Cam Linn said.

The team's opening match-up with Warren County South from Kentucky couldn't have gone better, ending in a 5-1 Hinsdale victory, all broadcast by ESPN.

"It was kind of fun knowing that people watching at home knew you won," Owen said.

Next up was Michigan, a team they'd gotten to

know well as their hotel neighbors. A tight early contest ultimately became a 0-10 defeat. But a win against Ohio would punch Hinsdale's ticket for Williamsport as both the regional champion and runner-up qualified this year.

Unfortunately Hinsdale's bats couldn't get heated up and the team fell 0-12.

"We just ran into really good pitching and we didn't particularly pitch well or play well," coach McLaughlin said.

Assistant coach Chris Marnell considers it a successful journey.

"We always thought if we win state, going to regionals or even Williamsport, that was just icing on the cake," he said. "Winning state was the highlight."

So will team members be cheering on anyone in the Little League World Series, which starts today?

"I'll root for Michigan," several of the players said in unison. "We bonded

with those kids."

Players said getting to spend time together, often in a bubble, grinding through an intensive couple months of baseball produced a lot of highly competitive Spike Ball games during downtime, and good memories.

"I had a lot of fun getting to know my teammates better and hanging out with them," said team member Luke McLaughlin

"It was just a good season, practicing with the boys," team member Jupiter Pohlenz said.

Coach Linn said the town's elevated profile became clear when a family member recently placed a furniture order with a Hinsdale delivery address,

"He said, 'Hinsdale? I just saw you guys on ESPN!'" Linn related with a laugh. "That's just crazy."

"It was great representing Hinsdale, but representing Illinois was amazing," Max said.




